Roselle Park's 100th anniversary celebration last week brought the past and current officials together to the Borough Hall on Westfield Avenue. Standing against the back wall, resident and businesswoman Nanette Derillo, herself a former official, watched the ceremonies from the vantage point of a lineage in which both her grandfather and great-grandfather were residents when the community broke away from Union and was incorporated in 1901.

A few rows away Jarryd Delandry, 3, alternated between watching the crowd file in and staying close to his brother, Anthony, 8, and their parents. His family moved from Bayonne two years ago. They desired a safe, close-knit community and East Webster Avenue in the borough fit the bill.

Left Out

As the ceremony progressed, including the opening of a time capsule prepared 25 years ago, I reflected that with the advances in medicine, the two young Delaney brothers may have the opportunity to be present at the borough's second hundred-year remembrance.

The evening's event was part of the effort of the community's historical society to preserve the past. Current Mayor Joseph Delorio was gracious in welcoming the four living ex-mayors and a host of other officials who were present. He proudly noted that the event was being covered live on the local cable access station.

There is a quote that says the historian is the prophet looking backward. Jean Morro, a longtime resident, and present for the evening events, is especially adept at reeling off the names of residents who started in Roselle Park and went on to successful careers in business, law and medicine.

From its early origins, the community has been a magnet to ethnic groups looking for a better life. The current wave of the borough of Indian and Hispanic citizens are really no different.

Prior to the opening of the time capsule, State Sen. C. Louis Bassano was welcomed by the crowd. He even embraced former Mayor Eugene Carmody.

My memory darted to a time a little more than 25 years ago, when Bassano proposed the Roselle Park Police Department be merged into Union's force. The resulting headline in *The Daily Journal* brought an angry crowd to the borough meeting for Carmody to deal with. There was no hugging that night.

The political battles in Roselle Park were furious. But this night former rivals like ex-mayors Virginia McKenny and Carmody were all smiles. The late Union GOP leader, Earl Henwood, once quipped that he was convinced it was something in the water that made normal people fight so hard in Roselle Park.

McKenny said, that any time a mayor in Roselle Park saw a crowd present in the amount of the evening they had cause to worry. Actually, the time capsule for the evening had been misplaced and later rediscovered by borough Tax Assessor Paul Endler in the local library basement. Borough historical expert Pat Pagnetti praised the event and spoke about the "friends in the room."

The friends Pagnetti spoke about were the diverse group that made the community move forward. Edmund Burke once wrote that "history is a pact between the dead, the living and the yet unborn."

From the Derillo family to Jarryd Delaney and into the future, Roselle Park through its historical society were keeping the pact alive.

Augustine, Bassano to retire Union County districts will see plenty of new faces

Two longtime Republican Union County legislators will not seek re-election this year, causing a turnover in legislative seats not seen in many years.

Assemblyman Alan Augustine of Scotch Plains announced last week he will retire effective Saturday due to health reasons. "I do not feel I can continue to serve my constituents in District 22, to continue my legislative agenda in Trenton, or to continue as chairman of the State Government Committee, as I have done," Augustine said in a statement.

State Sen. C. Louis Bassano of Union announced at Saturday's Union County Republican Committee convention that he will not seek re-election to a sixth term. He plans to accept a job offer with the New Jersey Sports & Exposition Authority within the next month to become director of government relations and economic development.

Upon officially taking the position, Bassano said he will submit a letter of resignation for his senate seat.

The decisions of the two legislators to not seek re-election leave several openings. State Senate President Donald DiFrancesco of Scotch Plains moved up to acting governor after Gov. Christine Whitman was appointed to President George W. Bush's cabinet, and will run for the position in the June primary. Assemblyman Richard Bagger will seek DiFrancesco's 22nd District senate seat. Augustine's retirement leaves both Assembly seats open for elections this year.

The Union County Republican Committee is expected to select a candidate Tuesday to fill Augustine's vacancy, which takes effect April 31, and another to run for Bagger's open seat. Among the candidates so far in the running for the 22nd District are Cranford Township Committeeman Thomas Denny, former Scotch Plains mayor Gabriel Spera, Thomas Kean Jr. of Westfield and Green Brook Mayor Patricia Walsh, said County Chairman Ronald Frigerio.

Walsh and Kean both ran for the 7th Congressional District seat vacated by Bob Franks last year. Kean finished

second in the primary while Walsh dropped out of the race before June.

The 22nd District, considered a safe GOP district, includes Berkeley Heights, Clark, Cranford, Fanwood, Garwood, Mountainside, New Providence, Scotch Plains, Westfield, Winfield and parts of Middlesex, Morris and Somerset counties.

In the 21st District, Assemblyman Kevin O'Toole is expected to move up to Bassano's senate position with at least four candidates gunning for O'Toole's open seat: Summit Councilman Dr. Eric Munoz; Roselle Park Mayor Joseph Delorio; former Springfield Township Committeeman Harry Pappas, who is running for the Springfield school board, and former freeholder Linda DiGiovanni of Union. Frigerio expects a candidate to be named to run for O'Toole's Assembly seat at a convention on Wednesday.

The 21st District includes Union, Summit, Springfield, Kenilworth, Roselle Park and parts of Essex County and also is considered a safe Republican district.

