Board will cut bus service for 31 children at 2 schools

Move made over protest of 50 residents in area

Despite vehement opposition from some 50 residents of the Clinton Ridge drive and Rolling Rock road areas, the Springfield Board of Education Tuesday reduced to five the number of children to be bused to two schools in the area.

The board, however, voted to delay implementation of the new policy from yesterday until April 6, to give the parents some time to make other arrangements.

Cawley may get district judgeship

First Aid Squad puts out appeal for daytime help

The Springfield First Aid Squad has once again found it necessary to put out an urgent plea for new daytime members.

"You've got to learn to protect yourself," said the squad's president, Dr. J. D. Lyles. "We just don't have enough daytime help. Some days we must run the rigs with only two people. This is not good. If we cannot get more members we may be forced into a desperate situation, so cancel all daytime services except dire emergencies."

"This would mean that there would be no daytime transportation from home to hospital, from hospital to home, or from hospital to nursing home. It would mean that these calls would have to be taken care of by night crew, which might cause a real inconvenience to patients and their families."

"To become a member of the Squad, a person must be at least 21 years old and have a driver's license. New members will be supplied with all equipment and clothing they will need. They will receive their training on the job as well as in regular training sessions."

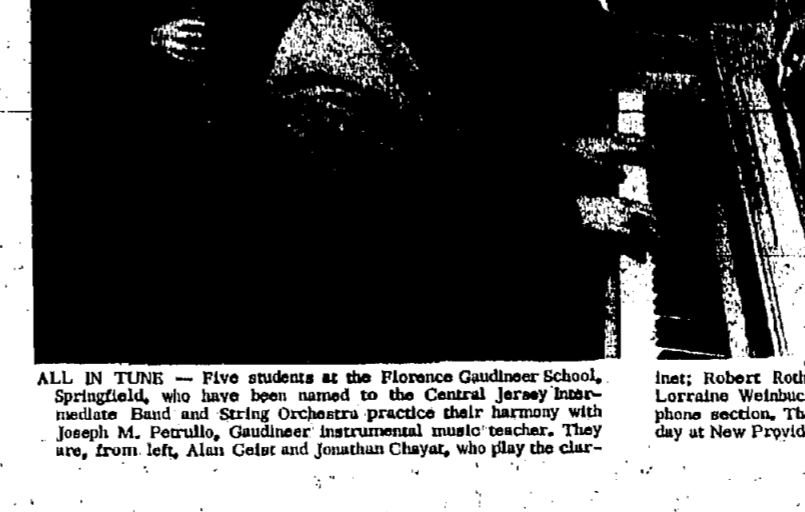

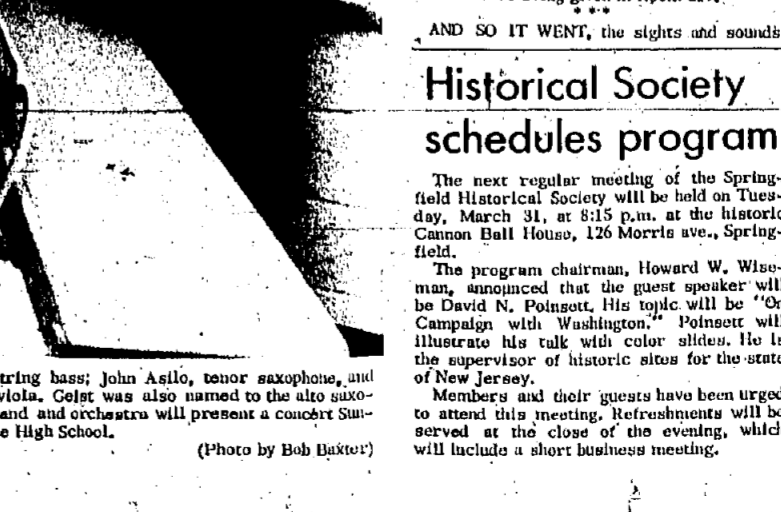

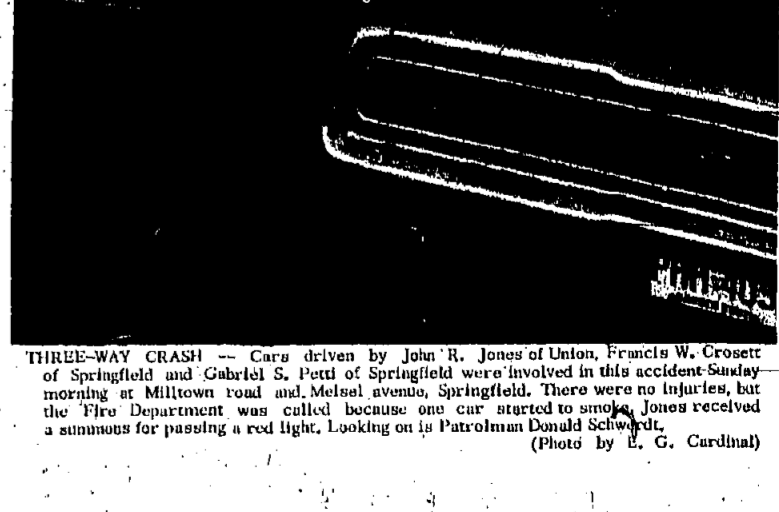

Space age medicine arrives; device diagnoses blood flow

A \$63,000 Gamma camera, made possible by the advances of space age technology, has been given to Overlook Hospital's radiology department by the Overlook Women's Auxiliary, according to an announcement made by Mrs. Walter F. Greener of Chatham, auxiliary president.
According to Dr. Alexander D. Crockett, Overlook radiologist, the 15-inch diameter camera's nuclear medicine scanner, the gamma camera, is "one of the most sophisticated pieces of equipment in the field of nuclear medicine and a tremendous diagnostic advance for Overlook patients."
"With this \$63,000 installation, Overlook has one of the best equipped isotope laboratories in the state," Dr. Crockett commented.

"IMPORTANT FOR OVERLOOK patients, the gamma camera gives vital dynamic information on blood flow to various parts of the body—lungs, brain, heart, kidneys, liver, thyroid, and other vital organs—clearly showing their function as well as any abnormalities of their static structure. This gives vital diagnostic information that never before could be determined so precisely," he pointed out.
Dr. Crockett explained that radioactive isotopes enable the radiologist to see organs, tissues, and the arterial system through use of tracer materials not available in the early days of radiology.
