School board votes for teacher pay pact

The Mountainside Board of Education unanimously ratified a two year contract with the borough teachers' association Tuesday night, leaving only the teachers' approval needed to complete the settlement.

Although details of the contract could not be released before the teachers' action, Board of Education negotiating chairman Bart Barre said, the contract calls for approximately a 7 1/2 percent increase for each of the next two years.

"I'm optimistic they (the teachers) will ratify the contract," Barre said. "It's beneficial to both sides." Barre said the teachers might take action within the next week.

Dr. Art Williams, board president, thanked both sides in the negotiations and said, "There was a definite move toward early settlement."

In other business, the board heard an energy conservation report drawn up by John McDonough, board secretary, after he attended an all-day energy seminar at New Jersey Institute of Technology Nov. 28.

In the report McDonough suggests the schools review with the maintenance supervisor, head custodian and coordinator of night work a manual prepared by the state Department of Energy and NJIT titled New Jersey Conservation Manual of Operation and Maintenance. The report also suggests the development of a memorandum to all staff members outlining federal conservation guidelines and urging all staff members to cooperate with the regulations.

Some specific recommended measures include putting "reminder" decals on light switches in the schools and giving decals to students to take home; distributing posters throughout the schools; disseminating conservation messages periodically through the superintendent's bulletin or the community relations program and including in the regular instruction program information on energy conservation.

The board also approved a request by Deerfield students to attempt to publish a yearbook. Dr. Debora Clifford, English and composition teacher, will help the students, who will attempt to raise the money themselves through activities such as bake sales. The books

will be paperbound and will cost approximately \$3 to \$5 each.

Dr. Levin Hanigan, superintendent of schools, described the books as "nothing so pretentious as a high school yearbook." Williams cited the skills students could learn in the preparing of the books.

On another matter the board voted 4-1 to table two applications for minigrants until a meeting could be called between the board and the PTA possibly to amend the guidelines for awarding the

grants. The controversial application again involved Clifford, who has asked for money to put on another musical show this year. Board member Pat Knodel mentioned that the minigrants originally were to be used for innovative programs.

"It bothers me to see the money for the play come out of the minigrants, however, I have no objection to the play," she said.

The vote to table the request was 4-1, Barre dissenting.

Skiing, roller skating excursions planned

Skiing and roller skating are on the Mountainside Recreation Commission's Christmas week calendar. The roller skating trip is set for Wednesday, Dec. 26, and the ski trip, to Jack Frost Mountain in the Poconos, will be held the following day.

Registrations for both trips are being accepted weekdays at the Recreation Office from 9 to 11 a.m. and 2 to 4 p.m. Payment must accompany registration.

The registration fee for roller skating is \$3.50 per person, and includes bus transportation, admission and skate rental. The bus will leave Deerfield School at 1:15 p.m. and return at 5:30 p.m. People in the third grade and above may participate. Early registration is strongly recommended by the Commission.

The ski trip registration fee is \$15 per person and includes bus transportation and lift ticket. Rentals and lessons are available for an additional fee. A "first day on skis" package is available for \$26 per person, and includes bus, lift ticket, rentals, and two lessons. The bus will leave Deerfield School at 6:15 a.m. and return at about 6:30 p.m. The trip is open to all ages but people in the seventh grade or lower must be accompanied by an adult.

A holiday 'gift' idea—blood donors sought

Union County residents can donate a gift of life and health for the holiday season during a special blood drive tomorrow at Red Cross headquarters, 203 West Jersey St., Elizabeth, from 12:30 p.m. until 5 p.m.

The special blood drive is an attempt to bring up the level of local donations, which have been dropping during the past two years because of resident "apathy," according to the Red Cross.

No appointment is needed for tomorrow's blood drive and locations of other area blood banks outside of Union County are available from the Red Cross at 353-2500.

Blood donations are needed especially before the coming holiday season and most holiday weekends, when there are more emergency accidents and bloodmobile hours are cut, Overton said.

The amount of blood being given by Union County residents is becoming lower and lower, according to Peter W.

Overton, manager of the Union County chapter of the Red Cross. Two years ago, the Red Cross used to receive about 40 pints of blood per drive day; now it receives between six and 10 pints per day, he said.

"Alienation from one's neighbor is spreading," he said. "Severe public apathy continues to deteriorate the position of the Red Cross in collecting voluntary blood."

because of a "lack of concern for others," agreed Vera Maier, chairman of the local Red Cross blood program.

