Left Out

Last week Elizabeth Mayor Chris Bollwage received kudos for the mail in his city. Among the political pros, he deserves praise for his ability to get "No" signs up at key locations in his city. Along with the usual signs for candidates, this year Elizabeth faces a charter change which brought forth the question if Elizabeth shall continue to be a major player in electoral politics in the county. A no vote would continue Elizabeth's key role.

In the world of political signs, it's a good deal like real estate. Namely, it's locations, location, location which matters the most. Be it North Avenue in Elizabeth, Valley Road in Clark, or the Boulevard in Kenilworth, the more people who can see the sign, the better the results.

Kenilworth Mayor Michael Tripodi is philosophical on the use of signs. "We have limited the time, place and manner on signs, but this of course has to be balanced with the right of free speech," Tripodi also admits that he is "flattered when a person in the community puts your sign on his lawn."

Tripodi's seems to be especially focused on being flattered on the eastbound lane of the Boulevard where his signs are found on numerous houses. His opponent has had considerably better luck on the westbound side of the Boulevard.

Mayor Albert McWilliams of Plainfield has been watching the sign in his community as a supporter for candidate Corey Storch. He concedes that Storch has a severe critic who McWilliams has nicknamed "The Mangler." Rather than stealing the Storch signs, The Mangler rips up the signs and crushes the metal holder, leaving the destruction behind as a calling card.

Some towns continue to have ordinances limiting or preventing the use of signs. In most towns where signs don't appear, it is due to a gentleman's agreement or tradition between the political parties.

Three seats up for grabs

"There will be at least one new face on the Board of Chosen Freeholders come Jan. 1. Voters on Tuesday will choose between the Democratic ticket, which includes two incumbents, and the Republican challengers.

Freeholder Chairman Nicholas Scutari of Linden and Freeholder Linda Stander of Fairwood are running with Angel Estrada, a member of the Elizabeth Board of Education. He replaced Freeholder Donald Concalves on the Democratic party list. They will face Republicans Al Dill of Summit, Wally Shackell of Cranford and Richard Revilla of Elizabeth.

Stander is completing her second term on the board; she served as chairwoman in 1997. She has been endorsed by the Women's Political

Caucus, a statewide political action committee.

Scutari, this year's chairman, is finishing his first term as freeholder. Estrada has been a member of the Elizabeth Board of Education for two terms.

Shackell, a former mayor of Cranford, served on the Cranford Township Committee for three years while Dill was a three-term member of the Summit Common Council. A former

candidate for Assembly in the 20th Legislative District, Revilla is a member and former chairman of the Elizabeth Housing Authority.

The Democratic freeholder ticket has been endorsed by the Union County Policemen's Benevolent Association Local 73. It is the first time in the association's more than 70-year history that it has endorsed candidates for county office.

Surrogate

Democrat James LaCorte faces Republican Linda-Lee Kelly, both of Elizabeth, to fill the unexpired term for surrogate. The vacancy arose after the death of Ann Conil in July. She had been surrogate since 1983 and was re-elected to a five-year term in 1997.

LaCorte is a partner in the firm of LaCorte, Bundy and Varady of Elizabeth. Kelly is a former assistant





county counsel and currently is principal of Hamilton Middle School in Elizabeth.

Kelly was freeholder chairwoman in 1993 and served two terms on the board, from 1990 to 1996.

Democrats far ahead of GOP in fund-raising

Republicans, already faced with the prospect of a 9-0 Democratic-controlled freeholder board, are being outraised by Democrats at a rate of more than 3-to-1 in this year's freeholder election.

According to reports filed last week with the Election Law Enforcement Commission, Democrats already have spent nearly \$120,000 on the campaign. The Union County Democratic Committee had raised \$384,516.40 through Sept. 30 with \$180,760 of that coming in the most recent quarter — July 1 through Sept. 30.

On the other hand, the Union County Republican Committee has raised \$91,807.06 through September. The three Republican candidates — Richard Revilla, Al Dill and Wally Shackell — filed finance reports jointly.

