## Unit to give advice on bond sales Borough will issue

\$1½ million in bonds A citizens committee which will advise

the Borough Council on bonding and financing was, appointed by Mayor Frederick Wilhelms jr. Tuesday night as the governing body authorized the issuance of \$190,000 in bond anticipation notes, the first phase of approxi-mately \$1,500,000 in bonds expected to be issued by the community within the next 18 The five appointees, Wilbur Groves of

Creek Bed rd., Kenneth Donnelly of Darby lane, Nick Bradshaw of Partridge run, Charles Harrington of Evergreen ct. and Dick Whitcomb of Deer path, are all "knowledgeable" in finance, according to Wilhelms, and will advise the Council on the sale, distribution, amounts and timing of the bond sales.

The \$190,000 bond anticipation notes authorized Tuesday night will be used to pay for the storm drainage work in the Darby lane-Summit rd. area which is now about 80 percent complete. Work contracts on the job, the first of four such projects planned for the borough, totaled about \$92,000. Engineering fees will be added to that figure but will not bring the total to the \$190,000.

Other projects for which bond issues have already been approved by the Borough Council are the library, \$370,000 and the bathhouse for the pool \$90,000. The voters last October



approved a bond issue of \$845,000 for an addiion to Deerfield School. The library, the bathhouse and the tennis courts are now under construction. Work on the school addition is scheduled to begin this summer.

The Council introduced two ordinances Tuesday night, one appropriating \$15,000 from the capital improvement account for tennis and volley ball courts and the other creating the office of municipal engineer. Public hearings on both measures are scheduled June 20 at 8 p.m. in Echobrook School.

The tennis and volley ball courts are now under construction near the site of the muni-

The title of municipal engineer will be conferred on the borough's Superintendent of Public Works, Robert Koser, who also serves as tax assessor. Mayor Wilhelms explained that since Koser, a licensed engineer and land surveyor, does already perform engineering and related duties for the borough the Council deemed it advisable to spell out the title for him officially. He will continue to serve as Superintendent of Public Works and Tax As-

## **Board awards contracts** for library furnishings

Contracts totaling \$28,868 for shelving, furniture and equipment for the new library building were awarded Monday night by the trustees. The bulk of the money, \$26,917, will go to the Sjostrom Co. of Philadelphia for shelving, equipment and tables. Farkas Co. of Newark was awarded a contract for \$1,951 for chairs, etc.

Both contracts set an Oct. 2 deadline for delivery.

The trustees instructed the acting borough

attorney, Norman Shulaner, to draw up the contracts.

Two other companies, the Library Bureau of Remington Rand, Inc., of New York City, and Reeves Manufacturing Co., submitted bids on May 2; the first concern bid on all the equipment, Reeves bid only on the steel

The previously announced date for the opening of the new library was set for sometime in September. However, the board president, Sidney Mele, had indicated that there was a chance that delivery of the equipment might delay the opening a short while.



#### PROFILE---Albert J. Benninger

On March 30, Albert J. Benninger, long-time GOP leader in this borough and in the county, underwent an operation in which a command pace-maker was connected to his heart. Toward the end of April he announced that he would quit his post as State Republican Committeeman before the end of the year and move from his present home at 1454 Orchard rd. to Little Silver, a shore community near

Many people thought that this meant the veteran political virtuoso was going into semiretirement. But those who know him best doubted that --- "Al isn't able to stay idle, not even semi-idle," one said.

The latter group was right.

Benninger is bouncing around with the same old zest. And with a typical reaction, he has become interested in another cause as the result of his operation.

He's busy organizing a kind of Pace-maker Club, a group with membership to be drawn from Union County residents who have pace-

The group will not spend time rehashing the details of their operations --- there won't be time for that. They'll be busy raising poor guy who needs a pace-setter and can't afford it."

Benninger is convinced that his fellow pacesetter-wearers will be as eager as he to take this tangible way of saying "we're thankful we're alive.'

Benninger has already marshalled his own formidable organizational abilities to get the project underway. He's contacted the director of the Union County Heart Association, sent out "feelers" to friends and associates and taken many other preliminary steps to set the wheels rolling.

Although the framework of the proposed

organization has not yet been set up. Benninger projects it as a three-pronged endeavor which will supply economic assistance for a heart patient, give tangible support to the County Heart Fund and to the heart work of Overlook Hospital and the pace-maker clinic at Beth Isrel Hospital, Newark.

Benninger will get monthly pace-maker check-ups at the Beth Israel Clinic, as do most wearers of the miraculous mechanical

"All this wonderful work so many agencies are doing --- I want to do something practical to show my gratitude. I think this organization is at least part of the answer.'

