## A good name

Last Sunday, *The New York Times* did a follow up on Raymond Donovan. The Short Hills executive is a former U.S. Labor Secretary in the Reagan administration. But he was better known for the bevy of lawsuits and the battering brought against him by overzealous prosecutors. All charges of corruption were ultimately dropped and even publicly ridiculed. His famous question "Which office do I go to get my reputation back?" remains a chilling statement.

Donovan's unfortunate ordeal came back to me while reviewing a new proposal regarding public officials being graded by the state Office of Inspector General and State Commission on Ethical Standards. It looks like things are getting better.

## Left Out

The Trenton rulemakers are expected to adopt by year's end some new standards on conflicts of interest and the subject of refusal. For refusal, a.k.a. not voting on a subject when you have a conflict of interest, they will even be a form.

The obvious conflict — like a direct pecuniary interest affected by your vote — really doesn't need clarification. In layman's terms, you aren't supposed to vote on something where you will end up making a buck. But the topics of indirect pecuniary and direct personal interests are a little more murky. The state regulations may clear that up.

Indirect pecuniary interest refers to voting, for example, on an ordinance which benefits a business associate. The most interesting, and the area being expanded is direct personal interests. One legal scholar described it as a palpable interest which is not financial in nature, but yet is of immediate and unique importance to the individual. The bottom line is when your personal interest differs from everybody else, you have a problem.

As an example, relatives in terms of identifying a conflict include your immediate family, your mother-in-law, sister-in-law and even your first cousin. Lay on top of this the question of appearance of impropriety and the public official has the need to be vigilant.

The commission justifies its existence saying it will "provide greater public trust in government for those who need to hold the respect and confidence of the people." They are right. But, the Trenton group has done more. They are encouraging an official facing a potential conflict to seek an advisory opinion so as not to fall into a trap.

Officials hear often that beyond direct conflicts, they should avoid appearances of conflict to the extent such appearance diminishes public confidence and may be an embarrassment to the public official.

I recall a relative during spring cleaning who followed the motto: See AVOID, Page B2

## Dems take early lead in campaign spending

Democrats have outspent Republicans by a margin of nearly three-to-one so far in this year's countywide races, according to the first campaign finance report filed for the Nov. 6 General Election.

The 29-Day Pre-General Election Campaign Finance Report was due to the County Clerk's Office Oct. 9. The 11-Day Pre-General Election finance report is due Friday and the 20-Day Post General Election report will be due Nov. 26.

Democrats have spent about \$39,500 to the Republicans' \$16,000 thus far. A majority of the Democratic spending — about \$23,000 — has gone to Message & Media, the New Brunswick-based political consulting firm that runs the campaign each year. About half of the \$23,000 was spent on the production of a cable television advertisement.

Another \$11,250 went toward polling and research by Azalone Research and \$3,000 for lawn signs. More than \$1,300 was spent with ACB Promotions — a company owned by Democratic Roselle Park Councilman Bob Micali — for tote bags. Democrats also spent several hundred dollars on Bingo chips, which are used in the same fashion as palm cards, with candidates' names printed on them and passed out a Bingo halls.

Republicans have spent most of their money so far on campaign literature, nearly \$8,800 with Jamestown Associates of Lawrenceville, a political consulting firm. Nearly \$7,000 went to Basswood Research of Washington, D.C. for a survey and nearly \$200 for business cards with McIntock Associates, a Mountainside firm owned by William McClintock, a former Republican Scotch Plains councilman.

Reports indicated that the Republican County Committee contributed \$20,000 to its candidates' committee. Since the Union County Democratic Committee coordinates the freeholder candidates' campaign, the committee's Oct. 9 report simply listed expenditures as in-kind expenses from the county committee but no contributions. Contributors would be listed in the quarterly finance reports, which county organizations must file on Jan. 15, April 15, July 15 and Oct. 15. Candidates and their committees meanwhile are required to file the three reports around the time of the election.

## Familiar face in county race

One side of this year's election for Union County sheriff has changed little since 1977. Sheriff Ralph Froehlich, a Democrat from Union, seeks an unprecedented ninth three-year term against a Republican, this time versus Nick Berkey of Union.

A longtime officer in the Elizabeth Police Department, Froehlich has emphasized his experience in this year's campaign, particularly in the time of heightening security since the Sept. 11 terrorist attacks on the nation. Being able to coordinate federal and

state resources in a time of crisis is extremely important, he said.

Froehlich touts the many awards his office has received over the years for innovation. A fingerprint program for children has been copied by law enforcement agencies nationwide in addition to a gun safety program that has served as a model many times. "These are just the beginning," the sheriff said.

A new program the sheriff hopes to develop, TRIAD, will aid seniors by effectively using local police and retired officers. "Seniors are a target

## 22nd District race one of keys to new legislative map

In a year when Democrats have an opportunity to cut into the Republican advantage in the Legislature, the 22nd District has been viewed as a chance for the party.

The new district creates a opportunity for Democrats to pick up seats in the Assembly and State Senate, as there are no incumbents in the district. The old 22nd District was represented by Republican Assemblymen Richard Bagger and Thomas Kean Jr., both of Westfield, which is now in the 21st, and State Sen. and Acting Gov. Donald DiFrancesco, who dropped out of the gubernatorial race. The new 22nd District is comprised of Clark, Fairwood, Linden, Plainfield, Rahway, Scotch Plains, Winfield, Green Brook, North Plainfield, Duellen and Middlesex Borough.

Assemblyman Joseph Suliga of Linden is looking to move up to the State Senate and will face Republican Milt Campbell of Plainfield. Suliga's hometown had been in the 20th District before redistricting. In the Assembly race, 17th District incumbent Gerald Green of Plainfield and Freeholder Linda Stender of Fairwood, both Democrats, take on Republican Green Brook Mayor Patricia Walsh and former Scotch Plains Mayor Gabie Spera.

