## Freeholders request study of police merger

The Board of Chosen Freeholders has begun investigating the consolidation of the Sheriff's Department and the Union County Police Department.

Sheriff Ralph Froehlich was recently asked by the freeholders to begin a "feasibility study," according to Froehlich, of consolidating the two agencies, both of them arms of the county government.

"We're looking at a number of things throughout the county, just cost savings," said Freeholder Vice Chairman Dan Sullivan.

Sullivan stressed that consolidation of the two police departments is only being considered at this point and will not be taking place in the near future, at least.

"A lot of people think this is imminent, that this is going to happen in a month," said Sullivan. "That's not true."

They just want a report, that's all they want," said Froehlich. "They just want information."

"This is not the sheriff's idea," he added. "This is part of a Law Enforcement Study Commission formed in 1991."

The consolidation is a subject that has been discussed for at least since then, when a state study was done by then-Attorney General Bill Tuffo as per a directive of then-Gov. Jim Florio.

According to Froehlich, this study was done to develop "core functions" to eliminate overlap and duplication of services and to save money.

This study did not consider the Union County Police Department but did look into the State Police, municipal police departments and county sheriffs.

The study does affect the Union County Police because one of its recommendations was to give a number of county duties to the Sheriff's Department. According to Froehlich, these include the security of the courts, parks and county buildings in Union County, part of the current duties of the Union County Police.

**Froehlich said if the two departments are consolidated, there would be no layoffs or demotions. The Sheriff's Department would absorb the County Police's 65 officers and 22 civilians.**

This, according to Froehlich, applies to any county with both a sheriff's department and a county police department. He added that the two receive their money from the same source and the sheriff's department is larger.

The officers from both departments have the same training from the County Police Academy in Scotch Plains and have the power to arrest suspects. Froehlich said that some units from both departments would benefit from interaction, something that he would be looking into; he could name few other benefits.

As to disadvantages, he said, "I'm not sure because I haven't had the

chance to do studies on it." The number of counties in New Jersey with both departments is small and getting smaller all the time. Both Passaic and Morris counties did away with their county police departments in the 1980s, according to Froehlich.

Hudson County also eliminated its county police last year with its Emergency Management and Weights and Measures departments as a cost-cutting measure. This, said Froehlich, was what brought up the subject again. It has also been done in Essex County, though Froehlich said that it was too early to tell the results there.

"Sadly, there a lot of rumor about this — people are going to lose their

jobs over this — and that's just not true," he said.

Froehlich said that, if the two departments are consolidated, there would be no layoffs or demotions. The sheriff's department, with 151 officers and 22 civilian staff, would therefore absorb the Union County Police's 65 officers and 22 civilian staff.

Union County Police Chief Richard Mannix said "I'd rather not comment on that. I haven't seen the study." Mannix did say that the the duties of the Sheriff's Department and the Union County Police are "completely separate."

Froehlich said that he has received little cooperation from the Union County Police in his study, especially from the president of the Union County Policeman's Benevolent Association President Tom Rickey, who could not be reached for comment.

The report should be ready in a few weeks but, because of time constraints and "limited cooperation," Froehlich said that it would not be in detail.

## Illness of geese in parks follows a rite of spring

It is a springtime ritual in Union County, like the swallows coming back to Capistrano: The geese coming back to Union County's parks.

In almost every one of Union County's parks, the ranks of the geese and ducks are swelling daily. They look pretty in the parks' ponds and lakes, but on land they eat the grass down to stubble and leave their droppings all over the place. And when they try to cross roads en masse, the large convoys of birds can block traffic.

The geese, which are fairly large birds, have been known to be aggressive and attack humans in other areas but, according to Daniel Bernier of the Union County Division of Parks and Recreation, there have been no reports of this happening in Union County.

The birds stick around for a fairly obvious reason — there is food in it.

According to Bernier, the birds are normally migratory. But when humans start to feed them, they learn that they do not have to head for a warmer climate and more abundant food in the winter. They just spend the winter in New Jersey and wait for humans to come around and feed them.

The droppings that the birds leave are the number one problem, according to Bernier. A flock of geese can turn a grassy park into a minefield for people walking and jogging and it is almost impossible to stretch out a blanket for a picnic or a tan.

Then there are the health concerns. The geese normally congregate in lawns and other open areas around ponds and lakes. Their droppings are washed into these bodies of water, many of which feed into the Rahway River, the source of drinking water for Rahway.

As to the health effects of this, Bernier said, "I don't think it's been completely studied yet, but having fecal matter in your water can't be good."

Paradoxically, it is the feedings that attract the birds to the area that can lead to mass deaths.

According to Bernier, there have been three reports of ducks coming down with avian botulism, a poisoning resulting from the ingestion of botulitis bacteria.

Botulitis bacteria builds up in the summer during hot, still days in the summer when the water level in lakes and ponds goes down and water circulation is slower. Large masses of algae or algae blooms grow all at once under these conditions, using up the dissolved oxygen and suffocating all other life in the water. According to Mark Payne of the Raptor Trust in Millington, a wild bird rehabilitation

center, the birds' droppings, uneaten food and fertilizer used on the lawns also contribute.

