One of the biggest criticisms among lay citizens against those who work in the public sector is that if you're a government employee, you receive more perks than any employee in the private sector.

Annual raises — sometimes as high as 10 percent — are given despite poor economic conditions that in all probability would force the private business owner in the same economic climate to withhold raises. Benefits packages are some of the best in the nation in the public sector and days off are expected on any holiday.

Where does the money come from for these kinds of financial packages? Taxpayers' pockets, of course. It's been government's belief that taxpayers have an overflowing river of funds to keep Town Hall thriving. But what few elected leaders consider is that the taxpayers' reservoirs are dry and they simply cannot afford to be Town Hall's Welfare Department.

While the "merit-based" raises are doled out through the same elected officials will complain about shortfalls in state aid to make ends meet. They'll complain and complain instead of truly governing with the taxpayers' best interests in mind. That is, having the courage to tell their employees that government this year or next year for the next three years cannot afford to give the kinds of raises they've been accustomed to getting. But that would take real leadership, and if the number of voters who want to the polls last week is any indication, Joe Voter does not have that much faith in his elected leaders anymore.

Another perk is "the convention" for public sector employees. Municipalities and school districts are notorious for sending elected officials and employees to conventions, sometimes as far away as California, all at taxpayer expense.

Last week, school district employees were in Atlantic City, putting a halt for a couple days to education. This week, municipal employees are in Atlantic City for the annual League of Municipalities convention. There will be little hope of finding too many officials in town this week.

Sure, the convention offers workshops and seminars about many facets of government, but how many officials sign up, attend and learn very little because they're too preoccupied with the politicking and one name stacking that occurs during the three days?

Why can't government leaders find innovative solutions closer to home to learn more about government if they're really interested in developing their skills — and saving taxpayers money?

Take, for example, the Union County Economic Development Corporation, which for the past two years has offered a seminar for new zoning and planning board members. The board members face a less expensive and more targeted seminar to be paid at taxpayer expense.

UCUA hopes to boost demanufacturing

Surely, there must be a use for that old typewriter that's been sitting up in the attic for years. And, what about that old black-and-white television that hasn't seen the light of day in years?

The Union County Utilities Authority has an answer: Demanufacturing.

Demanufacturing is the process of collecting and disassembling products, such as electronic equipment and household appliances, into component parts which are then sold and reused in new or recycled products.

As part of its ongoing effort to promote demanufacturing, the Union County Utilities Authority held a Union County Conference on Demanufacturing last month at the Elizabethtown Gas Company's main office in Union.

The conference was designed to educate local companies and elected officials about what demanufacturing is and the economic and environmental benefits that may be realized from it.

The UCUA's initiative will focus on appliances, computers and other electronic products, such as televi-

sions and refrigerators. Many of these items contain heavy metals such as mercury, lead and cadmium which can potentially cause environmental harm when improperly disposed.

"While these elements do not pose a problem during an appliance's normal life span, disposal of these products can present special challenges," said UCUA Chairwoman Blanche Banasiak during the recent conference. She noted that until recently no

environmentally or economically sound disposal methods existed, but now with demanufacturing the UCUA "wants to foster a demanufacturing presence in Union County that will collect these items from across the region and disassemble them into components that can be reused in new products or recycled."

On Aug. 10, the UCUA issued an Expression of Interest in the demanufacturing industry. The EOI

outlines the various incentives offered to attract demanufacturers to Union County, a profile of the county and requirements that interested parties will need to satisfy to establish operations here. The UCUA is presently conducting interviews with the respondents and will then work with interested companies to set up operations in the county.

Last month's conference was co-chaired by Freeholder Henry Kurz and U.S. Rep. Bob Franks, R-Union, gave the keynote address. Other participants included UCUA Executive Director Jeffrey Callahan; Joe Puzio, senior project manager for HDR Engineering, and Mauro Checchio, director of the Office of Policy and Planning and President of the Union County Alliance.

During his speech, Franks announced that the Congressional Manufacturing Task Force, which he co-chairs, will convene a special session on demanufacturing in the first week of December.

"We are going to be sponsoring the first-ever congressional forum on demanufacturing, and I would like the Union County Utilities Authority not only to offer testimony in their own right, but also help us identify the

kinds of speakers on a nationwide basis who could help us shine the spotlight on this vitally important subject," said Franks.

Banasiak commended Franks for his efforts, saying the county stands to receive a "wealth of benefits from this new industry. Congressman Franks' support for our initiative is exciting and will continue and accelerate the progress we have already made."