Green said Suliga is both former Union County freeholders while Stender is serving her third term, which expires next year on the board. All three are claimants of their municipal Democratic committees.

Suliga is completing his fourth two-year term in the Assembly after a term on the freeholder board. Green served two non-consecutive terms on the freeholder board and is completing his fifth term in the Assembly. He is a self-employed businessman in marketing and real estate. A former mayor and councilwoman in Fairwood, Stender first was elected to the freeholder board in 1993 and served as chairwoman in 1997.

A Navy veteran, Campbell was the first Black athlete to win the decathlon, earning a gold medal in the 1956 Olympics after a silver medal performance in 1952 at the age of 17.

"When you look at the new district, one of the main issues is racial profiling," said Walter Fields, a general consultant to the Campbell campaign. During his tenure in the Assembly, Suliga failed to co-sponsor legislation presented by the Black and Latino caucus, Fields said. "One of the most critical issues in recent years," he said, and Suliga failed to show his leadership on the issue.

Suliga said he has the "leadership experience to get into the Senate from Day One." The assemblyman said he voted in favor of two bills related to profiling, the only ones that reached the Assembly floor for a vote, adding that Campbell should be critical of his own party for delaying votes on racial profiling legislation.

The state budget is among Suliga's primary concerns, particularly the rising level of state debt. During his eight years on the Assembly Appropriations Committee, Suliga said he earned a reputation as a watchdog of state government and someone who did not just go along with votes.

During his tenure in the Assembly, teen smoking was a big issue for Suliga. He introduced legislation outlaw-

ing teen smoking which was adopted but ultimately was vetoed by the governor. He hopes to use funds from tobacco settlements for public health issues, such as providing mammograms for women 35 years and older if they have insurance or not. Preventive measures are the key to stopping breast cancer, he said.

The Campbell campaign has taken aim at the number of jobs Suliga holds. In addition to being chief financial officer for the City of Linden, Suliga owns Kool Scoops Italian Ices, a manufacturing business in Linden. "You have to make a choice if you want to represent the district," Fields said.

Campbell, who is a motivational speaker, co-founded an alternative private school in Newark. Fields said, "an experiment that continues and shows an alternative way to educate children. The Plainfield native does not believe in a widespread voucher program, but Fields added that a significant number of parents with children already in private schools deserves a tax credit since they are doubly taxed — with school tuition

and school property taxes. Assembly candidates met last week during a 90-minute candidates' forum in Plainfield. Among the issues the candidates were asked to comment on included their position on the trash train, a proposition that utilizes planned transfer station in Linden to transport New York City's household trash by rail through Union County.

Stender, who was voted in favor of the trash train as a Union County freeholder, cited the impact on traffic as her reason for supporting the plan.

"It will take 1,000 trucks off the roads of Union County," Stender said. "I felt it was a good environmental choice. In terms of safety, trains are safer."

Spera, however, was against the trash train for ecological reasons. "It's going to fall out of the trains, and we're going to have dirty beaches again."

One issue the four candidates did not differ on was the importance of labor unions. All the candidates said they supported organized labor, however Green was able to point out that

## Scary videos provide thrills, chills this Halloween

It's that time of year again when things go bump in the night. For movie buffs, and fans of horror movies in particular, what better time to hunt down a good scary movie on video, pop some corn, turn out the lights and settle in for a night of chills?

With the endless choices available, which films warrant a look, or perhaps a revisit? We all know how disappointing it is to rent a video based on the cover box, only to get home and discover you've picked a turkey. So, I've compiled my top 10 list of horror and/or suspense movies perfect for an eerie autumn evening.

With one exception, I've skipped the "slasher flick" genre since they're all cookie-cutter creations. Also, I've opted to pass on the old classics — "Dracula," "Frankenstein," "The Wolf Man," et al — since they're in a lionized class by themselves. For the most part, the films that give me the chills feature horror that's more psychologically driven. Yes, there are ghosts to be found here, as well as a couple of appearances by the Devil himself, but in each case it's the human element which brings the terror to the breaking point.

It is perhaps important to note that I first selected six of the 10 as a child or young teenager, placing me at a very tender age and possibly explaining the movies' lasting impressions.

These picks — some of which are not the best movies ever made — are all chosen for completely subjective reasons and based on one criterion: Did the movies scare me and leave a lasting impression, continuing to be effective on subsequent viewings? They're all available on video, although some titles may take a little hunting to locate. I was able to find all of them at [www.amazon.com](http://www.amazon.com), which ships its orders within 24 hours, mak-

ing it possible to get your movie by Halloween.

#### 1. "Psycho"

Not only does this top my horror movie list, it's also my all-time favorite film. Made on a shoestring budget, director Alfred Hitchcock's brilliant 1960 classic stands head and shoulders above the rest. Hitchcock masterfully directs not only the actors, but the audience as well, building the tension to an unbearable point. His meticulous filmmaking is nowhere more effective than in this masterpiece! Skip Gus VanSant's remake, rent the original, and let's see how long it is before you take a shower with the bathroom door unlocked.

#### 2. "The Innocents"

Based on Henry James' "The Turn of the Screw," Jack Clayton's 1961 film, with a screenplay co-authored by Truman Capote, treads a fine line between outright terror and psychosexual drama. As Miss Giddens, the repressed governess of two small children in the remote English countryside, Deborah Kerr is as burgeoning as the ism, creating a compelling internal conflict which drives the story and fuels the horror — are her young wards haunted by discontent, malicious spirits or by their own governess' repressions? The hide-and-seek sequence still makes my blood run cold with every viewing.