Then the algae itself dies and settles to the bottom, where it ferments instead of rotting. It is in these oxygen-poor conditions that the botulitis bacteria thrive, waiting to be eaten by ducks, which dive to the bottom of bodies of water to feed.

Of the ducks that come down with botulism, Payne said, "It's not mass amounts. We get five but, to be honest, I don't know how many die on site." Payne said that the Raptor Trust only takes in ducks from these incidents that are still strong enough and, needless to say, that have not died.

At least two Rahway residents have reported birds coming down with an unidentified disease in recent weeks.

But both Payne and Bernier said that there have been no cases of sick or dying ducks coming from Union County recently. A Union County bird rehabilitator could not be reached for comment.

Payne was not sure as to whether the botulism posed a health hazard to humans but, according to Bernier, humans cannot contract the avian form.

"It's not something you'd want to get, but it isn't usual," said Payne. "The Board of Health would quarantine the parks if that were the case. It's common sense," he added with a laugh, "you don't go over and kiss a dying duck."

According to Payne, the solution to this problem is a simple one — putting an aerator into a body of water to circulate and aerate the water. This would feed oxygen-loving bacteria that would break down any dead matter in the water.

Not so, said Bernier. "Aerators won't work," he said, calling them a "short-term" solution. "We've studied it extensively and aerators only go so far."

At least one resident who witnessed one of these die-offs blamed the incidents partly on the design of the lakes and ponds.

Bernier denied this, saying, "It's not a problem of design. All the lakes in the county system are designed to circulate, but the water level has changed over the years."

According to Bernier, the water level in these lakes changes as streams feeding them become silted up or have their water levels lowers. They change even faster if they are tapped as a water supply.

The Union County Parks System hired a lake management consultant, SX Browne, Inc. of Landsdale, Pa., to study 11 lakes in Union County. Their report is due in a month, said Bernier. A company representative could not be reached for comment.

## County college has campus career day

### High school seniors go to Cranford

Some 500 public high school seniors from throughout Union County received career information opportunities Tuesday through a three-pronged day of activities at Union County College's Cranford campus.

A career fair featuring representatives of 16 local firms, career exploration workshops, and entrepreneurial workshops were part of an effort of the Union County School-to-Work Opportunities Initiative. The program is intended to provide young people with opportunities to learn about various careers, enabling them to choose a career direction.

In effect, a "seamless" curriculum would be established so that students would take many appropriate classes on the secondary level and prepare themselves for the workforce upon high school graduation or for related education at the post-secondary level.

The participating high school students represented 14 public schools from throughout Union County that follow curriculum areas of Engineering Technologies, Criminal Justice, Business, With Marketing, Accounting, and Banking Concentrations, Restaurant Management, Electronics/Robotics, Multimedia/Desktop Publishing, and Office Administration/Information Processing.

Professors from Union County College, the School-to-Work Initiative's coordinating agency, discussed the college's related curricula, with two business representatives, one of whom is involved in recruitment. As part of panel discussions for each of the areas, they shared their own experiences in their fields, and shed light on related employment opportunities.

In addition, local business representatives were set up in the Commons to recruit these, as well as UCC students, for employment at their firms. They set up a Career Fair arrangement whereby individual students approached company booths and discussed their career goals with representatives in an effort to mesh their backgrounds with company needs.

Companies represented at the Career Fair segment of the program were Visiting Nurse and Health Services, CA One Services, Tops Appliance City, Robert Half International, Meeker Sharkey Financial Group, Hilton Hotel-Newark International Airport, Snelling Personnel, Union Center National Bank, U.S. Navy, United Parcel Service, Ladies Footlocker, Aceys Resources, Inc., Reed-Elsevier, Prudential Preferred Financial Services, Statewide Savings Bank, and Interbake.

Meanwhile, students from 11 schools who are involved in entrepreneurial projects whereby they are conducting year-long "businesses" to gain experience in a cooperative employment setting, displayed their wares and sold their products. These students represented the Roselle, Union County Regional, Cranford, Elizabeth, Linden, Plainfield and Union public school districts, and the Union County Educational Services Commission.

Throughout the day, presentations were conducted on resume writing and job interview techniques, using the Internet for a job search, and exploring employment opportunities via the New Jersey Employment Services, all conducted by UCC counseling staff.

Theater audiences say 'Yes!' to 'No, No, Nanette'

When 20 young men and women tap dance simultaneously to "Tea for Two" at the Paper Mill Playhouse, Millburn, there is a roar of approval and enjoyment from the astounded audience. At least, that's the way it was at Saturday's matinee when "No, No, Nanette" was staged and choreographed by Donald Saddler.

The fabulous musical of the 1920s, which has retained its glorious entertainment value now in 1997, has so much more to offer to theater goers. It has the kind of cast that Broadway would envy — led by Kaye Ballard, Eddie Bracken, Helen Gallagher and Lee Roy Reams — a light, frothy, gaily-attired atmosphere, and the kind of music an audience brings home with it long after the last curtain.

