

## Thriving chapel now just a shell, marooned in island of neglect

The State Department of Transportation this week advised the Echo on its plans for Chapel Island on Rt. 22 and its decaying old church building. Its decision: perhaps one day it will close the first two U-turns and enlarge the western third one, but until the funding is straightened out, the department will do absolutely nothing. "There is no active plan or study to do anything to Rt. 22 right now," Charles Takacs, a supervising engineer with the state DOT said.

happens, that thing will sit there forever," Takacs commented. "It's still in pretty good shape, and if some historical group asks if they can remove it, I think the department would be willing to cooperate with them." The Mountainside Union Chapel is now a boarded and barricaded structure on a weed-choked traffic island in the highway, ignored by the commuters who drive past and the residents who live nearby. Until recently, though, it was a bustling church, uniquely located, and a major symbol of Mountainside's contribution to local and state heritage. It survived two wars, floods, blizzards, urban encroachment and changing lifestyles, but was closed, finally and permanently, by an unfulfilled traffic

plan of the State Department of Transportation. The settlers who came to the area between 1700 and 1750 formed the first permanent population in the Mountainside area, then part of a larger city called Elizabethtown. About 1736, the Badgely family settled "between the first and second mountains" (the Watchung Mountains) and built a large homestead near the section of the present Watchung Reservation where the Trailside Museum and Zoo stands today. This was the origin of the church; the building itself would not be constructed until the beginning of the 20th Century. But the original worshippers who prayed with traveling pastors in Abigail Badgely's home were the men and women who founded the congregation. Churchgoers organized a Sunday school, conducted by the Rev. Edwin Downer, 22, assisted by his brother Silas, and by other worshippers, Amos Lum, George Frazer and Mrs. Badgely. About 1825 the school was moved to the local schoolhouse, known as the Locust Grove Schoolhouse because of the locust trees nearby. The structure, built in 1760, was used at that time for both religious and secular education. These religious lessons continued until 1856, when the well-worn schoolhouse was torn down. Classes paused for a short time until another building replaced it. Activities resumed in 1857, continuing until 1862 when the Civil War and the subsequent displacement of area residents closed the school. After a nine-year lapse, the school was reorganized under the control of the Westfield Baptist Church on Feb. 26, 1871. It was known as the Locust Grove Baptist Sunday School until Feb. 26, 1879, when it became the Union Sunday School. The Chapel Island property was donated in 1893 by Kate B. High, the widow of an Illinois pastor. The Locust Grove Union Chapel (a society which would have title to the land) was created on June 23 of that year. In 1895, the school decided to set aside the first Sunday offering each month as a building fund. Generous parishioners and large donations allowed the cornerstone to be laid with appropriate ceremonies on Oct. 28, 1900. By September 1901 the building, constructed at a cost of \$2,500 was dedicated free of all debts. In an interview 20 years ago, Dewey Knoll reminisced about his life on the Knoll farm (located on Central avenue) and his activities with the new church. The former superintendent of Sunday Schools recalled the days when the simple 30-by-40-foot half-stone and half-frame building stood next to a winding country road that eventually became Rt. 29, and then the eastbound lane of Rt. 22. "There weren't a dozen homes around here then," he said. "If we had 25 at an evening service, it was considered a good congregation." Knoll remembered that he would often ride his pony to the chapel and help fill the kerosene lamps or stoke the

## Business office thefts show just slight rise

The rate of burglaries in the borough's business office district has not risen appreciably in the last year, according to Detective Steven Semancik of the Mountainside police department. "If we've gone up, it's a very small percentage," Semancik said. "A lot of it has been carelessness on the part of the people who work there." Commenting on a rash of recent breakins in the secluded area, Semancik said that public awareness is the only possible way that burglars can be caught.

"When people see something they suspect, they don't call police, but when something occurs, then they call police," he observed. "By then, of course, it's too late to do anything. There's no need for burglars to visit the building in advance," he added, explaining that most of the recent breakins were executed in the same manner that a private home might be entered.