#### 3. "The Haunting"

For those of you who saw Jan De Bont's 1999 remake, you ain't seen

nothin' yet. The original — wonderfully directed by Robert Wise — features not one drop of blood and almost no special effects. Sticking much more faithfully to the plot of Shirley Jackson's novella, "The Haunting of Hill House," the 1963 version starring the incomparable Julie Harris will make your hair stand on end without ever resorting to gimmicky tactics, not to mention the ill-conceived plot devices used in the remake.

#### 4. "The Exorcist"

In no film has the Devil seemed more horrifying, perhaps because he preys on an innocent child. While the special effects in William Friedkin's 1973 film pale somewhat in today's digital age, the story still works like nobody's business. The recently remastered version features scenes

and effects not included in the original, but it's only really worth seeing for the remastered sound and the unsettling spider-walk down the stairs.

#### 5. "Rosemary's Baby"

Roman Polanski's 1968 film version of Ira Levin's novel, which Polanski adapted, did what "The Omen" couldn't do — make the son of Satan so real that you can't stop looking over your shoulder. Using Levin's cast of "everyday" characters — most notably Ruth Gordon in an Oscar-winning appearance — Polanski weaves a tale of gut-wrenching terror and paranoia, not in the remote mountains of Transylvania, but right in the heart of New York City's Upper West Side.

#### 6. "The Legend of Hell House"

Adapted by Richard Matheson

Made on a shoestring budget, director Alfred Hitchcock's brilliant 1960 classic, "Psycho," stands head and shoulders above the rest ... His meticulous filmmaking is nowhere more effective than in this masterpiece.

from his novel, "Hell House," this 1973 film starring Roddy McDowall and Pamela Franklin — who appeared as the young Flora in "The Innocents" — borders slightly on the campy side, but still delivers a rickrolling good haunted house story, set in what is described as "the Mt. Everest of haunted houses." The sound effects editing in the seance sequences could very well give you nightmares.

#### 7. "The Silence of the Lambs"

While not a traditional horror flick, 1991's "The Silence of the Lambs" features Anthony Hopkins in one of the scariest performances ever committed to celluloid. The interview scenes between Hopkins and Jude Foster — both Oscar-winners for this film, as were director Jonathan Demme and screenwriter Ted Tally — are as terrifying as the more graphic moments featuring serial killer Buffalo Bill. Interestingly, "The Silence of the Lambs" is loosely based on real-life serial killer Ed Gein, the same source for "Psycho."

#### 8. "Hush, Hush, Sweet Charlotte"

If "The Legend of Hell House" borders on campy, this movie is way south of the border. Director Robert Aldrich originally intended 1964's "Hush, Hush, Sweet Charlotte" to be a reimagining of his leading ladies from his successful "Whatever Happened to Baby Jane?" — Bette Davis and her longtime off-screen adversary, Joan Crawford. Crawford bowed out and was replaced by a better-cast Olivia deLavilland, who delivers a meticulously crafted performance, as does the amiable Joseph Cotten. The nagging

question — "Is Charlotte Hollis really that crazy, or is something dirty afoot?" — drives this film to its conclusion. Agnes Moorehead is brilliantly over the top in an Oscar-nominated turn as maid Velma Crother.

#### 9. "Halloween"

The first of the lot — it not only spawned countless, forgettable sequels, but a string of copycats as well — survives mediocre acting and contrived situations, and scares the living daylight out of you. John Carpenter's 1978 movie very ably creates a sense of isolation which is unsettlingly effective, yet almost imperceptible — note how desolate the neighborhood is on a night when children are usually everywhere you look.

#### 10. "When a Stranger Calls"

Although the middle tends to plod, the first and last 20 to 30 minutes of Fred Walton's 1979 movie account for some of the most unbearable suspense ever captured on film. Carol Kane, Charles Durning and Colleen Dewhurst star in this compelling nail-biter, which features some excellent camera work to heighten the effect. The question "Have you checked the children?" will ring in your ears for days — and nights — afterward.

There are countless others, many of which may be your personal favorites, but which didn't happen to do it for me. As it is, there are about a dozen more of my picks which didn't even make the final cut.

In the end, the only real test is whether or not you sleep with the lights on. If you do, consider your time and money well spent!

# NJ Ballet Company 'jazzes things up'

When Carolyn Clark, artistic executive director of the New Jersey Ballet Co., came onstage before an enthusiastic audience Saturday evening prior to the performances at the Wilkins Theatre at Kean University, Union, to "pay tribute to the American theater in celebration of the Arts and Humanities Month in 2001," the ballet enthusiasts stood as one to applaud.

Even as the petite former prima ballerina, so instrumental in bringing the best in ballet through the years to New Jersey audiences, honored "the artists who are bringing meaning and value to their lives," she, herself, also was honored.

Now, in its 43rd season, Clark indicated, "the company is comprised of the most talented dancers the world has to offer. They're American, Russian, Chinese, South American and Mongolian ..."

The company featured the area premiere of "Facets," and "Saturday Night" and "Mean Ol' World," two ballets staged at its gala last May. Kean University and New Jersey Ballet presented "An Evening of Contemporary Ballet" in a most unusual style. Highlighted were jazz and blues productions, rather than classical, and the audience appeared to delight in these new programs and costumes.

"Saturday Night" opened the show with a series of background songs by blues singers Etta James and Keb' Mo' — aka Kevin Moore — in which the company incorporated ballet and jazz dancing. The choreographer was Ginger Thatcher with costumes by Lynne Bowling. And the familiar dancers, dancing to jazz and blues, featured Michelle de Fremery, Saul Rachmedova, Julia Vorobyeva, Andres Neira, Gabriella Noa, Christina Theryoung, Tuvshin Bold and David Tamaki. They danced in threes and fours and even solo to such numbers as "Ain't Got Nobody," "She Just Wants to Dance," "Love Blues," "Loving Arms," "Unforgettable You," "Anybody Seen My Girl," "Steal Away" and "Something's Got a Hold On Me."

