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Koonz Offers 10-Point Program For 1965 Progress

Fadam Land Sold To Head Of Valco; Plans Not Known

Jakobsen Property Goes To Developer At \$170,000 Price

The Fadam Farm and Jakobson properties on Mountain ave. changed hands last month in real estate transactions with a total price tag of \$255,000.

The Fadam tract was sold by Frank Colatruglio to Sidney Hubschman on Dec. 15, for a price of \$85,000. Hubschman is president of Valco, Inc., which had received a special exception permit to construct a nursing home on this property. That permit was upset in a recent court decision.

Fadam Farm, at the corner of Mountain ave. and Shimpick rd., has also been strongly urged by the Springfield New Library Committee as the site for a new municipal library to replace the present facility on Main st.

Hubschman was unavailable for comment on what he intends to do with the land. Hubschman, Murray Simon of Newark, declined to comment in any way on what is planned for the tract, or on whether the court decision will be appealed.

The property is in a residential area zoned for homes with a 75-foot frontage. With a total area of 2.85 acres, it could provide space for no more than 10 houses — and the land had been used for a parking lot.

The expensive, profitable use in this manner, Simon stated, however, that Hubschman has no connection with the Villa Royale, which has applied for a permit for a nursing home on Morris ave. at the Railway River. That application is still pending before the Board of Adjustment.

Jakobsen Tract

The Jakobson property, with an area of some six acres, was sold for \$170,000 on Dec. 10 to Towns Corp. Realty Co. That firm is headed by Frank Racioppi of 14 Janet lane.

He disclosed that he is now awaiting final approval from the township on a subdivision application to construct 23 one-family homes on the property.

8 Candidates Seek Election To School Board

Ballot positions for the Springfield Board of Education election to take place Feb. 9 were assigned at a drawing conducted by Mrs. Audrey Ruban, board secretary, Saturday evening at the school board office.

Candidates for the three three-year terms, as their names will appear on the voting machines, are: Alvin B. Jay, Mrs. Sonya G. Dorsky, Canio A. Casale, Howard S. Levin, Harold H. Liebeskind and Francis H. Shimshock. Mrs. Dorsky is the lone incumbent seeking another term.

Appearing on the voting machines as candidates for the one-year term will be Mrs. Ruth Weisman and Joseph R. Afflitto.

Levin and Shimshock were the latest entrants in the race, filing their petitions just before the Dec. 31 deadline. Levin was an unsuccessful candidate in 1962 and 1963. He resides at 99 Troy rd.

Shimshock, whose home is at 104-R Hill rd., has long been active in recreation and Boy Scout programs in Springfield.

Polling Places

The polls Feb. 9 will be open from 3 to 9 p.m. Residents of voting districts 1, 2 and 3 will use Polling Place No. 1, at the James Caldwell School, Polling Place No. 2, for districts 4, 5 and 6, will also be at the Caldwell School.

Voting districts 7, 8, 9 and 10 are assigned to Polling Place No. 3, at the Florence Gaudineer school.

Committee Lists New Appointees

A 10-point program for progress during 1965 was outlined by Springfield's new mayor, William F. Koonz, at the organization meeting held by the Township Committee at noon on New Year's Day in the Municipal Building.

Other meeting highlights included two efforts by Bloom to make changes in the long list of appointees approved by the Committee or announced by Mayor Koonz.

Bloom proposed Joseph Seidel, municipal prosecutor, to replace James M. Cawley as township attorney, and Henry Grabarz to replace Otto Fessler as building inspector.

Both nominations failed for lack of a second, and the administration choices were approved by Grabarz, a lifelong Republican and a former building inspector, was an unsuccessful Democratic candidate for the Township Committee in November.

Department Chairmen

Koonz named members of the municipal working committees for 1965. Falkin heads the department of finance and revenue, aided by Bloom and Koonz. This has jurisdiction over township real estate, insurance, budget control, treasurer, tax collection, tax assessment, pension fund and purchasing.

The department of public works is headed by Del Vecchio, aided by Planer and Falkin. This covers the engineering department, road construction and maintenance, sewers and drainage, public utilities and the building departments.

Koonz heads the department of public affairs, assisted by Planer and Bloom. This supervises parks and public properties, animal welfare, local assistance, local assessment and recreation.

Planer will direct the department of public safety, aided by Koonz and Del Vecchio. This has jurisdiction over the police and fire departments, civil defense and disaster control.

Bloom will be in charge of administration, aided by Falkin and Del Vecchio. This area includes the township clerk, licenses, township attorney, law department, township offices and personnel and sanitation.

10-Point Program

The 10-point program projected by Mayor Koonz in his inaugural address, and recognition of the long-term road improvement project initiated in 1964:

1. Efforts to attract "desirable" industry.

100 Ask Youth Employment Aid During Two Days Of Operation

More than 100 applicants were interviewed by members of the Springfield Youth Employment Service during the two days the service was available last week, according to Mrs. William Lorimer, chairman.

Mrs. Lorimer said that the applicants were mostly high school and college students seeking part-time employment or summer employment. She said that she expects some full-time opportunities will be available, particularly in the summer.