"Most of these jobs are spur-of-the-moment things. They don't want to be seen. Most of them are junkies, and they don't want to be caught because they can't get drugs in jail." Last Thursday, fast-moving burglars pried open three doors and a cigarette machine in a Springfield avenue business building, carrying off nearly \$2,000 in cash and property, according to police, who said that there were no signs of forced entry into the building itself.

"It's probable that more than one person was involved," Semancik commented. He explained that information from the building employees indicated that the thefts had

occurred very shortly before the building was open for business.

The Stock Equipment Co. was entered and a small refrigerator valued at \$200 was stolen, according to police. The Diet Control Center was broken into, and \$100 cash and two cameras were taken. Cerates Inc. reported three cash registers valued in total at \$1,440 and an IBM typewriter were stolen, police said.

A cigarette vending machine also was broken into and the change box was emptied, it was reported.

All three office doors showed signs of being jimmied open with a screwdriver, but, according to reports, the door of a fourth office showed screwdriver marks but was not entered. A broken screwdriver blade was found nearby, police reported.

In previously reported burglaries, buildings on Sheffield street and Bristol road were entered the weekend of August 10 by thieves who hacked two foot openings into roofs, dropped into offices, then exited through the same holes.

## Robbery suspect held after wild car chase

A dead end street in Mountainside was the end of the line Aug. 15 for an escaped convict who allegedly robbed a Rahway supermarket and then, with his wife and young daughter in the car, attempted to elude policemen from five departments during a winding collision-filled cross-county chase, Union County police said.

The suspect was captured after a foot chase through Echo Lake Park, police reported.

Thomas James Campbell, 30, was charged with the armed robbery of \$5,500 from an Acme supermarket. His wife, Bonnie Lyn Campbell, 26, and an 8-year-old daughter were held pending an investigation, according to reports. Campbell had escaped from the State Correctional Institution at Graterford, Pa., on May 26, Pennsylvania State Police reported.

Sgt. David Regal of the county prosecutor's office noticed the Campbell car heading north on the Garden State Parkway in Cranford soon after hearing a broadcast of a police bulletin on the robbery. The subsequent chase led increasing numbers of police through Cranford, Kenilworth, Westfield and Mountainside. The suspect allegedly "fish-tailed" around one police roadblock and avoided another by swerving through a gas station, through a narrow area between a retaining wall and a telephone pole, and up a one-way

fire. The pony became used to pausing at the church, which was a problem if Knoll wanted to travel beyond the building to go swimming in the lake or to pick chestnuts from the surrounding woods.

"I would have to urge him considerably to get him to go on," Knoll commented.

During the next several decades small roads then highways ringed the constantly expanding building. Additions were constructed for use as classrooms and worship areas. In 1946 the New Jersey State Garden Club and the State Highway Commission were granted permission to landscape the Chapel grounds. The work done in conjunction with the Blue Star Drive project (another section of Rt. 22) included the planting of numerous flowering dogwood trees.

The church continued operating as a house of worship and a religious school. One wall was damaged in 1948 when workmen digging an excavation accidentally undermined an unsupported part of the building. It collapsed into the ditch, nearly killing four men.

The church that had outlived some of the colonial governments it had provided with missionaries finally read its own future epitaph on the blueprints of the Department of Transportation's plan for Rt. 22.

The talk in 1972 was of expanding the highway, installing feeder lanes, cutting New Providence road into two separate sections, and engineers had planned a two-lane one-way turnaround overpass very close to the spot where the chapel stood.

The parishioners fought the takeover attempts, but by April 28, 1974, they had moved out of the building, chosen another site off Central Avenue and dedicated a new church. The old chapel was stripped of its bell, cornerstone and stained glass windows, and left boarded up a property of the state.

The state's traffic plans ran into problems, financial and legal, and were canceled soon afterwards. The state, according to a recent statement issued by a spokesman, "would never have done something like that nowadays."

According to Nicholas Cifelli, a Transportation Department regional maintenance engineer, the parking lot is now being used as a storage area for winter materials, such as salts and abrasives.