The premiere performance of "Facets," choreographed by Ali Pourfarokh, with music by Gustav Mahler, and costumes by Paul Daigle, was exceptionally impressive, with skillful dances by three couples amidst much emotion. It was set to the third movement of Mahler's Fourth Symphony, and the three couples — Vorobyeva and Jouravlev, Era Kortava-

Jouravleva and Sergio Amaratte, and Rachmedova and Bold — revealed a deep interaction that visibly affected the audience.

The audience was further excited by New Jersey Ballet's own diva — its own special star — Rosemary Sabovick-Bleich, who had everyone applauding wildly and screaming, "Brava! Brava!," when she did her unusual turns and dances in a *pas de deux* with Konstantin Dournev, an equally talented dancer, in "Satinel-

la," a premiere performance of a portion of the full-length ballet, "Carnavale in Venice." Choreography was by Marius Petipa, with music by Cesare Pugni and costumes by Toodie Wittmar. Unquestionably, Sabovick-Bleich, with her perennial smile, her extraordinary talent and her ability to bring such joy to the public, certainly proved to the world of ballet what an exceptional performer she is. And Dournev, a fine performer in his own right, is a brilliant partner for Sabovick-Bleich.

And it was an extra treat to see her perform in different moves, quite impressively, with 10 other ballet dancers in "Mean Ol' World," a blues score composed by Lisa DeSpain. Choreographed by Donlin Foreman, staged by Terese Capucillo and Jennifer Emerson, performed by Catfish

Corner with costume designs by Elisa Jimenez and costume construction by Christina Giannini. The accompanying dancers, giving themselves to the rhythm and physical sensation of the music, included Kozlova, de Fremery, Noa, Marnie Shapiro, Jouravlev, Neira, Korotava-Jouravleva, Vorobyeva, Dournev and Tamaki. Kozlova was quite different from the four men and six women, as she danced solo in jazz style.

The evening was an enormous success, which continues to prove that professional ballet can be an incredible experience — right here in Union, N.J., and makes one ask, "What does New York City have in ballet that New Jersey does not?"

The New Jersey Ballet Company will return to Kean University Nov. 3 with an "Evening of Classical Favorites." In next week's edition, Arts and Entertainment Editor Bill VanSant reviews the company's family series.

# Devilins to be honored by UCC

On Sunday, Union County College will honor renowned artists Harry and Wende Devlin on the occasion of the rededication of a wrought sculpture of an owl caricature that was drawn by Harry almost 40 years ago. A reception in honor of the couple will be from 5 to 7 p.m. in the Cranford Campus Commons, 1033 Springfield Ave.

"This sculpture has particular significance to UCC and its alumni, especially those who graduated when the college was known as Union Junior College," said Louise Yohalem, executive director of the Union County College Foundation. "In fact, it has become the virtual trademark of our Alumni Association."

Union County College was originally established in 1935 as a night college. The tradition of the evening session persisted into the pre-war years and, in recognition of that, the 1941 Student Council selected the Owl as the official mascot. According to the late historian, Donald Raichle, "Since that time, the college has moved twice and even changed its name, but the owl remains immutable..." UCC teams still proudly carry the Owl moniker into battle on the fields of athletic competition.

A few years after the college moved to its current Springfield Avenue location, Harry Devlin created a caricature of the Owl and his design was executed in wrought

iron. In 1964, the sculpture was presented to the college on behalf of high school students and directors from Union and Middlesex County Junior Achievement in appreciation of the college's scholarship program for JA members. Soon after it was installed on the stairway of the "new" Campus Center, the UCC Owl was given the name of "Icarus" by virtue of a contest conducted by the campus newspaper. Icarus now hangs proudly in The Commons, the hub of student and other activities on the Cranford campus.

# 'Phantom' to haunt UCAC Saturday

The Union County Arts Center will present the 1925 silent film, "Phantom of the Opera," starring Lon Chaney Saturday at 8 p.m.

Based on the novel by Gaston Leroux, "Phantom of the Opera" is quite possibly the best known silent film. It was Lon Chaney's last film for Universal. He went through more physical pain and torture than any other actor in history to pull off his gruesome illusions as the Phantom.

The story is one about an Opera Ghost, who always sits in Box 5 of the Paris Opera House, and the opera's new owners who laugh at the stories. The Phantom falls in love with the young ingenue, Christine Daae and insists that Carlotta, the prima donna, relinquish her role to Christine. With Carlotta and the new owners refusing to obey the Phantom, strange incidents begin to occur.

In the original ending, the phantom died at his organ of a broken heart. After the first edit, Chester Conklin was brought in to add comic relief to the film, and additional scenes were shot and edited in; the scenes were later removed before being shipped for the general release. The film's production costs were approximately \$1,000,000.

The film was re-edited and released in 1929 with added talking sequences and music dubbed over the operating sections. "Universal's million dollar super jewel production" has frequently been regarded as one of the greatest American horror films of all time and the very best of the many adaptations of Gaston Leroux's 1911 literary work.

The organ will be played by UCAC House Organist Bernie Anderson, who will perform the original Universal score. He performs on UCAC's Biggest Little Wurliizer style E-X, one of a few remaining original theater-organ installations in the nation.

"Phantom of the Opera" will be preceded by the Laurel and Hardy short film, "Habeas Corpus." 1928, about a loony scientist who hires Laurel and Hardy to raid the cemetery to keep him supplied with dead bodies for his experiments.

"Phantom of the Opera" will be shown on the Union County Arts Center big screen Saturday at 8 p.m. Tickets are \$8 for adults and \$5 for children younger than 12. For more information, call Ticket Central, UCAC's box office, at 732-499-8226.

