A youngster who had recently joined the frenzied, bewildering world of the newspaperman was told that the top executive needed his help for a few minutes.

"Mr. Howard . . ." the youngster started.

"Call me Sam," came the response.

Sam was called this week and we think he must have been called by his first name.

It isn't difficult to address the publisher of eight newspapers by his first name when he works as hard as any of his employees . . . as proof-reader or messenger or social writer or ad salesman or paste-up man or anything else that needs a hand to get the papers out.

That's how Sam learned the newspaper business as a kid in Irvington. He never knew another way.

Young Sam in Irvington had gotten it done well. He took a floundering publication, printed in a shack-like building on a creaking flat-bed press, and turned it into the jumping-off point for a group of community newspapers that are respected by professionals throughout the country.

He put out prize-winners but wasn't particularly interested in prizes. He didn't like fights, but he won some beatus. He didn't like to be wrong, but if so he was quick to say it --- in print. Like all good newspapermen he hated to be late, and he never was.

He passed around bonuses at the end of the year a little earlier than most employers, because it was more convenient for his staff.

The bonuses, along with a poignant note expressing gratitude for "the cooperation of everyone through the many years," came even earlier this year.

Sam had met another deadline.

## Vocal groups set to sing in concert

# Sam Howard, publisher, dies at 55

Sam Howard, 55, publisher of eight community newspapers in Essex and Union Counties, died yesterday at Memorial Hospital in New York City.

Mr. Howard, who started his newspaper career as a part-time sports writer for the Irvington Herald, had built an organization that included that newspaper, the Union Leader, The Spectator of Roselle and Roselle Park, the Springfield Leader, the Linden Leader, the Valhalla Leader, the Suburban Leader of Kenilworth and the Mountainside Echo.

Mr. Howard became a partner at the Irvington Herald in 1938 with the late Walter S. Gray, an Essex County freeholder. He

became sole owner of the publication in 1940, the same year that he entered the army for an 18-month tour of duty. His return to the newspaper was to be short. He was called back into service at the start of World War 2 and was to spend a total of six years in service. He was discharged as a warrant officer after seeing service in the Philippines.

A sports fan, Mr. Howard augmented his income in his early newspaper days as a publicist for motorcycle and automobile races, professional football teams and boxing promotions. He also staged amateur boxing and wrestling programs under the sponsorship of the Irvington Herald A.A.

In association with Milton Mintz of Spring-

field, who is business manager of the newspaper group, Mr. Howard formed the Howard-Mintz Advertising Agency in the early 1950s. That agency was the first to handle the Shop-Rite stores account. After two years the agency was sold to Zal Venet of the Venet Advertising Agency, now of Union and New York City.

Mr. Howard's newspapers won numerous local, state and national awards, the most recent of which were general excellence awards to the Union Leader and the Springfield Leader as the top weekly newspapers in the state in their circulation categories, by the New Jersey Press Association.

Born in Brooklyn, Sam Howard was brought

to Irvington as a pre-schooler. While helping his father, Nathan, in the newspaper delivery business, he attended Clinton Avenue School and Irvington High School from which he was graduated in January, 1930. He attended New York University and was graduated from Upsala College, where he had been a history major.

Mr. Howard had been a member of the board of directors of the Irvington State Bank, now part of the Howard Savings Institution. He had been a director of the Union Township Chamber of Commerce and a member of the Irvington Chamber of Commerce.

The funeral will be today at 2 p. m. from the Philip Apter and Son funeral home, 1600

Springfield ave., Maplewood. Dr. Benjamin Englander, rabbi of Temple B'nai Israel, Irvington, will conduct the service. Burial will be in Mount Lebanon Cemetery, Iselin.

Mr. Howard lived in Lebanon with his wife, the former Trudina Lipke, and his son Bruce, a student at Upsala College.

He also leaves a brother, Isidore Horowitz of Irvington, and three sisters, Mrs. Mattie Barer of Irvington, Mrs. Edith Neuwirth of Falls Church, Va., and Mrs. Margaret Mintz of Springfield.

In lieu of flowers, the family requested that contributions be sent to the American Cancer Society.

## Slight rise in schools' enrollment

Dr. Levin B. Hanigan, superintendent of schools, disclosed on Tuesday that enrollment was up eight pupils over last month, mostly in the sixth, seventh and eighth grades. He reported at a meeting Tuesday night of the Mountainside Board of Education. Dr. Hanigan also stated that every grade, excepting the third, was heavy at the Beechwood School, which now has a total of 458 students.

John McDonough, board secretary, reported that of the 1967-68 school budget of \$1,167,342, contracts were issued in the amount of \$564,213, leaving a total of \$603,128 in available funds.

Robert Britton, president, introduced a motion to transport another handicapped Mountainside child to and from Springfield by the Intercity Taxi Co. Britton said that the community would be reimbursed 75 percent of the cost by the state for the transportation of the two children and no additional bond would be required.

Charles A. Jerome, attorney for the board, when asked about the legality of requiring no additional bond, stated that the county approved such procedure, provided the board take the risk of inadequate performance by the taxi company.

In other business, Mrs. Fay Sosnick was approved as substitute teacher.

McDonough said that a special meeting will be held next Tuesday night at the Beechwood School for the purpose of adopting the 1968-69 school budget and to deal with several routine matters.

The meeting lasted a total of 13 minutes. It was conducted before an audience consisting of two reporters, one of whom arrived five minutes late.