The Red Cross now must import about 35 percent of the blood used for medical purposes from Europe. About 5,500 pints of the 8,000 pints used annually in Union County donated by residents, Overton said. As a result, the Red Cross now requires that patients who receive blood must replace it, Overton said. That can be done by finding friend or relative to donate the blood, he said. Until now, the Red Cross has provided blood to anyone who needed it without that requirement, Maier said. She noted, however, that the Red Cross will continue to cover all individuals participating in the program, senior citizens and those unable to give blood, but in need of it. Another problem is receiving donations from unhealthy specimens. Overton cited an example of a New Year's Day in Lowell, Mass., when a number of people lined up to give blood, but most of it was unacceptable.

Group seeking more vests aid

The Honorary Mountainside PBA 126 inaugurated a "Bulletproof Vest Fund Drive" in October for the purpose of raising monies to equip each member of its police force with a bulletproof vest. A spokesman said, "the fund drive has been successful but is still short of its goal, and it is hoped that those who were of a mind to contribute and who have not yet done so will do so in December."

The Juniors came alive Saturday against South Orange to even their mark at 1-1. It was a strong team effort and an 18-0 first quarter set the stage for the victory.

Klinger led with 10 points; Nenner, Hernandez and Eric Kahn each had seven. Nenner also had three assists and three steals. Hernandez led with 11 rebounds. Petino scored five points. Cole had nine rebounds and three points.

A newcomer to the team is Mike Caracado, a 135-pound junior who will not wrestle in our meets until he is in condition.


Tri-captains on Kean team

The three local junior teams saw action last Sunday. Union County was defeated by its host, the Dalmatians, 7-4.



Kean's women cagers shoot to make nationals

The Kean College women's basketball team has two goals for the coming season: win 20 games and make it to the nationals.

The women finished 19-7 a year ago, the best record in the school's history, but Coach Pat Hannisch is hoping to improve on that with a veteran team.

"I know 19-7 is a tough act to follow, but potentially we're stronger than last year," Hannisch said. "We have experience and depth. We're not just shooting to make the regionals this year, we want to go to our first national tournament."

Gone from last year is Jenifer Savio, the all-time leading scorer and rebounder at Kean. The 6-2 center is now playing with the New Jersey Gems of the World Basketball League.

Savio will be missed, but the presence of freshman Terri Braithwaite, a 6-1 All-State player from New Brunswick, will ease the pain.

"Terri was the second best center in the state last year behind Ann Donovan and we're happy to have her," Hannisch said. "Terri's potential is enormous. She can be as good as she wants to be, but it will take work."

The leading veteran is Elaine Carroll, a 5-8 senior from Bayonne. She averaged 14.6 points and 11.2 rebounds last year and can play either guard or forward.

"Where she plays will depend on who we're playing," Hannisch said. "There's nothing she can't do and I expect her to break every offensive record. She's easily one of the top five players in the conference."

Kean will have good size up front with

5-10 center Cindy Patrick of New Brunswick and 5-11 forward Jane Koza of Rahway. Patrick, a sophomore, came on strong at the end of a last year, while Koza averaged 8.3 points and 6.0 rebounds.

Karole Wallace, one of the most improved players, plus Jan Berry of North Haledon and Robyn Venner of Jersey City, the leading scorer on last year's JVs, give the team solid depth up front.

Janice Rush of Cranford, averaged 11.5 last year, and is an excellent outside shooter. She figures to handle one of the guard spots while Debbie Hanna of East Brunswick, Kathy Shea of Mays Landing and Angle Lombardi of Harrison battle for the other spot. All will see a lot of action, no matter who starts.

Although Kean has dropped to Division II on the national level, it will still be Division I on the state level. More than half its schedule is against Division I schools that give scholarships.

"Division II also gives some scholarships, but I'm sure we can compete with anyone on our schedule, including Division I teams," Hannisch said. "We have good size, so I'm looking to run more. We'll get the ball up the floor in a hurry."

Kean will host its annual Christmas Tournament (Dec. 27-28), with the home team facing Sacred Heart, and Seton Hall meeting Providence in the first round.

In the last four years under Hannisch, Kean has posted a 63-24 record for a winning percentage of .724.