"This system takes a matter of minutes to set up and a matter of minutes to perform. It is a procedure that is safe, simple, and non-invasive. Abnormal tissue retains differing amounts of radioactive material, and this is shown on the screen. This distribution is shown by the detector and recorded on film."
By electronic means, the output of the detector can be built in the middle, so that the function of paired organs, such as kidneys or lungs, can be separated and compared with each other.

What a difference a decade makes

Census will picture changes since '60

Ten years of change in New Jersey's population and living conditions will be reflected in the 1970 Decennial Census to be conducted through the summer in April by the Bureau of the Census, U.S. Department of Commerce. The statistics will provide information on the state in 1970 compared with the 1960 census. Even the census taking process will be changed for many Americans. All households will receive census forms by mail to be filled out at home. In densely populated areas, including the entire state of New Jersey, they will be asked to return the forms by mail to the Census Bureau. In other parts of the country, census takers will call to pick up the completed forms.

As one of the 13 original states, New Jersey was included in the First Decennial Census in 1790 when 184,139 inhabitants were counted. By 1900 the population had grown to 1,883,669. The most rapid rate of growth in the 20th century came during the next decade when the 1910 census recorded a 34.7 percent increase over 1900. At mid-century the population stood at 4,435,329. The numerical gain of 2,551,659 in the decade following was the greatest in the history of the state.

Taxpayers group publishes analysis of '71 state budget

The New Jersey Taxpayers Association this week published its annual analysis of the Governor's budget recommendations to the State Legislature. Calling for expenditure of nearly \$1.6 billion in fiscal year 1971, the budget is the largest in the state's history. With the 1971 budget, the association estimated, "New Jersey passes another \$1/2 billion budget inflation." NJTA pointed out that it took the first 107 years of New Jersey's history for the budget to reach the \$1/2 billion appropriation level in fiscal 1965. Three years later, in fiscal 1968, the state added its second \$1/2 billion. Now, after only three years have elapsed, the 1971 budget exceeds \$1-1/2 billion. Thus, in less than a decade, the state's budget will have expanded over \$1 billion. In addition, it was noted, a total of over \$1 billion of state bonded indebtedness has been authorized in the last two years.

VA home grants

The VA says permanently and totally disabled veterans are eligible for \$12,500 for the construction, remodeling or adaptation of homes.

1. Call the doctor, hospital or poison center immediately.

2. Dilute the poison whenever possible with a glass of water.

3. Make patient vomit, but not if the patient is unconscious or is having convulsions, or if the swallowed poison was a strong corrosive or contained kerosene, gasoline or other petroleum distillates, unless it also contains dangerous insecticide, which must be removed.