So what if the story line is corny and the scenes dated? This production is good for whatever ails a theater goer. It is so old it even has three acts. One needs only to attend just one performance to forget one's troubles for a few hours and become transformed into the wacky world of a wealthy, generous Bible publisher and his adopted daughter, who wants to sow her wild oats before becoming engaged and entering into marriage.

With a book by Otto Harbach and Frank Mandel, music by Vincent Youmans, lyrics by Irving Caesar and Otto Harbach, featuring the lively tootling "I Want to Be Happy" number, "No, No, Nanette" was originally adapted and directed by Burt Sheve-

love. The musical was recently revived on Broadway and here in Millburn, it has as much to offer — if not more.

Veteran movie actor and comedian Bracken, who hails from Glen Ridge, is hilarious as James Smith, the Bible publisher who has befriended three young ladies in the past and has provided them with money necessary to advance their various careers. Now, the three women, played by Jeanne Jones, Donna Lee Marshall and Jessica Wright, show up at his home to thank him — and his relationship with them is vastly misunderstood, particularly with one, a buxom Marilyn Monroe-type, who bounces her way all the way to the home of James Smith and ultimately, to his cottage in Atlantic City. She's a real show stopper. A natural funnyman, the ageless Bracken employs his antics of years ago — a smile, a frown, a walk, a double-take, and he has the audience in stitches.

Ballard, who has made audiences laugh for years, on the stage and in several television series, portrays the Smith maid, who is always on the

verge of quitting. She has her own style of comedy, and she is really fun to watch.

Gallagher, now a soap opera heroine, repeats her Tony Award-

winning role in "No, No, Nanette," as Sue Smith, Bracken's very proper wife. She can still dance with the best of them — and she does — to the utter delight of the audience.

Reams, a very talented dancer, director, choreographer, and actor, is cast as Billy Early, Smith's lawyer, who becomes entangled in the web of three young women, when all he really wants is his lovely wife, Lucille, gracefully portrayed by Virginia Sandifur. The Paper Mill audiences recall the handsome Reams' memorable performance in "La Cage Aux Folles." He dances so effortlessly that Reams makes the dancing appear so easy. He also can be a very funny comedian and is given every opportunity in this production.

Debra Wiseman, a young actress with great potential, plays the title role, admitting to boredom when she is constantly reprimanded with "No, no, Nanette." That pretty little performer is able to keep pace with the veteran stars. Her fiancé, Tom Trainor, another handsome young man, is properly portrayed by Daniel Herron.

Many of the musical numbers are not memorable, but they are pleasant to the ear — a real delight. In Act I, at the home of James Smith in New York City, Sandifur as Lucille and the boys sing and dance to the lively "Too Many Rings Around Rosie." Herron and Wiseman, as Tom and Nanette, offer "I've Confessed to the Breeze," the incomparable Reams dances with the girls to "Call of the Sea," Nanette, Jimmy, Sue and the boys perform "I Want to Be Happy" and Nanette and the boys dance to the title song, "No,

No, Nanette." Tom, Nanette and the chorus end Act I with Finaletto Act I.

The acts are brief, and before long, in the second act, set in the garden of Chickadee Cottage in Atlantic City, when folks traveled to the famous shore area for its sun and fun, rather than for its casinos, the numbers included "Peach on the Beach," with Nanette, the chorus and the dancers; the riveting Flora, Betty and Winnie doing "The Three Happies," then Tom and Nanette and the chorus offering an outstanding "Tea For Two" softshoe dance, Lucille and Billy in "You Can Dance With Any Girl," and the second Finaletto Act II with the full company.

Act III brings the audience to the living room at Chickadee Cottage, where Billy and the three girls perform "Telephone Girlie," Lucille and the boys dance to "Where Has My Hubby Gone Blues," Tom and Nanette offer "Waiting For You" and the orchestra provides a beautiful "Dress Parade" as Sue and the boys and Lucille, Pauline and company join the dance to "Take a Little One-Step." After the Finale and the Bows and Exit Music by the full company, the audience was reluctant to leave.

When the lights ultimately went on, there were those who danced up the aisle humming "Tea for Two." The others were singing "I Want to Be Happy." And for a few hours at the Paper Mill Playhouse, they were.

College student gives some insight into Russian theater

Most theater-goers are generally familiar with the works of foreign writers and artists, enough to get an impression of what it must have been like to live during different eras and in different cultures. Union County College is fortunate to have a student who is able to share her insight into the drama of her native Russia in "The Great Illusion — The Russian Revolution of October 1917," a theatrical presentation about the effect of the Revolution on Russian drama, which will be performed tomorrow through Sunday at the College's Elizabeth Campus.

Zoya Bromberg is excited about the opportunity to share her experience of living in Russia during the Revolution, during the time of many great writers.

"It's a presentation about Russian theatre and about Russian points of view on revolution. There are three general points of view, and we take three brilliant Russian writers. I believe they are best, and it is not only my opinion."

Bromberg has chosen the works of writers Andre Biely, Vladimir Maygovsky and Mikhail Bulgakov to exemplify the atmosphere surrounding Revolutionary Russia. She reported being shocked when she first came to the U.S. only a few years ago and found that no one was even vaguely familiar with these great authors.