Threats of future gasoline shortages have prompted Gov. Brendan Byrne to reinstate mandatory minimum purchase requirements at the gas pumps. Although this type of regulation, designed to ease lines and panic buying, was greeted with angry indignation last June, most people I talk to now reflect a determination to cut back, conserve and show oil tyrants in Iran that we're through being pushed around.

In other energy-related action, New Jersey voters last month approved a \$475 million transportation bond issue. Since much of this money will fund mass transportation improvements, its implementation will be another tool in averting serious energy crises in this state. The State Senate will begin work on the details soon.

An energy question that many thought had been answered in the '70s—the use of nuclear power—is now being reconsidered in light of events at Three Mile Island and other generating sites. A bill I sponsored to limit construction of nuclear facilities until problems with waste disposal are worked out has passed the Assembly and is now in a Senate committee. You can be certain this issue will continue to be the subject of heated debate in the '80s.

So we leave the turbulent '70s with a grave concern with what the future will bring, but with a confidence that a renewed sense of national purpose will unite us to meet new challenges. By working together at every level of government, we will find solutions to our energy, inflation and other problems.

I wish you all a happy holiday season, and peace for the new year.

Franks asking for 'equal time' on Iranian TV

Assemblyman-elect Bob Franks of Berkeley Heights this week called for an American spokesman to have "equal time" on Iranian television to tell the truth about this country.

"I am incensed by the vitriolic lies about our country being spoonfed to the Iranian people by their leadership and by the venom being spread by Khomeini supporters using free TV time in this country," Franks said. "Although I'm certain the present leadership in Iran hasn't the courage to allow its people to hear the truth, five minutes of facts regarding American principles and American freedoms might plant some seeds of doubt."

Franks said an "editorial reply" by a spokesman of the Socialist Labor Party to a WCBS-TV editorial supporting President Carter's handling of the crisis was "sickening." He said the spokesman accused this country of racism and that American was seeking an excuse for war in the Middle East.

"The spokesman took full advantage of free TV exposure to vilify this country," Franks said. "The Iranian leadership's appeal for 'justice' would have some meaning if it would allow the same 'editorial reply' opportunity on their state-owned television."

Franks said "any real American," and preferably a "man on the street," could effectively display the enormous unity of our country on the Iranian crisis issue.

"What disturbs me most is that pro-Iranian spokesmen in this country are taking full advantage of our freedoms to advocate the denial of those same freedoms in Iran," Franks said.

"The Ayatollah and most of his student followers are simply naive about the American people's response to this issue," Franks said. "They say they hate the American government but love the American people. What they don't realize is that the two are inseparable. The government is the people."



IN CONGRESS

Individuals and families throughout Union County are deeply troubled over the state of the economy. Even with rising incomes, many find their purchasing power dwindling as inflation reduces the value of the dollar. For senior citizens and others on limited or fixed incomes, the soaring cost of living imposes a severe hardship.

Every analysis of inflation shows that it is closely related to energy costs. This is ominous for New Jersey and other northeastern states, which must spend

heavily on energy for winter heating. Increased energy prices account for almost a third of our 13 percent inflation rate. Although our total oil imports have been reduced from last year's level, unrelenting OPEC price increases have resulted in a mounting outflow of U.S. petrodollars.

Heavy dependence on foreign oil now costs America \$60 billion a year. It is the major cause of a U.S. trade deficit that weakens the dollar overseas and aggravates inflation at home.

U.S. exports have experienced a healthy increase of about 14 percent this year. Yet last month the United States suffered its 41st consecutive trade deficit, due primarily to increase in the price of imported oil.

We are witnessing an unparalleled transfer of wealth from the consumers of energy to the producers of oil, and the situation poses grave implications for the balance of economic and strategic power in the world.

There is no way that the U.S. economy can maintain its strength if we continue to send a substantial amount of our national wealth to other countries through the purchase of oil. America must reduce dependence on foreign oil by conservation and by increasing domestic production and pushing ahead with the development of alternate energy sources.

Meanwhile, Congress needs to concentrate on a wide range of

additional inflation-fighting measures. Excessive and wasteful government spending must be eliminated. Incentives must be provided to expand industry, create new job opportunities, and improve productivity.

Surveys show that the federal government benefits from inflation by receiving a larger share of the gross national product.

Tax revenues in relation to the gross national product will rise from 20.5 percent in this fiscal year to 21.3 percent next year and to 22 percent in 1982. The anticipated 1982 ratio will be a record surpassing the peak set in World War 2.