Despite the Legislature working on a new legislative map, Frigerio does not expect big changes with redistricting in Union County. He said there is a bill pending in the Legislature this week that would push the filing deadline for the June primary from April 12 to April 19 with redistricting results scheduled to be released April 7.

A tie is expected among the 10-member, bipartisan Apportionment Commission, which would give the commission another month to break the tie after an 11th member is appointed by the State Supreme Court Chief Justice Deborah Portiz.

"We can't wait," Frigerio said of the county GOP. Each candidate for the local legislative seats are from towns that he believes will not be affected by redistricting. One political insider, however, said it is too early to make decisions since changes to the legislative districts are afoot.

Augustine, who served on the Union County Board of Freeholders from 1982 to 1987 and again for a term in the early 1990s, was chosen to complete the unexpired term of Bob Franks, who was elected to Congress, in 1992. Augustine was elected to a full Assembly term in 1993 and re-elected three more times, most recently in 1999. He was a member of the Scotch Plains Township Council for 16 years and was mayor for three years.

Republicans select three for freeholder and one for sheriff

Union County Republicans selected candidates for freeholder and sheriff during their annual convention on Saturday at Scotch Plains-Fanwood High School.

Paul Marks of Elizabeth will join Roselle Park Councilman Ricky Badillo and Andrew MacDonald of Fanwood to run for freeholder while Nicholas Berkey of Union will run for sheriff. The 326 delegates voted by acclamation to nominate the four candidates.

MacDonald, who was unsuccessful in his bid for freeholder when he ran with Juan Fernandez and George Gore in 1998, served 12 years on the Fanwood Borough Council. A veteran who served a year Vietnam, MacDonald is a teacher at St. Mary's in Elizabeth after spending 20 years in sales.

Committee seeks volunteers

Volunteers are needed for a vital program serving the Superior Court, Family Division — Family Court — in Union County. There is a particular need for bilingual volunteers.

Nancy Spano Yurek, coordinator of the Union County Juvenile Conference Committee Program, is seeking adults willing to spend one night a month volunteering for their local Juvenile Conference Committee.

The Juvenile Conference Committees serve under the authority of the Superior Court, Family Division. A JCC is a six- to nine-member citizen volunteer panel appointed by the Family Division Judge that acts as an arm of the court. In a confidential manner, the JCC hears and decides such matters involving alleged juvenile offenders as the court refers to it. The juvenile, the parents and/or guardians and the complainant are invited to discuss voluntarily with the committee the offense and other related factors.

The committee considers the facts and then makes a recommendation to the judge for a resolution that aids in the juvenile's rehabilitation. If the judge approves, the recommendations become a court order which is monitored by the JCC. Upon successful completion of all conditions set down in the recommendations, the case is dismissed. If the obligations are not fulfilled, the case is returned to the

He is expected to face the same Democratic candidates he lost to in 1998: incumbents Daniel Sullivan of Elizabeth, Mary Ruotolo of Westfield and Lewis Mingo Jr. of Plainfield. Sheriff Ralph Froehlich of Elizabeth also will be completing his sixth term this year.

Badillo was re-elected to a second term last year as the 2nd Ward representative on the Roselle Park Borough Council. A corrections officer, he has been vocal in his opposition to the county's plan to close the old jail and lay off almost 100 officers to meet an \$8-million budget shortfall.

Berkey unsuccessfully ran for Township Committee in the Township of Union the past two years. Marks, a first-time candidate for public office, is employed at Snelling Personnel in Summit.

The main event of Saturday's convention was the nomination of Acting Gov. and State Senate President

Donald DiFrancesco of Scotch Plains as the party's candidate for governor in the June primary.

DiFrancesco said touched on three main issues he plans to concentrate on in the campaign: property tax relief, healthcare and tax rebates for senior citizens.

He said he will make it a point to campaign with the freeholder candidates and expects his running for governor to have a positive impact for the party in countywide races.

"In an off year, it's definitely going to help the freeholder candidates."

Last year, former Congressman Bob Franks of Berkeley Heights ran for U.S. Senate but could not outpoll Democrat Jon Corzine in Union County. Franks carried 12 municipalities but only garnered 44 percent of the vote countywide. President George W. Bush also did not fare well within the county or statewide in last fall's election.

Corrections officers protest outside jail

Continuing their verbal assault on the Board of Chosen Freeholders and county manager, corrections officers rallied against proposed layoffs outside the county jail in Elizabeth on March 22 despite heavy rains and wind. Carrying signs declaring "I Want My Daddy to Come Home Alive" and "Union County Jail security for your safety not for profit," members of Policemen's Benevolent Association Local 199, which represents more than 300 Union County corrections officers, were joined by their families and corrections officers and police officers from throughout the state.

PBA Local 199 invited several speakers to the podium during the two-hour rally, including the executive vice president of the New Jersey State PBA and a representative of the Rhode Island Brotherhood of Corrections Officers, among others.

Union County will close the old jail adjacent to the county courthouse in Elizabeth effective Sunday and lay off 99 corrections officers. The third floor of the old jail will remain open indefinitely until the transfer of inmates to the new jail and to a drug treatment center in Newark are complete in a few months.

A drastic reduction in the number of state inmates housed at the county jail starting last summer resulted in less reimbursement to the county, causing an \$8-million shortfall in the 2001 county budget.