# Rahway's 'ghosts' come to life this weekend

The "ghosts" of people who lived more than a century ago are expected to materialize to tell tales of their lives and times to those who venture into the historic Rahway Cemetery for the Merchants and Drivers Tavern Museum Association's third annual "Ghosts of the Past" Cemetery Tours Saturday and Sunday. The event, which will also include refreshments and a tour of the adjacent Merchants and Drivers Tavern, is being given to benefit the recently restored 200-year-old structure.

Some of the "ghosts" one can expect to encounter on the tour include John Frazer and Isaac Brown, two nationally famous sculptors and an equally famous clockmaker. Examples of Frazer's work are found in the cemetery, and a Brokaw ball case clock is housed in the tavern. The tavern's first owners, John and Catherine Anderson, who purchased the building in 1798, are buried within sight of the tavern, as are Abraham and Mary Terrill, owners of

the smaller Terrill Tavern, located to the rear of the larger structure," said Ted Nevins, president of the Merchants and Drivers Tavern Museum Association. The Terrill Tavern, which will also be open to visitors, is now used as the museum shop, where a variety of early American craft items are sold.

Rahway was once known as "The Carriage City of the World," and the cemetery holds the graves of numerous 19th-century carriage makers and one of New Jersey's well-known 19th-century wallpaper manufacturers. The latter's ghost may amaze visitors with his knowledge of wallpaper here. The most famous burial is that of Abraham Clark, signer of the Declaration of Independence and a member of both the Continental Congress and the United States Congress.

"Although our participants will encounter about a dozen 18th- and 19th-century 'spirits,' portrayed by costumed interpreters, the ghost of the Unknown Woman, murdered in the

1880s, is a highlight for many," said Linda McTeague, executive director of the museum association. "Although the woman remains silent, the ghost of the police chief who was unsuccessful in solving the case can always be counted on to relate details of the internationally known crime."

Each participant will receive a tour booklet that includes additional gravesites. The leisurely, self-guided tour route begins at early brownstone markers carved with quaint epigrams and winds through areas of more ornate Victorian monuments.

A recently discovered section of the cemetery includes the graves of African-Americans who served in the United States Colored Troops during the Civil War. In addition to Union soldiers, the cemetery also includes the graves of a soldier of the Confederate army, Revolutionary War soldiers, and the firebrand minister of the Presbyterian Church. The latter was an ardent supporter of the Revolution.

Tours leave the Merchants and Drivers Tavern every 15 minutes, beginning at 2 p.m. The final tour will start at about 4:30 p.m. Saturday and at 4 p.m. Sunday. Visitors may return to the tavern following the tour.

Tickets are priced at \$12 for adults, \$9 for members of the museum and \$5 for students. The ticket price includes the tour of the tavern and refreshments. Parking will be available at Paradise Plaza, located on St. Georges Avenue immediately south of the tavern. For information, call 732-981-0441.

"Ghosts of the Past" is being presented in conjunction with "Buried in New Jersey," a statewide program celebrating Arts and Humanities Month. The Merchants and Drivers Tavern Museum Association, a non-profit organization, is supported in part by a General Operating Support grant from the New Jersey Historical Commission.

# Pumpkins help cooks put on a happy face

Pumpkins are more than just a pretty face. According to Helene Messner M.S., R.D., with American Dairy Association and Dairy Council Inc., pumpkins are an excellent source of vitamin A, with moderate amounts of potassium, as well as being low in calories and fat-free. "We generally think of pumpkins as a fruit, but it's really a member of the winter squash family. Although pumpkin is associated with the fall in many people's minds, canned pumpkin offers an easy way to enjoy this orange treat year round."

This versatile vegetable can be served as a main dish, dessert or anywhere in between, as shown in these recipes from the test kitchens of American Dairy Association and Dairy Council Inc.

**Cheddar Pumpkin Tart**  
Yield: 6 servings

- 1 cup all-purpose flour
- 1/2 cup yellow cornmeal
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 6 tablespoons (3/4 stick) butter
- 3 to 4 tablespoons milk
- 1 egg white, slightly beaten

**Filling:**

- 1/2 cup chopped green onions
- 1 tablespoon butter
- 1 cup canned pumpkin
- 1/2 cups light cream or half-and-half
- 4 eggs, slightly beaten
- 1 can (4 ounces) diced mild chilies, well drained
- 1/2 slices bacon, cooked, crisp, drained and crumbled
- 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
- 1/2 teaspoon pepper
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 cups (6 ounces) shredded Cheddar cheese

For crust, combine flour, cornmeal and salt. Using a pastry blender or two knives, cut in butter until mixture is crumbly. Add milk — 1 tablespoon at a time — mixing until flour is moist-

ened. Shape into a ball. Wrap in waxed paper. Refrigerate about 1 hour for ease in handling. Preheat oven to 350 degrees F. Roll out dough on lightly floured surface to fit 13" quart shallow baking dish. Pat into baking dish, trim and flute edges. Pierce inside of crust with fork, brush with egg white. Bake 10 to 12 minutes or until golden. Remove from oven; set aside. Reduce oven temperature to 325 degrees F.

For filling, saute onions in butter in small skillet over medium heat about 3 minutes or until tender. Remove from heat. Combine pumpkin, cream, eggs, onions, chilies, bacon and seasonings in large bowl. Stir in cheese. Pour into baked pastry shell. Bake 40 to 50 minutes or until knife inserted near center comes out clean. Cool 10 minutes before serving.

