White won't be candidate for Regional Board seat

Theodore A. White, Mountainside member of the Regional High School District Board of Education, announced at the board meeting Tuesday night that he will not be a candidate for reelection when his term expires this February. Natalie Waldt of Springfield stated following the meeting at Jonathan Dayton Regional High School in Springfield that she will be a candidate for the fourth three-year term.

Mrs. Waldt, a former board president, said that she had decided to seek another term "after much deliberation over what we can do about school financing—which is still a riddle in the legislature—and implementing the requirement for 'Thorough and Efficient' education."

She added, "I feel that the educational needs of our students are very great, and this is the major reason why I will seek a fourth term. I view board membership as one of the most important functions a person can engage in."

White told the 25 persons at the meeting, "Having given the matter careful and thoughtful consideration, I have decided not to seek reelection as the Mountainside representative. Service on the Regional Board is very time-consuming. I do not feel that I can continue to devote the amount of time needed, in my opinion, to adequately carry out the responsibilities of the office and, at the same time, meet commitments to my family and to my employer."

"Facing continued declining enrollment and the advent of 'Thorough and Efficient' education, the board and administration clearly have their work cut out for them in finding means to operate the system efficiently and, at the same time, meet the needs of the students in the district."

White was elected to a two-year unexpired term in 1974 after having been named to replace Dr. Minor C.K. Jones, who had retired from the board. White was commended for his services by Charles Vitale of Kenilworth, board

president, who said he had made major contributions "especially in the area of fiscal improvement."

IN OTHER BUSINESS, the board named Aldo H. Collura of South Orange as coordinator of foreign languages to succeed August Caprio of Springfield, who retired last spring. Collura,

who will start work in January, has served at Madison Township High School for 11 years, the last seven as foreign language department chairman.

He received a B.A. degree in French from Upsala College in 1963 and also holds a master's degree in French from Seton Hall.

"Now there are many orphanages and homes for children and also for senior citizens who, like the original request, ask for our help during this good-will holiday season," a

spokesman said. "And the Bestowers still respond. As they better understand the needs of their recipients, the Bestowers alter what they do. No longer can selected invitees answer the known need for help. It is too great. It will take everyone in Mountainside to respond adequately to this year's known needs. Students are given the opportunity to voice opinions on a patriotic theme and to convey their thoughts via the broadcasting medium.