AL BENNINGER IS A GOOD ORGANIZER. According to him, it started back in boyhood days in Mountainside when he was one of six

children of a "poor farmer."
"I made up my mind when I was a kid, I was going to get somewhere," he grinned widely, remembering, "I was always talking --- my parents used to tell me I had a big

That "big mouth" helped put Al Benninger on the Borough Council when he was 21, the youngest man ever to sit on that body. Now 58, Benninger has had a long, successful political career in which he tangled successfully with older rivals and during which he came in close contact with national poli-

tical figures. The big, rambling home on Orchard rd., into which he and his wife, Betty, moved about 17 years ago, has a basement room which gives a pictorial record of his poli-tical career. He is shown with former President Eisenhower, when he was making his first bid for the presidency, former president Nixon, Senator Case, the late Jim Mitchell, once Secretary of Labor, former Governor Al Driscoll, the late Bernard Shanley, Chief Justice Earl Warren, then gover-nor of California and numerous others. A framed letter, handsigned by "Ike," thanks him for his efforts in the 1952 presidential

IT WAS BENNINGER'S "big mouth" that brought Eisenhower to this state in his first presidential campaign. The brash young man called the presidential hopeful in California, convinced him that he should plane to New Jersey and on three hours notice, with the help of Gov. Driscoll and Shanley, had 35,000 people lined up at the Somerset Court House to give Eisenhower a resounding welcome. One picture shows vice-presidential can-

which gained fame in the political campaign. The dog house was Benninger's idea. Months later Nixon's wife called from California to ask Benninger if the dog house could be sent to them in Washington.

The engraved invitation to the Eisenhower-Nixon inaugural, which Benninger was unable to use, also decorates the wall of the room which over the years has often served as the smoke-filled backroom where the big GOP decisions were made.

With a nice sense of balance, Benninger has another room in the basement with walls decorated with his fishing gear.

"For political business we go in that room. We talk fishing in here," he said decisively. His wife, the former Betty Tansey whom he married almost 25 years ago, never objected to the time Benninger's political activities

took.
"We all enjoyed it. The children (Mary, now 23, and Peter, 17) and I were part of it. The kids learned practical politics," she

A member of the Union County Board of Freeholders for 13 years (from 1947 to 1960), Benninger served as chairman of that body for six years. He has been a recognized power in the county and the state for over 30 years.

His phone still rings often with people seeking help. He never turns a request away,

"I want to do whatever I can to help. That's what life's about," he said one day last week, He plans after moving to Little Silver to work a few days in his Mountainside insurance office and to continue as secretary-treasurer of Joaldan, Inc., developers of a 520-acre industrial comples in East Brunswick.

He also plans to do a lot of fishing.

The course of study is broken down into four units --- the family, physiological changes in teenagers, human reproduction and problems relating to teenage boys and girls.

The unit on the family will study the family as the basic unit of society; relationship of family members to each other and to the community; physical, social and economic aspects of family life; common family problems including discipline, allowances, progress in school, etc.; attitudes, codes of dress and conduct and social mores. A film, "You and Your Family," will be included in

'Physical Aspects of Puberty," films showing the growth of a boy into manhood and a girl into womanhood, will be used in the unit on physiological changes. Study topics in this unit will include: maleness and femaleness; physical characteristics and changes; puberty and its problems; mental health as it relates to adolescence.

The unit on human reproduction will cover the process of human reproduction; growth stages in the fertilized egg; vocabulary related to human growth and reproduction and menstruation. Films included in this unit will be "Human Growth and Reproduction" and 'It's Wonderful Being a Girl."





peanuts are not helping as much as they should. The country is in need of a second crop or a second industry, and in a land that is mostly dry with only one lush agricultural area and only one major industrial area (80 per cent of industry is around Dakar, the capital,) that is

a big problem. Fisheries, with tuna the lead item, are favored as the next best possibility if the peanuts become non-sellable, and there is high hope for oil in the coastal waters north of Dakar. Corn and rice growing, and some cotton, is being attempted in the lush Casamance area in the south, but this is mainly to support the country itself so it will not need to import these products and pay the high prices and transportation costs of imports. A ship from Canton, China, for instance, was in the fine harbor at Dakar when our NNA group was there and it was loaded with rice for the Senegalese. This does not mean that Senegal is communistic. The coun-

try is pro-western but trades with various communist nations for some of its needs, Several new industries, such as furniture making, shoe making and weaving--on imported cotton predominantly-have been started but are not important yet. Besides the ground nuts or peanuts, the raw materials of Senegal also include rubber, skin for shoes, tuna, cattle, minerals, stone and copper, but again, not in enough quantity to be of im-

And so Senegal is worrying.

WE FLEW INTO THE CAPITAL CITY of this worrying nation one day last January on the first stop of our African journey. We came in one fell swoop so to speak, for we flew non-stop out of New York taking only six and a half hours to fly from 40-degree U.S. to 85-degree Africa. We stayed at the N'Gor Hotel which is only five minutes from the airport and directly on the ocean, with a lovely beach, balcony, beautiful view soft breezes, good weather, good food--and the peanuts did not bother us a bit.

But in the subsequent days in looking about, they began to. Dakar seemed to have changed.

Four years previous it had looked just a little crisper, a little more vital. This time

there seemed to be a dejected air about the

SENEGAL IS A COUNTRY which lies on the most western tip of Africa right on the center edge of the "hump" making it, geographically, the closest African nation to the U. S. Here the Atlantic Ocean is blue and tranquil with many lagoons on the coastline. Here a January day can be 85 to 95 degrees and a June or July day can be even hotter.