To make a patient vomit, Meyer listed the following recommendations of the American Association of Poison Control Centers:

1. Give one tablespoonful (one-half ounce) of syrup of ipecac for children plus at least one cup of water, if no vomiting occurs after 30 minutes, this dose may be repeated.

2. If no ipecac syrup is available, try to make patient vomit by tickling back of throat after giving water.

3. Do not waste time waiting for vomiting, but transport patient, if indicated, to medical facility. Bring package or container with intact label.

It is advisable to have an ounce of syrup of ipecac in the home, Meyer said, "and it is absolutely essential to call for help promptly."

The doctor's office and home phone numbers should be prominently listed and readily available. So should the number of your poison control center, hospital, rescue squad or police, in case your doctor cannot be reached promptly.

"The swifter the action, the better the chance of avoiding tragedy."

Meyer said the pharmacist's purpose in setting aside a specific time as Poison Prevention Week is to focus public attention on the serious situation and urge people to prepare themselves in advance, and thus be alert to any contingency.

Soil study key to state land claim

Meadowlands ownership rests on tidal line

It is not often that professors of soil science are asked to help establish ownership of property, but this what John Tedrow and Kathryn Harman, both tried to do in one of the world's most difficult pieces of "recreation."

Dr. Tedrow and Harman, faculty members at Rutgers University, Camden, and Environmental Science, have completed a study of soil and vegetation to assist in determining the extent of tidal influence in the Hackensack Meadowlands.

With its strategic location in the New York-Boston transportation corridor, the value of the Meadowlands area is estimated as high as \$85,000 an acre.

The Resource Development Council of the New Jersey Department of Conservation and Economic Development, which commissioned the study, has claimed that 9,000 acres of the Meadowlands area is state property.

According to law, all land below the high tide line belongs to the state. In large, low-lying marshy areas like the Meadowlands this is difficult to determine, because of the numerous dikes, channels and landfills imposed by man over the past 300 years have made it uncommonly difficult to fix boundaries by the usual survey methods.

By studying core samples from the tidal line, it was possible for us to reconstruct the physical history of the Meadowlands for several hundred years and may indicate how far sea water has advanced into the Meadowlands. But soil survey can also be blown inland by storms.

"Similarly, vegetation is another indicator of tidal influence—with some species occurring only under salt conditions. Distribution of plants, however, is not uniform throughout the Meadowlands, and other factors may be involved."

"The most reliable single historical indicator," Dr. Tedrow and Harman say, "is pollen analysis of peat cores. This technique takes together that a reasonable degree of precision is possible."

"The indicators were in agreement that this area was originally below the high tide line and thus should probably be claimed by the State," the authors report.