"First point of view is idealistic, second point of view is that of messenger, and third is skeptical. Andre Biely — his point of view was idealistic, through rose-colored glasses. He believed that with the revolution, it was the opportunity to establish new Christian era in Russia, but you know what happened? We are separate from the religion.

"The second chapter is Vladimir Mayagovsky. He was poet and playwright, and he was herald, messenger of the revolution. He was deeply involved in revolutionary work in his youth, for example, at the age of 15, he was in a prison for the revolutionary work. And then he started to write poetry, but the real life disappoint him so much that he shot himself when he was thirty-seven."

The third author, Mikhail Bulgakov, Bromberg considers to be the best Russian writer of this century, pointing out that his work was translated and published in other countries.

"In Russia he was not published. He was deeply skeptical, he felt deep skepticism about such a revolutionary process taking place in such backward country, and he was right."

According to Bromberg, all three of these authors had trouble getting their work published in their native country, and actually had their work banned from print for a long time. She commented on how the experience of living through the Revolution affected each author's creativity.

"Biely was also very disappointed by the real life of the Soviet system because he was not published, his wife was arrested, and his dream had nothing to do with the real system."

Biely's most famous work was a novel called "St. Petersburg," written in 1913.

"It was not about our October revolution, it was about the revolution of 1905, but he has prophetic point of view, a prophetic mind, and he told everything that happened later. He wrote about October of 1905, and it happened in October of 1917."

American playwright Ken Swanson adapted the novel to a play, from which UCC Theater Director Mark Spina has chosen a scene for students to perform as part of Bromberg's presentation.

The second scene to be presented is from "The Bedbug" by Mayagovsky.

"This play is about the new Soviet bourgeoisie, the new Soviet bureaucracy and new Soviet philistinism. Why a bedbug? A bedbug in Russia is just like a cockroach here. He used this word as a symbol of tenacity of philistinism and bureaucracy and of bourgeoisie, because his generation, the generation of revolutionary romantics, had been replaced by a generation of the new Soviet bourgeoisie. This disappointed him so much that he shot himself. He really saw in the revolution to opportunity to build a new world.

"And Bulgakov was a satirist. Everything that he wrote was about what happened in Russia. His play "The Crimson Island" was a revolutionary play, but not directly, more allegorical. He was published only during the post-Stalin turn, in the mid-sixties when his name returned to our literature.

"So this is our goal, to tell how the great dream about the new society was destroyed, and we are going to show it through the eyes of three Russian writers.

Bromberg said her inspiration for the presentation was the fact that 1997 marks the 80th anniversary of the Revolution.

"I remember each year the date, 7 of Nov, a holiday and anniversary in Russia. Here, nobody knows about it, so let me tell them. I want everyone to know not only what happened in Russia then and now, but I want everyone to know about our great culture, because, for me this culture is my essence."

Bromberg will be narrating the production. The three scenes to be presented are directed by Mark Spina, who received high praise from Bromberg for his grasp of Russian culture. (See Student, Page B9)

'La Cage Aux Folles' leaves an impression

Every theater company embarking upon a production discovers that the energy it generates is different from each prior show. Union County Arts Center has been generating a great deal of positive energy lately in preparing for "La Cage Aux Folles," their final show of the season. Amidst a flutter of colorful costumes and glittering backdrops, "La Cage" director Jim Murphy has been enjoying the positive feeling which has come from a happy cast and crew producing a humorous, touching and sensitive production.

"I'm loving it," Murphy said backstage at UCAC during a tech week rehearsal.

A theater professor at Kean College for over 30 years, and recently retired, Murphy is no stranger to the musical stage, having directed and taught students nearly every season of his tenure. Last year, Murphy directed UCAC's "Phantom of the Opera," a unequivocal success and his first venture into the arena of professional directing.

"Oh, it's like night and day," said Murphy of differing energy surrounding "Phantom" and "La Cage." "Phantom was extremely serious, a tragedy. It was all done like a shadow play — you couldn't see all of the set, every nook and cranny, it was so mysterious and eerie. There was one novelty number, but most of the music was serious."

Juxtaposed to "Phantom," Murphy described "La Cage" as "bright and gaudy."

"The audience knows that the setting is a different place and time. The costumes, the music, is uplifting. It's glorious to sit and listen and watch. This is a real musical," the director added, "by Jerry Herman, the last of the musical theater masters."

Murphy is quick to point out, though, that however light-hearted "La Cage" might seem as compared to "Phantom," it still has an important message.

"The audience left 'Phantom' not exactly down, but moved. It was truly tragic. Leaving 'La Cage,' you feel buoyed up, and have had a fun time, but there is the serious theme of how the son learns to respect his parents, almost a family values type of issue. It's a different context — the focus hits more at the end in the final scene."

Murphy said that, in spite of the serious tone, he hopes the perspec-

tive theater-goers leave with is an uplifting one.

"It sounds so corny, but either you'll feel very good or we've all failed."

Murphy was bit by the acting bug in 8th grade, and geared his educational effort toward a career in theater. His focus eventually evolved toward directing while attending Columbia University, and resulted in a very happy and long-term association with Kean College of New Jersey's Communications and Theater Department, where Murphy served as chairperson. Murphy took on some acting roles throughout his career, working in soaps, commercials and films, mostly in an effort to bring the experience to his classroom.