"Around the end of the grass-cutting season, the end of September or the beginning of October, we'll remove dead trees and any dead underbrush."

The church sits alone, now. The horse-sheds are long gone, the spot overgrown

with weeds. The posts where farmers parked their buggies and the lawn where the borough's first Boy Scout troop once met are gone also; the ground covered with piles of sand, salt and calcium chloride.

## Grant to aid study of humanities issues

The newly created Community College Humanities Association has received a \$17,500 grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities to conduct a national planning meeting at Union College Oct. 18 through 20.

The grant was announced this week by Dr. Donald D. Schmeltekopf of Cranford, professor of philosophy at the college and the new association's first president. The first event planned by the association, the meeting will address issues confronting the humanities, particularly the erosion of the humanities in community colleges and in other institutions.

The three-day workshop-conference will draw on leaders in college humanities across the nation. Its major aim is to formulate a set of proposals that address the problems in the humanities and to determine what actions will best advance the humanities at the college level.

The event will begin with an 8:30 p.m. meeting Oct. 18, followed by a full day of symposia, discussions, addresses and work sessions Oct. 19, and an inaugural conference the next day.

# Aging, handicapped can get fare cuts

Peter M. Shields, director of the Union County Division on Aging, this week reminded senior citizens and handicapped persons they are eligible for reduced fares on transportation.

Senior citizens must be 62 or over. Shields said but handicapped persons are eligible regardless of age. The program enables qualified persons to ride intrastate bus and rail routes at half fare from 9:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. and 7 p.m. to 6 a.m. weekdays and all day Saturdays, Sundays and state holidays. The program also applies to most interstate bus and rail routes in adjacent states.

Shields, whose office is part of the Union County Department of Human

Resources, said senior citizens can apply for the reduced fare program through any bank, savings and loan association or the Union County Division on Aging. Applicants must bring their Social Security card and proof of age. Enrollees will receive their identification card and 50 one-way tickets approximately four weeks after applying.

Handicapped persons should apply to the New Jersey Department of Transportation, Special Programs, Division of Commuter Services, at 1035 Parkway Ave. in Trenton, 08625. Applicants can also call the Union County Division on Aging at 527-4662 for additional information.

# Driver turns to moped, draws 2nd \$215 fine

A former Springfield resident now living in Roselle Park was fined \$510 and given 45 days in jail by acting Judge William Boffa Jr. in Springfield Municipal Court Monday evening.

Andrew P. Bullen, formerly of Mountain Avenue, was fined \$215 and given a 45-day jail term for driving a car while on the revoked list, a violation that occurred Feb. 22.

On June 28, Bullen was arrested by Police Officer Ivan Shapow. From that arrest, Bullen was fined \$215 for driving a moped while on the revoked list, \$30 for careless driving and \$50 for attempting to elude a police officer. He pleaded guilty to all charges; but pleaded not guilty to a charge of obstructing the passage of cars. That charge was dismissed.

# Equity not enough

Financial institutions that make second-mortgage loans to homeowners don't want to get into the used-home business; therefore, regardless of how much equity you have to offer as collateral, prepare to meet traditional tests of your debt-carrying ability.

In other court action, Lorraine J. Braustein of Kenilworth and Peter Picarra of Rahway both pleaded not guilty but were both found guilty of careless driving, the charges stemming out of an accident involving the two. Braustein and Picarra were each fined \$40.

## Assemblyman seeks federal flood control

As sponsor of a state bill to create a flood control authority for Union, Somerset and Middlesex Counties, DiFrancesco pointed out that the 22nd District has experienced serious flooding problems involving loss of life and property.

"We mustn't wait for another tragedy before taking action to protect these flood-prone areas," the legislator said. "Solving the problem requires effort and cooperation at all levels of government."

# Blue Cross members increase utilization of home care benefits

Members of Blue Cross of New Jersey are taking increasing advantage of home care benefits, according to recent utilization reports.