The union had to go to federal court last week to appeal a decision by Superior Court Judge Miriam Span to enforce a court order to prevent any job actions, such as an alleged sickout on March 16. "We saw a lot of powerful, political people who didn't want to see this rally take place," said Peter Femia, state delegate for PBA 199. "We fought court orders and won."

"The accusations against PBA 199 are unfounded and without merit," Femia said. "We're joined in the defiance of tyranny" by corrections officers and police officers from around the region.

Union representatives continued to bring up points they have raised at freeholder meetings for the past month, calling the layoff plan unsafe for inmates, corrections officers and county residents. The union contends that the new jail, built in 1989 and across the street from the old jail, is not adequately equipped to handle maximum-security inmates. In the past, only minor offenders were housed there, Femia said.

"Government is supposed to exist to serve the public and protect it, not to run a profit or protect shareholders," Femia said. He said locks on cells at the new jail are ill-equipped for maximum-security inmates. Union County Manager Michael Lapolla, however, said there have not been any problems with the locks in terms of escapes and the new jail is capable of safely housing all types of prisoners. Locks are periodically broken but repaired and upgraded as needed. "The new jail was built with the idea of closing the old jail," said Lapolla, a freeholder at the time the new jail was built.

As of Monday, 74 corrections officers slated to be laid off had been offered jobs by the state, Lapolla said, and several more had been offered positions with other counties. Union County conducted a job fair last month to officers who will be laid off.



Junior Achievement marks 50th anniversary



Choreographer's Jewish roots reach into the future with dance

Through the years, children of Holocaust survivors have expressed their innermost feelings and emotions in thoughts, in prayers, in lectures, in books, in music. Carolyn Dorfman of Short Hills, choreographer, performer and teacher, who has a Union-based office, Carolyn Dorfman Dance Company, has revealed her feelings and emotions in a deeply creative piece of dance called "Mayne Mentshn," meaning "My People."

The full-length work, which celebrates Dorfman's Eastern European Jewish heritage, choreographed in

two parts, includes "The Klezmer Sketch" and "The American Dream." It was staged last week in a premiere performance at the F.M. Kirby Shakespeare Theater on the campus of Drew University, Madison.

"The most significant aspect for me of creating this work is that as a child of Holocaust survivors, my parents always said, 'Remember,'" Dorfman said the other morning during a chat. "Remember that six million died." What drove me to make this work is that six million lived. It is the life I'm interested in — the joys, the laughs, the humor of my culture, and in a way I'm really creating a vibrant legacy.

That's what really drove me.

"It's the life of the people, and my family and the American dream of the immigrants coming to America and being a daughter of immigrants in America."

She sighed. "How do you stay connected to this heritage?" In "The Klezmer Sketch," the Carolyn Dorfman Dance Company's eight-member ensemble, three men and five women, presented the work in four sections. The sections are called "My Father's Solo" and "The Three Sisters," which are "personal interpretations of the personalities that nurtured" the artist. "The Table" and "The Arrangement," according to Dorfman, "reflect the more universal experience of holiday meals and arranged marriage, shared by many cultures." It all is played out to the original score by Greg Wall of Livingston and performed by his band, Hasidic New Wave. Wall also performs "My Father's Solo."

Dorfman had explained that her intent was "to mine the exuberant, joyful, yet soulful quality of Klezmer music that inspired me to explore Jewish gesture, expression, ritual and character as springboards for contemporary work. In Klezmer music, the various instruments used such as violin and clarinet, take on human characteristics that celebrates the uniqueness of the Jewish journey, and yet, the extraordinary universal connections that it engenders."

Her "American Dream," she mentioned, expresses the complexities of her growing up in a European Jewish community in America and the problems she encountered. "They represent the constant struggle of all immigrant cultures as they struggle to maintain the identity of their cultural roots while becoming a part of

another, larger whole." "The American Dream" explores the questions — "What is the essence of our unique legacies? What are the inextricably linked values? What is the 'fragile thread?'"

"These pieces," declared Dorfman, "are really a tribute to my family — my parents — and I think that is what it is for me. The joy of opening night — it speaks to a special group of Jewish cultures. But it's very clear that it resonates this universally. People didn't have to be Jewish to have a connection. What I hope, actually," she said, "is that in many ways, it reminds them of the legacy and heritage and what is beautiful about it. Fifty years after World War II, we defined it by the loss of six million. All of my family was wiped out. This work, 'Mayne Mentshn,' is a legacy to my children. It is something that they can latch on to. It is a tradition and passion about life that you end up with. That was a tribute to my father to reach the highest highs and the lowest lows and to live the full spectrum of life." Dorfman's parents, Henry and Mala Dorfman, "who came out of the Polish community in Europe, now reside in Michigan."

Dorfman explained that her "Mayne Mentshn" has been "a two-season project. The Klezmer part was created last year. This year, I wrote 'The American Dream.' It really is a two-year project." An important one, to say the least.

And with her creative efforts, Dorfman has said that "I finally acknowledge all of the strengths, trials and more importantly, humor that has sustained 'my people.' The dance is a tribute to my family, from my nuclear and extended family to the human race at large. It is about a spirit and passion for life, people and truth. I am

ready to celebrate the joyous, soulful qualities of Jewish character, gesture, ritual and humor. Through my art, I want to honor the tragedy of the past by celebrating my roots through music and dance and move forward with spirit and optimism into the 21st century."