"I had a wonderful life at Kean," said Murphy, expressing his gratitude at finding what he calls "the perfect job" teaching theater to young people, although he found teaching during the day and directing theater productions at night much like having two jobs at once. Murphy is finding his professional theater experience at UCAC just as rewarding, but in a different way.

"Having a professional staff is helpful," he said. "You have to train at the college."

Murphy also tried his hand at playwrighting, and is the author of "Day Dreams: The Music and Magic of Doris Day," whom he calls "one of the great singers of all time."

"I get teased about it," Murphy smiled. (See Director, Page B8)

## Drama reaches an emotional high in MVP's 'West Side Story'

When voices, acting, musical and dramatic scenes reach an audience beyond its emotional realm, one wonders where the credit is due.

In the Linden Cultural and Heritage Committee's presentation of the Mystic Vision Players' "West Side Story," which was staged Sunday afternoon in the Linden High School auditorium, much credit must go to Jil Durbin, director; Barbara-Jude Greco, choreographer; Tom Pedas, musical director, and the entire cast. And, of course, added credit must go to the musical's depiction of the Jerome Robbins original Broadway production by Robert E. Griffith and Harold S. Prince, with a book by Arthur Laurents, music by Leonard Bernstein and lyrics by Stephen Sondheim.

After an introduction by John T. Gregono, mayor of Linden, who is honorary chairman of the Linden Cultural and Heritage Committee, one of the most professional offerings ever given in Linden High School thundered across a stage that seemed too small for so many people. But the stage did accommodate them, and within the marvelous dance numbers and chillingly emotional dramatic scenes, a social comment was being made about prejudices among nationalities on the streets of New York City, with fighting gangs protecting their own — much of which has not yet to this day been resolved. It also had a modern story in a near-ballet definition of William Shakespeare's "Romeo and Juliet."

The performances were splendid and the voices, with a tang of operatic nuances, were as professional as in a New York production. Most outstanding were Irene Caguinquin as Maria, with a promisingly operatic voice — absolutely beautiful — Andy King as Tony, Kevin Brady as Riff, the leader of the Jets; Denise Gerona Fernandez, riveting as Anita, one of the best Anitas this reviewer has ever witnessed; and Greco as Graziella and the Dream Maria, whose dancing and ballet talents equal her singing and acting and choreographing aspects.

There are comical numbers interspersed with the drama, violence and heartbreak. In the opening scenes, the excited audience comes in contact with the Jets, with fine performances by Riff, Tim Skarbek as Action, Steven Fakelman as Arab, Matt Nazzaro as Baby John, Chris Maziekien as Diesel and Dan Rivard as Big Deal, and the Sharks, led by Mohamed Jalloh in a sharp performance as Bernardo, the leader; Angel Pereira in an equally sharp performance as Chino and the Dream Tony; Franco Lubunao as Pepe, Robert Rivera and Joe Funes as Mando, Joe Zedney as Luis and Bernard J. The Mystic Vision Players' production of "West Side Story" was presented in Linden with so much professionalism and emotion, that this reviewer, along with the rest of the audience, departed the auditorium with a shudder and a tear.

a naturalness unusual in one so young.

Meridoc Burkhardt, who plays Mack Sennett, has a fine, resonant voice and a professionalism in acting that is rewarded in a difficult role. His renditions of "Movies Were Movies," "I Won't Send Roses," "I Wanna Make the World Laugh" "Hundreds of Girls," "Hit 'Em On the Head," and "I Promise You a Happy Ending," were very effective.

This year's winners: "Best in Show" was awarded to Ben Gibson of Edinboro, Pa., for his work, "The Executive Pool Party," which received \$1,000. Merit Award winners each receiving \$200 were Usui Takatomo of Tokyo, Japan, for "Fence II"; Danny Trent of Tavernier, Fla., for his acrylic, "Miami Bronzed"; Virginia Baich of Albuquerque, N.M., for collographs "Razor's Edge" and "Moving Sands." Suza Bubrinski of North Bennington, Vt., received the Juergen Thieck Memorial Award for Photography for "Suza (as James Joyce)." Evelyn Busch Klie of Binghamton, N.Y., received the Peg O'Brien Memorial Award for Watercolor, "The Hares Dance in the Orchards."

Approximately 140 works in all media are now on exhibit, representing artists from 42 states and six countries including Brazil, Sweden, China,

Japan and Luxembourg. Works range from picturesque watercolors to haunting black-and-white photography, a strong selection of conceptual and narrative sculpture, mixed media, oil paintings and prints.

It will be juried by leading national art critic and historian Kuspit. Many of the artists were present at the opening; merit awards, honorable mentions, the Juergen Thieck Award for Photography and one award of "Best in Show" were presented. "The exhibition is a wide variety of what's going on right now in art," said Alice Percy, exhibition curator. "We were really able to reach a lot of far corners." # Workshop announces schedule for summer arts and crafts

# Images of the season at Swain Galleries

The "Jersey Shore" — the Atlantic surf with dunes, white sand, beach grass, scrub pines, boardwalks, amusement parks, casinos, tourists and summer people, hurricanes and environmental concerns — these words echo experience of and describe a heritage common to New Jerseyans across the state including artist Louis Lanzafama, who paints there on location. His latest works, "Seasonal Images," will be on view in a solo exhibit through May 2 at Swain Galleries in Plainfield.