Franks noted that demanufacturing may be a way to provide a "magnet" for manufacturing firms to locate in Union County. "The closer this demanufacturing facility can be to manufacturers that can utilize these parts will be extremely important to the longstanding success of this project. We should begin earnestly looking at how Congress can help pave the way for localities that want to move ahead with demanufacturing."

Many countries around the world already are developing demanufacturing programs. In Germany, computer manufacturers already are required by law to take back old machines owners don't want. Plastics are recycled to create new telephone handsets and metals such as aluminum and copper are returned to the production cycle.

Holocaust expert to speak at Kean

Lawrence L. Langer, a leading authority on the Holocaust, will speak at Kean College of New Jersey on Dec. 4.

The program will take place in the college's Wilkins Theatre at 7:50 p.m. Funding and arrangements for this lecture are made possible by Kean College's Holocaust Resource Center, in cooperation with the office of the vice president for Academic Affairs.

Langer is currently an alumnae chair professor, emeritus for Simmons College in Boston, Mass. He has served as a professor of English at Simmons College where he was the holder of the alumnae endowed chair. At Yale University, he served as a lec-

turer in English and guest fellow of Morse College.

A prolific scholar, Langer is author of seven books, and numerous articles and book chapters. His book, *Holocaust Testimonies: The Ruins of Memory*, captured the 1991 National Book Critics Circle Award for Criticism. The author also received the 1991 Eugene M. Kayden Press Prize for the most distinguished book in the humanities published by an American University Press. It also was chosen as one of the year's "ten best books" by the editors of *The New York Times* Sunday Book Review.

Langer is the recipient of a National Endowment for the Humanities Senior Fellowship for College Teach-

ers and Independent Scholars and was a Fulbright professor of American literature at the University of Graz in Graz, Austria. He was named outstanding teacher of the year at Simmons College several years ago.

A magna cum laude graduate of City College of New York where he received his bachelor of arts degree, Langer also holds a master's degree and doctorate from Harvard University.

The program is part of the college's Contemporary Issues Lecture Series. There is no entrance fee and seating is on a first-come, first-serve basis.

Sheriff to feed needy for holidays

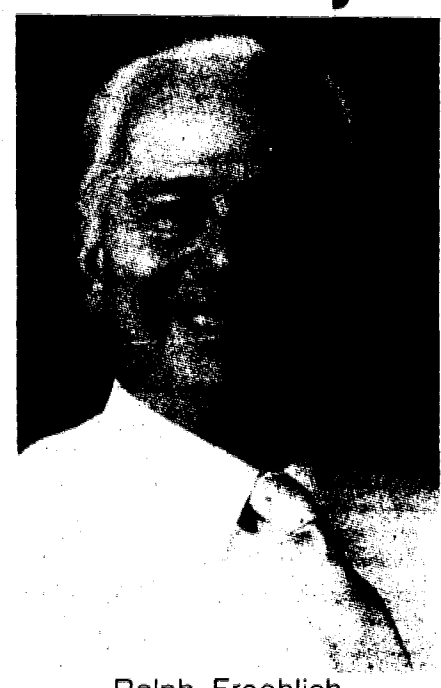
The Union County Sheriff's Office will once again sponsor "Operation Breadbasket," a program that helps feed the needy during the Yuletide season.

