Realtors observe a 'week' that emphasizes ownership

"Home Ownership — Foundation of the Nation" has been selected as the theme of Realtor Week, which is being observed this week. Chester L. Frankel, president of the Eastern Union County Board of Realtors, said that the 110 members of the Eastern Union County Board are joining with more than 87,000 realtors throughout the nation in observance of the week.

"The term realtor is an indicator of particular qualifications because only a member of the National Association of Real Estate Boards and one of the more than 1,550 local boards can identify himself by that term," Frankel explained. "To be eligible for membership, a candidate must demonstrate a superior knowledge of the business, possess a record of business integrity, and finally, subscribe to a strict code of ethics."

THE CODE OF ETHICS is important, he added. One of the first adopted in the history of American business, it is based on the Golden Rule. Under its 30 articles, the realtor pledges to keep the interests of both the buyer and seller uppermost in his mind during the entire transaction. Frankel said "some surveys show that many people erroneously believe that the term realtor is interchangeable with 'real estate man.' However, it is a service mark (trademark) registered in the U.S. Patent office and only active members of NAREB and its member boards may use it. That is why it is always capitalized."

He praised realtors' leadership over the years in championing the institution of private property and working to make home purchase possible for whole new classes of buyers.

"Realtors," Frankel concluded, "feel they have contributed greatly to the nation's prosperity. NAREB and its leaders have for years urged and promoted home ownership both by the business in which they are engaged and by

support of legislation and custom that have made purchase possible for millions of families who could not previously afford it."

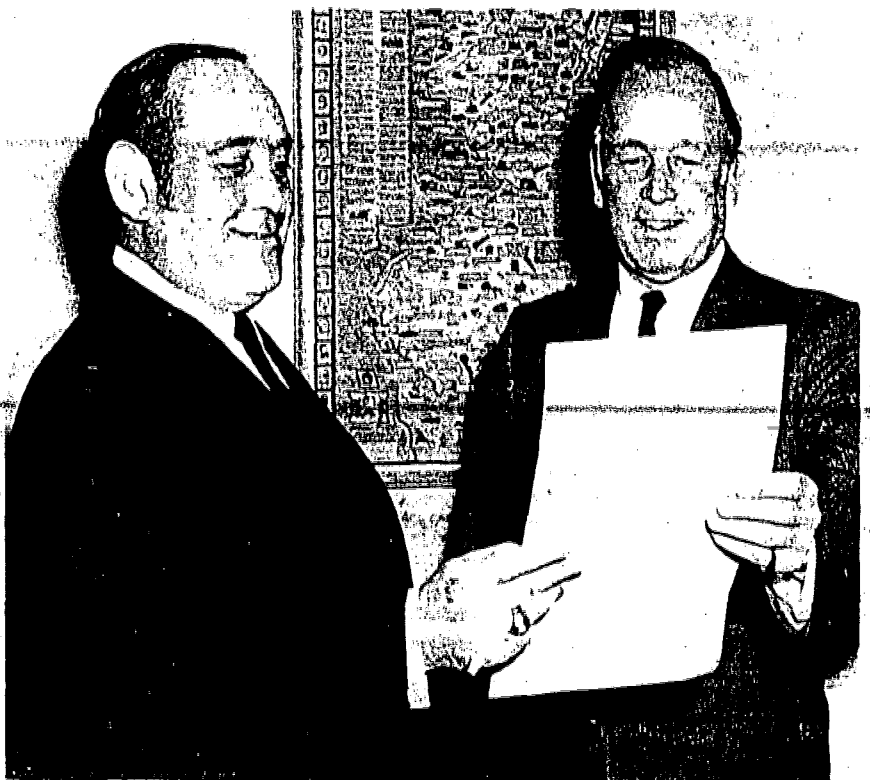
A rhododendron and azalea show will be held in conjunction with this program. Draydon Ellicott of Wayne is chairman of the program.