## Safety measures probed at PTA general meeting

More than 250 residents attended the first general meeting on safety recently held by the Mountainside PTA in the all-purpose room of the Beechwood School.

A question and answer period was culminated by the following motion made and passed by those attending:

"That the PTA is to appoint a committee who will forward the suggestions made by the panel and the public to the proper governing bodies of the Borough of Mountainside. These suggestions include the following: sidewalks, shoulder or walking lines on streets; one-way traffic on Central Avenue and other streets where heavy school traffic is evident; student safety programs; bicycle regulations; parent monitors; curbing to allow for widening of

County roads and various types of warning signs where applicable.

"The committee named will supplement the above list with other suggestions deemed necessary, and will request an answer to the suggestions from the governing bodies within a reasonable period of time set at approximately 60 days. The committee will then report back to the PTA, who will report to the public any progress toward implementation of the suggestions."

Mrs. Arthur Williams, Mrs. A. G. Weiler, Mrs. Robert Osbair and Mrs. P. S. White-scarver Sr. were appointed as a committee to look into the possibility of a bicycle safety

## School unit to offer plan on facilities

The Regional High School District Board of Education will present its long-range plans for expansion and pupil distribution at a special public meeting tonight at 8 at Jonathan Dayton Regional High School, Springfield.

Some background material on the proposal was discussed by Avery Ward of Kenilworth, school board president, at a PTA meeting held last week at the Gov. Livingston Regional High School in Berkeley Heights.

Ward said, regarding the immediate and long-range plans: "Your Board of Education has been studying and working on these plans for over six months and has also hired an educational consultant to review our requirements and educational program and to make recommendations.

"Many suggestions have been studied and reviewed by your board and those plans which will be most beneficial to the District as a whole have been decided upon.

"We fully understand the concern of the students and parents of Mountainside about which school they will be attending. We would therefore like to announce at this time that the freshmen from Mountainside for 1968 and 1969 will be assigned to Jonathan Dayton High School, and for the rest of their high school career they will be assigned to Gov. Living-

## Borough board votes to change sanitary code

The Mountainside Board of Health at a public meeting on Monday night approved the final adoption of amendments to the sanitary code which were introduced, read and approved at the Nov. 13 meeting.

Amendments approved were: Article 5, Dairy Products, section 1, was amended to read: A fee of \$10 shall be charged for each license.

Article 6, Food and Drink, rule 7, plan 1 to read: Washing equipment shall consist of three separate adjoining compartments, two of which must have connected to it running hot water, and the other compartment need have only a cold water connection.

Section 1 of Article 6 forbids the operation of a food establishment where food is sold in broken packages without a license, and such license must be obtained from the board after a written application and a license fee of \$25 is paid.

Section 11 of this article, under medical examinations, was amended to read: No person shall engage in or be employed in a business in the borough where it is, or may become his duty to, or he does handle food, drink or other articles intended for human consumption, unless such person is free from all communicable disease.

Section 13, which concerned ice licenses, was deleted from the code.

Article X, Garbage and Scavengers, section 8, is amended to read: No person, whether he be the owner, tenant or occupant of any dwelling house, or commercial establishment, or contractor, builder, or gardener shall dispose of any garbage, swill, offal leaves, grass clippings, garden wastes or other refuse by open burning of any kind. This section was also amended to read: Before such scavenger license is issued a fee of \$75 shall be paid.

Article 11, Animals and Manure, section 3, was added to read: No person shall own, harbor or keep any horses, colts, ponies or quadruped ruminants within the limits of the borough.

Article 13, Penalty, section 1, amended to read: Any person who shall violate any article, section or part of a section of the sanitary code shall be subject to a penalty of not less than \$500, and not more than \$500, for each violation thereof; upon conviction in the Municipal Court of the borough. Each and every day after notification to cease and desist such violation will be classified as a violation.

Awards will be based primarily on scholastic standing, physical qualifications and leadership potential.

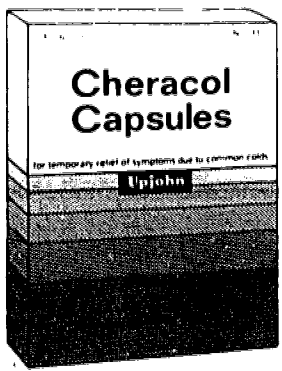

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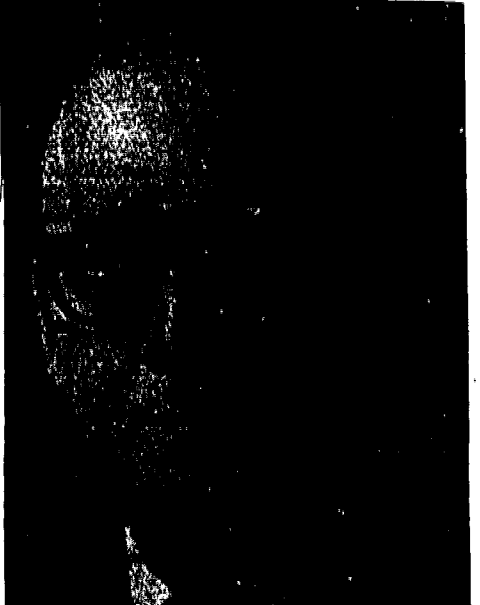

## A FEMININE LOOK ... AT AFRICA 1967

(Commentary on a National Newspaper Association Study Mission to eight African countries south of the Sahara.)

able or fraught with the essence of adventure, as Ambossell had been.