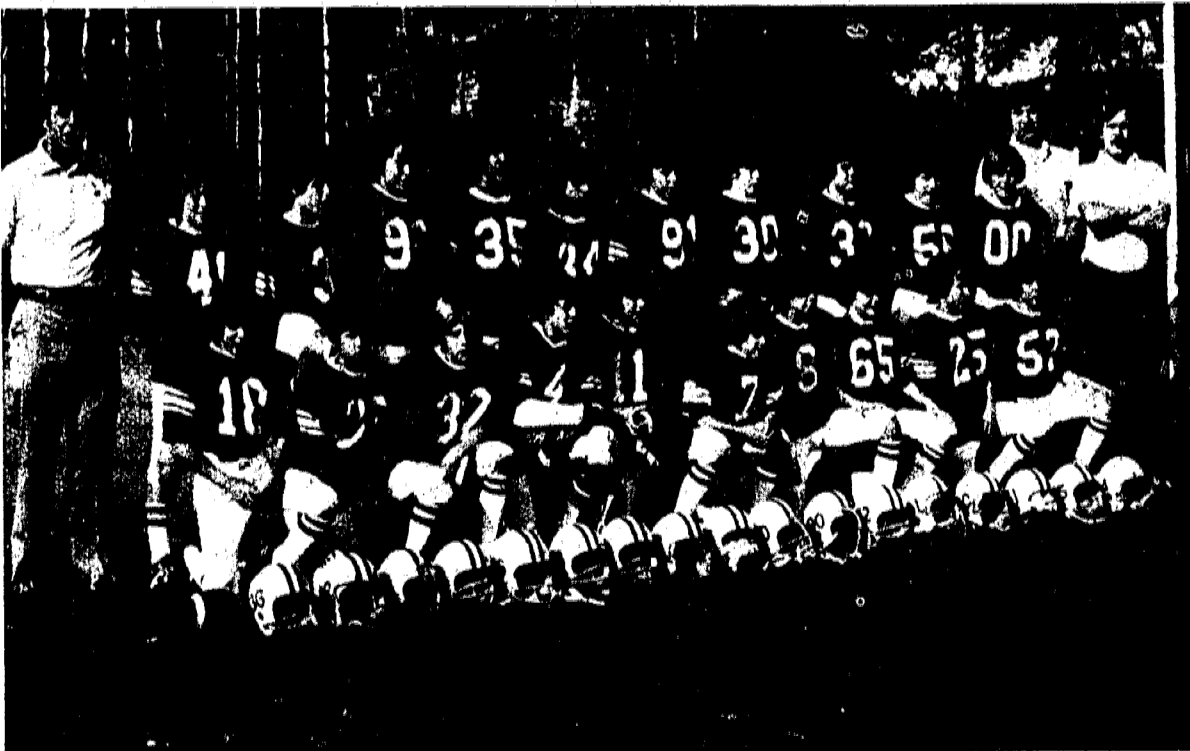

Tickets to be issued for overnight parking

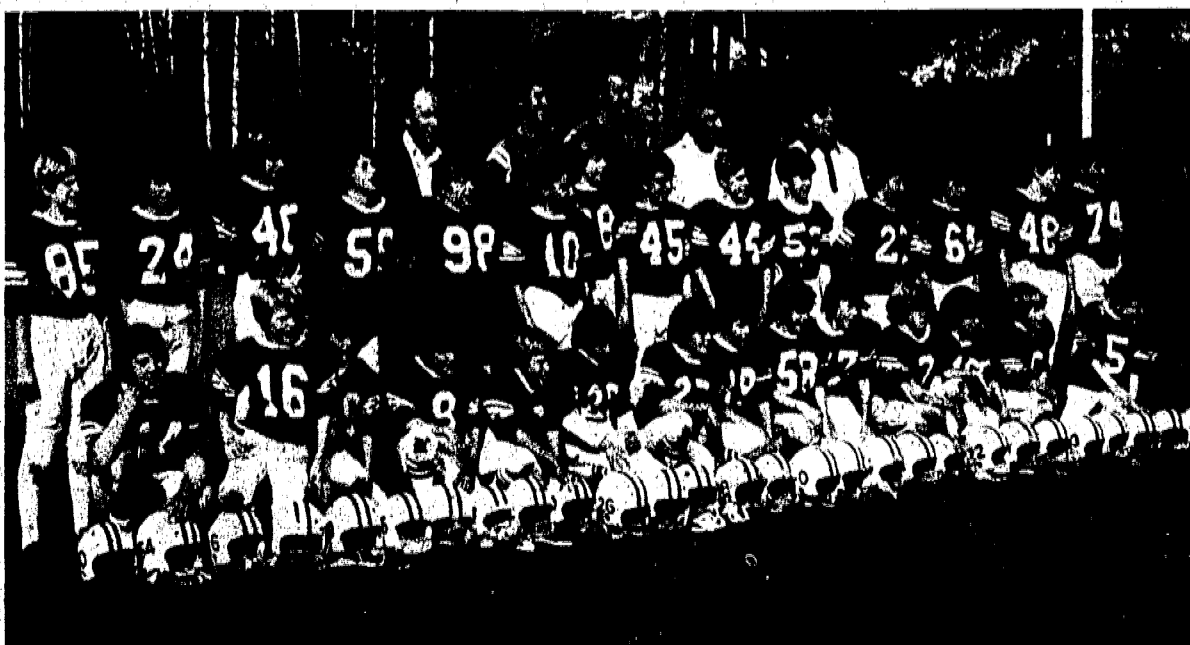

Rinaldo shrugs off talk of running for governor

Midway through his second term in Congress, Rep. Matthew J. Rinaldo (R-12th District) has settled down into a heavy but "challenging" schedule: an 8 a.m.-to-11 p.m. workday in Washington, a round of speaking engagements in his home district every weekend, and "not a single vacation in three years, except for a couple of days around the holidays with my family."

It's a schedule he obviously relishes and which, he firmly insists, he hopes to continue into the foreseeable future.