Dorfman's company is celebrating its 18th season in New Jersey. It has appeared in major theater, dance festivals and universities and has conducted choreography, teaching and performing residencies regionally and nationally. Dorfman, herself, has been designated as a "Distinguished Artist" by the New Jersey State Council on

the Arts, and she has been awarded four of NJSCA's fellowship grants and appointed a Principal Affiliate of the New Jersey performing Arts Center in Newark. She also received the 1994 Prudential Foundation Prize for Non-Profit Leadership. Dorfman is a former trustee of ArtPride/NJ, a founding member of Dance/NJ, a current trustee of The Yard in Massachusetts, and a member of the NJ Israel Commission.

"The music in this piece of work is by Greg Wall," she said, "and it is incredible."

So is Carolyn Dorfman.

Acclaimed cabaret performer to grace The Manor's Le Dome

"What You'd Call a Dream" will become a reality for Jaymie Meyer, when she appears tonight in the cabaret area of the Manor in West Orange — Le Dome.

The actress-singer will be bringing love songs, original songs, songs with stories, classical songs — "a real mix."

Meyer, who recently released her debut solo CD, "What You'd Call a Dream," will find it "an exciting experience" to appear at Le Dome. The title song had been written by Craig Carmelia, a Tony-nominated and MAC Award winning songwriter. "I've never appeared at the Manor," Meyer said during a recent chat. "I came to the Manor several years ago at a social party to celebrate my grandmother's 90th birthday, and I was very impressed."

She explained that "a number of my colleagues have appeared at the Manor, and they suggested I call Mary Jane Frankel, the public relations person. I brought her my CD. She listened, was interested and invited me to be a part of the Manor. And so, here I am."

The singer said that she became interested in music at a very early age. "It was very early on," she recalled. "I was about 7 years old. You see, my mother, Eileen Todd, was a professional singer. She was pursuing her career, but actually, on her way to California, she got married. And that was that. But it was in my blood at the age of 7 and I knew. Nobody pushed me into it."

Born in Miami, Fla., Meyer lived in South Orange until she was 11 years old. Then I went back to Florida for a while. My mom's family was from the New Jersey area. And I have cousins," she chuckled, "many, many cousins in Short

Hills, Verona, the Oranges.

"And I knew, quite early, that I would follow a musical theater career — to act and to sing," she said. "Basically, I went to Syracuse University and received a B.S.A. in musical theater, and essentially, I've been working at this career ever since. In New York, I worked on the soaps and did feature TV. I also served as a spokesperson."

Meyer said that she was "thrilled when I received the Bistro Award in cabaret work. I was really surprised and thrilled. It was unexpected. The CD came out in May, and it has been well received across the country, and even in London and at the Kennedy Center."

She debuted her one woman show, "the one I'm going to do at the Manor, at Odet's in New Hope, Pa. I love story songs. The lyrics are very important to me."

Meyer reiterated, "It's so lovely to be here at the Manor. I'm just thrilled to be here. And I know it'll be fun."



Transition from painting to photography is natural transition for artist

Recent and continuing work in his black-and-white "Chiaroscuro" portfolio of archival still lifes will be mounted by celebrated photography artist Howard Nathenson for his solo exhibit, Saturday to April 30, at Swain Galleries in Plainfield.

The exhibit is one of Swain's rare showing of photographic art. Each Nathenson image is limited to 25.

Beginning his professional fine-art career close to 30 years ago, Nathenson made a prestigious debut in 1972 when his oil paintings were selected for two group exhibitions at the Whitney Museum of American Art, New York: the Annual, now the Biennial, and "Extraordinary Images."

Nathenson did not suddenly turn to photography, explaining, "I found I could accomplish more of what I wanted with the same subjects if I employed black-and-white photography rather than painting or drawing. The transition occurred quite naturally."

Added the Cliffside Park artist, "Looking through a view camera, I spend hours setting up my still lifes just as if I were preparing to paint. I think of my photographs as paintings."

Nathenson uniquely combines traditional and advanced hi-tech methods. His choice is a wooden field camera with its 4-by-5-inch negative, still very much in use for landscape and

architectural photographs, and the latest archival digital printing known as piezography. Further, he prints on archival papers such as Epson archival matte and Somerset enhanced watercolor paper.

Nathenson's preference for large negative is specific. "I seek spectacularly detailed images and I print them to bring out the edges, contrasts, textures and those intensities in the shadowy portions of the negativity." While his work demonstrates the chiaroscuro qualities of dark and light used by painters as far back as the late Renaissance, he likes to apply a tonal scale to his interpretations by photographing his objects, for example, through translucent fabrics.

"I like to give people a feeling of a mysterious world, possibly metaphorical, even provocative, depending on

how the viewer sorts the visual stimuli," he noted.

Among his numerous and significant group and solo exhibitions are New York City shows at the 92nd Street "Y," the Drawing Center, the Interchurch Center, Artists Space, the Kohn, Pederson Fox Gallery, and a collaborative work with Eva Capobianco at Snug Harbor Cultural Center, Staten Island.