Mrs. Lorimer explained that the offices in the Municipal Building, which opened on a regular basis from 2:30 to 4:30 p.m. on Monday, are staffed to interview additional applicants aged 14 to 20.

Potential employers are asked, she said, to notify the service of available jobs by calling DR 6-5800 between the hours of 10 a.m. and 4:30 p.m.

A speakers' bureau has also been organized, it was explained. The bureau, maintained by Paul Roman, will provide speakers for any organization wishing to know more of the services of the Youth Employment Service. Funds and supplies from individuals and organizations are being acquired, Mrs. Lorimer said, and are still needed.

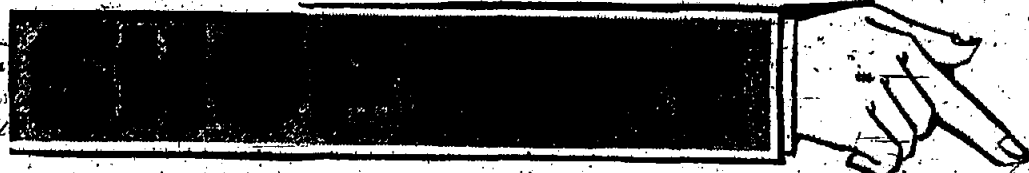

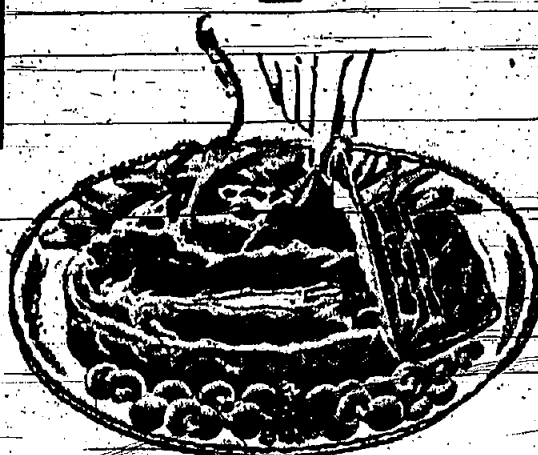

OLD TIME FAVORITES ADD GLAMOUR TO MODERN MEALS

"That apricot raisin stuffing in the duck was very special" said a young West Point Cadet to his hostess after a dinner this past week. The remark stimulated our thinking about how much dried fruits could contribute to "special" meals during the winter season. It also raised a question as to how widely used are all the good dishes made possible through the use of dried fruits.

Raisins, prunes, dates and figs all add a "special something" to any meal. Prunes and canned figs are on the January list of food plentiful. Prunes especially present a wide variety of ways in which to enjoy dried fruit. Prune Walnut Bread is a real treat in the lunch box as well as for snacks or meals at home.

Cottage cheese and prunes combine in a pleasing lunch-time salad. Stuffed prunes, prune tart and prune coconut crunch are other leads that can add interest to the

day's menu. Fig-oatmeal cookies are a flavor treat that will satisfy even the most fickle of appetites. Like other dried fruits, figs are not only tasty, but contribute to the nutritional quality of the meal.

Miss Audrey C. Burkart, extension specialist in food and nutrition at the College of Agriculture, Rutgers University, suggests this delicious and different milk shake made with pureed prunes:

Turn one quart of milk into refrigerator to chill. Fry the following until soft, control at the lowest temperature. Freeze until ice is 1/2 inch deep around inside edges of tray (about 1 hour). Combine with 1/2 cup pureed prunes, 1-3 cup sugar and six ounces can of frozen orange juice concentrate. Blend in electric blender or beat with a rotary beater. Serve plain or with a float of ice cream. Serves four to six.

Prune Walnut Bread
 1 1/2 cup chopped prunes
 1 cup boiling water
 1-3 cup strained honey
 1 egg, beaten
 1 t. vanilla
 3/4 cups sifted flour
 2-3 cup sugar
 1 t. baking soda
 1 t. milder butter or margarine
 1 cup chopped walnuts
 Combine prunes and boiling water. Cover and let stand 20 minutes. Add honey, egg and vanilla. Sift together flour, sugar, soda and salt; add the prune mixture, melted butter or margarine and walnuts, mixing well. Pour into greased 8 1/2 x 5 x 3 pan. Bake in slow oven (325 degrees F) for one hour or until done. Cool 10 minutes. Remove from pan. Cool thoroughly before slicing.

Prune Coconut Crunch
 1 cup cooked prunes, pitted
 1/2 cup liquid from prunes
 1/4 cup granulated sugar
 3/4 t. cinnamon
 3/4 t. lemon juice
 2-3 cup flour
 2-3 cup milk
 1-3 cup light brown sugar
 1-2 cup butter or margarine
 2-3 cup quick-cooking rolled oats
 2-3 cup coconut, flaked or shredded

Chop prunes; add prune liquid, sugar, and cinnamon. Cook until mixture is the consistency of thick jam. Remove from heat and stir in lemon juice. Sift flour and salt; stir in brown sugar and cut in butter until mixture is crumbly. Stir in oats and coconut. Spread half of mixture in a greased eight-inch round pan. Spoon prune mixture evenly onto first layer and top with remaining flour-rolled oat mixture. Bake in slow oven (325 degrees F) for 45 minutes. Serve warm with dabs of whipped cream. Makes eight servings.