**Pumpkin Walnut-Date Pie**  
Yield: one 9-inch pie

- 1 cup all-purpose flour
- 1 cup finely packed brown sugar, divided
- 1/2 cup (1 stick) butter, cold

1 cup canned pumpkin  
2 eggs, beaten  
1 cup milk  
1 teaspoon cinnamon  
1/2 teaspoon ground cloves  
1/2 cup chopped dates  
1/2 cup chopped toasted walnuts  
sweetened whipped cream, to garnish

Preheat oven to 350 degrees F. Place flour, 1/2 cup brown sugar and butter in work bowl of food processor. Process until mixture is crumbly. Press evenly onto bottom and up sides of 9-inch pie plate. Using a fork, prick bottom several times. Bake 5 minutes. Remove from oven. Increase temperature to 375 degrees F. In a large mixing bowl, combine pumpkin, eggs, milk, remaining 1/2 cup brown sugar, cinnamon and cloves. Stir in dates and walnuts; pour into prepared crust. Place pie on cookie sheet. Bake 45 to 50 minutes or until knife inserted in center comes out clean. Cool in pan on wire rack. Serve topped with whipped cream.

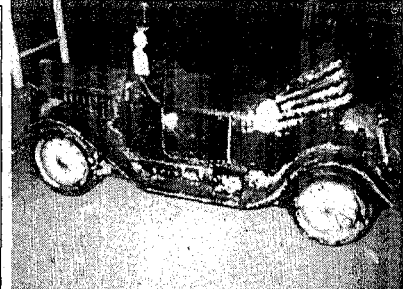

 Ripple Coffecake**

Yield: one 13 1/2 x 9-inch cake  
 1 cup (2 sticks) butter  
 1 cup granulated sugar  
 1 teaspoon vanilla  
 3 eggs  
 2 1/2 cups all-purpose flour  
 2 teaspoons baking powder  
 1 teaspoon cinnamon  
 1/2 teaspoon salt  
 1/2 teaspoon baking soda  
 1/2 cup canned solid pack pumpkin  
 Pumpkin Cheesecake Filling  
 (recipe follows)

Strusel topping (recipe follows)  
 Preheat oven to 350 degrees F. In large bowl, cream butter, sugar, and vanilla until light and fluffy. Add eggs, one at a time, beating well after each addition. Combine flour, baking powder, cinnamon, salt and baking soda. Add to butter mixture alternately with sour cream and pumpkin; beat until smooth. Spread half of batter in buttered 13-by-9-inch baking pan; spread evenly with Pumpkin Cheesecake Filling. Spoon remaining batter over filling; swirl gently with knife. Sprinkle with Strusel Topping.  2 cups loosely packed unpeeled sliced cooking apples (about 2 large)  
 1 cup (4 oz.) shredded Cheddar cheese  
 2 cups all-purpose flour  
 1 tablespoon baking powder  
 1/2 teaspoon baking soda

1/2 teaspoon salt  
 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon  
 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg  
 1/2 teaspoon ginger  
 Confectioner's sugar  
 Unsweetened whipped cream  
 Preheat oven to 350 degrees F. Cream butter in large mixing bowl. Add sugar and beat until light and fluffy. Beat in eggs, pumpkin, apple and cheese. In a separate bowl, combine dry ingredients. Gradually stir into butter mixture. Pour into buttered and floured 12-cup bundt cake pan. Bake 55 to 60 minutes, or until wooden pick inserted in center comes out clean. Let cool in pan 15 minutes before removing. Cool completely on wire rack. Wrap in plastic wrap and let rest 24 hours before serving. Dust cake lightly with confectioner sugar. Serve with unsweetened whipped cream.

 because they are so weak when it comes to criminal acts," Froehlich said. The program would increase efforts with seniors, to explain how to protect themselves, and provide a senior ID program.

"This election will be an opportunity to use my leadership to help the taxpayers of Union County and benefit Union County," Berkey, a fraud investigator for Honeywell Interna-

tional, said. He has stressed investigating the sheriff's annual budget, seeking federal and state grants, more employee training and revamping the sheriff's K-9 Unit.

Berkey, who the past two years lost bids for election to the Union Township Committee, promised to use his expertise in finance to do a thorough examination of the Sheriff's budget to see if money can be saved anywhere. "It's difficult to say without checks

and balances if the sheriff's office was shortchanged in its current contract," he said, referring to a new collective bargaining agreement reached with sheriff's officers.

Froehlich said his budget is investigated annually and not once has it been overexpended. "We must go out and seek other funds, absolutely. Our grantsmen are doing well in obtaining funds," he said, for such things as weapons and armor.

 he has the endorsement of both the state's police and firefighters' unions. "Unions are important," said Walsh. "In our last negotiations we did it with just two administrators and no attorneys," she said of Green Brook's settlements."

Spera, who pointed out that his parents were union workers, said unions were important because they provided checks and balances to management. "Without labor unions, management picks on the little guy. I'm pro-union."

When asked about her position regarding cardiac facilities, Walsh, a former nurse, said she has been fighting to have cardiac facilities close to homes, adding that she has "passed ordinances and written personal letters to the commissioner on that."

Another issue candidates seemed to agree on was supporting legislation that would return rights to inmates who have served their time in jail. All the candidates said that a person who has done their time in prison should have their rights, such as voting, restored.

"I would be happy to sponsor legislation that restores a person's right to vote when they have paid the price," said Stender. "The fact is that no money has been put into rehabilitation. We should do more."

Spera not only said that she supports restoring the rights of inmates who have served their time, he also added that something should be done to stop

racial profiling. "Racial profiling is wrong and it has to be stopped. We have to have rules that make certain it no longer exists."

On the issue of a constitutional convention to create an amendment for revamping the entire tax system in New Jersey, which has one of the highest tax rates in the country, all the candidates were once again in agreement that they would want to have a convention, with the exception of Green who refrained from commenting on the topic until he has taken a look at the issue.

"The education tax bill is what drives taxes so high," said Walsh, who ran in last year's 7th District Congressional primary. "A lot of money is being spent on education and the children aren't getting it. I wish it was going to the teachers but it's not, so where is it going?"