Nathenson's "Chiaroscuro" exhibit will open with a reception from 5 to 7 p.m. Saturday, and continue Tuesdays through Fridays, 9:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m., and Saturdays to 4 p.m. at Swain Galleries, 703 Watchung Ave., Plainfield. For additional inquiries, call (908) 756-1707.

Cranford Rep's 'West Side' lacks tension, urgency

Some plays depend heavily on only one or two elements to truly work, and "West Side Story" is one such title. From the opening measures of Leonard Bernstein's famed "Prologue" — "buh daaaaaaaah dup, da de da" — there is tension.

On the first page of the script, librettist Arthur Laurents sets the scene as "the last, hot days of summer in the east 40s." Anyone who knows an "un-air-conditioned New York in the summer knows what that means — tension.

Lyricist Stephen Sondheim adds his contribution: "Boy, boy, crazy boy, keep cool, boy" — more tension.

Where then were the tension and life-and-death urgency on the stage of Cranford High School Sunday afternoon when the Cranford Repertory Theater Company presented this classic musical?

The responsibility for this lies with the director upon whom it's incumbent to "conduct" the script with the precision and meticulousness of Bernstein's score. Furthermore, in the unchoreographed numbers, director Arlene Ur-Britt often allowed her actors to sing directly to the audience rather than continuing to participate in the scene in song, adding another distraction.

Many elements of good theater were present — a functional set, effective — if sometimes mis-cued — lighting, a phenomenal orchestra under the baton of Ginger Haseldin, plus two powerhouse performances; but unfortunately, this reviewer often found himself reading his program.

To the credit of co-choreographers Cindy Smith and Kristen Baldoni, they did not try to impose Jerome Robbins' legendary choreography on non-Robbins dancers, but the result was a mixed bag. Often many of the dancers — and, remember, this is a dance show — seemed to be "just doing" the moves they'd rehearsed rather than using their bodies to communicate the dramatic intention of a given moment. Of the cast, only Jennifer Hanselman as Velma, Josh Lieberman as Riff, Michelle Mulvihill as Anita and Eric Witkowski as Action seemed truly comfortable with

choreographed dramatic expression.

While the "Prologue" began the show making it clear that most of these young men were not up to task in terms of choreography, the "Dance at the Gym" was a marvel, particularly the "Mambo" sequence, wherein both Lieberman and Mulvihill were featured.

However, while the "Dance at the Gym" and the Act Two ballet sequence worked very effectively, some numbers seemed under-choreographed or repetitious, such as "America," wherein it was clear that the women could have handled a little more of a challenge.

And, please, could some theatrical authority pass a law prohibiting the use of rows of dancers facing the audience all doing the same choreography? It works for "42nd Street" and "Anything Goes," but not here.

The sound design was probably the only technical element to truly detract. With some principals wearing body mikes and others not, and an omnipresent hum in the system, this was a very difficult show on the ears.

As Tony, Nathan Mello demonstrated a handsome optimism and a simply beautiful voice. His acting, however, did not carry Tony from "point A to point B," as it were. His acting intention on the rapturous "Maria" and "Tonight" was identical to that in the earlier "Something's Coming." Not a reviewer to be suckered in by a "pretty voice," I still must comment on Mello's incredible use of his instrument, getting maximum mileage out of his upper register, using his pianissimo and falsetto to excellent effect.

Vivian Kalugdan fell into the ingenu trap of being sweet — and not much else. Her vocal performance was impressive, especially when one

considers that the classically trained alto tackled a soprano role with such aplomb. However, like many lower-voiced singers, her high notes had only two volume choices — deafening or just not there, which often over-powered the lighter quality of Mello's voice at the end of such numbers as "Tonight" and "One Hand, One Heart," both of which should end tenderly, not dramatically.

As Bernardo, Javier Jimenez also lacked the urgency of the burgeoning tensions between the gangs, but his focus was not without its merits. Lieberman's Riff was relatively solid, but the actor lacked the presence — either physical or dramatic — to be believable as the leader of this all-powerful gang.

However, none of this mattered if Mulvihill or Witkowski were on stage. Both actors imbued their roles with a moment-to-moment connection, allowing us to see them actually "live" the scenes they were in — affected by what transpires, responding rather than acting, thinking throughout — just like real people in

real situations. Mulvihill simply sizzled as Anita. Her comfort and ease on stage made it difficult to look at anyone else in her scenes, and her ease with the acting, vocals and choreography demonstrate her status as a true triple-threat actress. Her performance — particularly "A Boy Like That" — was filled with passion and energy, as well as a focus which made them accessible to the audience. Brava!

Witkowski's power and presence made this reviewer wonder why Riff and not Action was the leader of the Jets. While others "did the staging they'd been told," Witkowski moved fluidly, if menacingly, through Action's life. Like Mulvihill, he commands your attention, even if silent and off to the side.

Only from these two did the audience get the tension this script demands. Whether it be sexual from Mulvihill, or violent from Witkowski.

Patti LuPone explores 'matters of the heart' in concert

Concert-goers at the Paper Mill Playhouse in Millburn March 20 were wise to bring their passports, for a rare and unique journey was in store. Add to that a pocketful of tissues, and the audience was set to go.