"I like to paint movement — the water, the light, the people, the weather. Still life portraits are not for me. I have more opportunity to express myself when there is a passing parade. People come in and out of a scene, and so does the sun, then the wind changes — all of it excites my creativity," explained the Toms River artist. Earlier in his career, his oil paintings were of woodlands, wherever he went backpacking. "But once I started painting at the beach, I was captivated by its brightness and its own seasonal

changes and I never went back to the trees."

A painting titled "Early Season" shows a beach badge stand ready for business, the snow fence on the dune, the ocean and the sky; another, "The Gift," painted just before winter, depicts a sweater-clad adult biker pedaling homeward with a youth's bicycle in tow. By contrast, a beach setting of "Hollywood, Florida," seems more mannered and formal than the breezy informality of the Jersey shore.

Born in Newark and raised in Irvington, Lanzafama received his art education at Plainfield's du Cret School of the Arts and Designs and New York's National Academy of Design and Fine Arts, where he became the first non-student to receive a scholarship based on a preview of his work. The academy also awarded him a Certificate of Merit.

Last year, his paintings were exhibited in the 83rd annual exhibition of Allied Artists of America at the National Arts Club, New York City.

An educator as well as artist, he accepted the post of field instructor in 1998 for the Island Heights Artists Guild. He both developed and taught art programs at the Watchung Arts Center and the Roselle Community Adult School.

Honored at the Annual Awareness Exhibition in Teaneck, the Hunterdon Art Center in Clinton, the Ocean County Artists Guild, and more, he was selected for a three-man exhibit at Ward Nasse Gallery in New York City and a one-man show at the Cranford Art Center.

Sunday is the date for Warren Chiasson's vibraphone jazz concert, from 2 to 3:30 p.m., in the Westfield Community Room Gallery, 425 East Broad Street, presented by the Westfield Art Association.

Mr. Chiasson's "ebullience and almost manic enthusiasm" have been described by George Kanzler in the Newark Star-Ledger. "Warren Chiasson was the center of attention for both his fine playing and for his body English. When he goes into action, Chiasson throws himself at the vibes. He developed his own four-mallet technique in the 1960's, which he practiced about nine hours a day. Before forming his own group, he toured with the George Shearing Quintet, the Chet Baker Quartet, the Tal Farlow Trio, and played for Roberta Flack. He has appeared at the Newport Jazz Festival, both in Rhode Island and New York City, and at the

jazz festival in Monterey, California. He performed in Broadway productions including "Hair," for which he composed the percussion. He has appeared regularly in New York City at Zimmo's, the Knickerbocker, and the Village Gate, and he has played recently at the Cornerstone in Metuchen, on the Scotch Plains Green, and at Watching Art Center.

Over a hundred recordings include Chiasson on vibraphone. He has recorded three albums, starting with "Quartessence," "Good Vibes" for Kurt Weill was selected as a Billboard "Pick of the Week." His latest album is "Point Counterpoint" on Empathy Records. Chiasson was featured as a soloist on the B.B. King album "Blues

"N Jazz," which won a Grammy Award.

About his work, Chiasson stated to jazz reviewer Teresa Hinds in 1995. "I am a performer. When I play, it's a physical thing; it's built into me and it has been ever since I was a kid. I have hunger to reach out to the people of the audience, reach into their hearts."



# Student tells tales of Russia through drama

 "Mask is a very talented director, with an amazing grasp of Russian staging. He felt Russian style and essence, and I've seen him produce another play and I've seen how he felt it!" Bromberg said excitedly, adding that many famous directors were imprisoned in Russia for producing these "anti-Soviet" plays.

Bromberg immigrated to the U.S. in order to study the language and learn about American culture.

"Literature and theater is not my background. I was an editor in Russia, but my field was in computers, accounting, statistics and economics. But, I have read a lot, and was always interested in literature and theater. I brought from Moscow all my books, all my library, and this is what I have in my life," Bromberg laughed.

Soon after enrolling in classes at UCC, Bromberg became employed by the College's Institute for Intensive English, a program for speakers of other languages.

"I am here to study, to work. I like my job because of the intelligent office. Intelligent English is around me. I treasure it very much."

Director Spina is grateful to have met Bromberg, and feels that she has broadened his horizons regarding his

admittedly limited knowledge of Russian drama.

"What amazed me is that the only Russian that we're usually exposed to in school is something like the 'Gulag Archipelago,' or maybe 'War and Peace,' something very heavy, and it amazed me that there's this entire other side of wild black comedy in Russian literature that we never hear about, because comedy is very difficult to translate. So the three scenes we are doing are wildly funny, and it's amazing to me, having grown up on the 'Gulag Archipelago' and 'Dr. Zhivago,' that there is such incredible humor in these Russian plays. The thing about Russian comedy is, in America everything is either serious or funny. But apparently, in Russian comedy, they take the most serious subject and find the humor in it.

