ment to the governing body, in support of its stand. She declared:

"The League of Women Voters of Springfield has a position in regard to the town's zoning ordinance. This position stresses the orderly development of Springfield in accordance with the Master Plan."

"The League of Women Voters supports the town's decision of Sept. 25, 1968 to deny a variance for construction of a commercial parking area on a residential lot at the property located at 733 Mountain Ave., Springfield, Block No. 147, Lot No. 14."

"We hold that the granting of this variance would be detrimental to the orderly growth and development of Springfield as stated in the town's zoning ordinance. We therefore urge the Township Committee to take action to appeal the court's reversal of their decision."

Other comments supporting the township, and strongly opposing to the proposed variance were presented by Irving Neubart of Lakeland, H. Kuperstein of Albemarle Court and Frank Fanelli of N. Perry Rd.

Fanelli commented, "We have to live in the country, and we don't want all the carbon monoxide in our yards. This is a big business, and they just want to shove it under."

Mrs. Judith Weinstock, who had written a letter, "With respect to the committee's action and expressed their support for the variance. They stressed the need for a zoning ordinance that would provide a buffer between the residential property owners and the use of the land because of a zoning boundary in the middle of the property."

Seal also said that expansion of the parking areas would remove parked cars from the street and would reduce traffic congestion in the area.

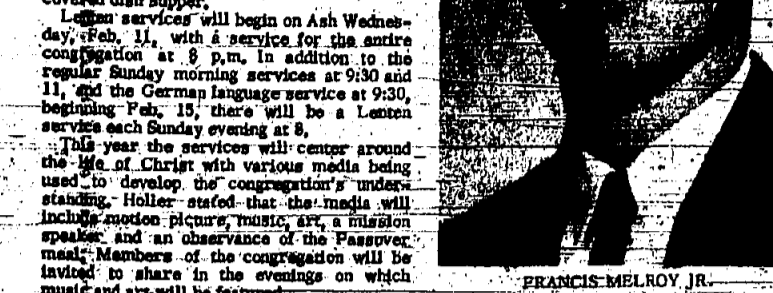

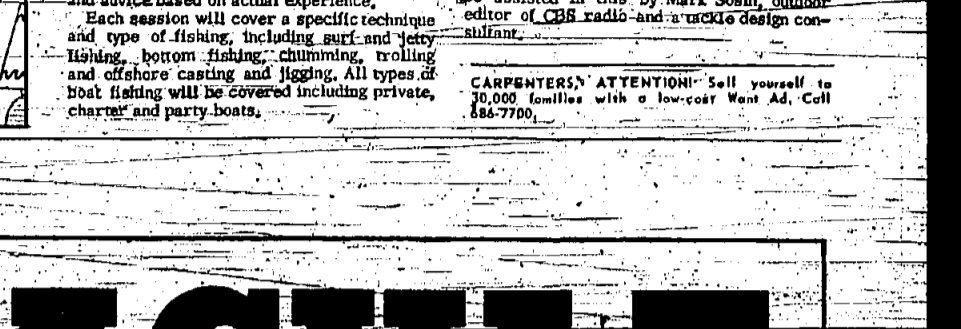

Removing cars helped township to plow roads

Those of us who complained from June to November about the local ordinance clearing the streets of overnight parkers, might well have had some second thoughts these past weeks.

The results of the ruling were quite evident as streets were plowed more quickly and much more effectively following each of the recent snow storms.

Because the curbs were clear of parked cars, the plows were able to sweep the length of each block in half the time. It seemed, and without having to twist a round at the obstructions.

A quick comparison with a neighboring town, Union, where parking is still permitted all night, is quite instructive. Springfield streets are plowed well up to the curbs, and access to side streets is substantially easier.

In addition, the better plow job permits whatever sun there is to apply its melting power to the snow left in the roadways.

The snow left in our valleys by the need to widen sidewalks in order to get all our cars off the streets at night remains, but now we can feel that the ordinance, in-

convenient as it may have been for the one brief period, has helped the community in the long run.

While we're talking about snow, however, we might all do well to take a good look at our sidewalks. Local police handed out 24 summonses last week to bad neighbors who failed to shovel a pedestrian path.

The major sufferers are children who must walk to school. There have been frequent comments in recent days about youngsters forced to walk in the street during the morning rush hour—particularly along Stimpke road.

The Township Committee, too, might make sure that all new homes be required to have sidewalks.

Perhaps we should wait for a snow-covered road to start at getting sidewalks installed on those blocks where pedestrians now are forced to walk in the path of traffic, at year round.

Or perhaps the people and the leaders of Springfield will be able to avert such a tragedy.

Science Topics

SATELLITE WOULD AID LUNAR COMMUNICATION - A satellite in the earth-orbit communication link between the earth and astronauts on the far side of the moon has been proposed by a group of aerospace engineering students at the University of Michigan.

SAURUS'S RINGS are formed largely of ammonia ice, say scientists at the University of Arizona. The rings are thought to be composed of ice and ammonia.

USE OF WELDING METHODS to join plastics will grow in the next decade, predicts Chemtron Corporation, Chicago. The company said that plastic has now been joined by using specialized equipment.

A NEW AND HIGHLY sensitive test to avoid the acute rejection in kidney transplants has been developed by Stanford University physicians. They report that by using this test, which determines whether the potential kidney recipient's immune system is attacking the donor's kidney, they are now able to know which patients have the highest chance of a successful transplant.

THE USE OF LARGE amounts of the biologically active form of the vitamin nicotinamide to treat chronic schizophrenia may not only be effective but also may worsen the condition of the patient, reports a psychiatrist at the University of Chicago. 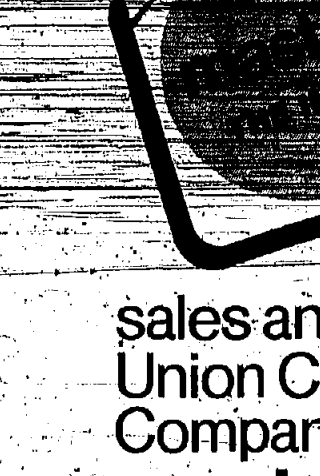

# UC gets more U. S. tuition aid for law enforcement course

The Office of Academic Assistance of the U.S. Department of Justice has awarded Union College a grant for law enforcement education. The grant is for the law enforcement course which is being offered by the college.

Earlier this year Union College was awarded \$3,000 for a similar purpose, bringing the total funds available to the college for the 1970-71 year to \$20,000.

There are 41 law enforcement men and women enrolled in Union College's law enforcement program, and 44 of them are qualified for federal tuition aid grants.

Dr. Iversen said a limited number of additional law enforcement majors will be admitted to Union College's evening session for the upcoming spring semester. With the new grant there will be financial aid available for most if not all of the energetic freshmen in the law enforcement curriculum, Dr. Iversen said.
