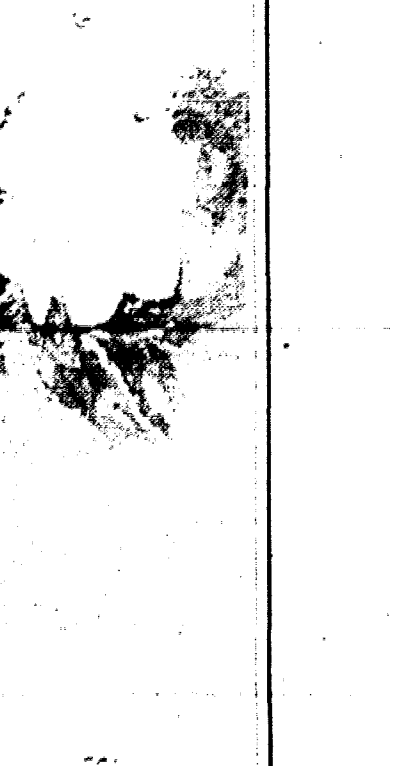

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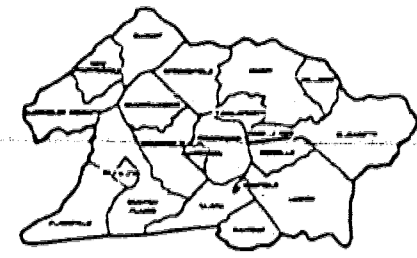

Movie Makers look to past and future at one-year mark

If you build it, they will come. This was sage advice expressed to Kevin Costner in 1990's "Field of Dreams."

Hisani DuBoise of Bloomfield seems to have followed the same inspirational words in her own chosen dream field: independent filmmaking.

DuBoise, the co-founder and executive director of the New Jersey Movie Makers' Network — and an independent filmmaker herself — is in the final stages of preparing for Friday night's festivities...

Another workshop was presented by Gregory Towns of the New Jersey Economic Development Authority on the Film Production Assistance Program...

The philanthropic community won't really support anything to do with film or video in the state," DuBoise continued. "So we've had a really hard time economically this year."

Shall We Dance?

The first act, she has the audience wringing its hands in its own emotion. It is a truly devastating moment.

David Tamaki, who portrays Hilaron, the game keeper and the jilted lover, may be smaller physically than Andrei Jouravlev, who plays Albrecht, the duke of Silesia, but he is very impressive. He is a very fine dancer and a very good mime.

Journalists, by contrast, is very powerful in every way, and his acting and dancing are superb. He is truly astounding.

Tatiana Iatsenko, who plays Berthe, Giselle's worried mother, is as marvelous a mime as any fine actress as she shows her emotions, her constant love and concern for her daughter. She does more acting than dancing, and she is extremely effective.

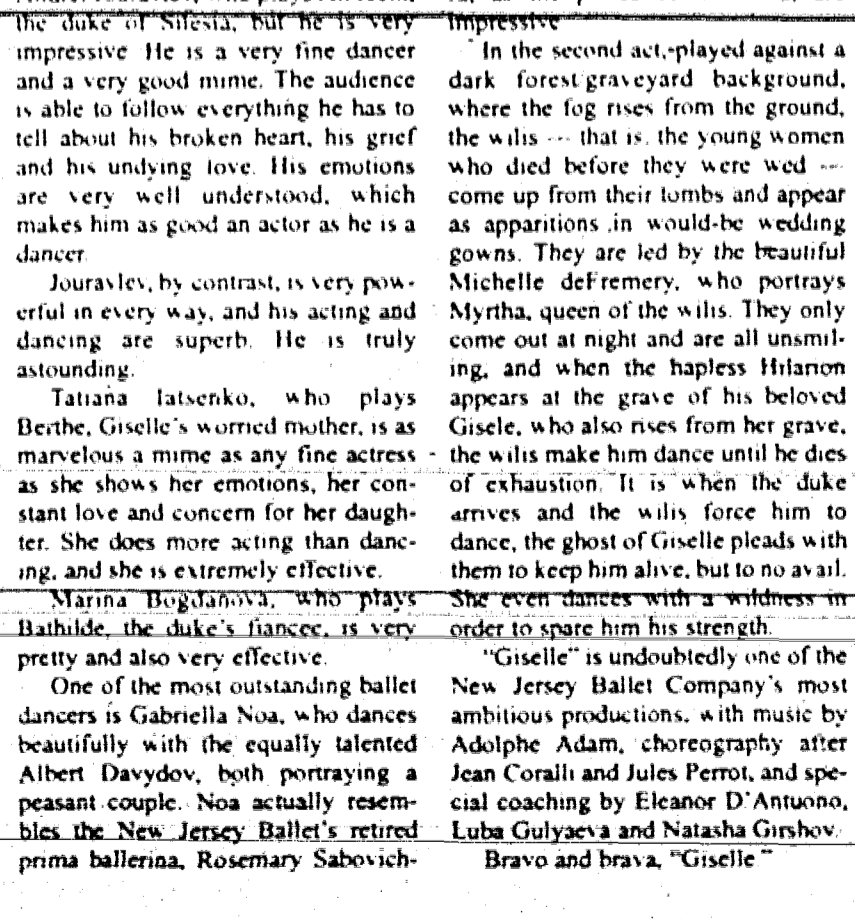
Marina Bogdanova, who plays Bathilde, the duke's fiancée, is very pretty and also very effective. One of the most outstanding ballet dancers is Gabriella Noa, who dances beautifully with the equally talented Albert Davydov, both portraying a peasant couple. Noa actually resembles the New Jersey Ballet's retired prima ballerina, Rosemary Sabovich.