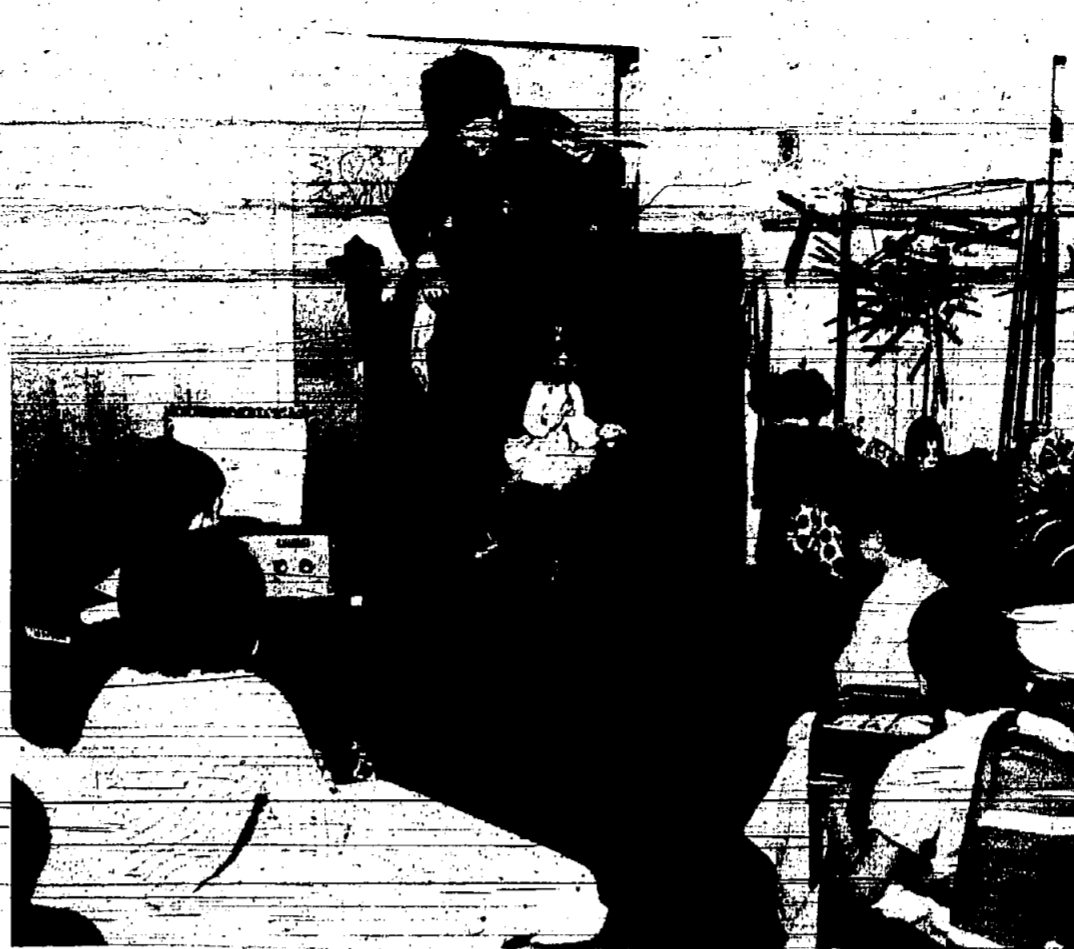

Springfield zoning regulation withstands court challenge

In a 13-page decision, Superior Court Judge Milton A. Feller ruled in Elizabeth on Monday, that a challenged Springfield zoning ordinance is valid. Stating that "economic loss alone is never the basis for upsetting a zoning ordinance," the judge ruled against a suit brought by the Bahlstrol Top Inc., a developer. Specifically, the firm's suit, presented by Ernest Prepis, protested a September, 1968, ordinance which changed its property from an S-75 to an S170 residential zone. Before the revision, the tract, required a minimum lot area of 10,000 square feet, and minimum frontages and depths of 75 and 110 feet, respectively. The new zoning demands 22,000 square feet at minimum lot size, with a minimum width of 120 feet, and a minimum depth of 160 feet. The firm asserted that the rules were unreasonable and made development of the land impossible. The tract in question borders on Bahlstrol Golf Club, near the Mountainside border. The firm owns 6.15 acres of wooded land, which is part of an 11-acre plot stretching through both Mountainside and Springfield. The company claimed the new regulations made it impossible to construct a road through the land because of the lot size requirements. Edward J. Grassman of Elizabeth, head of the company, asserted the frontage requirements decreased the number of lots available. Feller ruled that the ordinance was without "arbitrary discrimination," as the firm had asserted, and noted that lots in the tract, which had been developed earlier, had not been constructed at the S-75 minimums, but were mainly between the S-75 and S-120 regulations.