The Oct. 22 11-day pre-election report was not available by press time but according to their Oct. 4 29-day pre-election report, the Republican candidates have raised \$23,000 and spent slightly more than \$5,000. The \$23,000 came from each candidate's individual election fund: Revilla, \$10,000; Dill, \$6,000, and Shackell \$7,200. Candidates also must file a 20-day post-election report by Nov. 22.

Democrats have spent more than \$107,000 with the New Brunswick firm, Message and Media, on everything from consulting and artwork to mailings and advertisements.

The Union County Democratic Committee, according to several members of the party, has taken charge of fund-raising efforts rather than individual candidates having to raise money. Even so, Scutari and Stender have individual filings with the Election Law Enforcement Commission.

Stender had raised \$24,000 and expended more than \$16,000 this year, mostly contributing to other candidates or committees but nothing within the last month. Meanwhile Scutari has the largest individual war chest of any candidate with nearly \$70,000 raised, more than \$54,000 coming within the last couple of months. To date, he had disbursed slightly less than \$12,000.

The power of incumbency is evident through donations from county employees and companies involved with county projects. In the Democratic Committee's last two quarterly reports, filed Aug. 15 and Oct. 15, the committee received approximately 30 contributions of more than \$200 each from employees. Contributors of \$200 or more must be identified in campaign finance reports.

Among the largest contributors to the Democrats, according to the latest reports filed, are The Musial Group of Mountainside, an architectural firm, and the Teaneck law firm of DeCotis, Fitzpatrick and Gluck.

The Musial Group contributed \$10,000 last month, bringing its total contributions this year to \$26,250, while DeCotis donated nearly \$30,000 in three separate contributions last month.

The Musial Group is working on the \$13-million renovation of the county's Veneri Complex in Westfield as well as other renovations at the county complex in Elizabeth.

Also involved in the Veneri Complex renovations, and other county projects, is contractor Joseph Jingoli & Sons Inc. of Lawrenceville. Owners Michael Jingoli and Joseph Jingoli have contributed \$10,500 and \$4,500, respectively this year.

Governor visits Union

When Gov. Christine Whitman stepped off the train in Union on Monday, she stepped off onto gravel and concrete amid the backdrop of a former lumberyard. If all goes according to plan, two years from now Whitman and other commuters will be able to step off onto the Union/Township Station platform, a stop along NJ Transit's Raritan Valley Line.

Part of the plan that will enable the transformation is a state question on Tuesday's ballot asking voters to authorize the \$500-million Statewide and Local Bridge Bond Act of 1999. The measure would fund \$80 million for public transportation projects, including the Union Station as well as the rehabilitation of the Bergen Turnpikes and Hoboken Yard.

"It's transportation projects like this one that will be especially if we do not find additional funding sources," Whitman said. "New Jersey's first-class transportation network can't run on empty. We need to refuel our transportation program so that our trains can continue to operate, so that stations like this can be built or refurbished."

Whitman traveled from Cranford to Union via the Raritan Valley Line with students from Hillsdale Union School in Cranford to push for support of Tuesday's state question.

The bond also will provide \$250 million to repair and rebuild county bridges that have been deemed most deficient and another \$170 million for state highway and transportation projects. Union County is slated to receive \$12 million in grant money for the repair and rehabilitation of bridges throughout the county.

The worth of the project far outweighs any bond repayment schedule, the governor said. "To move these projects through the pipeline, we need the funds."

"There is always a saturation point but we're not anywhere near it," See WHITMAN, Page B2

Local assemblymen to seek re-election

With all 80 seats up for election on Tuesday, Democrats will look to reduce the Republicans' 49-32 advantage in the Assembly. Incumbents in all local legislative districts are seeking re-election and voters in one district also will have a chance to decide on a state senate seat. Terms are for two years.

21st District

Incumbent Republicans Joel Weingarten of Millburn and Kevin O'Toole of Cedar Grove are challenged by Democrat Michael Cohan of Union and Dennis Caulfield of Roseland. Robert Diamond of Springfield also has filed for the race as an independent.

O'Toole, the Republican chairman in Essex County, seeks his third term while Weingarten is going for his second full term. He was appointed in 1996 to fill the unexpired term of the late Monroe Jay Lusibador.