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Bloomfield College will open science building in September

Bloomfield College will open a new science-classroom building this fall. The building, a modern, air-conditioned structure, will improve the day-to-day operation of the entire college, according to a spokesman for the liberal arts college.

Renovations at the college's Westminster Hall are scheduled to be completed during the summer. The building, purchased two years ago from the congregation of Westminster Church, is now being used for classrooms for music and art. It also has an auditorium. Bloomfield College has a day enrollment of 1,050 students. The evening session has approximately 400 students.

The original campus buildings, one of which dates back to 1807, face the Green in the center of Bloomfield.

Although the college is affiliated with the United Presbyterian Church, its program is nonsectarian and its student body represents diverse religions as well as social and economic backgrounds, said a school spokesman. The college occupies a site in Bloomfield which has served education for more than 150 years. Selbert Hall, now used for the offices of the president, is the original building in which Bloomfield Academy was organized in the Spring of 1807 by a "Society for the Promotion of Literature" composed of members of the First Presbyterian Church.

In 1868, Bloomfield Seminary was formed, first as a special school for training German-speaking ministers who came to this country in great numbers following the revolutions of 1848 in Europe. The seminary was established and incorporated by the Presbytery of Newark. In 1926, after the seminary had been through radical changes both in scope of endeavor and its program, a college of liberal arts was established as an independent division of Bloomfield College and Seminary.

Students may major in accounting, biology, business administration, chemistry, economics, English, French, German, history, mathematics, nursing, philosophy, physics, political science, psychology, religion, sociology, Spanish and secondary teacher certification at the college.

Rutgers program employs the poor in malnutrition fight

The Cooperative Extension Service of Rutgers University is making a dramatic move to help relieve malnutrition and hunger in New Jersey's central cities and other low-income areas.

It has recruited 74 aides, each of whom bears the title of Rutgers Community Assistant. All at present are women and many are welfare mothers who well know the problems of feeding a family that's short of cash. Some are fluent in Spanish as well as English.

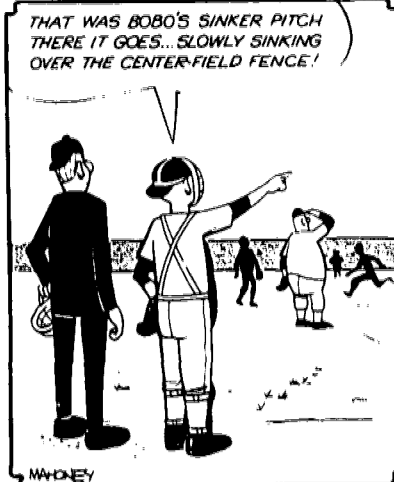
Certain members of the professional staff of the Extension Service—an arm of the Rutgers College of Agriculture and Environmental Science—spend most of their working hours in the new project. Training and supervising aides is only a beginning. Then come the attempts to deal with many unexpected and complex problems the aides encounter during their neighborhood visits.

Each community assistant goes about her neighborhood with a basic understanding of the foods people need for a balanced diet. She can explain menu planning, principles of food shopping, and budgeting.

She is trained also in how to make a home visit, how to observe and report any special needs of a family, and to provide sources of help on sanitation and control of rats and roaches.

Another of her functions is to explain community services such as the Public Health Nursing Service; effective uses of credit, personal care and grooming, and details of the U.S. Department of Agriculture's food stamp or donated foods program.

Troopers to trade cars for 'copters; training for wings

Fourteen State Troopers will trade their patrol cars for helicopters, according to Colonel D.B. Kelley, superintendent of the New Jersey State Police.

The troopers will be trained as pilots for the new rotary air wing of the state agency. They will begin their flight training Monday at Ronson Helicopters Inc., Trenton.

Col. Kelley said four helicopters will be purchased. The rotary wing will make New Jersey the first state in the nation to establish a regular statewide aerial traffic safety patrol.