Groups join to end hunger during week of awareness

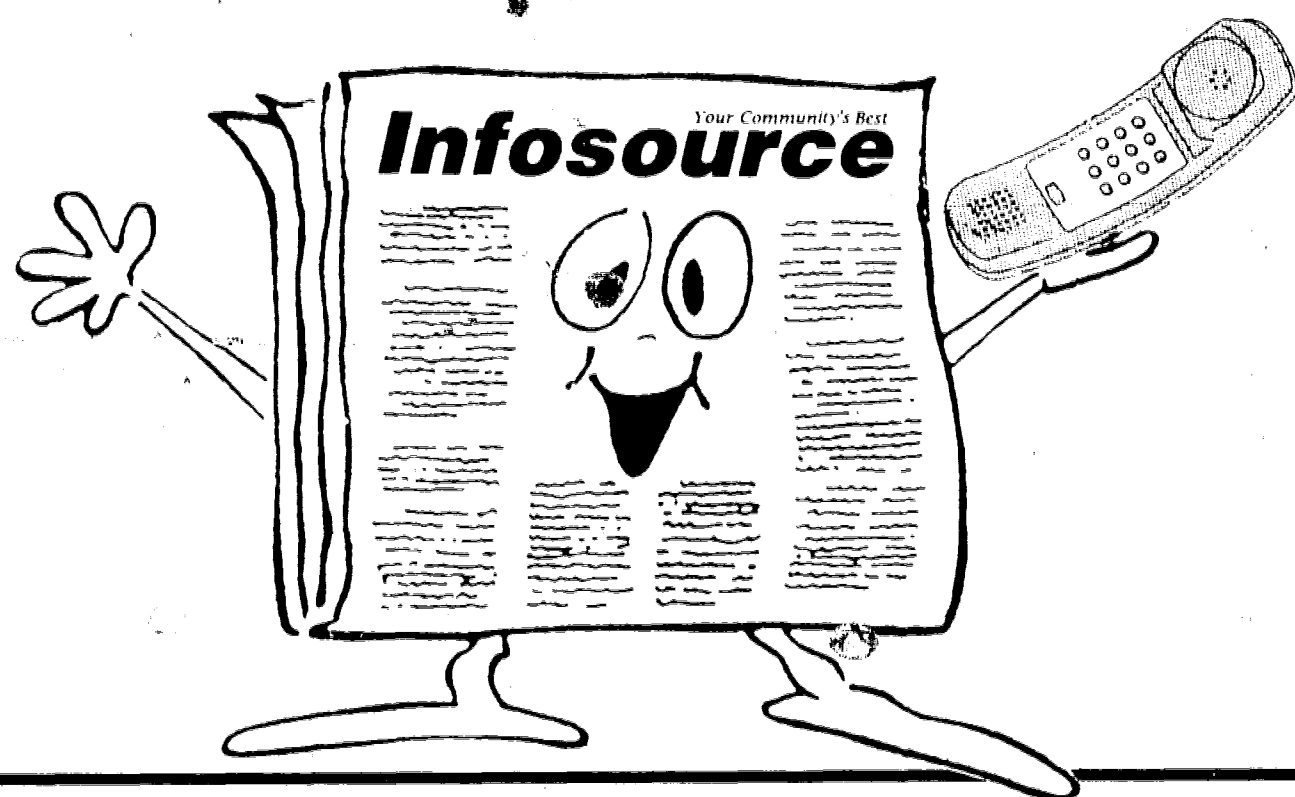

Partnerships key subject of county health forum

The building of health care partnerships in support of a "healthy" Union County will be the focus of a Healthcare Roundtable titled "Defining Healthcare For Union County's Future."

Sponsored by the Union County Alliance, the roundtable will be held on Monday from 5 to 7:30 p.m. in the George F. Billington Education Center of Elizabeth General Medical Center-West, 925 East Jersey St., Elizabeth.

"As we approach the 21st century, we must address a critical challenge: creating a high quality, cost effective and accessible health-care system," stated David A. Fletcher, president of Elizabeth General Medical Center and an organizer of the roundtable. He added that more than 600 representatives of the county's healthcare, business and insurance organizations have been invited to join the discussion.

Attendees of the roundtable will address key health-related questions dealing with patient access, business and industry requirements, promotion of healthier living and the requirements of providers.

"The bottom line of this roundtable is: How do we create a healthier Union County?" Fletcher said. "To answer that question we need to come face-to-face with a number of inter-related issues, such as

assuring access to health services for the uninsured, developing and implementing community health plans, and encouraging good health behaviors among the county's residents," he added.

According to Union County Manager Ann Baran, this roundtable is one of several being held by the Union County Alliance to address a variety of major issues. "Holding roundtables such as this one on health care issues is an important first step in finding out what everyone wants Union County to really look like as we approach the year 2000," she said.

Menendez applauds Turks decision to free local

Rep. Robert Menendez, R-13, praised the decision by a Turkish state security court to drop charges against Aliza Marcus, a reporter for Reuters, accused of "provoking racial hatred" through her reporting on the Turkish military campaign against the Kurds in southeastern Turkey.

In September, Marcus, a native of Westfield, was informed that charges would be brought against her for an article she had published 11 months earlier. Her case reflects a trend in Turkey of criminalizing spoken and written expression.

"The charges against Marcus were baseless and an affront to the principles of democracy," said Menendez, a member of the House International Relations Committee. "I am proud to have worked with other congressional leaders to seek their dismissal.

"I hope that the attention her case drew, both from recognized human rights organizations and members of Congress, will send a message to Turkey that intimidation and censorship cannot be tolerated. Ms. Marcus and Reuters deserve a great deal of credit for standing up for their principles and convictions. Freedom of the press is a principle sacred to any democracy."