A Feminine Look account given three years ago of Ambossell describes safari best even this time:

To go on our safari we rose early one morning dressed in Grade B movie safari clothes—that is denim, long pants or white shirts, and long-sleeved sports shirts (against the sun, dust, mosquitos and flies, "they" said). Grade A outfits are either white riding type breeches and boots, or the khaki white-hunter type thing, and boots, but I'm afraid our baggage weight allowance didn't leave room for such glamour.

WE SET OUT from the front of the New Stanley hotel in Chevrolet and Ford sedans with four or five of us and a driver to the car. Some of our group were going to Tree Tops which is north, and some to the Ambossell Masai Reserve which is south. I was in the Ambossell group.

We started by winding our way through the paved streets of Nairobi, out on the paved highway past the open air movie and then onto a dirt road to go about 200 miles into the bush.

The dirt road was one of the best I've ever seen, however, and was two-lane most of the way. It took us past several villages, but nothing in between, such as gas stations or road signs or houses. About halfway we came to Namanga where a palm-leaf roofed "hotel" and its little cottages constituted the town. We had lunch there, a veritable smorgasbord too. And beer! Even in the wilds of Kenya, there was beer. And geraniums and zinnias!

THERE ALSO WERE Masai. These natives were all through this area, and as a matter of fact, the Ambossell Reserve is owned and operated by them. The Masai are thin, tall, aloof people whose men elongate their earlobes until they have large holes in them and almost reach their shoulders. The women

wear brick-red wrap skirts and some are covered from hair to toes with red-brick dust. The men are hardly covered with anything at all.

Actually a stole-like burlap-type piece of material is swathed around their middle and up over the right shoulder, but it barely (ha!) reaches the hips and there is nothing under its flapping sides, so it is not much help. They always carry spears as long as they are. Spears, ears, rears and red dust—and you have a Masai.

We had been told to wear the long sleeves for protection against sun, flies and mosquitos, but there was more dust than insects. It was so dusty, that we had fun theorizing that the Masai women got covered with the red dust just by standing by the road side and watching the tourists go by. Actually though, they do it quite purposely.

After lunch we climbed back into cars and entered the gate of Ambossell Reserve. Before we reached our camp which is operated by a firm of white hunters of Nairobi and which was used by the film company for "The Snows of Kilimanjaro" we went about 75 miles. The reserve is 1,259 square miles in size, so it was easy to do.

Much of the drive was over a dry lake which made a marvelous motoring surface. With all this talk of dry lakes and dust, you might think we were on a desert but we were not. It was grassy and green and a little mountainous in the distance.

When we reached camp a Masai official joined us. He was the equivalent of a game warden, and was our guide and captain of the ship from then on. He carried no gun, but he knew what to do, where the animals would be, how to look for them and how to find them. We arrived about six in the evening and stayed overnight, leaving about noon the next day. In that time we had more "firsts" happen to us than in any other same amount of time any other place.

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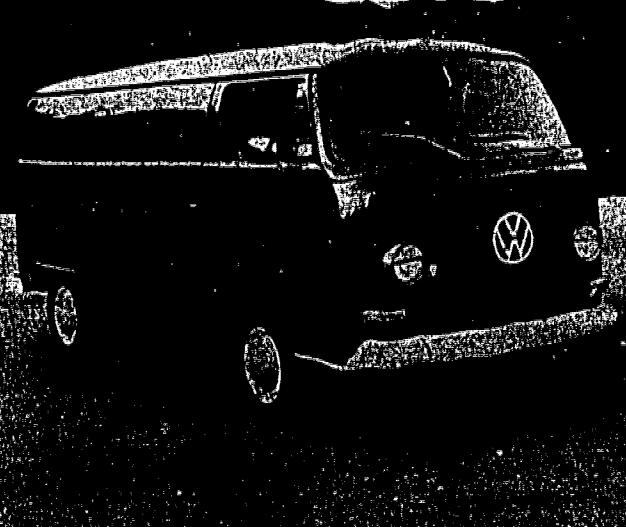

program which would include the licensing and inspection of bicycles. Mrs. Walter Klute, coordinator of the Westfield Bicycle Safety program will act as consultant for the committee.

A committee headed by George Crane assisted by Thomas Spina, Joseph Farley, Matthew J. Farnella, Philip Rizzo, Donald Pote, Matthew Gibbon, and Robert Muirhead were named to look into immediate or short term easement of congested high density areas, namely, Central avenue and Woodacres drive with the possibility of making these one-way streets for a half-hour during morning and afternoon school arrival and dismissal time. The committee also plans to investigate more permanent or long range solutions, such as sidewalks and curbing in high density and other areas.

ston High School in Berkeley Heights."

COMMENTING ON the origins of the district, Ward reminded the audience the regional district, comprising Berkeley Heights, Clark, Garwood, Kenilworth, Mountainide and Springfield, was the first in New Jersey to be created by having a number of communities, not having a high school, combine to support a regional high school.

"It was born in the year of 1932 because of need, brought into being as a result of the vision and diligent, persistent, hard and voluntary efforts by many people," he added. He went on to say that despite the Depression, leaders went to the national government and applied to PWA for help, but because the regional group had no corporate standing, no pattern to follow and no voter approval-only vision and drive—they were turned down several times.