Three of the new helicopters have maximum carrying capacities of three persons, and will normally be flown with a pilot and observer. The fourth helicopter is a high-speed jet with five-place capacity which can be converted to accommodate two inside litters with sufficient room for a doctor and medical supplies. The helicopter, a Fairchild FH 1100, has a cruising speed of 140 mph and will be able to reach any portion of the state from its base at Trenton within 30 minutes.

All four machines will be equipped with dual controls, police radio, camera mounts, floodlights, loudspeakers, sirens and litters. They will be capable of landing on any type of terrain, including rivers, lakes, swamps and snow.

The newly-formed Helicopter Patrol Bureau, said Col. Kelly, is designed to improve efficiency, availability and overall capability of police patrols in traffic safety and other related law enforcement functions.

Doctoral program added for NCE civil engineers

Newark College of Engineering has announced the addition of a new doctoral program in civil engineering to its graduate school curriculum, which presently offers the degree of doctor of engineering science in chemical, electrical and mechanical engineering, as well as the degree of engineer, and master's degrees in chemical, civil, electrical management and mechanical engineering.

Authorization for the new degree was granted by the New Jersey Board of Higher Education. NCE, which established its first doctoral program in 1960, has awarded a total of 19 doctorates to date, and will award up to six additionally at its June 5 commencement. About 200 master's degrees will also be granted. Graduate programs at the college receive substantial research support from NCE's privately financed affiliate, the Foundation for the Advancement of Graduate Study in Engineering, headed by Robert D. Lilley, president of the N.J. Bell Telephone Co. The foundation will expand its operations to support advanced research in the new doctoral program.

In commenting on NCE's authorization to grant the new degree, Dr. Frederick G. Lehman, chairman of civil engineering, stated that the

need for doctorates in civil engineering has been growing steadily as recent advances in science and technology have been applied to the increasingly complex problems that confront the civil engineer. "Although civil engineering is the oldest field of engineering," according to Lehman, "it is faced with many modern challenges in the highly industrialized state of New Jersey. Particular mention should be made of the civil engineer's role in solving urban and environmental problems."

STERLING FOREST, N.Y.—Springtime at the 125-acre Sterling Forest Gardens — now at peak bloom — will be prolonged due to a succession of cool nights.

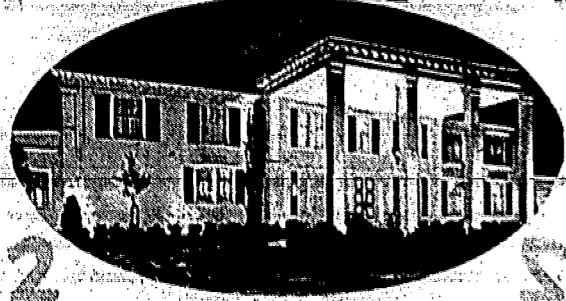

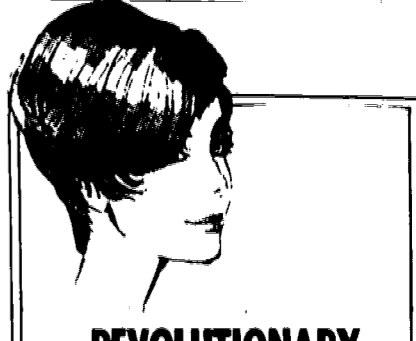

Members of the congregation will be attending conventions and as a group are assigned to the New York gathering. An attendance of 80,000 is expected.