With a cost-of-living wage increase of 10 percent a year during the next three years, the government would reap a windfall profit of \$13 billion in 1980, \$26 billion in 1981 and \$40 billion in 1982. This additional tax revenue, stemming directly from inflation, would be at the

expense of individual taxpayers.

A massive transfer of purchasing power from consumers to government is occurring at a time when taxpayers are falling further behind in the race against soaring living costs.

Tax cuts enacted during recent years have not kept pace with inflation. The struggle to keep up with soaring costs has pushed people into higher income tax brackets. Many middle income taxpayers now face tax rates of 40 percent to 50 percent.

I have sponsored legislation that would provide a \$36 billion tax cut, reducing personal income taxes by 10 percent and canceling scheduled increases in Social Security taxes. It would help to restore a sense of balance to the tax system and ease the strain of inflation on many Americans.

In addition, I have sponsored legislation to exempt up to \$1,000 of interest on savings accounts from

November warmth missed record high

The Union County area enjoyed the warmest November in four years, according to the Cooperative Weather Station on Union College's Cranford campus.

In the 20-year history of the weather station, the only warmer November came in 1975. The average temperature that month was 50.7 degrees. The average for this November was 48.5 degrees, 3.23 degrees higher than normal for November.

A high of 74 degrees reached Nov. 25 marks the latest date in the month it has ever been that warm. The previous late-in-the-month high

was recorded Nov. 15, 1973, when the thermometer hit 76 degrees.

The lowest November temperature this year was 23 degrees Nov. 30. November of 1976 had the record of 14 degrees.

This year has had the second highest precipitation record through November in weather station history. The 55.87 inches of rain that have fallen since Jan. 1 are second only to the 60.73 inches recorded through November 1975.

There were 15 days with measurable rainfall last month, for a total of 3.66 inches.

The average relative humidity per day was 49.7 percent, with a maximum of 76 percent recorded Nov. 10 and Nov. 26 and a minimum of 28 percent Nov. 16.

There were 500 degree days in November, with an average per day of 16.6. Total degree days from Sept. 1 are 941, compared to 1,057.5 at this time last year.







Statewide contest

The seventh annual New Jersey Contractor of the Year competition is being sponsored by the National Remodelers Association of New Jersey.

In the competition, remodeling contractors vie against each other for top state honors in six categories.

New Jersey is the only state in the country to have a statewide competition, according to John Pabst, a home improvement contractor from Roselle who was last year's winner in the commercial remodeling category.

Facts available on organ giving

Modern science has made life possible where there was little hope before. Operations like kidney transplants and cornea transplants enable some very ill people to lead new lives.

If you've ever thought about donating your body or a part of your body to someone who needs a transplant after your death you'll want to know the facts first. A free booklet from the National Institutes of Health explains what you must do and includes donor cards you can fill out. For your free copy of How to Donate the Body or Its Organs, just send a postcard to the Consumer Information Center, Dept. 5800, Pueblo, Colo. 81009.

According to the National Institutes of Health, in most states the Uniform Anatomical Gift Act governs how you can become a donor. Usually, after discussing your wishes with your family, you fill out, sign and carry with you a Uniform Donor Card. You can find out from your state department of motor vehicles if there is a place on your driver's

license to designate that you are an organ donor.

But just filling out a card does not mean that automatically you will become a donor. Medical personnel are hesitant to proceed unless your next of kin agrees as well. So it makes sense to let your close relatives know about your decision perhaps even in writing.

You may want to find a specialist or hospital that will accept your donation. You can start by asking your own

doctor for a referral, or by calling the surgery department at the nearest medical school or hospital. For donating the entire body, contact the anatomy department at a medical or dental school.

Remember, you don't need to have perfect eyes or perfect health to be a donor. And for helping scientists discover new ways to save lives in the future, an elderly person is as valuable a donor as a younger person.