"While I am encouraged by the acquittal of Ms. Marcus, censorship and

human rights remain a serious concern in Turkey. On Wednesday, eight leaders of Turkey's leading human rights organization, the Turkish Human Rights Foundation, were taken to court over an article prosecutors claimed insulted Turkish laws," Menendez said. "Turkey is presumptuous in believing that we will be appeased by the acquittal of one journalist."

The European Parliament has sent a similar message to Turkey, threatening to veto Turkish customs union unless progress is made on human rights concern.

Turkey has responded by relaxing Article 8, Turkey's anti-terrorism law and releasing a number of prisoners convicted under that law, which is commonly used to imprison journalists and intellectuals. However, observers have called the changes only cosmetic, reducing the prison term for conviction, but not making substantive changes to the law.

"There are an estimated 100 journalists, authors and intellectuals imprisoned in Turkish jails. Turkey cannot be accepted as a member of the family of democratic nations unless it commits itself to democratic ideals," Menendez said.

Art is the lifeblood of Springfield resident Doris Krueger. Whether she's painting, sculpting, making "artistic" jewelry, designing stationery in her studio, or lecturing at museums, libraries, art galleries or women's clubs, creativity is foremost in her mind.

"As understudy, I'm rehearsing Deena," she said with enthusiasm. "I know it means learning another role. But actually, it's not hard for me because I did this show before."

Lang performed in a regional production of "Dreamgirls."

"I know the music already, and I appeared in the show in a regional company in Long Beach, Calif., about three years ago. I was in the ensemble. This is what you call movin' up," Lang laughed.

"I love the show," she exclaimed. "Everybody is great to work with. 'Dreamgirls' is a great piece of work. I just fell in love with it."

Lang has appeared in national tours of "Tommy," "Cats," "Bubblin' Brown Sugar," "Satchmo" and "Harlem Suite, and in the regional production of "Ain't Misbehavin.'" She also portrayed one of the original flygirls in the television comedy "In Living Color."

"I auditioned in New York City for the role of Michelle in the Paper Mill's 'Dreamgirls,'" she recalled. "And I went to about three rehearsal calls and then found out I had the part maybe a month later. I live in East Orange and I live in Los Angeles, too. You know, kind of bi-coastal. My parents, Juanita and Wallace Lang, and my family live in East Orange. But I grew up in Plainfield."

Singing came easy for Lang, and she does a lot of it in the this musical. "I never took a singing lesson in my life," she admitted, "but actually, I started dancing when I was about eight years old. I started taking dance lessons back then. I used to watch all the old Fred Astaire and Gene Kelly movies, and that got me started."

"Right out of high school I went to the Alvin Ailey School in New York City and took musical theater courses," she said. "I wanted to work right away, and my first job was a European tour of 'Bubblin' Brown Sugar.' And I've been working ever since. In between, I was in some shows. Right after high school, I did a show called 'Harlem Suite' with Maurice Hines, Jerome Hines' brother. The show toured and we went to Los Angeles and it closed there. I decided to stay there, and I got an agent out there and a month later, I auditioned for a show, a pilot, for 'In Living Color,' for television. And a year later, the show got picked up, and the rest is history. The show ran for five years," she said proudly. "I was one of the original flygirls."

"You know," Lang admitted, "television is harder than people think. You rehearse eight hours a day and tape the show on a Friday. But it was fun for me."

Lang also appeared in her Broadway debut in The Who's "Tommy." "That was in February of this year, but it closed in June. I love it here at the Paper Mill," she added. "Everybody's so nice, and each performer treats the other as a person. It's a good place to be working in," Lang said. "And it's good to be working at home. My friends and family come to see what I do in person. It's like I can give back to my community where I come from."

The energetic musical show with so much singing and dancing can drain any human being, especially with eight performances a week — three matinees and five evenings.

"Oh, I get tired," declared Lang. "But I'm tired and I'm wired, and I stay up a couple of hours after I come home to East Orange, dancing and singing in my head."

The young woman said that after "Dreamgirls," her "plan is to go to Los Angeles and pursue a television and film career."

"I'd love to make movies," she grinned. "It's my next goal in life." "Dreamgirls" runs through Dec. 10 at the Paper Mill Playhouse in Millburn.