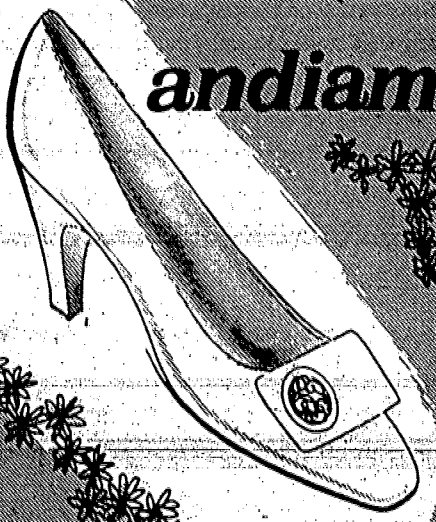

What you say may be true, but if your husband's daughters have been kind and respectful to both of you over the years, he should not cut them out completely... If he has enough to go around!

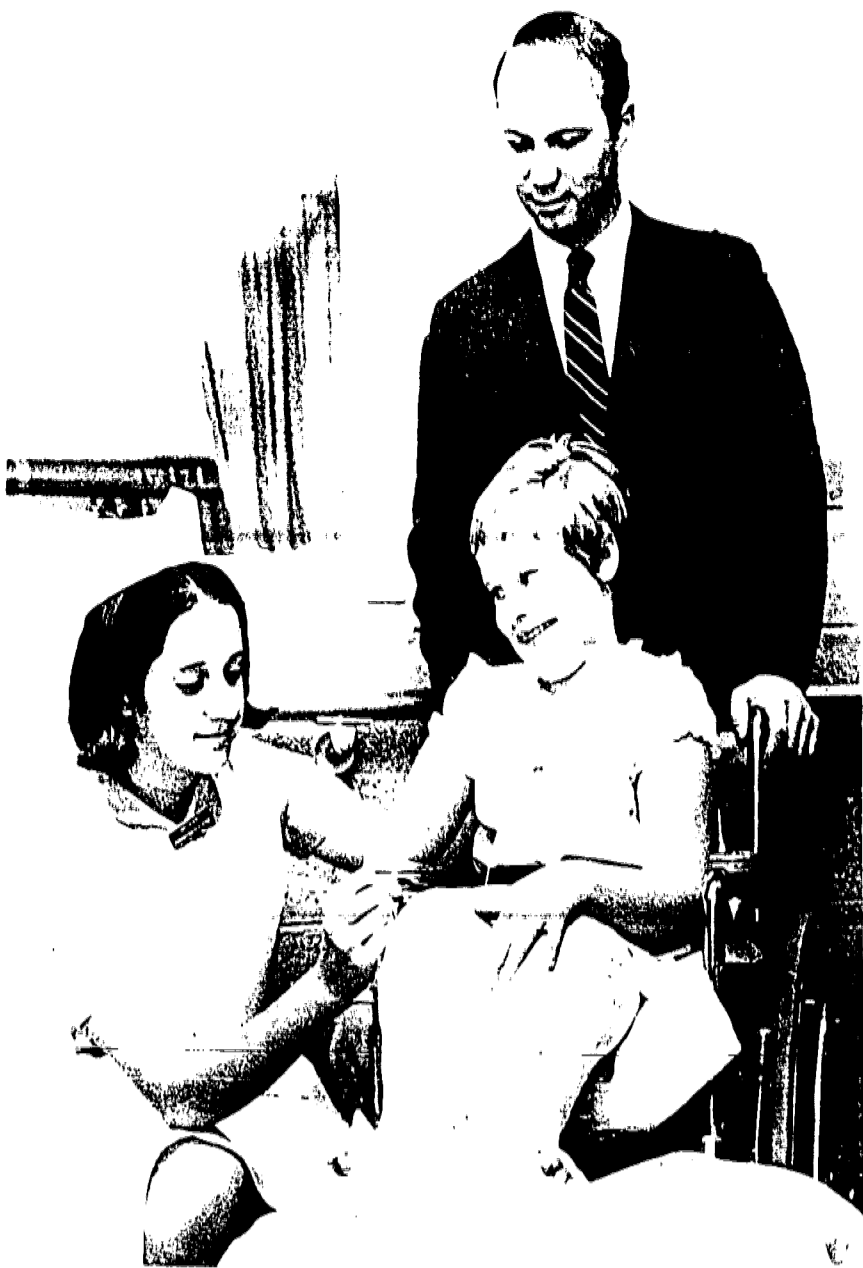

William backs 18-year-olds; says youths deserve vote

WASHINGTON - U.S. Senator Harrison A. Williams, Jr., (D-NJ) this week urged support of the New Jersey referendum question that would permit 18-year-olds to vote.