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"The snow piled right back again by our plows. We've had more complaints about this — but it cannot be helped. The streets must be cleared."

"I really do feel for them," Kozub said sympathetically. "But there's nothing else we can do."

"We MUST ALWAYS consider the possibility of a fire, where a fire truck must get through, or an emergency illness, where an ambulance must get through..."

"If we could only stress the importance of keeping cars in driveways, rather than on the street. We implore people to get the cars off the street when they see that it is snowing..."

"This seems rather impractical for us, because for one thing, it would take too long to get to a storm sewer."

"RIGHT NOW, the township has equipped three vehicles with plow equipment. This," Kozub said, "is going to come in much handier..."

"The county," Kozub added, "plows Mountain ave., Meisel ave., South Springfield ave., Summit way, Summit rd. and a portion of Hillside ave."

"The moment it starts to snow," he said, "we spread cinders and get about 2 1/2 to three inches deep..."

"We've always looked for and studying the possibilities of new equipment. In fact, there's a thermal snow melter on the market, which runs about \$24,000..."

"We GET THE COOPERATION of about 80 percent of the people in Springfield. But the few remaining are those who cause the most difficult problems..."

"The road department personnel," Kozub stated, "really do a terrific job. Sometimes the men work 36 hours straight, plowing snow..."

"With a little cooperation, we can do a darn good job. We all realize the complaints to Kozub and some of the other employees stand ready for action..."

"and if we can get 100 percent cooperation from the citizens of Springfield, everyone would be much better off."

"Because one never knows when a fire will break out — or if the family which has parked the car out on the street should be the same family to need medical aid or an emergency ambulance..."

"I can't seem to stress enough the importance of keeping cars off the streets. People should stay home during snow storms or they add to our many, many problems."

"They work on five plows, worth \$1,500 a piece; eight additional removal equipment units, about \$10,000 worth; trucks costing about \$5,000 apiece... altogether, \$85,000 worth of equipment."

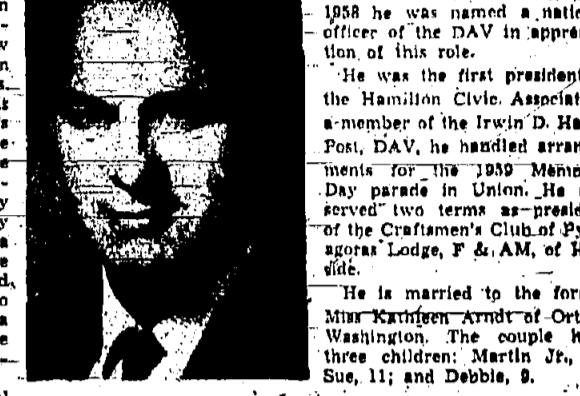

The Howard Savings Institution of Newark has announced plans to acquire the assets of the Irvington State Bank, according to John W. Kress, president of the savings institution.

Unit Cites Need For Computers In County Offices

The Union County Commission on Efficiency and Economy has recommended the installation of automatic data processing equipment. The committee was formed in April at the suggestion of former Freeholder Matthew J. Binardo of Union.

The report dated Dec. 28, said that a "modest computer" should be installed in the welfare board to handle work for the department as well as for the probation department and Rutherford Hospital. Consideration should also be given to additional accounting machines in the treasurer's office to handle payroll and budgetary work, the committee said.

Six meetings were held by the committee, which was formed to find ways of increasing the efficiency of county government. Three computer manufacturers—IBM, NOR and Burroughs Corp.—were invited to submit proposals. Estimates of equipment costs ranged from \$1,100 per month to \$5,800 a month. The committee interpreted the variance in price to the companies' "different understandings of what should be done, and what equipment is necessary."

The committee strongly recommended that the machines be rented or leased, rather than purchased. Members of the committee were: former Freeholder Director Jay A. Steiner, Freeholder Harry Osborne, former Freeholder Thomas Dunn, Rinaldo Thomas Gallagher, John Wernier and Albert H. C. Wiegman. The latter three were citizens.

The Irvington bank has assets of approximately \$10 million. The bank was chartered in 1958. According to Howard L. Mason, president of the bank in a letter sent to stockholders, it is estimated that stockholders will receive in liquidation approximately \$37 to \$40 per share for stock. Irvington State stock had initially sold for \$18 a share.

The Howard, in addition to its main office at 768 Broad st., Newark, has additional suburban offices in South Orange and North Caldwell, as well as five branch offices in Newark.

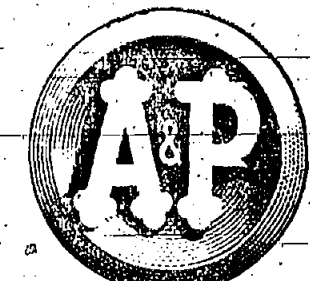