Chenille's, a seafood and steakhouse conveniently located at 1114 Liberty Ave. in Hillside, is carrying on a tradition of fine dining. The elegantly styled restaurant replaces the Hillside Seafood House which occupied the location for more than 25 years, according to owner Paula Walden. With its soft lighting and pastel ambiance, the decor of Chenille's is reminiscent of the innards of a cruise liner. Perhaps the oceanic atmosphere can explain the absolute freshness of the seafood. Of the appetizers — which are reasonably priced between \$4 and \$7 — the shrimp cocktail is not to be missed. The succulent shrimp, served with a tangy cocktail sauce, sails across the palate in a parade of fresh flavor. The buffalo wings are also a find. Delicately fried, this chicken appetizer provides a mild entry into a world usually reserved for patrons with the strongest taste buds. Chenille's, which is slowly making a move toward a more Cajun-style of cooking, also offers appetizers like jambalaya, consisting of chicken, sausage and shrimp. Patrons have a wealth of seafood entrees from which to choose, including the beautifully prepared shrimp scampi. The meal, which can be served over linguini or rice, offers a generous portion of juicy shrimp in a subtle, butter-garlic sauce. Other seafood entrees include Chenille's gourmet catfish in a cream champagne sauce, teriyaki salmon, blackened snapper, barbecued seafood kabobs with wild rice and Cajun scallops with a chili pepper mayonnaise. 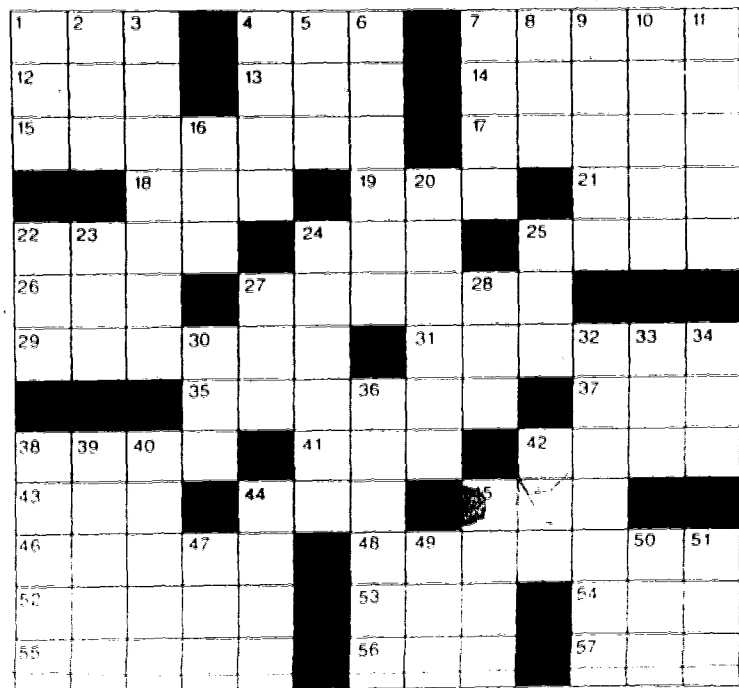

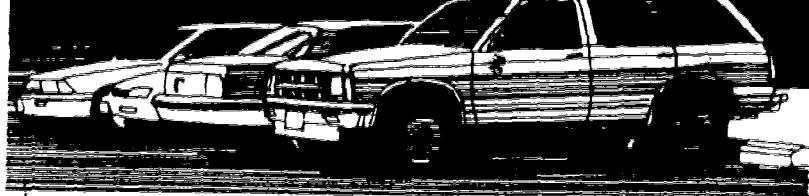
'Music Man' to be presented

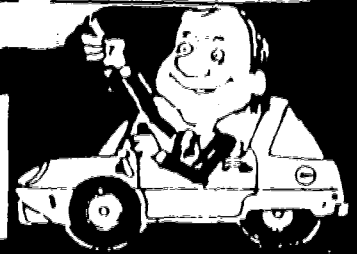

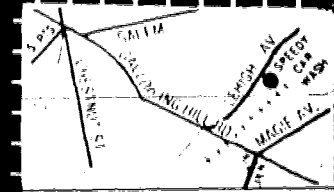

UMDNJ researchers developing method of destroying bacteria

A method of destroying the bacteria that threatens the lives of thousands of surgical-implant recipients is being developed by researchers at the University of Medicine and Dentistry of New Jersey.

The method involves using the implant itself as the vehicle for a substance that will stimulate cells of the immune system to fight the bacteria. Researchers hope they can reduce the 50 percent mortality rate of patients who develop infections following surgery to replace limbs, heart valves and other body parts. The bacterial infections associated with implants are often resistant to antibiotics.