The Union Township Republican returns to that point whenever mention of his name comes up, as it periodically does, as a possible gubernatorial candidate or as a possible successor to 71-year-old Senator Clifford Case, Republican, whose current term expires in 1978.

In 1977, when New Jersey will elect a governor, "I will probably be doing my congressional job as diligently as I can," Rinaldo said.

In 1978, "I will probably be running for Congress again on a ticket with Case as candidate for senator." Case, he added, is "a good friend." And as for 1976, when the present term of Democratic Senator Harrison Williams expires, Rinaldo's only comment is a smiling: "He's another friend."

But if he avoids talk of any political future outside the House of Representatives, Rinaldo does comment in detail on other issues facing his district and the nation.

He reviewed many of these issues in a wide-ranging interview last week with members of the staff of this newspaper and its sister Suburban Publishing Corp. newspapers in Rinaldo's district.

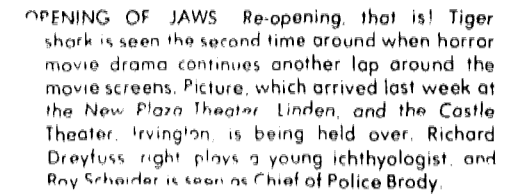
Among the issues was the ever-present question of the nation's energy crisis.

In 1975, the United States spent \$398 million for solar, geothermal, advanced energy systems and physical research; \$12.2 million

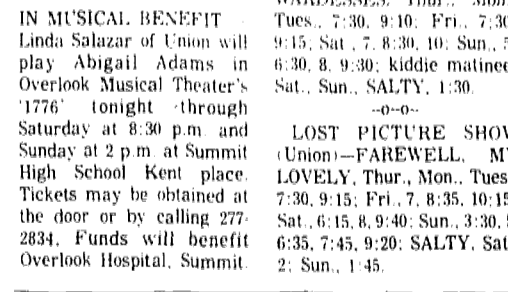

Regional auditions to be held by New Jersey State Opera

The first regional auditions awards program of the New Jersey State Opera has been scheduled for early in 1976, with winners to receive scholarship awards and possibly a contract with the State Opera.

Six regional auditions will be held in January and February. In April, regional winners will compete in the finals at Symphony Hall, Newark, for first, second and third prizes of \$1000, \$500 and \$250. Final winners will be

presented at a concert with orchestra at Symphony Hall on April 25. Deadline for applications is Jan. 1.

The awards program is sponsored by Friends of the New Jersey State Opera. In announcing the competition, Mrs. William A. Cromarty, chairman of Friends of the Opera and of the regional auditions, said that singers between the ages of 22 and 34 are eligible to participate if they are college graduates or the equivalent and are ready to enter the professional theater.

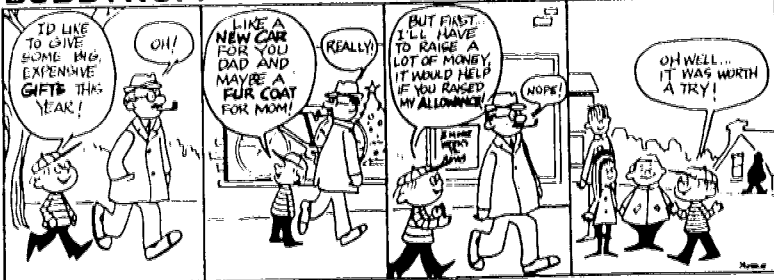
"Our purpose is to discover and encourage young artists and widen their career opportunities here in their own region without making it necessary for them to go abroad for professional on-stage experience," said Mrs. Cromarty. She pointed out that audition sites include five colleges and universities.

Mrs. Cromarty announced the following auditions schedule: Tuesday, Jan. 20, Douglass College, New Brunswick; Sunday, Jan. 25, Glassboro State College, Glassboro; Sunday, Feb. 15, Robert Treat Hotel, Crystal Room, Newark; Tuesday, Feb. 17, Fairleigh Dickinson University, Teaneck; Sunday, Feb. 22, Westminster Choir College, Princeton; Sunday, Feb. 29, Fairleigh Dickinson University, Madison.

Judges will include State Opera's artistic director and conductor, Alfredo Silipigni; a well-known voice teacher, a member of the faculty of the host college, and a member of the local sponsoring organization.