Finally, in 1935, President Franklin Roosevelt approved a loan to the regional group for 60 percent of the cost, and a PWA grant for 40 percent for the construction, with one proviso, "that the contracts be awarded for the building on or before Dec. 15, 1935."

Ward added, "This gave the regional group just two-and-a-half months to get voter approval at two elections; building plans approved in Trenton and by the PWA in Washington; bids advertised and received and awarded. And they did it. The bids were awarded on Dec. 10, 1935, with five days to spare."

"In September, 1937, the building was completed and the first students from all six communities had their first home, in the Jonathan Dayton Regional High School, Springfield."

In closing, Ward urged attendance at tonight's meeting "to hear about our long-range plans."

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## PROFILE--Rev. Gerard B. Whelan

Love for his calling and love of music completely fill the life of the Rev. Gerard B. Whelan, assistant pastor of Our Lady of Lourdes Church, Mountainide.

Born in Elizabeth, the son of Patrick A. and Mary T. Mc Carthy Whelan, he began training for his priestly duties at an early age. He attended St. Patrick's parochial grammar and high schools in Elizabeth and was graduated from Seton Hall University, South Orange, with a BA degree in philosophy.

In continuation of his curriculum at Seton Hall, which began his training for the priesthood, he entered the Immaculate Conception Seminary in Darlington, where he studied theology for four years.

He was ordained as a diocesan priest of the Archdiocese of Newark on June 11, 1949, and celebrated his first mass the following day at St. Patrick's in Elizabeth.

Assigned to Christ the King Church in Hillside, where he served for nine years as assistant pastor and first curate, Father Whelan found an outlet for his love for music. He formed and directed the boys' choir with a cast made up of parishioners, he presented variety shows and staged performances of "Girl Crazy" and "Finian's Rainbow." His understanding of people was utilized in his highest sense when he was named director of the pre-Cana and Cana conference clubs, which engage in discussions with engaged and married couples.

He was transferred to St. Michael's in Cranford, where his talents for organizing and achieving kept him busy for the period of six years. He was named director of the Catholic Youth Organization. Again he formed and directed the boys' choir, was in charge of adult music and put on a variety and stage shows.

BEFORE COMING to Our Lady of Lourdes last June, he served three years at St. Charles Borromeo, Newark. Of St. Charles, he speaks humbly of the more than 100 converts, 46 of them adults, he brought to his church while a teacher in conversion instruction.

In charge of the Parents Guild at the school, chaplain to Beth Israel Hospital in Newark, which he recalls fondly, this devoted man still found time to form and direct a choir of boys and girls. This choir became so proficient under his guidance that they accepted an invitation to perform at the Vatican Pavilion of the New York World's Fair where they sang a mass.

Father Whelan has also found time to teach psychology, religion and medical ethics to student nurses at St. Elizabeth's Hospital, Elizabeth. He also served as moderator of the Union County Catholic Choir Guild, which covers all parishes in the county.

Duties at Our Lady of Lourdes include those of assistant pastor, moderator for the male lectors at mass, and of the Holy Name Society.

His future plans include a variety show in the auditorium of the church. He hopes to start rehearsing at the end of January for an early spring presentation. Parishioners will

help with costumes and scenery, and Father Whelan will help write the script and will be responsible for producing and directing the show.

Father Whelan is a musician himself of no small stature. He played piano in his high school band and, as a student, played with community groups. Taught at the seminary to play the organ, he was the organist for the choir at the consecration of Bishop James McNulty at the Sacred Heart Cathedral, Newark.

A member of the Catholic Tape Recorders International, Father Whelan enjoys exchanging tapes with other members throughout the country.

AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING THE CONSTRUCTION OF CURBS ON BOTH SIDES OF WEST CHESTNUT STREET FROM STUYVESANT AVENUE TO FAIRWAY DRIVE AS A LOCAL IMPROVEMENT AND PROVIDING FOR THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS AND BOND ANTICIPATION NOTES TO PAY FOR THE FINANCING THEREOF AND TO ASSURE FOR SPECIAL BENEFITS TO BE OBTAINED BY THE TOWNSHIP COMMITTEE OF THE TOWNSHIP OF UNION IN THE COUNTY OF UNION.

Section 1. Authority is hereby given for the construction of concrete curbs on both sides of West Chestnut Street from Stuyvesant Avenue to Fairway Drive, including such reconstruction of sidewalks, driveway areas and adjacent thereto as may be required, and including such reconstruction of walks as may be required.

Section 2. All of the said work provided for in this ordinance shall be shown on plans prepared by the Engineer of the Township of Union in the County of Union, entitled "Construction Plan for Proposed Concrete Curb in West Chestnut Street, Stuyvesant Avenue to Fairway Drive", dated May, 1966, and according to the specifications prepared by said Engineer which said plans and specifications are on file in the Clerk's Office of the Township of Union in the County of Union and in the Office of the said Township Engineer.

Section 3. All of said work shall be done under the supervision and direction and subject to the approval of the Engineer of the Township of Union in the County of Union and may be done on contract or by Township forces with materials purchased by or furnished to the Township.

Section 4. The sum of \$15,000.00 is hereby appropriated to the payment of the cost of said improvement. Such appropriation shall be met from the proceeds of the bonds authorized and the down payment appropriated by this ordinance.