On the issue of abortion there was some variation of their positions on the issue, although all of the candidates were ultimately said they were pro-choice.

"I do not believe in abortion as a form of birth control," said Walsh. "I do support it in cases of rape and incest."

"I could see both sides to this issue," said Spera. "The decision did not come easy. I'm definitely pro-choice."

The issue of school vouchers was one in which Spera disagreed with his Republican running mate, Walsh. Although Spera said he was against the voucher system, just as Stender

and Green did, Walsh supported the voucher system to a point. "Yes, I would support a voucher system; but not if it means taking billions out of the public school system."

One of the last issues the candidates were asked to comment on before the forum concluded was how they intend to help clean up crime and drug sales.

Stender said that funding for law enforcement should be examined. Walsh cited three ways in which crime should be attacked. "First, we need more of police presence. The second thing is money for rehabilitation to prisoners. Third, we need more money into education for our children in school to help our kids understand that this is something that alters your life."

"I have two nephews who are drug addicts," said Spera. "They come out of jail and back into drugs. You have to provide jobs for these people. We must pull them out of despair and give them self-esteem."

During the closing remarks portion of the forum, Stender said there was a clear difference between the Republicans and the Democrats. "The difference is clear. In the last eight years we have seen the debt triple and property taxes soar."

Green concluded his remarks with his priorities, should he be re-elected. "Our priority should be number one, taxes; two, debt; three, education and four, crime. I like to feel I represented the 17th District in a way that can be proud. I'll represent Plainfield in a positive way."

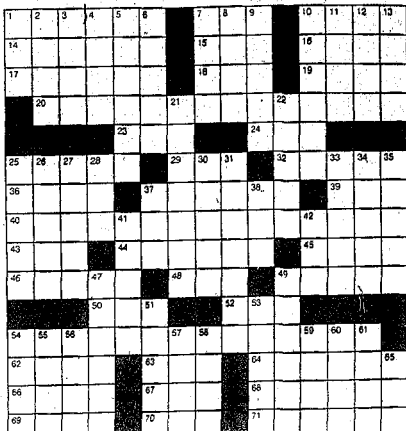

who can be there make every effort to attend."

Alzheimer's disease is the leading cause of dementia, a syndrome characterized by the gradual loss of memory and the decline of cognitive abilities — the ability to think and make decisions. "Diagnosis can be difficult and is not made by means of a single, clinical test, but when other curable and incurable causes of memory loss have been ruled out. A working diagnosis is arrived at through various

tests including thorough physical, neurological and psychological examinations. A definitive diagnosis is only possible after the patient has died and an autopsy has been performed.

It is estimated that one-third of the population will experience the disease in an older relative. With a life expectancy of anywhere from two to 20

years after the onset of memory-loss symptoms, caregivers may face many years caring for a loved one. They become the diseases' secondary victims, as those affected eventually require 24-hour care and supervision.

Runnells Specialized Hospital also offers a monthly Caregiver/Alzheimer Support Group to the community. Free of charge, held the third Thursday of each month.

**STARTING SOLIDS**

Parents should start feeding their babies solid foods when they are about 4 months old. The most important factor, however, is showing signs of readiness. The baby should weigh more than 13 lbs. be able to keep his head up, grab small items, and show interest in a parent's plate. Feed the baby from the breast or bottle first, and make sure he or she isn't tired or cranky. Start with about a half- teaspoon of food such as rice cereal. The first few tries may yield more food on the bib than in the mouth. Until a child's first birthday, breast milk or formula is still an essential part of the baby's nutrition.

Some foods to avoid for the first nine to twelve months are eggs (particularly the whites), chocolate, whole wheat, cow's milk and nuts. ## Dodge's new Ram 1500 is a pickup with an attitude

Dodge has restyled its Ram pickup with a heavy dose of out-of-my-way attitude. That's because Detroit is discovering the intimidation factor sells vehicles.

"When another driver sees one of our cars or trucks coming up, in his rearview mirror, we want him to feel like he should move out of the way," said one stylist at the recent media introduction. "We want our vehicle to have 'attitude.'"

And that's what the new Dodge Ram 1500 has — attitude.

The temptation is to describe the new Ram, which goes on sale about now as a 2002 model, as an exaggeration of the model it morphs. Dodge prefers to describe it as an amplification.

Styling cues, such as the big-trig grille and exposed fenders introduced with the 1994 models, have been taken to the extreme in the redesign. The protruding Peterbilt-style nose assumes Gallic proportions. The gaping cross-hair grille looks positively predatory — like it could ingest small import sedans.

Fenders bulge like biceps, and the streamer-floored optional tires and wheels complete the caricature of a bull's ready to kick sand on a half-pound weakling.

"Before we came out with the new Ram in '94, nobody paid any attention to us in the market," says Mark Heber, of Dodge Truck marketing.

Truck Studio. "We were a bit player — insignificant — with just 6 percent market share.

"We decided we had nothing to lose, so we decided to take the risk to develop a dynamic vehicle. Boldness, power and capability became our signature look."

The gamble became a legendary success story — vaulting Dodge to a 20-percent market share by 1998. With sales since then leveling off, Dodge has decided it's time for another bold stroke of the styling pen.

"With this restyling of the Ram, we tried to strike a balance between revolutionary and evolutionary," Myles says.

Love it or loathe it, it is here to stay for at least another six or seven years — until another styling statement is required.

NASCAR truck racers are likely to love it; a "laydown" racing-style windshield helps lower the drag coefficient by 9 percent — despite the Gerard Papatrakis nose.

Casual observers might ask, "What happened to that Dodge truck? It looks swollen." But in our experience on a short test drive in the Blue Ridge Mountains, the growing legions of Ram fanciers are likely to pull over, park and gaze in awe.

"These are the guys we want to shake up," says Mark Heber, of Dodge Truck marketing.