Gracing the Millburn boards was Patti LuPone, star of the Broadway and London stage, film and television. Her concert — based on her album, "Matters of the Heart" — was a vocal voyage through life's highs and lows and how each of these pluck certain strings in our hearts.

The night of the concert, LuPone was battling something of a tadpole in her throat — not a full-grown frog, but in the general family. However, being a consummate musician, LuPone simply made effective, dramatic use of the very slight restrictions imposed on her impressive instrument. Only die-hard LuPone devotees would have known the singer was not at her usual best.

Resplendent in a tiered burgundy gown in Act One and a black, strapless satin gown in Act Two, LuPone emerged on stage to resounding applause and greeted the crowd: "Good evening, ladies and gentlemen. I am Loretta Young," setting a whimsical tone for the proceedings. "As Sylvia Plath once said — or was it Dean Martin? — 'Love — ain't it a kick in the head.'"

LuPone was joined on stage by a pianist and a string quartet, which created an almost magical feel as the great lady led us through life's joys and sorrows — all in song, with anecdotes interspersed throughout.

With most of her material taken from the aforementioned CD, she peppered the repertoire with some numbers not found on the album. Some of the additions worked very nicely in context, others did not; furthermore, some of the album's songs not included were missed by this reviewer, inspiring wishes for a longer concert, at least long enough to include the riotous, Gallic "I Regret Everything" and her sweet handling of "The Boy Next Door" from "Meet Me in St. Louis."

Opening with strains of "Love Makes the World Go 'Round" from "Carnival," LuPone informed the crowd that the evening was meant to celebrate "love in all its forms: blissful, passionate, painful — the mysteries of the heart."

While the arrangement of "Wonderful Guy" from "South Pacific" — a

hesitating, syncopated drive — made the over-performed number new to the ears, LuPone worked to a little too hard to put the song across, perhaps because of the power needed in the song's final measures, notes of LuPone's not in fighting condition on this particular night. However, she moved nicely into "God Only Knows What I'd Be Without You" and "Easy to Be Hard," neither found on the album and both welcome on the Millburn stage.

While the material followed something of a "plot" — young love to adult love, to lust, to mature love, to love of parents and children and one's self — LuPone kept the evening varied, primarily with some very effectively comedic numbers. Known for such dramatic and tragic roles as Eva Peron in "Evita," Fantine in "Les Misérables," and Norma Desmond in "Sunset Boulevard," LuPone showed an incredible comic flair with numbers such as "My Shattered Illusions," "I Never Do Anything Twice" and "Better Off Dead," during which she destroyed a long-stem rose in a "he loves me not"-cum-PMS manner.

Flipping the coin, her delicate emotional handling of "The Place Where Love Resides," "Not a Day Goes By," "Sand and Water" and "Back to Before" not only brought tears to the

eyes, but at times had them literally running down the cheeks. Only a truly great performer could get so much mileage out of material by doing so seemingly little. With the precision of a neurosurgeon, LuPone cut right to the heart of the matter and transfused the listener with the pain and catharsis of the singer's plight. Masterfully done!

Perhaps her Act One finale best summed up any matters of the heart — "Being Alive" from Stephen Sondheim's "Company." LuPone performed this number several years ago in the now-legendary tribute to Sondheim at Carnegie Hall, but her performance here was leaps and bounds beyond her New York rendition. The number encapsulated all of love's hopes, fears, joys and pains, and LuPone filled every note and lyric with a humanity that reached from her soul directly into yours. What a finale that was!

LuPone made a stellar name for herself on the Broadway stage, so the inclusion of some contemporary pop numbers initially surprised the ears of her fans. Her simple, pianissimo rendition of Eric Carmen's "The Air That I Breathe" wove such a spell that the song was followed by a hushed moment of silence the audience seemed unable to break with applause, and her treatment of Dan Fogelberg's "Another Auld Lang Syne" was handled with amazingly beautiful lyrical imagery. However, not all the pop choices worked. Gilbert O'Sullivan's "Alone Again, Naturally" was too much of a pity party and didn't fit with the mindset of the other songs' lyrics, and although

dedicated sweetly "to my family," Cindy Lauper's "Time After Time" just didn't work at all.

Receiving not one, but two standing ovations, LuPone's encore of "The Way You Look Tonight" — complete with a vocal "doo-wop" section supplied by her musicians — and a Scottish folk song, taught to LuPone by an old woman in a pub, ended the evening not on a "high note," as one might expect, but rather with simplici-

ty and beauty. Just like the happier matters of the heart.

But the fact remains that for the entire time, LuPone held the audience in the palm of her hand, completely enthralled. A quintessential performer, comfortable and accomplished in every media, she was able to stand stock still and do nothing more than cock one eyebrow and lift one corner of her mouth — no words were necessary. She communicates, and that's

what performance is about — communicating an emotional experience to someone else. LuPone's stage presence was palpable, as was her love of the material she was performing.

Last week's concert left this reviewer with nothing but good memories and two nagging questions: When is the Paper Mill bringing her back? And can the concert please be longer next time?

Jeffrin wows audience at Sunday concert at 'Y'

The simple little cabaret room at the YM-YWHA of Union County on Green Lane in Union, turned into a full-fledged concert hall Sunday afternoon as the richly resounding voice of the versatile performer Hal Jeffrin bounced off the walls and into the hearts of the patrons.