Section 5. Said improvement shall be undertaken as a local improvement and the cost thereof not borne by the Township shall be assessed upon the lands and real estate upon the line and in the vicinity of said improvement which may be benefited by said improvement as provided in Chapter 17 of Title 40 of the Revised Statutes of New Jersey. All assessments levied for said improvement shall in each case be as nearly as may be in proportion to and not in excess of the peculiar benefit, advantage or increase in value which the respective lots and parcels of real estate shall be deemed to receive by reason of such improvement. The total amount of such assessments so levied shall not exceed the cost of said improvement. The portion of such cost, if any, which shall not be so assessed shall be paid by the Township as in the case of a general improvement which is levied and paid by general taxation. Such portion of the cost if any shall be in addition to the contribution, if any, of the Township, hereinafter provided.

Section 6. It is hereby determined and stated that (1) the Township will contribute the sum of \$6,000.00 of the cost of said purpose, it being the estimated amount of such contribution as provided in Section 40A:2-2 of the Local Bond Law of New Jersey and (2) no special assessments for such purpose have been levied or confirmed and (3) such special assessments may be paid in four annual installments.

Section 7. It is hereby determined and stated that (1) the making of such improvement (hereinafter referred to as "purpose") is not a current expense of said Township and (2) it is necessary to finance said purpose by the issuance of bonds pursuant to the Local Bond Law of New Jersey and (3) the estimated cost of said purpose is \$15,000.00 and (4) the cost of such purpose as hereinafter stated, includes the aggregate amount of \$2,500.00 which is estimated to be necessary to finance the cost of such purpose, including architect's fees, accounting, engineering and inspection costs, real expenses and other expenses, including interest on such obligations to the extent permitted by Section 40A:2-20 of the Local Bond Law.

Section 8. It is hereby determined and stated that monies exceeding \$100,000.00 appropriated for the capital improvement fund in budgets heretofore adopted for said Township are not available to finance said purpose. The sum of \$100,000.00 is hereby appropriated from such monies to the payment of the cost of said purpose.

Section 9. To finance said purpose, bonds of said Township of an aggregate principal amount not exceeding \$14,000.00 are hereby authorized to be issued pursuant to said Local Bond Law. Said bonds shall bear interest at a rate which shall not exceed six per centum (6%) per annum. All matters with respect to said bonds not determined by this ordinance shall be determined by resolutions to be hereafter adopted.

Section 10. To finance said purpose, bond anticipation notes of said Township of an aggregate principal amount not exceeding \$14,000.00 are hereby authorized to be issued pursuant to said Local Bond Law and that such notes shall bear interest at a rate which shall not exceed six per centum (6%) per annum and may be renewed from time to time pursuant to and within the limitations prescribed by said Law. All matters with respect to said notes not determined by this ordinance shall be determined by resolutions to be hereafter adopted. In the event that bonds are issued pursuant to this ordinance, the aggregate amount of notes hereby authorized to be issued shall be reduced to an amount equal to the principal amount of the bonds so issued. If the aggregate amount of outstanding bonds and notes issued pursuant to this ordinance shall at any time exceed the sum first mentioned in this section, the money so stated by the issuance of said bonds shall, to not less than the amount of such excess, be applied to the payment of such notes then outstanding.

Section 11. It is hereby determined and declared that the period of usefulness of said purpose, according to the reasonable life thereof, is a period of ten years computed from the date of said bonds.

Section 12. It is hereby determined and stated that the Supplemental Debt Statement required by said Local Bond Law has been duly made and filed in the Office of the Township Clerk of said Township and that such statement as filed shows that the gross debt of said Township as defined in Section 40A:2-43 of said Local Bond Law, is increased by the issuance of the bonds and notes authorized by this ordinance will be within all debt limitations prescribed by said Local Bond Law.

Section 13. This ordinance shall take effect twenty days after the first publication thereof after final passage.

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# Expansion endorsed over new county college

The Union County College Opportunity Committee this week endorsed the proposal of the Chamber of Commerce of Eastern Union County to use and expand the existing Union College in Cranford and the Union County Technical Institute in Scotch Plains rather than establish a new county college in Union County.

The position of the citizens committee was announced by former Assemblyman James M. McGowan and former Assistant Prosecutor Richard P. Muscatello, both of Elizabeth, co-chairmen.

"It has been our position for many years that Union County should make use of existing

facilities to meet its responsibilities in higher education," the committee's statement said. "This is one of the reasons our committee worked for the establishment of a county-financed tuition aid plan for students attending Union College."

The Union County College Opportunity Committee agrees with the Chamber of Commerce that making use of existing facilities is the most economical means to meet Union County's higher education requirements as well as the best method educationally, according to the statement.

"IN UNION COLLEGE and the Union County Technical Institute, we have institutions that can provide for our higher educational needs in Union County," the co-chairmen said. "Since both institutions have indicated a willingness to work with the Union County Board of Freeholders, since both are willing to expand to meet increasing needs, we see no reason not to take advantage of this unique opportunity."

The exhaustive study made by the chamber and its interest in higher education on all levels was commended by the citizens committee.

"The Chamber of Commerce is doing all the citizens of Union County a great service in coming to grips with vital issues like our responsibilities in higher education," they said. "This is an enlightened approach that other Union County organizations might well emulate."

"Making use of existing facilities is not only the most economical means to meet Union County's requirements in higher education, but is also the best educationally," Erwin Rausch, vice president for manufacturing of the Wing Company, Division of Aero-Flow Dynamics, Linden, and chairman of the chamber's Education-Business-Industry Committee of the Chamber of Commerce, said.