Caulfield is a lineman with the Newark Fire Department where he has worked



since 1983. He also is an attorney concentrating in real estate and estate planning law. His father, the late John Caulfield, was a state senator and Newark fire director.

Caulfield has been endorsed by the New Jersey AFL-CIO, the New Jersey Firefighter's Mutual Benefit Association and New Jersey Right to Life.

A social studies teacher at Kawamosh Middle School in Union, Cohan was president of the Union Township Education Association for 10 years.

The 21st District includes Union, Springfield, Summit, Roselle Park, Konitworth and parts of Essex County.

20th District

A heavily-Democratic district, the 20th District is comprised of Elizabeth, Linden, Roselle and Rahway. Incumbent Neil Cohan of Roselle and Joseph Suliga of Linden seek re-election against Dirk Weber and Elvira Drzewinski, both of Rahway.

Cohan, who shares a law practice with 27th District Assemblywoman Nia Gill of Monclair, is deputy minority leader in the Assembly. He is the only person to ever be elected to the Legislature from two different districts. A former freholder and county Democratic chairman, Cohan seeks re-election to a third consecutive term.

The chief financial officer for his hometown of Linden, Suliga looks to be re-elected to a third term. He also served as 7th Ward City Councilman in Lin-

den and on the Linden Board of Education. Both incumbents are chairmen of their local Democratic committees and have earned the endorsement of the New Jersey Tenants' Organization.

Weber lost in his bid for an at-large seat on the Rahway City Council last year.

22nd District

Incumbents Richard Bagger of Westfield and Alan Augustine of Scotch Plains, both Republicans, likely will earn re-election as no Democrats filed in the race. The district includes Clark and Cranford, as well as other parts of Union, Middlesex and Somerset counties. They have been endorsed by the Trustees of the New Jersey Organization for a Better State, the state's largest and oldest probusiness political action committee.

29th District

Incumbent Democrats William Payne and Donald Tucker likely will be re-elected in their staunchly Democratic district. In addition, Newark Mayor Sharpe James, who was appointed to fill the seat of the late Wynona Lipman, is seeking to finish her term in the state Senate.

Republican challengers in the Assembly race are Tharion Arnold and Elaine Guarino, both of Newark. In the senate election, James is opposed by Republican Isaac Durette of Hillside.

The 29th District is composed of Hillside and parts of Newark.

Whitman said of the state's debt—

NJ Transit Executive Director Jeffrey Warsh said there is nothing wrong with bonding considering the size of the project. "To pay as you go would not be realistic. It needs to be done with bonding capacity."

Warsh said people admire train stations built in the early 20th century and 100 years from now, people will be admiring Union Station. "It's not fair for one generation to pay for something that many generations will use."

The governor's top priority for the

coming year is the reauthorization of the transportation trust fund which was depleted. She hopes to work closely with the Legislature to craft a proposal that will gain support, something her proposed four-cent gas tax two years ago lacked.

The proposed \$29-million, 2,000-square-foot Union Station will be constructed on Green Lane adjacent to Kean University and Scherling Plough. A 545-foot high-level-center island platform will contain a heated shelter. Daily ridership is expected to be 800 passengers and the station will have 500 parking spaces.



For sculptor, art is passion

Veteran sculptor-artist Doris Krueger of Springfield, formerly of Union, whose works are known nationally — and locally — attributes her success to "believing in oneself."

Krueger, a slim, delicate-looking artist, who belies her strength in sculpting large and small pieces of art, currently has an exhibition through the end of this month at the Cornell Museum at Del Ray Beach, Fla., called "Winners Circle," where she won a prize for her sculpture, "Embrace."


A real winner of her own, she has had numerous exhibitions, juried shows, one-person shows, and has lectured to women's groups, served as art consultant and conducted seminars and sold art to corporations and residential clients. Krueger has served as president and contributor to the Co-Operative Gallery, Art Makers in Carwood, demonstrated for the Print Making Council of New Jersey, The Art of Monoprints, Branchburg. She also was interviewed on cable television, "Women in the Arts," from 1990 to 1991 and is a member of the New Jersey Center for Visual Arts in Summit, the Organization for Independent Artist of New York City and the Women-in-Visual Arts in Boca Raton, Fla.