This unique man from Syracuse, whose operatic voice can thrill an audience — whether he is singing excerpts from Broadway shows, lively Yiddish tunes, beautiful Hebrew songs and prayers, or arias from operas — had the audience, mostly senior citizens, in a dither last Sunday. Not only has he appeared in Carnegie Hall, Off-Broadway, top musicals on the touring circuit, on the Borscht Belt up on the Catskills, in soap operas, but ideally in his own synagogue in New City, N.Y., as cantor to 920 families.

Handsome, endearing, even sexy at times, Jeffrin, adorned in a red jacket and black pants, offered a repertoire of music that could have been presented successfully on a Broadway stage, in a night club or even up at Le Dome at The Manor in West Orange. He was melodically accompanied at the piano by Bruce Levine. Jeffrin's professionalism, mingled with warmth and tenderness, took magical hold of his audience and remained so long after he was gone from the scene. He opened his show with "Yerushalayim," then went into excerpts from "Man of LaMancha."

Jeffrin called his next segment, "The Borscht Belt Meets Broadway," and sang "Bi Mir Bist Du Shain" in English, and then in Jewish, when suddenly, to his delight, there was audience participation. Then came a Jewish lullaby followed by numbers from "Finian's Rainbow" — Broadway music with a Broadway voice. He was astounding. In "an American theater classic," Jeffrin sang from his "very favorite composer, Jerome Kern, the highlight of 'Show Boat,' 'Old Man River.'" And it seemed as if the whole building was shaking. He did a wonderful rendition of "I'm Going to Live 'Til I Die."

Then Jeffrin talked about his son, who just got his driving license, and his daughter, who has just entered Cornell University. "I gotta sing a lot of songs," he mused.

Jeffrin explained that his "earliest drive was to be an opera singer." And the first year, he came to New York City, "I was invited to sing in Carnegie Hall. I auditioned for Broadway shows, and I was lucky enough to get parts in some of the shows that eventually folded." He traveled around the country, appeared in such soaps as "One Life to Live," and "Edge of Night." "I had a wonderful career up to then, and I appeared with some big names.

"But when I learned about my Jewish roots, I decided to go to cantorial school to study to become a cantor. Now, I am able to combine both careers."

Jeffrin continued to thrill his "Y" audience with Englebert Humperdinck's "Quando, Quando," during which he moved sensuously, and flirted with the women in the audience. When he sang, "My Yiddish Mama," in English, everyone pulled out handkerchiefs. Imagine what it might have been like had he sung it in Yiddish? Then he sang some Hebrew songs, such as "Zenna, Zenna," and "Shalom Aleichem," and from "Fiddler on the Roof," "If I Were A Rich Man," "Sunrise, Sunset" and "To Life."

At this point, the audience was in its glory. And there was no way that this man could get away without an encore. And his encore? "Romania" — a piece of music that not only shook the building once more, but shook the audience into complete submission. It was a performance the senior citizens at the "Y" would not soon forget.



Nissan Frontier upgrades appearance, upgrades for 2001

The popular Nissan Frontier compact truck lineup receives a dramatic new appearance, interior upgrades and the addition of a range of new factory-installed supercharged V6 models for the upcoming 2001 model year. The new Frontier line goes on sale at Nissan retailers nationwide in late summer, while supercharged models go on sale in late fall.

The radically redesigned 2001 Frontier 14 different models, including Regular Cab, King Cab, Crew Cab and Desert Runner and three trim levels, giving buyers the ability to choose a truck that perfectly fits their needs and budget.

The Frontier's new exterior, created at Nissan Design International Inc., in La Jolla, Calif., offers a simple, tough, "machine" aesthetic with a powerful front grille and bumper, tall hoodline, oversized headlights and large fender featuring visible divot holes and bolts which hold the fender flares to the body. Additional enhancements include new fog lamps adopted from the 2000 Maxima, new tailgate cover and standard tailgate lock.

For the interior, a new instrument cluster with reversible gauges has been added, along with new seat fabric with optional leather on supercharged models and SE Crew Cab, new steering wheel and enlarged knobs and switches. Cruise control switches have now been located on the steering wheel and a new lineup of audio systems, including an available in-dash 6-disc CD changer, has been added.

Along with Regular Cab and King Cab models, the 2001 Frontier line continues to offer Crew Cab and Desert Runner models.

Introduced as a 2000 model, the Frontier Crew Cab was the first compact truck with four full-size forward-hinged doors offered for sale in the United States. It is available in 4-wheel and 2-wheel drive. The 4x2 Desert Runner is a V6 King Cab compact truck that features the same heavy duty chassis, ride height and stance as the rugged Frontier 4x4 V6.

In addition to a choice of a 143-horsepower 2.4-liter inline 4-cylinder and 170-horsepower 3.3-liter SOHC V6, a new factory-installed supercharged version of the 3.3-liter V6 will be offered in select 4x4 and 4x2 models called SC. The new supercharged engine produces an estimated 210 horsepower and 240 ft-lbs of torque. Additional details on the

supercharged V6 will be available closer to its late fall 2000 on-sale date.