"In Union College and Union County Technical Institute we have a combination of institutions which can serve the need, Union College is an institution that has proved itself over the past 30 years and an institution that is fully accredited. Since Union College is willing to work with our Board of Freeholders in increasing educational opportunities for all qualified students, we see no reason not to take advantage of this unique opportunity. Union County Technical Institute has produced outstanding technicians to serve our local industry and will continue to do so."

EDWARD L. FOX, EXECUTIVE vice president, said Union College officials and Union County Technical Institute officials have assured the chamber they have admitted over the past several years "all those students from their Union County constituency who, based upon school record and/or potential, are capable of successfully taking either an academic program at the freshman and sophomore level or a technical program at the post high school level."

"Union County can have the least expensive

and highest quality two-year college system in the state by simply taking advantage of existing institutions," Rausch said.

Fox said Union College officials told the chamber they have the facilities to expand enrollment over the next several years, and plans are underway for another building, which will add further to the college's student capacity.

city. The new campus of the Technical Institute under construction in Scotch Plains will provide expanded facilities for technical education.

The Union County College Opportunity Committee was organized in 1964 to study Union County's needs in the field of higher education and to make recommendations to the Board of Freeholders. The committee is comprised of leading civic, business, industrial, labor, educational, religious, veterans, and political leaders in Union County. The original executive committee included all the mayors from Union County's 21 municipalities, and the county's entire legislative delegation.

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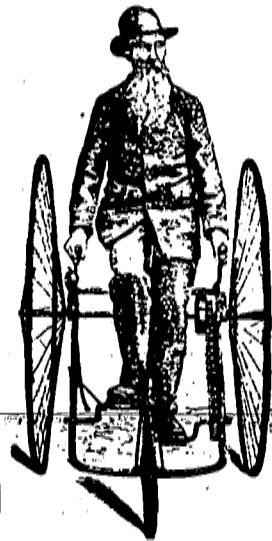

"The consolidation agreement between the two associations will enable the new corporation to more fully perform and carry out the objects for which both Associations were originally formed."

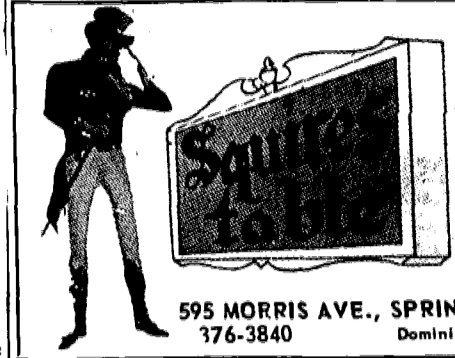
## Travelogue to be shown

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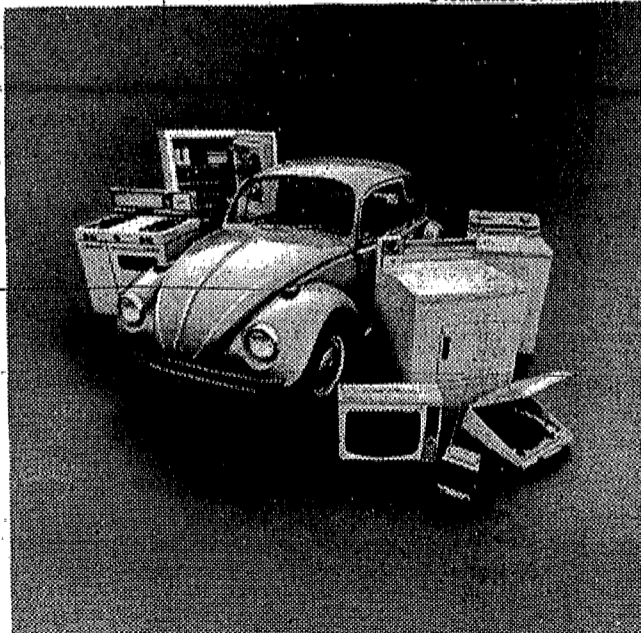

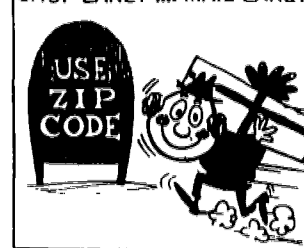

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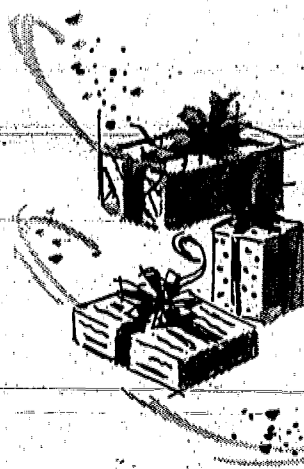

A specialist in radio astronomy and binary stars, Dr. Franklin joined the Hayden Planetarium staff in 1956. Prior to that time, he spent two years with the Carnegie Institution of Washington where he held a research fellowship in radio astronomy.

In 1949 and 1950, Dr. Franklin served as a research assistant at the Lick Observatory in California. After completing his graduate studies at the University of California, he assisted Dr. Otto Struve, chairman of the university's Astronomy Department, in research on various problems of visual double stars.

Dr. Franklin's recent research has been concerned with the planet Jupiter. In 1955, he and Dr. B.F. Burke of the Carnegie Institution jointly discovered the radio frequency noise emanating from Jupiter, and in 1957 he initiated a project at the Hayden Planetarium to investigate further the static-like emissions from the planet.

