

# UC gets more U. S. tuition aid for law enforcement course

The college, which has a \$22 million federal grant over five years to treat addicts in a program coordinated with existing drug addiction rehabilitation programs, is on its own conducting an extensive drug education program in schools throughout the state. As Director of Drug Abuse staff members present these programs, they also are being educated in the extent of the problem in New Jersey.

"One of the difficulties has been that there is no accurate estimation of the amount of drug abuse in this area," Dr. Louria said. "I can tell you, from our limited experience to date, that the problem is growing more widespread than any of us in public health had thought."

THE COLLEGE IS GETTING THE message partially through an 80-part questionnaire which is taken voluntarily by high and high school students in schools where the education program is taking place. Actually, there are several types of drug education programs being conducted by the college. The first was a "hospital-college family" program designed to educate high school students on drug abuse and treatment for attending physicians, residents, interns, medical students and nurses. These sessions were accomplished through workshops, rounds, and lecture courses.

Once the college staff had become somewhat knowledgeable, they turned the attention to the community where drug workshops are being presented. These workshops are conducted by the college staff, public health nurses, P.P.S. and other service groups. Monthly there have been conferences presented by the college staff, Dr. Robert A. Walker, director of the state's drug abuse program, Dr. Stanley Binetstein, educational coordinator at Mark O'Connell, a Ph.D. candidate who is presenting a seminar on drug abuse.

BUT THE PROGRAM which the staff feels is the most important is the comprehensive program which includes the questionnaire and the educational program. The questionnaire is given to the students and the educational program is given to the students.

Small groups, each led by a student volunteer, participate in a questionnaire which is taken voluntarily by high and high school students in schools where the education program is taking place. School administration is provided with all material except student names so they know exactly the extent of the drug use in their school. The college is possessing this program in eight schools during this school year. Other schools interested may write to the college to be put on his list for next year.

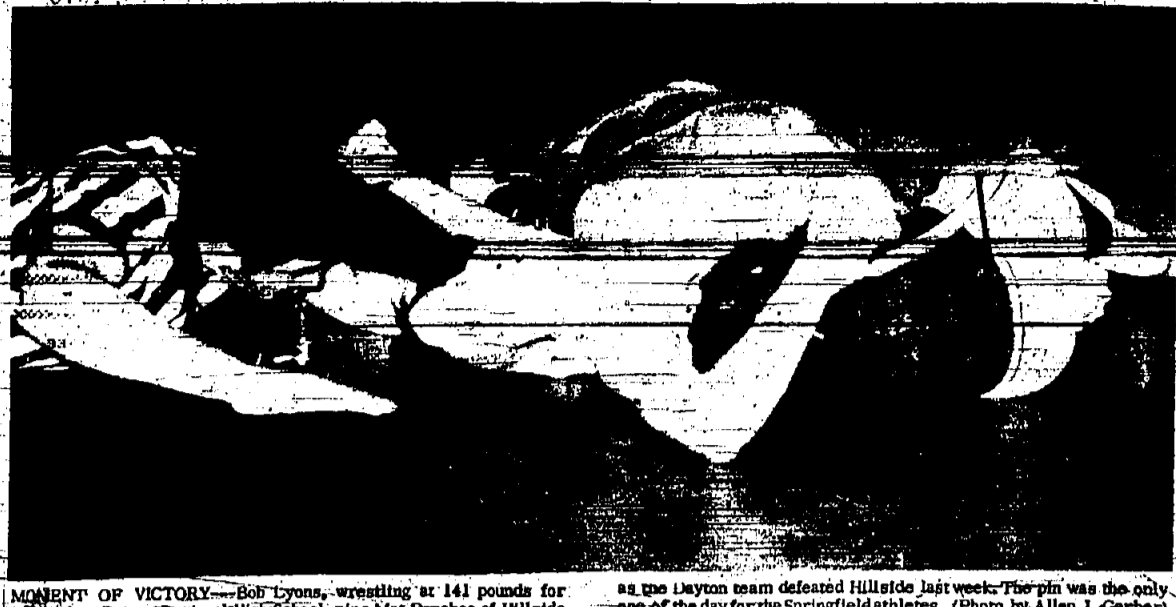