Frontier XE Regular Cab 4x2
The 2001 Frontier model lineup begins with the XE Regular Cab 4x2 model. It features a 143-horsepower DOHC 16-valve 4-cylinder engine with an electronic multi-purpose fuel injection system, rear-wheel drive and

a 5-speed manual transmission.

An independent double wishbone front suspension with stabilizer bar and rear rigid axle with multi-leaf springs provides car-like handling and ride, while the power-assisted front vented disc/rear drum brake system with standard rear anti-lock brakes offers secure braking control.

Other standard equipment includes 15-inch styled steel wheels with Bright/Silver Sparkle paint, 225/70R15 all-season steel-belted tires, rear step bumper, woven cloth bench seat, LCD odometer with two trip meters, tinted glass, full carpeting, cupholder, power-assisted steering, dual outside mirrors and 3,500 pound towing capacity with manual transmission.

Standard safety equipment includes supplemental front dual air bags with

a passenger-side air bag shut-off switch, front crumple zone, energy-absorbing steering column, hood buckling creases, pipe-style steel side-door guard beams and a 3-point ALR/ELR seat belt system with seat belt pretensioners. Regular Cab XE 4x2 is available with automatic transmission, air conditioning, Popular Package and Body Color Package and Value Truck Package.

Frontier XE King Cab 4x2

The popular King Cab — Nissan created the original extended cab compared truck in 1977 — comes standard with a 60/40 split bench seat and carries all of the added equipment found on XE Regular Cab, along with additional seating for two passengers in the fold-down rear jump seats. Frontier XE King Cab 4x2 is available with a choice of 5-speed manual or an optional 4-speed automatic transmission.

To offer customers an easy way to order the Frontier they want, a number of value-oriented packages are available on the XE King Cab 4x2 model. Among the choices are automatic transmission, Popular Package, Body Color Package, Value Truck Package, Power Package and Deluxe Package.

Frontier King Cab 4x4

The Frontier King Cab 4x4 is available in three different models — XE, SE, and SC. XE and SE models come standard with a 3.3-liter V6 engine and the SC model features the factory-installed supercharged engine.

All XE models feature 15-inch styled steel wheels with P265/70R15 tires, auto locking hubs, woven cloth bucket seats and dual black outside mirrors and a center console with cup holders.

Adding to the XE model, then sporty SE come standard with 16-inch wheels with P265/70R16 tires, dual body-color outside mirrors, sliding rear tinted window, privacy glass, air conditioning, leather-wrapped steering wheel and shift knob, fog lamps and variable intermittent windshield wipers.

Besides the supercharged engine, all SC models come with 17-inch aluminum alloy wheels with P265/55R17 tires, body-color fender

flairs, knit bucket seats, 100-watt AM/FM/CD audio system and titanium-colored gauges.

Many option packages are available on the 4x4 Cab models including 4-speed automatic transmission, limited-slip differential, Value Truck Package on XE, standard on SE; Power Package on XE, SE, standard on SC; Deluxe Package on XE, SE and SC; Utility Package on XE, standard on SE and SC; Sunroof Package on SE, Premium Package on SC.

Frontier Desert Runner

Frontier Desert Runner is built on the heavy-duty 4-wheel drive Frontier chassis, giving the 2-wheel drive the same rigidity, ride height, ground clearance and tough look as the 4-wheel drive model. Standard equipment on Frontier Desert Runner is the SOHC 3.3-liter V6 engine, and, at roughly 500 pounds lighter than a 4x4 Frontier King Cab V6, Desert Runner offers the best power-to-weight ratio of any Frontier pickup. Additionally, a supercharged 3.3-liter V6 engine, which produces an estimated 210 horsepower and 240 ft-lbs of torque, is available with the Desert Runner SC.

Similar on the 4x4 Frontier V6 models, the new Desert Runner is equipped with standard P265/70R15 tires (XE, P255/65R16 tires (SE) or P265/55R17 (SC), fender flairs, skid plates for the engine and fuel tank, a full-size spare and 4-channel, 4-sensor 4-wheel Anti-lock Braking System (ABS).

All Frontier Desert Runners at KingCabs and are available with a 5-speed manual or 4-speed electronically controlled overdrive automatic transmission. Special badging distinguishes Desert Runner from other Frontier models.

Desert Runner is available in XE, SE or SC models with many option packages available, including the Value Truck Package (XE, standard on SE and SC), Deluxe Package (XE, SE and SC), Power Package (XE, SE, standard on SC), Utility Package (XE, standard on SE and SC), Sunroof Package (SE) and Premium Package (SC). A limited-slip differential is offered on SE and SC models as a stand-alone option.

Frontier Crew Cab

Frontier Crew Cab's exterior was designed to be user friendly, as well as reinforce the inherent toughness and dependability of the Frontier model. Four real doors, combined with the rugged look of the Frontier, offer a stylish statement and effectively combine the practicality of an SUV with the opened utility of a pickup truck.

All Frontier Crew Cabs are built on the heavy-duty 4-wheel drive Frontier chassis, giving the 2-wheel drive the same rigidity, ride height and ground clearance as the 4-wheel drive pickup.

Four real doors allow up to five passengers to enter the vehicle with ease. The bed is about 20 inches shorter than the standard Frontier, but within 15 percent of the volume of many competitive extended cab model beds. 


