Imported cars in stock avoid the surplus duty

While the increase in the tariff on imported cars coming into the United States will likely influence the price structure on the Volkswagens in the future, a spokesman for an area VW dealership said this week that cars already in stock were not affected and would be sold out of his company's inventory at prices that prevailed prior to President Nixon's announcement Sunday night.

According to Richard Hamilton, vice-president of Jeweitch Volkswagens, Elizabeth VW sales, service and parts facility at 900 E. Birchwood ave., Linden, a full complement of VW vehicles was in his firm's inventory when the 10 percent import tax was announced. These cars, along with cars that were already in the United States and awaiting shipment here from Port Newark, where they arrived over the past several weeks, are not subject to increased duty and may be sold at Volkswagen's present suggested retail prices.

Hamilton said that it is "conceivable" that a VW purchased now could cost less than it did last week — if Congress, when it renews Sept. 8, renews the Federal Excise Tax, retroactively to Aug. 16. In that case, he pointed out, a customer who bought a VW now that was imported prior to Aug. 16 would ultimately be getting a rebate of the Federal Excise Tax — which varies from model to model — and not be liable for any price increase that might result from the 10 percent surcharge.

The local VW official clarified two other items regarding the surcharge. First, he noted, since imported cars were already subject to a 35 percent duty, the increase in duty will amount to 6.5 percent, not an

Tuesday died for lack of a second.
Members acted to seek a grant from the State
Law Enforcement Planning Agency for some
\$25,000 to train 12 faculty members as special

town in his own area.



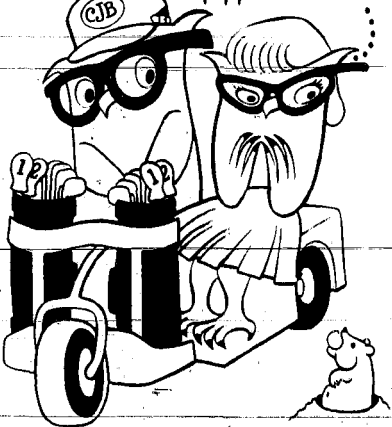
HAROLD DAMEROW

Ban on burning fossil fuels goes into effect Oct. 1

The New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection issued a regulation today that on Oct. 1 the final set of standards designed to control air pollution from sulfur dioxide came into effect. The standards pertaining to sulfur in fuel oil, together with their deadlines, were made public at the time that the New Jersey Air Pollution Control Act Chapter 106 (Sulfur in Fuel) was promulgated on Jan. 12, 1968. Fuel oil merchants and consumers have had the "transition" these years in order to prepare for the Oct. 1 compliance deadline.

By Oct. 1, the sulfur content of Number 5 fuel oil and heavier fuel oils sold and used in New Jersey must not exceed 0.2 percent. These oils are used mostly in power generating stations, big industrial furnaces and in heating systems of larger commercial installations. The sulfur content of Number 4 oil used in apartment buildings, commercial buildings and small industrial furnaces, must not exceed 0.2 percent, and the sulfur content of Number 2 oil, used in residential heating and in small commercial establishments, must not be in excess of 0.2 percent.

Also on Oct. 1, new standards for sulfur content in coal—regulated by Chapter 104 of the Pollution Control Code—go into effect. On the same date, the use of low-sulfur coal from both bituminous and anthracite coal is 0.2 percent.

Seven rural counties are exempt from the Oct. 1 sulfur-in-fuel regulations (both oil and coal): Atlantic, Bergen, Essex, Hudson, Hunterdon, Ocean, Sussex and Warren. In all other parts of the state, however, no fuel may be sold or used which does not meet the new standards.

The requirements of the air pollution control code do not preclude the use or sale of fuel on a hand so long as it meets standards now current. Anyone who sells fuel may continue to sell out of storage until the October 1 deadline, no later than Jan. 1, 1972. While the department will enforce the new standards vigorously, a realistic effort will be made to minimize any inconvenience to the public caused by the transition to lower sulfur levels.

William A. Minore, chief of the department's Bureau of Air Pollution Control, said "Because of the difficulty of obtaining new supplies of coal which meet the October 1 specifications, many users have converted to gas oil or burning equipment."

"In instances where there have been delays in completing these conversion installations, the county health officers, business and industry, or the state police or the Department of Air Pollution Control, the courts to comply, however rests with the consumer."

"In the case of Chapter 106, merchants and consumers have had since May 6, 1968, to prepare to meet the Oct. 1 deadline."

New road in drive for political power

Women set to renew battle for 'real' gains

The bell has rung for the second round in the fight by American women for political power. And, predicts the new director of the Center for the American Woman and Politics at Rutgers, it's going to be a lively battle.