Bleich, in her physical dance, her facial expressions and her acting ability. She is very graceful and very impressive. Vasily Veretich, as Wilfred, the duke's squire, and Peter Dikhanov, as the prince of Courland, are impressive.

In the second act, played against a dark forest graveyard background, where the fog rises from the ground, the wails — that is the young women who died before they were wed — come up from their tombs and appear as apparitions in waltz-like wedding gowns. They are led by the beautiful Myrtha deFremery, who portrays Myrtha, queen of the wails. They only come out at night and are all unsmiling, and when the hapless Hilaron appears at the grave of his beloved Giselle, who also rises from her grave, the wails make him dance until he dies of exhaustion. It is when the duke arrives and the wails force him to dance, the ghost of Giselle pleads with them to keep him alive, but to no avail. She even dances with a wildness in order to spare him his strength.

"Giselle" is undoubtedly one of the New Jersey Ballet Company's most ambitious productions, with music by Adolphe Adam, choreography after Jean Coralli and Jules Perrot, and special coaching by Eleanor D'Antonio, Luba Gulyaeva and Natasha Gishov. Bravo and brava, "Giselle!"

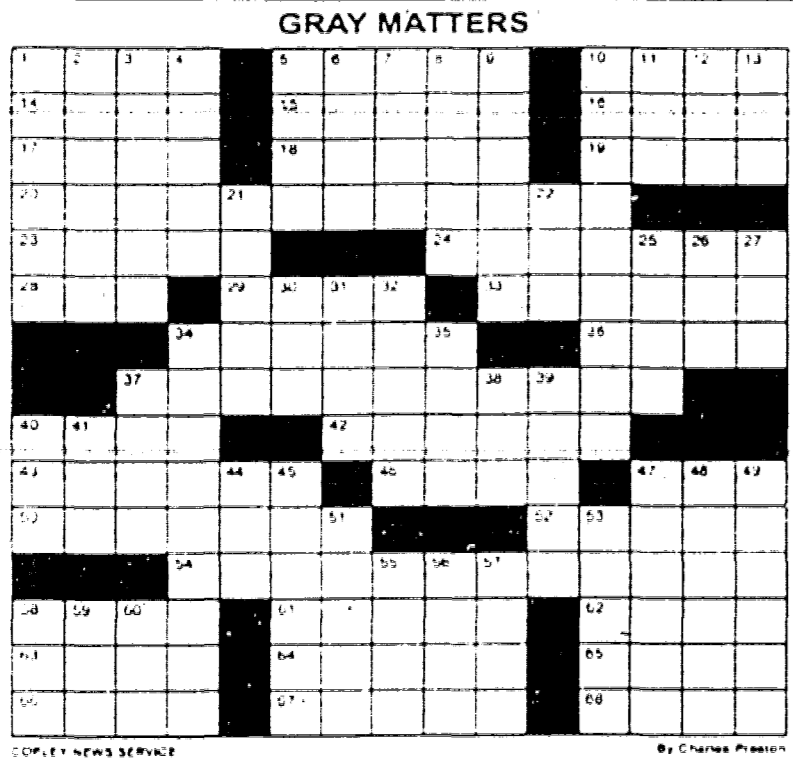