Spina has encountered more than cultural and language barriers while involved in this production. The scenes call for far more actors than American plays, and he's been pulling double duty with casting and rehearsals.

"In those days, of course, they had actors on salary. He's writing for there to be ten extra actors onstage and each have one line. So we've consolidated some parts, we've cut some lines, interpolated others. It's

like a revolving door — we're releasing half the cast one night and the other half the next night and just hoping it will all fit together. It's a challenge."

Spina is very happy to give Bromberg's dream a chance to become a reality.

"Zoya has really made it a mission of her own to bring some of those writers to our attention because we never hear about them here, and there's lots of wonderful stuff."

### Grants available for volunteer squads

Volunteer emergency medical squads in New Jersey have another opportunity to apply for grants to purchase life-saving heart defibrillators, as The Prudential Insurance Company of America announced a \$1 million expansion of its Helping Hearts Program.

Governor Christine Todd Whitman helped kick off the Helping Hearts Program in New Jersey in 1994. Since then, 193 volunteer EMS squads in the state have qualified for defibrillator grants, totalling an estimated \$475,000. The program's expansion will now give New Jersey volunteer squads another chance to apply for assistance in acquiring defibrillators.

The expanded Prudential Helping Hearts Program will provide matching grants of up to \$2,000 to qualifying volunteer EMS squads in any state to help defray the cost of purchasing a defibrillator. Defibrillators, which administer jolts of electricity to "reset" the heart's natural rhythm, have been called one of the most important lifesaving inventions of the 20th century. Studies indicate that, if used within minutes of an attack, they could save most of the 250,000 Americans who die each year from sudden cardiac arrest.

To be eligible for a Helping Hearts

grant, volunteer EMS squads must meet state defibrillation training requirements and raise the rest of the cost of a defibrillator themselves. Applications will be considered on a first-come basis. Squads interested in applying should contact their nearest Prudential insurance office for an application and additional details. The application also can be downloaded from Prudential's World Wide Web site at <http://www.prudential.com/community>.

Prudential has been providing defibrillator grants to volunteer EMS squads in selected states for the past three years. Nearly 1,000 squads in 13 states have qualified for the grants, and many lives have been saved with machines purchased through the Helping Hearts program kicked off in New Jersey in 1994. The Helping Hearts Program was subsequently expanded to California, Colorado, Florida, Illinois, Maryland, Minnesota, New York, Ohio, Oklahoma, Pennsylvania, Texas and Wisconsin.

"Prudential has seen the difference volunteer ambulance crews can make with a portable defibrillator," said

Prudential Chairman Art Ryan. "By expanding our Helping Hearts program nationwide, we hope many more communities will support their volunteers in purchasing this gift of life."

Defibrillators have been used in hospitals for years, but are just now beginning to see widespread use across the country by EMS squads. This is due to improved technology and changes in state licensing requirements. Still, the majority of ambulance crews do not yet own this equipment, primarily due to lack of funds. The Prudential Helping Hearts Program is designed to help address this need.

"Early defibrillation is critically important to saving people who suffer sudden cardiac arrest," said Myron Weisfeldt, M.D., chairman of the American Heart Association's Early Defibrillation Task Force. The Prudential Helping Hearts Program supports the ability of local communities across the country to respond effectively to heart emergencies."



## Oldsmobile plans to capture new customer base with new Intrigue

The all-new 1998 Oldsmobile Intrigue debuts in its production form recently.

—Due out in the spring as a 1998 model, the Intrigue plays a major role in Oldsmobile's renaissance and resurgence in the midsize segment.

Aimed at the upper end of the massive midsize market, Intrigue is not intended to be all things to a broad range of customers. Instead it's tightly focused to deliver "one great car" to a specific group of customers. Following through on this promise the Intrigue team presents:

Oldsmobile's flagship, Aurora. One seating configuration: Five passenger with center console and floor mounted shifter.

One powertrain: The 3800 195 hp V6, a perennial winner of Ward's Ten Best Engines designation.

One suspension configuration: Utilizing a combination of premium components unlike any other in the midsize market.

One elegant and functional interior design: Including a low cowl for excellent forward visibility.

This package also includes a high level of standard equipment including

a four-speed electronic transmission, traction control, four-wheel disc anti-lock brakes, air conditioning and speed sensitive rack and pinion power steering. Optional equipment moves the Intrigue further up the luxury scale with a BOSE stereo system, leather seating, sunroof and a 12-disc Cd changer. For performance perfectionists' an Autobahn package is also available.

Customer clinic results prove that Intrigue offers an uncommonly high level of ride and handling refinement. Achieving that praise from predominantly import owners and insiders was no mean feat. The foundation for exemplary ride and handling is a sound body structure, to fulfill that need, Intrigue has a very stiff unit-construction body with an isolated front subframe (patented).

Another area that the Intrigue excels in is its suspension componentry. The front and rear struts utilize a combination of premium components (rebound springs, four-phase valving and synthetic fluid) unlike other midsize vehicles on the market today. In addition, the Intrigue is the first high-volume application of four-stage deflected disc technology within the NAO GM family. Other ride and handling features unique to the Intrigue deliver excellent ride and handling characteristics. There are four patents pending on Intrigue's ride and handling package.