Dodge has attracted since 1994. Dodge already has these guys. Now they need to cast their nets farther for more fish.

"There are six 'Why Buys' that will drive sales," Heber says. "The full-size doors, bed and interior; the biggest brakes; the unique, innovative storage; safety; independent front suspension; and rack-and-pinion steering; and 'the look.'"

To entice Quad Cab buyers, Dodge lengthened the cabin by three inches, to make four normally opening doors.

The bait for standard cab buyers, just 10 percent of the market these days, is another three-inch extension. That adds enough room behind the seats to store, say, a Gatorade bucket, Charles Barkley's lunch pail(s) or a fully encased Ferris Statecaster. But not all at once.

Though the standard — 6-foot, 6-inch — bed became three inches shorter, Dodge contends it is ample for most tasks. To handle full-size plywood sheets, drop the tailgate. Or order the optional eight-foot bed.

Marine-style deck cleats are a novel touch for tying down up to 1,000 pounds of cargo. Overall load ratings also increase modestly, despite the smaller beds.

More of that kind of attention to detail is evident inside, where enough storage solutions are found to satisfy even the most notorious pack rat. In the Quad Cab, when the rear seats are

folded up, an optional flat steel load floor unfolds — capacity: 500 pounds.

The business center console between the front seats opens to reveal adjustable storage compartments for items as big as laptop-size, a 12-volt power plug and a removable coin sorter — "So the valet can't tip himself," Myles says, laughing only a little.

Under the center seat cushion is another storage compartment. Enough cup holders abound to hold a bachelor party.

In redesigning the Ram, Dodge kept to its corporate philosophy that bigger is always better on wheels and tires. Seventeen-inchers are now standard; optional tires are a mammoth 20 inches. And wheel openings allow as much as 34-inch-diameter off-road tires.

Bigger wheels facilitated bigger brakes, which in turn improved braking control and stopping — unofficially 60-to-zero braking is down to 140 feet. A take rate of only 17 percent for the optional ABS on the current Ram convinced Dodge not to make the system standard on the new model.

Two-wheel and four-wheel ABS are, however, available options. Four-wheel discs are now standard, along

with dual-rare brake boosters.

To further improve safety, Dodge went to a fully hydro-formed frame, which features innovative crush initiators on the frame rail ends. The ends compact accordion-style, up to the torsion bars, to absorb energy in crashes.

Dodge also has developed a repair technique that saves a truck with a crushed frame from the auto graveyard.

Dodge also offers side curtain air bags, to go with dual front bags, seat belt pretensioners and three-point belts in all seating positions. Pedal adjusters are available options. The crew cab rear seat is now large enough to handle a child safely seat; plus, there are now tether anchors.

The hydro-form frame is said to increase torsional stiffness by an amazing 40 percent and to reduce lateral bending by 150 percent. A new independent front suspension on 4WD models improves handling as well as ground clearance. Rack-and-pinion steering on all models provides precise feel and linear response.

On our tortuous mountain test run, the driver managed to make everyone in the vehicle car sick, including himself, trying to break traction and bring the rear end around on tight corners. Except for a slight amount of wheel

hop, coming out of hairpins under extreme acceleration, the Ram was admirably unshakable.

Drivability is enhanced by a smoother shifting optional automatic transmission and by smaller, but more efficient, engines.

The sleeper motor is the new 3.7-liter V-6 boasting 215 horsepower — 35 more than the 3.9 it replaces — with decent 15/21 fuel economy. The 4.7-liter V-8 is rated at 240 horsepower, which is up about five ponies from last year's 5.2-liter motor.

Each of the new power plants boosts fuel economy by about one mile per gallon. Those two engine choices, plus the carry-over 245-horsepower 5.9-liter Magnum V-8, run on regular unleaded. That's a mitigating factor for otherwise unimpressive fuel economy.

The 8.0-liter V-10 and Cummins Diesel engines remain available in 2002 on the 2500 and 3500 series heavy-duty models, which won't be restyled until 2003.

Overall, our purely subjective test drive found it quiet, comfortable and, almost car-like to drive. A real anomaly, considering its menacing look.

## Helpful tips are offered on safely winterizing the car

As the temperature begins to drop, it's a good time to get your vehicle ready for winter. The AAA New Jersey Automobile Club suggests the following steps to make sure your vehicle is outfitted from headlight to taillight.

- **Battery:** Cold weather can kill an ailing battery — the cause of many winter breakdowns. Avoid problems by asking your technician to test your car's charging system output and the battery's condition and charge.
- **Fluids:** Remember to check the oil and check the antifreeze, brake differential, and transmission fluids. Old antifreeze in your car's cooling system may contribute to cooling system failure.
- **Lights:** Enlist a friend to help check your car's high and low beams, and its license plate. Turn parking, side-marker, hazard, turn-signal, reverse, and brake lights.
- **Supplies:** Keep a windshield ice scraper, spray lock defroster — also keep an extra defroster at home — and an extra pair of gloves in the car, and consider packing a folding shovel and some rock salt, sand or kitty litter. If you'll be driving in the mountains, carry chains, blankets, foul-weather gear, flares, and a tarp, just in case you break down.
- **Tires:** If your treads are shallow, it's time to purchase a new set of tires. Consider the climate and the type of driving you do when choosing tires. Studded tires are permitted in New Jersey from Nov. 15 and April 1, but they should be used only in

packed snow conditions. During the winter, check tires regularly for correct inflation; they lose pressure as the temperature drops.

- **Wipers:** If your wipers leave streaks across your windshield or back window, the blades or tensioner arms may need replacing. Fill the washer-fluid reservoir with a non-freezing cleaner, and always clear ice that binds your wiper blades before turning on the wipers.

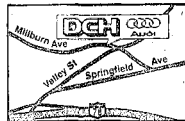