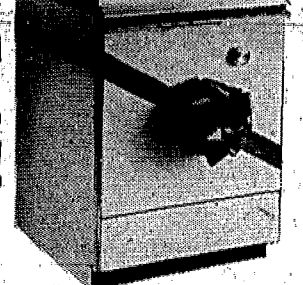

## Sen. Hughes asks action on smut bill

State Sen. Mildred Barry Hughes (D-Union) this week called upon all opponents of smut to persuade their Assembly representatives to attend the current Legislature's final session Jan. 9 and vote for her bill to extend the life of a study commission.

She pointed out that the Senate overwhelmingly voted two weeks ago in favor of her measure to permit the commission to report by June 30, 1968, instead of a year earlier as stipulated in legislation she sponsored.

Sen. Hughes, who for 10 years has been the prime mover in the Legislature's efforts to combat indecent literature, pointed out that unless her latest bill, S-527, is approved by the Assembly and signed by Gov. Richard J. Hughes, funds to save the commission will be in jeopardy.

SHE NOTED that the commission was to have been set up this year under her 1966 measure and it was to have reported by last June 30 on what steps it felt New Jersey should take to curb the sale and distribution of pornographic material. The Legislature appropriated \$10,000 to help the commission carry out its duties.

However, Sen. Hughes noted, the Governor failed to appoint eight public members to work with the Legislature's four appointees, and the commission therefore was unable to organize and function. Despite this, the commission still can fulfill its assignment, she added, provided the Governor makes the appointments and the \$10,000 appropriation is not lost.

As Senator Hughes explained, S-527 is designed to "protect the \$10,000 appropriation so that the commission can do the job the public wants it to do and has been under the impression it was doing."

"In view of the wide interest in New Jersey to combat smut," Senator Hughes added, "I urge all citizens, especially the mothers and fathers of teen-agers, who can so easily be preyed upon by the purveyors of pornography, to urge their Assembly representatives to be at the January 9 session and to vote in favor of S-527."

Mrs. Tubbs said there is a need for women who would like part-time work, or who are available for full-time work on a limited basis.

Among the qualifications are: At least an eighth grade education, high school preferred;

able to take instruction and supervision; love for an interest in people who are sick and need help, and satisfactory references from clergyman and physician, including medical examination.

Interested persons may apply to the Visiting Homemaker Service office, 121 Prospect st., Westfield. The service is supported by the United Fund of Union.

## Anti-war 'lunch-in' planned by SANE; Ferency to speak

With the theme "Take Dissent to the Ballot Box," members of New Jersey SANE (N. J. Committee for a Sane Nuclear Policy) have announced plans for a lunch-in to open a campaign "to channel anti-war protest into votes for peace," a spokesman said. It will be held at noon, Saturday in the Bloomfield College gymnasium, 170 Liberty st., Bloomfield.

Principal speaker will be Zolton Ferency of Michigan, who recently resigned as chairman of the state Democratic Party because of his disagreement with President Johnson's Vietnam policy. This will be Ferency's first appearance in New Jersey. A 45-year-old attorney, he is objecting to what he calls "power tactics by the Democratic Party establishment" and is advocating instead an open convention "where Democrats may have a free choice in nominating a presidential candidate and in reformulating national policies particularly with regard to the Administration's course in Vietnam," the spokesman said.

Also appearing on the platform will be Allard Lowenstein, co-chairman of the Conference of Concerned Democrats, a new group working to deny the nomination to President Johnson in states which conduct presidential primaries or open conventions. Presiding will be Dr. Seymour Zenchelsky, of Rutgers, SANE chairman.

According to Mrs. Dorothy Eldridge, director of the state organization, "N. J. SANE has not yet decided upon support of any one Presidential candidate but," she said, "SANE calls for a unified approach to the 1968 elections throughout the state by all who are seeking an alternative to the Johnson administration."

# Joint research project a Rutgers 'first' Medical-engineering team studies heart valve

The first joint research project combining the talents of the new Rutgers Medical School and the Rutgers College of Engineering is being conducted in a quiet and uncluttered laboratory on the University Heights campus of the State University.

This cooperative beginning of medical-engineering research is centered around a single heart problem - why is it that persons with artificial heart valves very often develop a red blood cell problem?

The operation for an artificial heart valve

Implant lasts about half an hour and, as a result of its success, thousands of people who had been stricken with valvular heart disease have been able to lead normal or near normal lives. The valves themselves represent a remarkable triumph of engineering skill and design.

Implanted in the human heart, they have to open and close something like 40,000,000 times, a year without fail, according to estimates, and they have to function perfectly for about 40 years.

THIS THEY DO, admirably and astonishingly to the layman, but a problem has arisen in some cases where artificial heart valves have been implanted. Some patients with valvular heart disease who have undergone valve prosthesis have developed what is known as mechanical hemolysis. This means that there is a decline in the number of red blood cells.

Normally in heart valve cases, says Dr. William S. Wilson, professor of medicine at the Rutgers Medical School, the body compensates for this by simply developing red blood cells faster.

However, there can be a lessening of the number of red cells in the point where anemia develops. It is believed that turbulence in the blood stream set up by the artificial heart valve may be a significant factor in causing this condition.