"You have to believe in yourself," Krueger said during a recent visit to this office. "As an artist, if you don't have a strong belief, you can't sell. Really, as an artist or a writer, one has to have that strong feeling that you have to give back to the world a part of yourself. In the art market, everything is based on decorative art. If you're trying to produce an original work of art, you have to find the source — which comes from within."

Krueger explained that "Basically, I'm a sculptor, a stone carver. I've been working all my life. I had to find my own direction. As a child, I admired my parents; that's what children do, and follow their direction. But when they mature, they're really looking out for their own direction."

"Fortunately, for me," she recalled, "I always had a admiration was recognized when I was very young. And it was marvelous that I had the strength to pursue it. When there is a passion in one's art, one has to pursue it. It's very difficult, but there are many challenges in life. It's endless. This is part of life, and when I went out there to have a full life, I proceeded to work. The experiences are a constant challenge."

Krueger studied at the University of Southern California, the California School of Art, Los Angeles; Rider University in Lawrenceville, the Art Students League in New York City; Outdoor Landscape with Armando

Sozio; Herb Wylie of Union; the New Jersey School of Visual Art, John Grabach, Figure; Anthony Triano, Seon Hall University; the New Jersey Business-Sculpture-Studio, Plainfield; Leo Schtoemowitz, New York, and the Tree Gallery in Boynton Beach, Fla.

"I work with tools," said the artist. "Last year, I worked with power tools. But power tools don't have the sensitivity that you have with your hands. There's an inner feeling when you have that chisel in your hand. You know you're going to achieve something special. And how does one keep in focus and inspiration?" she asked. "You keep the focus through the media — by consistency working. Sometimes inspiration comes, and sometimes it doesn't. The key is to keep working. And being an artist is a little kind of work. But there's a sense of working from within. I find that there's a nice interchange or rapport with other artists, but the bottom line is getting in touch with your own sources."

Krueger explained that "I work because I have this inner passion for my work. It was hard to relate to it when I was very young. But it gave me an identification, an inner pride. And I'm always striving to get better. "When I first started to work," she recalled, "I sold a great deal because my subject matter was more landscape, more floral in my paintings. But I changed as I matured. Now, I don't find time to go outside, although I still enjoy color and it does give me a vehicle to express myself. I still work at a pace. You have to pace yourself. I find when I'm uptight, I'm not free.

The art expresses your mood, your inner soul, especially when you're really on the top of your work."

She continued, "When you intellectualize, the work isn't as free. We allow inner forces to influence us." Krueger smiled. "You need to relax to work from within. I've had many friends who stopped working. One friend said, 'I've said it all. And that's that.'"

Krueger admitted that she hasn't said it all — not quite yet. "How does one create? Recently, I started working on a still piece. I had no preconceived idea of what it would be. I started to work on it. It's picking the shape that fascinates me. Right now, it's about two-and-a-half feet tall. I started to do something very angular. It's an abstract piece. Something guided my hand and it became a huge explosion. The face of it just unfolded, and the petals were not unlike my dancing figures. My husband, Murray, by the way, grows sunflowers."

"It's an oversized sunflower in stone," she said proudly. "It's called, 'Ah, Stage.' We understand now — we reacted with an 'Ah' — it was unexpected and so diverse."

The Kruegers have three sons, Brent, Mitch and Doug, and five grandchildren. Their sons are in business with their father, the Kiss Electric, Krueger Security.

"My doctor once said, 'You're a wonderful artist, and your family members are your jewels.' You know," Krueger reminded, he's right.

That, it is said, is the basis for life, happiness — and art.

NJ Ballet opens season at Kean

The New Jersey Ballet Co. opened its 41st season Saturday night at the Wilkins Theater at Kean University, Union, with two exciting and spectacular "firsts" to the delight of an enormous crowd of ballet enthusiasts.

The first of the "firsts" was the premiere of "Western Sweet," choreographed by Englishman and former soloist with the Royal Ballet, Michael Vernon. This unusual ballet was a collection of American country-western songs, completely different from anything ever seen on the ballet stage.