It is a country where the president, Leopold Senghor, states that he hopes to fashion it, at least politically, after the U.S., and which claims to be one of the most stable of the French-African nations.

The country is about the size of South Dakota and is mainly desert type land, Its population is about three million of which about 47,000 are white, and 40,000 of which white folk live in Dakar. The total population of Dakar is 525,000. Most of the Africans are of the Toucouleur, Serer or Wolof peoples. The Wolofs are the darkest, the most handsome and the most in number. The Serers are lighter and the Tourcouleurs the lightest. Yet Senegal is a country where there is no racial or religious discrimination problem. The president himself is an African, a Catholic and is married to a European, Within his own family there are Catholics, Protestants and Moslems, "We really all speak to one God," he said.

In fact, the Senegalese say the only discrimination is at the economic level. A man earns what he is worth regardless of his color. Depending on how educated, how clever and how good a position he attains, will deter-mine his house and his activities, not his color. The best street in Dakar, for instance,

where the American Ambassador hashis residence and which overlooks the city, has both white and black people living side by side.

SENEGAL GAINED ITS INDEPENDENCE IN September of 1960 after being French-owned since 1858. Before that, European penetration dates from the mid-fifteenth century with the arrival of the Portuguese, then the Dutch, English and lastly the French. In the city of Dakar the French influence lingers in the lovely French colonial style buildings, and there is a shop which believe it or not, is a branch of the Galleries Lafayette, a large department store in Paris! The "suburban" store? Four years ago I bought a sun dress there for 64 francs, 64 C.F.A. Francs that is, which is "Communaute Financiere Africaine" Francs, which are the francs that the French-African nations use in common, and I still have it. The dress that is.

The look of the city is nice. It is a white city. The great majority of the buildings are painted white and besides the French style buildings there are also a goodly number of modern ones and the great new University of Dakar, founded in 1957. There is also the Medina or native quarter. Our hotel, which was modern style, was not in the city proper but 10 miles outside it on the fringes of the airport. Surprisingly the airport did not disturb us even though it was a jetport,

THIS AIRPORT ALONG WITH ITS NEARBY two hills, was famous in World War II and a welcome sight to many a flier. The hills which are rather feminine in outline were given an endearing name by the pilots, for when they saw their voluptuous outline against the sky, they not only were cheered, but knew they were safely near a friendly airport. There were slight enroll-ment increases in grades three, six and eight, but decreases in kindergarten and grades one, two, four, five and seven in 1965, according to the survey, which is based on statistics as of Oct. 31, 1964, and Oct. 31, 1965,

Hobbins, chairman of the Upper New Jersey Chapter of the National Multiple Scierosis Society this week announced the selection of Mrs. Walter Robinson of Union as Union County MS Mother of the Year. Mrs. Robinson was selected because she "exemplifies the courageous handicapped individual who continues to function as mother and homemaker despite a severe handicap."
Mrs. Robinson is the 27-year-old mother of two sons, Walter Jr., 7, and Ricky 5. Her husband, a member of the Union police force, has fust completed a six-week training course at the New Jersey Police Academy.

Mrs. Robinson has had multiple sclerosis for four years. Her first attack came shortly after the birth of her second child and confined her to a wheel chair. She has had three other severe and similar bouts with the chronically cripping disease since then. Each time she has been unable to walk and forced to use a wheel chair.

bins pointed out, Mrs. Robinson "has never lost her courage or her desire to fight and to continue to perform her role as mother and homemaker. Even when confined to her wheel chair, she managed to care for her small family. Today she says that she is doing very well, and with the aid of a walker, she does all of her own housework. She does admit, however, that keeping track of two very active little boys does take all of her energy."

Hobbins said Mrs. Robinson hopes she will not suffer another attack. #### Tulip time at Warinanco

The Holland-grown tulips in the Henry S. Chatfield Memorial Garden in Warinanco Park, Elizabeth and Roselle, are now in bloom, it was reported by Robert A. Koller, chief horticulturist for The Union County Park Commission.

The garden contains nearly 14,000 tulin plants ranging in color-from dark purple to white. The focal point of the formal display is the center bed with 600 "Dreaming Maid," cottage-type tulips with lilacmauve petals merging to a silvery-white color. The beds in the inner perimeter of the garden feature "Helen Keller" a cottage-type, clear canary yellow petal with yellow stamens, and "Souther Cross," a lemon-yellow breeder type.

The center perimeter beds feature "G. W. Leak," a geranium scarlet cottage-type and "Pink Supreme" a bright pink Darwin-type, "Glacier" and "Magier," both of the Darwin type featuring a white color are in the beds in the outer peri-meter of the garden with a rich green taxus hedge background.

The tulip garden was first planted in 1936 to honor one of the original park commissioners and commission president for the first six years of its existence,

1921-1927. A stone bench nearly 20 feet long supporting a bronze tablet rests at one end of the garden as a permanent memorial to