The Senator praised the New Jersey legislature for passing the resolution which will put the question on the ballot.

"The resolution received strong bipartisan support and it received the strongest support of Governor Richard J. Hughes," the New Jersey lawmaker said. "I hope the voters will give the referendum question equal support."

"For too long, we have clung to the sanctity of the arbitrary 21-year-old voting standard," he said. "We sometimes forget that in

times past, persons under 21 years of age were considered as adults and treated that way. Many of the persons who founded our nation, fought the American Revolution, and opened the West were not yet 21 years old.

"We currently are witnessing deplorable violence on our college campuses. However, part of the problem may be that participation in the national decision-making process is denied those most vitally affected. That denial has built-up frustrations."

Senator Williams long has supported the lower voting standard. He currently is a co-sponsor of a U.S. Senate Joint Resolution that would initiate the process of Constitutional amendment to provide national suffrage for 18-year-olds.

Old ferryboat tells story of atom 'Elizabeth' used as nuclear energy exhibit

The former ferryboat "Elizabeth," which until 1967 shuttled commuters across the Hudson River between Jersey City and New York, surfaced again Tuesday as a Nuclear Information Center for Public Service Electric and Gas Company.

The 194-foot ferryboat was launched on a new Delaware River career after it docked at the utility's Mercer Generating Station in Hamilton Township. The Mercer Station is on the Delaware, a half-dozen miles south of the Statehouse in Trenton.

State and local officials, utility executives, and the press attended dedication ceremonies. They rang up the curtain on a dramatic audiovisual show and toured a large exhibit area. The program and the exhibits were developed by Public Service to provide better understanding of nuclear energy and build confidence in its peaceful uses, particularly in creating electricity.

The Elizabeth is now called "The Second Sun," in keeping with the new force for life-nuclear energy. Once drab green, it is now a dazzling white, with orange and gold trim.

A 140-seat theater has been built at one end of the boat. Exhibits cover the areas where cars and trucks once were packed aboard, bumper-to-bumper.

The exhibits trace the evolution of energy, beginning with the sun, and depict man harnessing fire, wind and water to work for him. They chart the history of the atom and show how, when split, it creates heat. Also shown in striking fashion is the process by which heat turns water into steam and how steam drives turbines which spin generator rotors to produce electricity.

A model of the Salem Nuclear Generating Station, now being built by Public Service, is also on display. The Salem Station is being built on a 700-acre site along the Delaware in Lower Alloways Creek Township, Salem County. It will have two nuclear units. The first, which will have a capacity of 1,090,000 kilowatts, is scheduled to be completed in 1972. The second unit, which will produce 1,112,000 kilowatts, will begin operating in 1973. Public Service is responsible for the design, construction and operation of the plant, but will share costs and electric output with Atlantic City Electric Company, Delmarva Power & Light Company, and Philadelphia Electric Company. When completed, the Salem Station will be the largest electric generating plant in New Jersey and one of the largest nuclear stations in the world.

The Nuclear Information Center will be open to special invited groups today and tomorrow. The general public will be able to view it from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Saturday, noon to 6 p.m. on Sunday, 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Monday and Tuesday.

Following the Mercer visit, the ferryboat will be towed to Public Service's Burlington Generating Station, about 15 miles downstream, where it will be open to the public from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Friday, Memorial Day; 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Saturday, May 31; noon to 6 p.m., Sunday, June 1; 10 a.m. to 4 p.m., Thursday, Friday and Saturday, June 5-7; and noon to 6 p.m. on Sunday, June 8.