The very expressive dancing was highlighted by such numbers as "Endlessly," "My Love Lossome Billy," "Cattle Call," "Slipping Around," "Shenandoah," "Green Leaves," "Ginger Like Me" and "Down at the Twist and Shout." The entire ballet company — attired in western denim, socks and bootie slippers — included the splendid, exceptionally talented principals: Rosemary Sabovick-Bleich, Debra Sayles, Christina Theryoung, Morgan Goddard, Iuliana Iatsenko, Era Korotseva-Jouravleva, Andree Nizer, Young Qing Guo, Konstantin Doumer, Tuvshin Bold, Julia Vorobyeva and Andrei Jouravlev.

"Western Sweet," incidentally, also launched the New Jersey Ballet's popular Saturday Night Concert Series at Kean.

The second of the "firsts" was the introduction of a new principal dancer

from China, Yan Li, who resembled a delicate, porcelain doll in her interpretation of the Swan Queen in "White Swan Pas De Deux." She danced one of the most difficult roles with the skilled Konstantin Doumer. The classical ballerina demonstrated her own skills derived from the Central Ballet of China Academy and the National Ballet of China, and placed third in the Moscow International Ballet Competition.

"An Evening of Contemporary Ballets" brought to New Jersey audiences by Carolyn Clark, artistic director of the NJB, with a professionalism rarely seen in theaters staging ballets, began with a thrilling "Allegro Brillante," the first movement of Peter Tchaikovsky's unfinished third piano concerto. It was choreographed by George Balanchine, and well danced by Vorobyeva and Jouravlev, who led five other skilled couples in a fine performance.

In "Emeralda Pas De Deux" — choreographed by Agrippina Vaganova after Peips, with music by Cesare Pugni and Riccardo Drigo — Sabovick-Bleich and Doumer danced beautifully to an actual classical dance with a Spanish flavor.

A truly emotionally gripping dance, which had the audience mesmerized just knowing that the couple dancing to "Dboe," meaning "Partners," was a married couple, was performed by the attractive Era Korotseva-Jouravleva and Andrei Jouravlev.

There was a strong intimacy, a chemistry between them, providing a more meaningful authenticity to the modern dance, which actually had been created for Jouravlev when he was with the Penn State Ballet. Kirill Schomogonev expertly choreographed the ballet with music by Franz Schubert and costumes by Paul McRae.

Ella Lazar, an alumnae of the New Jersey Ballet Co., who is still sorely missed by lovers of the ballet theater, served as choreographer of "Verdi Pas De Six," a neoclassical style, combining contemporary and classical variations. The music is from the ballet in Giuseppe Verdi's opera "Il Lombardi," with costumes by Paul McRae. It was superbly danced by Debra Sayles, You Qing Guo, Goddard, Theryoung, Iatsenko and Vorobyeva.

The New Jersey Ballet, which has been in residence at Kean for nearly 15 years, was designated a Major Arts Institution by the New Jersey State Council on the Arts in recognition of its artistic excellence, substantial programming and broad public service.

This honor enhances the extraordinary work of the New Jersey Ballet Co., and as far as audiences feel about this artistic endeavor right in their own backyard, one can account for the limitless possibilities of attracting more and more enthusiasts throughout the Metropolitan area.

Bravo! Bravo!



The Union County Arts Center, Rahway's restored 1928 vaudeville theater, will present legendary R&B diva Roberta Flack for one show Nov. 13 at 8 p.m.

Flack is a totally unique artist, whose 30-year career has seen number-one hits with "Killing Me Softly With His Song," "The First Time Ever I Saw Your Face," "Where Is the Love?," "Feel Like Makin' Love" and the dance classic "Uh-uh, Ooh-ooh, Look Out!"

Flack is the daughter of a church organist and started playing piano early enough to get a music scholarship and degree from Howard University. After some time spent studying, Flack was discovered singing at a club by jazz musician Les McCann and signed to Atlantic Records. Her first two albums were critically acclaimed, but produced no major hits; however, her career took off when a version of "Evan MacColl's" "The First Time Ever I Saw Your Face," from her first album, was included in the

movie "Play Misty for Me." The song soared to number one in 1972 and remained there for six weeks, becoming that year's biggest hit.

