

Yet many shows might have followed and diverted, or made you revel in your own comfort, or might have fit in so intensely as to create a new and greater catharsis.

"Stop the World, etc." did none of these, but rather did involve one with a dreary and intellectually dull life cycle of an arrogant little chap. I could hardly wait for his world to stop so that he could get off and so that I could get out to listen to the

Anthony Newley and Leslie original direction. It is, to quote the authors, "a new-style com-edy" that is freely eclectic and corn fed and led in its imagination. It finds everyman or Little through the seven ages of man in a circus tent, employing pantomime and music hall techniques, with a rhythmic and calisthenic chorus in the background, and a wife Eve who is all women and plays all the women in his life. However it took Newly and Bricusse two and a half hours to say what Shakespeare took 30 to 40 lines.

Can't Get Off "Stop The World, I Want To Get Off" indites the dilemma of the average man who steps gingerly from each convention, succeeding, failing, thinking of him self as a paragon, handling his frustrations and frustrating his handlers, and emphasizing that you can't get off.

I find no fault with Kenneth Nelson as Little Chap. Nelson is a reasonable theatrical triple threat, who does nicely in pantomime and burlesque timing and in endurance contests, for he is on stage almost the entire per-

#### Overlook Donation Will Help To Expand Coronary Care Unit

Overlook Hospital has been announced by Ralph W. Burger, president of the foundation, and director.

The funds will be used for equipment and personnel training in the four-bed intensive coronary care unit planned for the new wing, which is now under construction in Summit. Overlook's \$6,500,000 expansion is scheduled for completion in early 1967.

Last March, Overlook pioneered in New Jersey with one of the first coronary care units in the state, opened as a two-bed pilot unit. Since then the hospital has set up a comprehensive training program attended by nurses from many other hospitals, to instruct them in the techniques of intensive coronary care.

Tansey, chairman of the cardiac resuscitation committee.

#### Grant Expands Unit

The John A. Hartford Foundation grant will be used for monitoring and other life-saving quipment in the new coronary care unit, which will be double he size of Overlook's present unit, as well as more streamlined and efficient in lay-out.

In the new unit, each of the four patients will have the privacy of his own room, yet remain visible to the nurses in charge through glass partitions facing on the central station. A multiple oscilloscope panel at the main nursing desk will duplicate the monitor panel at each bed, giving added insur-ance of constant supervision. There will be an auditory as well as visual alert connected to each panel, plus an automatic pacemaker which is connected for instant action should it be required.