The 1998 Intrigue is not intended to be a direct replacement for any existing product line. Instead it will compete in fresh territory and bring new customers to the Oldsmobile fold.

Combining the refinement of import models within a subtly more expressive and elegant package, the Intrigue is the composition of refinement, upscale features and advanced technology. Imports won an enviable reputation by setting high standards within the \$20-\$25,000 segment of the midsize market. Now it's the Intrigue's turn to demonstrate that the bar can be raised a notch higher.

## Mercedes Benz set to take on scores of SUV's in '98

Mercedes-Benz has released more information on their M-Class All Activity Vehicle, a new sport-utility vehicle that will set new standards for both on-road performance and comfort and off-road ability. The Mercedes M-Class, which goes on sale in the fall, will compete in the heart of the premium SUV segment — along with vehicles such as the Ford Explorer and Jeep Grand Cherokee Limited models — with a price starting in the mid \$30,000 range.

Consumer research has shown that owners of current, truck-driven sport utility vehicles are pleased with the ruggedness and cargo capacity that their vehicles offer, but they also want a more comfortable ride, better fuel economy, greater passenger safety and improved reliability. Drawing upon this research as well as decades of expertise in four-wheel-drive technology, Mercedes-Benz designed the M-Class from the ground up, rather than rebadge or redesign an existing car or truck platform.

The M-Class combines the core attributes of Mercedes-Benz passenger cars (performing and handling, safety, quality, comfort and luxury) with the benefits that sport-utility buyers want (true off-road capability, rugged design, cargo capacity and versatility and towing capacity).

The Mercedes-Benz safety standard was designed into the M-Class from the start. A welded steel box frame and a reinforced steel body cage provide a carefully engineered crumple-zone structure, while maximizing torsional stiffness for a smoother, quieter ride.

As on every Mercedes-Benz vehicle sold in the United States, the M-Class features advanced four-channel, four-wheel anti-lock brakes and emergency tensioning retractors with belt force limiters for the front seatbelts. Front door-mounted side-impact airbags, currently on all E, S, SL, and SLK models, will also be standard, further raising the bar in safety equipment among SUVs.

While the practical aspects of the Mercedes M-Class design will please buyers into the next century, Mercedes is confident the style will last as well. That is because, just as Mercedes used a "clean sheet of paper" approach, for the M-class chassis, the designers likewise did not seek to copy an existing "look" or trend.

A sleek aerodynamic shape that breaks away from the prevalent boxy design of sport-utility vehicles will give the Mercedes-Benz M-Class a quiet ride, and helps to achieve class-leading fuel efficiency. The boxy designs of some SUVs compromise aerodynamic efficiency, which in turn contributes to wind noise and reduces fuel efficiency.

The Mercedes-Benz M-Class was developed with

passenger comfort, cargo room and versatility in mind. Its 111-inch wheelbase is among the longest in its segment — 5.1 inches longer than Jeep Grand Cherokee and 5.7 inches longer than Toyota 4Runner. The M-Class is also 5.2 inches higher than Grand Cherokee and 1.1 inches wider. The largest side doors among midsize SUVs and a low step-in make getting in and out of the Mercedes M-Class much easier than in most SUVs. The rear seat row has ample head, leg and shoulder room for all three passengers, thanks in part to a relatively flat floor.

For versatility, each second-row seat backrest can be folded down separately, and either one-third or two thirds or all of the seat cushions can be folded forwards.

An optional third seat, which will be available after the first vehicles go on sale, offers ample room for two more passengers. Unlike the additional seating capacity offered by some SUVs, the M-Class third seat is comfortable for adults. There is even a footwell in the floor for ample third-seat legroom.

The M-Class stands apart from other four-wheel drive SUVs in that it does not lock its axles in an attempt to maintain traction on slippery or loose surfaces. Instead, the M-class employs a sophisticated four-wheel adaptation of the company's proven electronic traction system (4ETS) to maintain stability and traction on wet or snowy roads.

Uncompromised ABS operation is also ensured by the M-Class 4ETS, since it eliminates the conflict between ABS and manually locking differentials, weight is lower and there are fewer mechanical parts to wear out.

Mechanically, the Mercedes-Benz M-Class offers full-time four-wheel drive with front, center and rear differentials. All three differentials are of an efficient "open" design. The center differential is located in the transfer case a planetary unit which provides low range gear reduction for serious off-road travel.

Torque distribution is 50 percent front/50 percent rear, so the driver experiences the benefits of full-time four-wheel drive. In slippery or off-road conditions, the benefit of the full-time system is obvious. Yet, even on perfectly dry highways, the system makes its presence known by giving the M-Class secure, neutral handling characteristics.

In first gear, low range, the Mercedes-Benz M-Class will have one of the lowest "crawl speeds" in its class, giving it the ability to negotiate the most challenging terrain and steep descents. When in low range, the M-Class five-speed electronic automatic transmission uses a special shift program to provide smooth shifting in rugged off-road conditions.