Flack followed it with the first of several duets with Howard classicist Donny Hathaway. "Where Is the Love?" "Killing Me Softly With His Song" became Flack's second number-one hit — staying in that spot for five weeks — in 1973, and after her third number-one hit in 1974 — "Feel Like Makin' Love" — Flack took a break to concentrate on recording and charitable causes. She charted several more times over the next few years, but was devastated in 1979 when her husband committed suicide. Disastrously, Flack was forced to find another partner and eventually did in Peabo Bryson, with whom she toured in 1980. The two recorded together in 1983, scoring a hit with "Tonight, I Celebrate My Love." Flack spent the remainder of the '80s touring and performing, often with orchestras, and also several

times with Miles Davis. She returned to the Top Ten once more in 1991 with "Set the Night to Music," a duet with Maxi Priest.

'Fight Club' director takes off the gloves

How does a man go about reasserting his masculinity in an increasingly feminized society? Why, he joins an after-hours club run by Brad Pitt, of course, where he can have the privilege of being humiliated so he can go to bed feeling better about himself. The next morning, he wakes up feeling refreshed and ready to start the new work day.

Unfortunately, things don't always move along this sensibly in "Fight Club" as it does tend to get a bit carried away in the end. However, it does provide a rather thrilling ride along the way, and it's another strong effort from director David Fincher, the highly touted director of "Seven," 1995, which I found to be excellent. If "Fight Club" falls just a bit shy of excellence, it's still a vast improvement over Fincher's highly disappointing "The Game," 1997, which, let's face it, was pretty dreadful.

In "Fight Club," Edward Norton plays an insurance adjuster for a major automobile company. He knows that his company produces shoddy merchandise, but that's neither here nor there. He just goes through the motions and does his job, which

primarily consists of cross-country business trips which take him from one time zone to the next. His schedule is all fouled up, and to make matters worse, he's addicted to coffee. As a result, he suffers from a major case of insomnia.

Fearing that he has narcolepsy while on the job, he sees a doctor who tells him that if he wants to know what real problems are, he should go visit a support group for men with testicular cancer. It's here that he meets a fellow, by the name of Bob Paulson, played by the rock singer Meat Loaf, who understandably assumes that Norton is there for the same reason he is. He encourages Norton to let out his pain by crying, which he does. Norton finds this to be so cathartic that he goes home feeling so emotionally drained that he goes right to bed and

sleeps like a baby, thus curing his night-time insomnia.

He finds this experience so fulfilling that he starts attending other support groups for AIDS, sickle-cell anemia, etc. It becomes addictive, but his insomnia appears to be permanently cured, until he begins noticing a mysterious woman attending all of his support group meetings. He finds out that her name is Maria Singer, played by Helena Bonham Carter, who follows him around as if she were some kind of ghost or phantom. Whoever she is, he finds her presence to be extremely disturbing.

One night while flying on one of his many business trips, Norton strikes up a conversation with a young man named Tyler Durden, played by Brad Pitt, an iconoclast who works as a projectionist at a movie theater but who nonetheless hands Norton a business card that reads "Paper Street Soap Company." Pitt correctly deduces that Norton's problem is an unhealthy obsession with consumerism, and that he spends too much time thinking about what he's going to order next from the Ikea catalog and the Horchow Collection.

When Norton returns home, he finds that he has no home to return to, as a mysterious explosion occurred in his apartment. Finding nowhere to stay for the night, he at first tries to call Carter, but is unable to reach her. He then calls Pitt, who invites him over to his place. Home for him is a public, dilapidated old mansion with no locks on the doors and a ceiling that constantly leaks when it rains. It's at this point that Norton's problems really begin.

"We are a generation of men raised by women," proclaims Pitt, who sees himself as the spokesperson for a generation of new angry young men. Pitt displays a Hemingwayesque swagger as Norton's dark alter ego, and delivers a bravura performance, while Norton himself is brilliant as always. "Fight Club" was adapted for the screen by Jim Uls at a novel by Chuck Palahniuk. The cinematography is by Jeff Cronenweh, whose somber, after-hours fight club scenes suggest something from a George Bellows canvas, particularly "Club Night," 1907, and "Stieg at Shark's," 1909. In this case, however, the gloves are definitely off.