The weapon used in attacking this perplexing problem in the laboratory at the Rutgers College of Engineering is the comparatively new and promising science of biomedical engineering.

This project is only one of several heart research projects under way at the College of Engineering, but it is the pioneering heart research project in cooperation with the Rutgers Medical School.

GARRY KATZ, an undergraduate and resident of So. Plainfield, is conducting the actual research under the direction of a member of the engineering faculty and in consultation with Dr. Wilson.

The idea in the research experiment is to measure in the laboratory the turbulence downstream from the valve and try to correlate the structure of the turbulence with the destruction of the red blood cells.

Essentially, the equipment to do this consists of a long glass tube with a mechanical valve, in this case a new type known as a Smoloff-Cutter mitral valve, at about the half-way point in the length of the tube. Water is run through the tube and valve at various flow rates and the velocity and turbulence of the fluid behind the valve is measured by several instruments. By making a number of calculations based on the properties of blood, the researchers can treat the water used in studying fluid flow as though it were blood.

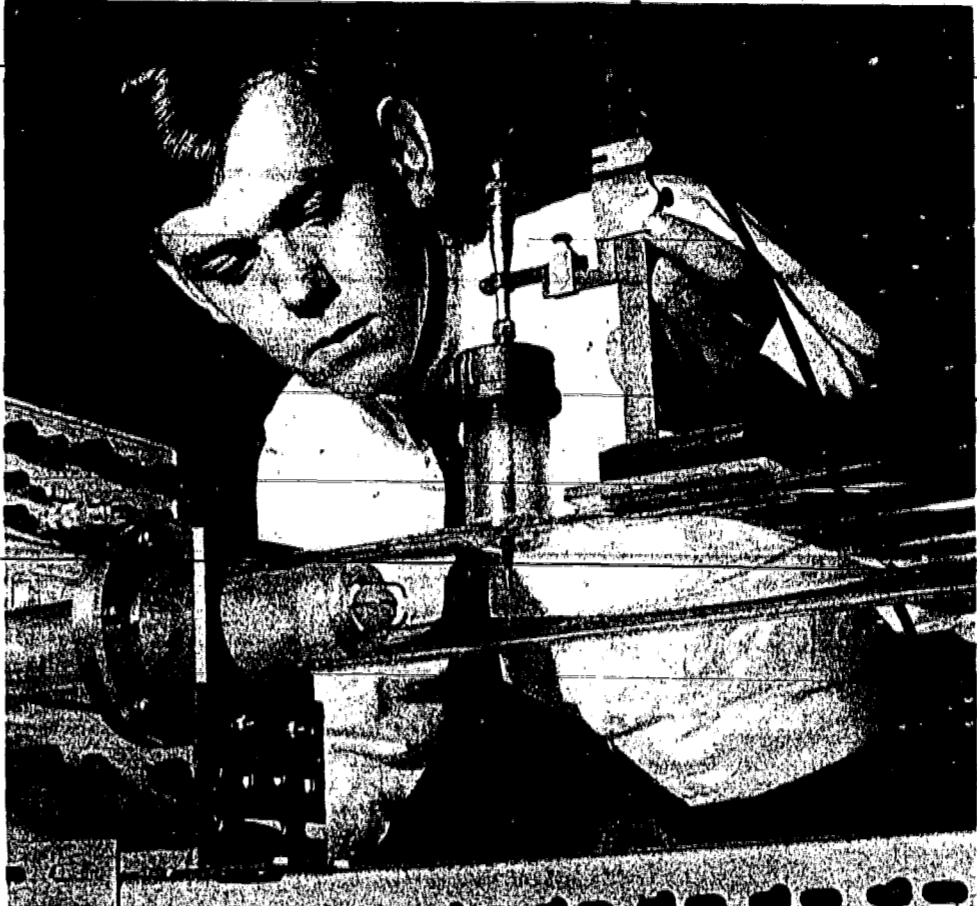
"This kind of investigation," said Dr. Richard L. Reskin, of Trenton, an associate professor in the department of mechanical and aerospace engineering, and supervisor of this particular project, "falls into the realm of mechanical engineering. Our responsibility is to study fluid mechanical turbulence by designing the equipment, determining the necessary measuring and recording instruments and acquiring the fundamental data in order to understand heart valve turbulence."

DR. WILSON, a resident of Bound Brook, and holder at Rutgers of the Sussex County Heart Association Chair of Cardiology, uses his medical knowledge to acquaint his engineering colleagues with the medical problem and to relate their experimental design to the human heart problem.

He believes that this sort of cooperative effort should be encouraged because physicians and engineers have bodies of knowledge and research tools which complement and supplement each other.

The research, financed by a National Science Foundation grant, began last summer. The foundation grants a small stipend to students such as Katz who are working on such projects and pays for the equipment and supplies involved.

Katz, a senior in the five-year program under which he will get both a bachelor of science and bachelor of arts degree, said he selected this particular research because it is the kind of application of mechanical engineering that has a distinct appeal to him.

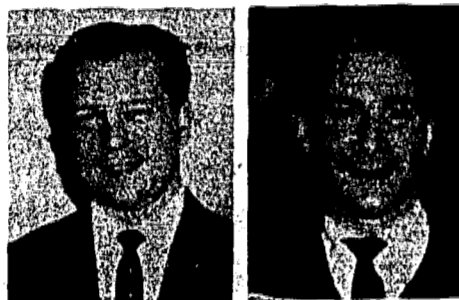