Dr. Jennifer S. MacLeod, who was named director of the center last month, points out that it is more than a half century since the U. S. Secretary of State announced the ratification (Aug. 26, 1920) of the 19th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution which gave women the right to vote.

"But rather than opening the door to a new era of political influence by women, as those who fought so hard for suffrage had expected," Dr. MacLeod said, "the vote didn't really change things drastically. Too many women automatically deferred to their husbands or fathers and voted as they did. They were not yet ready to confront the social and role changes which had to occur if the vote was to be meaningful."

These other changes, Dr. MacLeod suggested, are now taking place, creating a new interest in political power among women. She is scheduled to appear on NBC's "Today" show on Aug. 26, to discuss the women's movement.

"I think there are clearly three separate battles being fought by women's movements in the United States. The first of these, as an economist, probably the easiest, is the idea of equal pay for equal work but is obviously just that it is becoming ever more difficult to achieve."

The second front is political, the sharing of real rather than symbolic power.

"THERE IS ONE particular aspect of the political battle which makes me cautiously optimistic," Dr. MacLeod noted. "There are women who are not yet fully committed to other aspects of the women's liberation movement who are ready to play a role in the struggle against the status quo."

The third area in which women's lives are bound to change, Dr. MacLeod argued, is the most sensitive and the most crucial—personal and family relationships.

"The closer to home any battle comes, the more painful it is," she pointed out.

Dr. MacLeod has her own family: three supporters of women's liberation, her husband, John A. MacLeod, a vice president of Young and Rubicam advertising agency, her daughter, Pamela, 16, and a son, Scott.

Why has there been a 50-year lag between the attainment of the vote and the new drive for political power by women?

According to Dr. MacLeod, one reason is the recent availability of birth control methods which have given women control over their own bodies and, thus, their own lives.

Improved birth control is not the cause of the women's liberation movement, but it is a necessary precondition, just as the opportunity to work and earn is a necessary precondition, she said.

ONE OF THE SIGNIFICANT new aspects of the women's liberation movement, Dr. MacLeod noted, is that it is just beginning to attract a whole new group of adherents—lower middle class women who are beginning to realize that she is a victim of salary and social inequalities.

All of these factors together, Dr. MacLeod believes, mean that the women's movement is now beginning to reach the size at which it can successfully again "do politics."

"I find it interesting," she observed, "that as long as women deal with primarily emotional and 'person' issues they were scorned as 'and ridiculed. But men take politics very seriously, and as soon as women have political clout, I predict men will have to take the women's movement seriously."

Over 72? VA dropping income questionnaires

About 653,000 of 2,300,000 pensioners will no longer have to submit annual income questionnaires to the Veterans Administration starting Jan. 1, 1972, according to Joseph J. Malone, director, New Jersey Veterans Administration, Newark Regional Office, Newark, announced today.

A recent law permitted VA to drop the requirement for 72-year-old (and older) veterans for widows on VA pension, and for parents receiving VA dependency and indemnity compensation (DIC) payments.

The law affects recipients who have been on the rolls during two consecutive years. However, those beneficiaries must continue to report changes in income to VA.

VA receives on questionnaires mailed to beneficiaries each year with their "tax" check.

"VA pensions are paid on the basis of need to veterans who are blind and permanently disabled from non-service causes, and to widows and children of veterans who die of non-service causes."

Dependent parents of veterans who die of service-connected disabilities may be eligible for indemnity compensation.

Veterans, dependents and surviving spouses who are eligible for pension or other VA benefits may contact the VA Regional Office at 200 Washington Pl., Newark, NJ 07102, telephone 960-2100.

New Careers Training: A new careers training program designed to increase the scope and effectiveness of community mental health workers, psychiatric nurses, and patient advocates.

The program will aid state and local efforts to recruit and train the personnel needed to serve underserved areas and population groups that have been neglected by traditional mental health services.

The term of these workers, "New Careersists" will be broadly defined. It will include individuals who will be trained to do new mental health jobs such as outreach or going out into the community and neighborhoods to work with people.

However, these beneficiaries, and workers who will serve to help mental health patients by representing their interests and aiding them in various ways to get help during their illness and the recovery and rehabilitation period.

This program will also involve the training of persons for some of the kinds of work and jobs that have been previously considered to be the exclusive domain of more highly trained professionals, such as psychologists, social workers, psychiatric nurses, and patient advocates.

Grants will be awarded for carrying on the training of educational institutions, community centers, community mental health centers, and hospitals.

This program is part of our continuing effort to attack mental illness through the help of trained workers employed in a wide variety of mental health activities.

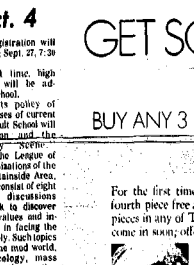

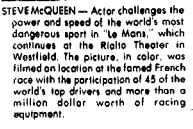