These benefits allow patients who have been hospitalized to receive continuing treatment at home when the doctor deems this medically appropriate. Treatment rendered in a home care setting is considerably less costly than the same treatment given to a hospital inpatient.

Blue Cross of New Jersey reported that the trend, which began last year, has continued so far during 1979. Compared to 1977, Blue Cross subscribers increased their use of home care benefits by 12 per cent in 1978 while convalescing and undergoing therapy.

That means more people are recognizing Home Health care as an effective, less expensive, alternative to an extended inpatient stay in the hospital, according to Blue Cross.

Figures from the first quarter of 1979 show that, although there are more home care cases, skilled professionals from home health agencies are making fewer visits per case. That, Blue Cross officials feel, represents an intelligent use of the benefit. Blue Cross and the home health agencies are cooperating to see that subscribers get the most out of each visit.

In a home care program, a patient receives a wide range of services from skilled nurses or therapists. Treatment or therapy is performed in the convenience of the patient's home at about one-sixth the cost of the same treatment when received in a hospital.

Blue Cross of New Jersey began offering home care benefits in 1966. Recently it has been working with the Home Health Assembly of New Jersey—representative of the state's 46 home health agencies—to promote home care as an alternative to hospital care when medically appropriate.

"We've been delighted to participate with Blue Cross in the growth of their home care utilization," said Winifred Livengood, executive director of the New Jersey Home Health Assembly. "We look forward to more growth this year as doctors and their patients become increasingly aware of available home care services."

The Home Care Direct Admissions program is one way New Jersey Blue Cross has been boosting increased use of home care. Under this pilot program, launched last year, Blue Cross subscribers living in the designated geographic service areas of 12 home health agencies can receive these services with their doctor's approval without the three-day hospital stay which would ordinarily be required. A

direct admission to home care can be a cost-effective alternative to inpatient hospital care. As a part of the pilot program, Blue Cross also covers rental of durable medical equipment when medically necessary, such as hospital beds or wheelchairs.

## Topic of talks: loss of hearing

Parents who have discovered their children are hearing-handicapped will be helped to understand the youngsters' needs and requirements in a series of talks this fall, it was announced by Dr. Pauline M. Jensen, executive director, N.J. Association for Children with Hearing Impairments.

Dr. Jensen said the series would include information on available educational and community resources. "Parents who have been thrust into a situation where 'the hidden handicap' is known to exist need to know that help is available, not the least of which is meeting other parents with the same problems," she said.

## Jobless benefits continue

The unemployment insurance extended benefits period now in effect in New Jersey, under which claimants receive additional coverage, will not come to a sudden halt as had been feared earlier, says the N.J. Department of Labor and Industry.

The extended benefits program provides a maximum of 13 additional weeks of unemployment benefits to individuals who have exhausted their rights to 26 weeks of benefits under the regular state program, where the maximum amount of benefits payable is 26 times the weekly benefit rate.

Under federal and state statutes, an extended benefits period must end "on the last day of the third week after the first week for which there is both a national 'off' indicator and a state 'off' indicator." The national indicator has been "off" for sometime.

Labor and Industry Commissioner John J. Horn, explained that jobless figures for the 13-week average used in the calculation, held firm at slightly above five percent insured unemployment. Therefore, extended benefits payments will continue. The department will continue to monitor the program closely.

With lawn sprinklers spouting all over the state, and burnt-out patches of grass appearing elsewhere, it may seem hard to believe that the month of July had 12 days of rain.

But that's what the data show, according to Raymond J. Daly of North Plainfield, head of Union College's cooperative weather station.

The station recorded measurable rainfall on 12 days, for a total of 3.59 inches, but that didn't set any records. The wettest July on record was in 1975, when 13.96 inches fell. The driest was recorded in 1966—81 inches.

The greatest amount of rain to fall in a 24-hour period was 1.74 inches on July 18.

Temperature-wise, the mercury ranged far and wide. The peak for the month, 94 degrees, occurred on Friday—the thirteenth. Low point for