Researchers at the UMDNJ-Robert Wood Johnson Medical School in New Brunswick have identified cell receptors, or molecules that sit on the cell surface, that, when combined with certain proteins, may activate immune cells to fight bacteria. Their goal is first to identify a protein or proteins that trigger the immune response and then bind the proteins to the implant surface before surgery.

"We believe that proteins that stimulate white blood cells, called neutrophils, can be attached to implant surfaces," said Ralph S. Greco, professor and chief of the Division of General Surgery at the medical school, who heads the study. "Then, if bacteria develop on the implant surface, they will be rapidly destroyed by the activated white blood cells."

Greco and his associate, Beatrice Haimovich, assistant professor of surgery, are focusing on the interaction of neutrophils and bacteria on the surface of vascular grafts, which are blood vessel implants.

"If our work continues to show promise, we will begin testing our protein coatings on a variety of prosthetic implants," Greco said. "We are hopeful that this investigation will lead to an effective means to combat the deadly infection that plague implant patients worldwide who face death and loss of limbs due to bacterial infection following surgery."

Springfield MD urges caution regarding diabetic blindness

People with diabetes need to give special attention to their eyes and vision because diabetes can cause blindness, according to a Springfield-based physician.

"Nearly half of all people with diabetes will develop some degree of diabetic eye disease," Frank Bucciero said. The most common is diabetic retinopathy, caused by changes in the blood vessels in the retina, the nerve-rich lining at the back of the eye that is essential for seeing. But diabetes can also contribute to glaucoma and cataracts.

Each year approximately 25,000 people lose their sight to diabetic eye disease, making diabetes a leading cause of new cases of blindness in adults 25-74 years old, according to

the American Diabetes Association, National Eye Institute and American Optometric Association. The three have joined with other organizations to alert people to diabetic eye disease this November, which is National Diabetes Month.

"Diabetes-related eye diseases often have no symptoms but early signs can be detected during a dilated eye exam," Bucciero said. "People with diabetes should see an optometrist or ophthalmologist at least once a year for a dilated eye exam. Early diagnosis and treatment can help in preventing blindness."

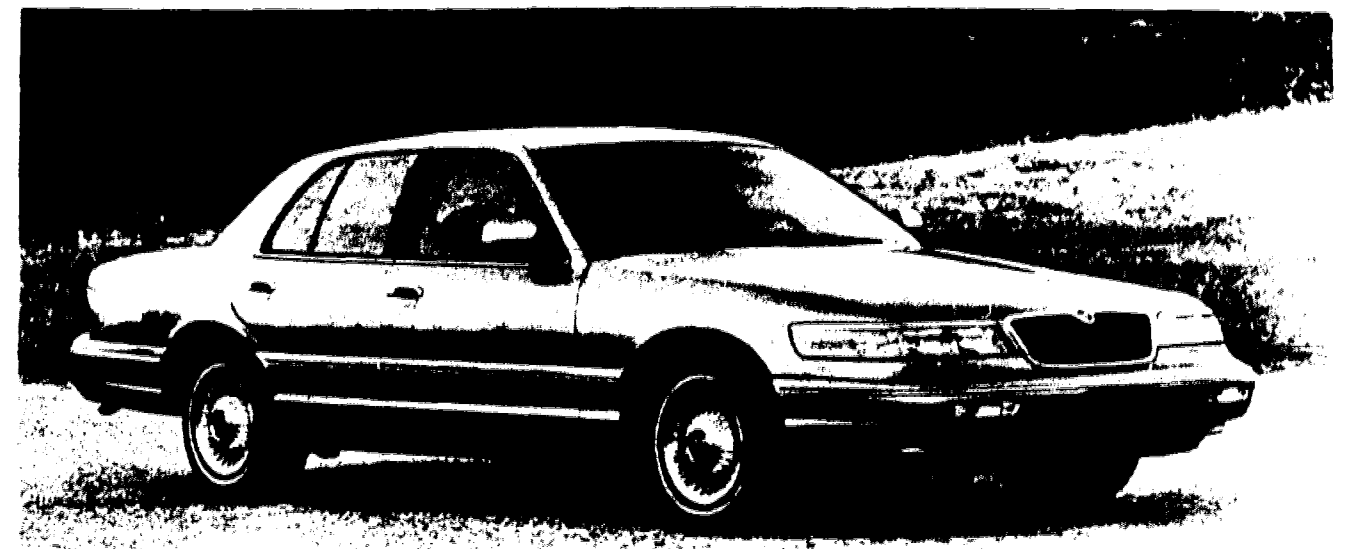