Now, how can you get a Uniform Donor Card? Two cards are included in the free booklet from the Consumer Information Center. When you order a copy of How to Donate the Body or Its Organs you'll also

How interest is figured

 Q. If I save "so much" money each month, how much money will I have in five, 10 or 20 years?
 A. This particular question is probably on the minds of many of my readers. The answer depends on the type of savings account you have, the amount of interest paid and how the institution compounds your money.
 The fastest way for your money to grow is if your funds are compounded on a daily basis. This means that the

 For example, if you deposited \$10 each month in a savings account at 5.25 percent interest, in 10 years you would have approximately \$1,600. If you could manage to put away \$100 per month, in 10 years you would have almost \$16,000.
 Naturally, the larger amount of money you can afford to save, the more interest you will have which can be compounded along with your original investment. If you will check at the

savings institution, they can probably provide you with a chart which will show you exactly how your money will compound.
 Q. Inflation and food prices are almost as bad as gasoline prices. Isn't there an easy way to cope with this problem?
 A. One of the best ways to cope with our rising food prices is to shop carefully. You can probably trim your present grocery bills by almost 20 percent if you shop for bargains, buy no-frills-type items, use coupons and try to utilize the unbranded products whenever possible.
 In order to ease the pain, you might be interested to know that we in the United States are spending a smaller proportion of our after tax dollars on groceries than was spent in 1940. According to a survey done by the Family Banker, a publication of Continental Bank, Americans eat better than most other people.
 In Japan, for example, beef costs

about \$12 per pound and the Japanese eat beef about twice a year. In Argentina, it takes 63 minutes of work to buy a pound of sirloin beefsteak, in France 40 minutes and Australia 26 minutes. Americans work only 19 minutes, and we work fewer hours to buy our food than the people of any other major industrialized country.
 The Family Banker does give some interesting information as to how to shop carefully. As consumers, our economy responds quickly to whatever choices we make. Inspired by competitive pressures, chicken, pork and turkey producers have rushed to fill the gap left by the high cost of beef. Some of your meat meals could be replaced with dishes that include such less expensive sources of protein as eggs, milk, cheese or beans.
 One of the last comments was to review your overall shopping habits. They can be modified effectively and painlessly to save money.
 Try an experiment in shopping with a friend. One person selects the least expensive choices on the shopping list while the other chooses the most expensive. Get the basket containing the least expensive items

will total about one-half the other basket.
 It's helpful to evaluate your own shopping habits with the idea of changing those that may be adding to your grocery bill unnecessarily.



Bell search spurred by high cost of gold

Gold means many things to different people but all agree on one thing... it's expensive. And whether people are wearing it, hoarding it or spending it, the cost of gold is a problem.

So what does a company do when it uses several million dollars' worth of gold every year in the manufacture of intricate electronic equipment? Obviously, it seeks ways of cutting the use of gold without diminishing efficiency.

Western Electric and Bell Labs engineers have been saving millions of dollars by substituting less expensive metals for gold. Every year Western Electric's Hawthorne (Chicago) Works produces a million gold-bearing

ceramic circuit boards for use in electronic switching systems. Gold is required in the circuit boards because of its outstanding conductive and bonding abilities. However, engineers have found a way to produce the circuit boards using much less of the precious metal.

The new process, called TPCNA (titanium, palladium, copper, nickel and gold), replaces TPA (titanium, palladium and gold). The TPA method used 13 grams of gold per circuit. TPCNA uses only 3 grams of gold. That's a savings of one gram of gold per circuit of \$17.86 assuming gold is selling at \$400 an ounce. The decision to look for ways of saving gold was made when it was selling at \$160 an ounce.

In TPCNA a thin ceramic nonconducting base is placed in a machine that sputters (deposits) thin layers of titanium, palladium and copper on it.

The titanium acts like a glue for the other layers, the palladium makes the surface inactive and provides protection from contamination and the copper is used to provide a foundation for a second layer of copper that will be plated in the next operation.

The ceramic circuit board, coated with the three layers, is then placed in another machine, a sequential plater, where additional layers of copper (used

for conductivity), nickel and gold are added. The nickel provides a diffusion barrier between the copper and the final layer of gold.

"Copper is a good substitute for gold," said Bob Gilhe, a Western Electric engineer who was responsible

for instituting the sputtering process for TPCNA. "But there is still a need for a heat bondable surface and that surface has to be chemically resistant. The only metal we can use for that is gold."

"So we save gold by using copper."

But to make sure there is no diffusion between the copper and the gold we must add a layer of nickel." Tom Robillard, Warren Pendergast and Debiec of the Bell Labs Technology Transfer Department noted that it was a long process to find the right combination of metals.

"We tried to eliminate the palladium at one point but we found we had to put it back because, without it, the titanium film was subject to chemical attack," said Debiec. "Even though it would have been easier to manufacture the circuit board without the palladium, it was necessary to include it."
