Schnitzers Find Retreat In Local Hills

Ornithologists Travel To Study Migration Paths

Huge, dark, rocky hills rise above just a few miles from Mountainside Highway 22, where a acre tract of ancient trees grow profusion and the sound of mat breaking the silence is the call of a bird or the soft scuttle a chipmunk makes as he scurries under a pile of fallen leaves.

This is the refuge where Albert and Eva Schnitzer, nature lovers both, had moved into seven years ago so they could live close to nature with woods and sky around them and within easy traveling distance of Elizabeth, where Albert's firm, Schnitzer Associates, is located. And so an extra bonus, their family can follow their favorite avian orthodoxy.

The Schnitzers, who are nationally known as a fixtures on bird lists, recently from a trap in Greece and Turkey. Although it was sponsored by an ecological group and field traps were aimed at birds in that field, Albert and Eva found time to add their names to those of the birds of that area.

The mystery of bird migration has long been a fascination subject for both of them. "How," Albert asked, "with frown furrowing his forehead, "does a tiny mountain bird, for instance, make its hundreds of miles long across the open seas of the Gulf of Mexico without starving to death?"

In captivity, Albert explained, mountain birds must be fed every hour, or they fall into a comatose state. This mystery and others similar to it fascinate the Schnitzers and for several years they have worked at attempting to solve them.

Last year they completed a four-year study on the migration of birds, devoting an entire month during the fall of each year to the project. Based on Monhegan Island, a small land area 15 miles off the coast of Maine, they conducted a massive bird-banding project to attempt to establish whether