From Burlington the ferryboat will move to Philadelphia where it will be on exhibit from June 12 to 26; to Wilmington, Del., from July 1 to 6, and finally to Artificial Island, the site of the Salem Nuclear Generating Station in

Lower Alloways Creek Township. There, beginning July 13, the ferryboat will be open to the public from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Wednesdays, Thursdays and Fridays; 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. on Saturdays, and noon to 6 p.m. on Sundays.

FAMILY LIFE TODAY

Mabel G. Stolte, County Home Economist

Do you think of yourself and family members as being creative? If not, why not? First of all, what does the word creative mean? For purposes of this discussion we can say that creativity is the special way each person sees, learns and thinks about things. It involves expressing new ideas, feelings and experiences. It is the ability to find pleasure and satisfaction in all parts of living. You're never too old to learn how to become more creative. Homemakers, teachers, lawyers, salesmen, plumbers and bricklayers as well as school children and preschoolers have the potentials for being creative. To be creative is learning to express one's uniqueness, it is the ability to be oneself. From the following description perhaps you will be able to select some ways in which you can develop your own and your children's sense of creativity. What are creative people like? Researchers have found certain characteristics common in creative persons. Creative people are alert and see many

things in their environment. They use all of their senses in a learning experience—seeing, hearing, tasting, touching and smelling, when possible. The toddlers or young children attempting to explore the world about them are an example of this. They constantly poke, punch or taste things to find out about them. Creative people like to explore new ideas. They tend to be original in their way of thinking about things. They have unusual ways of saying things. Revolutionary soldiers' graves to be dedicated

The graves of three Revolutionary War soldiers and that of the mother of two of the soldiers will be dedicated by the Westfield chapters of the Daughters of the American Revolution and the Sons of the American Revolution, with the cooperation of the Union County Park Commission, on Saturday at 3 p.m.

The cemetery is located in the "Deserted Village" area of the Watchung Reservation and contains the graves of Phebe Badgley Wilcocks, her sons John and William, and her nephew Joseph Badgley.

The dedication program will include the raising of the colors; a talk by H. Emerson Thomas, a member of the Sons of the American Revolution and former mayor of the Town of Westfield; the firing of a volley over the cemetery by two companies of the "Jersey Blues," the first company being members of the SAR; and the second company made up of students from Rutgers ROTC program.

Others participating in the dedication program will include the Rev. George L. Hunt of Fanwood, who will give the invocation; Mrs. Ralph A. Hall, Westfield, past regent of the Westfield Chapter DAR; Clarence Troxell, Westfield, president of the Westfield Chapter SAR; John Ludlow of Westfield; Union County Park Commissioner Francis R. Farley, New Providence; and Edwin A. Baldwin of Summit. The four grave markers have been made

available by the Department of Defense through the efforts of William W. Vanderhoff, supervisor of veterans' internment for Union County. The presence of the graves in the "Village" cemetery was revealed by Baldwin, who researched the history of the area in preparation for conducting tours through the "Village" for the Union County Park Commission last year.

The Wilcocks family, the first to live in the area of the "Deserted Village," established a burying ground of its own at the site, as was the custom of early New Jersey families living in outlying areas. A local historian, Willis Fletcher Johnson of New Providence, wrote in 1882 that the Wilcocks' graveyard, which once contained more than a dozen graves and had been surrounded by a picket fence, had become a wild unenclosed part of the woods and that its sole remaining headstone was that of John Wilcocks, son of the original settler, Peter Wilcocks.

Union County Clerk Walter G. Halpin, Fanwood, donated an aluminum flagpole with an appropriate thirteen-starred flag to the park commission which was erected at the cemetery site.

The dedication program is open to the public. The group will meet at the Trailside Nature and Science Center parking area in the Watchung Reservation at 2:45 p.m. and proceed to the site of the "Deserted Village" by auto.