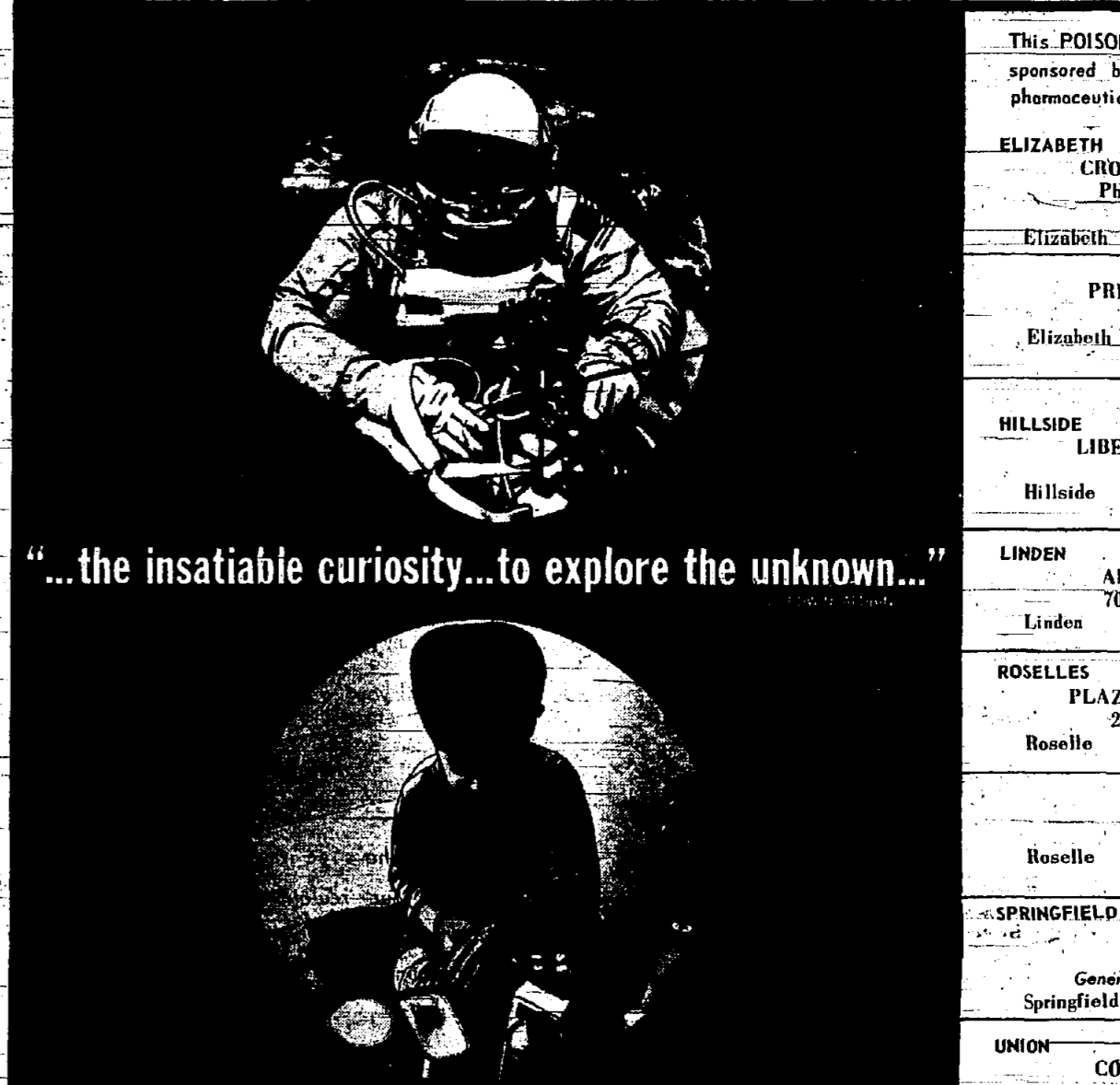

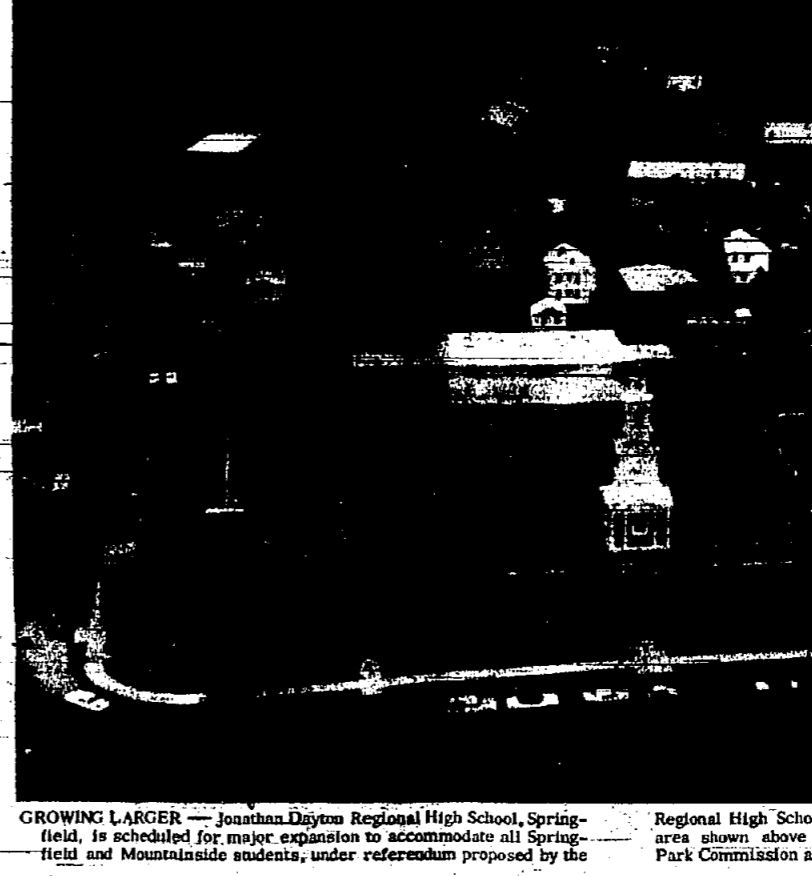
