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Regional expansion plan debated as Tuesday vote nears

The Regional High School District Board of Education last Tuesday held the first of a series of four public discussion programs on its \$6,975,000 expansion bond proposal, which will be presented to the voters in a referendum on Tuesday.

The meeting was held before a scant 40 members of the public at Jonathan Dayton Regional High School, Springfield. The second in the series Monday at A. L. Johnson Regional, Clark, was adjourned when only one interested citizen appeared.

The third meeting was scheduled for last night at Gov. Livingston Regional, Berkeley Heights — too late to be reported in this issue. The final session will be held tonight at 8 at

David Brearley Regional, Kentworth.

Most of the discussion from the floor was by residents of Mountainside, speaking both for and against the proposal. Edward Little of Berkeley Heights, board vice-president, conducted the meeting.

Dr. Frederick Hagedorn, also of Berkeley Heights, reviewed the board's planning and presented details of the expansion plan for the district's four high schools.

He commented that the schools are grossly overcrowded with 5,441 students, well above the functional capacity of 4,484, and that registration would continue to rise for at least the next five years.

Dr. Hagedorn said that the board is now using seven portable, temporary classrooms

and nine substandard classrooms, and that it will be forced to add three more portable rooms next fall.

He also declared that the plans had to comply with recently revised state standards in order to win approval in Trenton. Dr. Hagedorn added, "We think it is worth the investment."

Two statements supporting the proposal were then presented, both based on a study conducted by the League of Women Voters of Springfield and Berkeley Heights, the only two leagues within the district. Mrs. Herbert Earman, president of the Springfield League, read an endorsement previously announced to the board.

Mrs. Harry Nash of Mountainside, who is a board member of the Westfield League, noted

that she had participated in the study, as had several other Mountainside residents, and that she was in favor of the referendum as a "viable educational plan."

Mrs. Nash later declared, "I support this plan, for the good of all the children of the district, not just those of Mountainside alone."

Frederick Wilhelms, former mayor of Mountainside, spoke at some length in opposition to the proposal. He debated with the board on two aspects of the new state standards of functional capacity — whether they were best for the Regional District and whether they were required by the State Department of Education or were merely recommendations.

The old standard set a maximum approved capacity of 30 students per class, with the

assumption that each class would be 80 percent full — or 24 students.

The new standard sets a maximum approved capacity of 25 students, again with the assumption that they will average 80 percent full — or 20 students.

After lengthy discussion, he was not able to alter the board's stand that the plans would not have been approved with the larger class size. The board, on the other hand, was unable to shake Wilhelms' conviction that the change was simply a recommendation and not a requirement.

Little commented that the old formula of maximum size of 30 students, now in effect, leaves "several of our schools terribly over-

crowded. It does not meet the needs of our schools today."

Mrs. John Hecht of Mountainside recalled that Wilhelms had led a drive for smaller class size in Mountainside when he had been on that borough's board of education.

Wilhelms told the board, "I do not question the need for small classes, but I do question the rationale of this proposal. It is untimely, seeking to do two things.

"These are to provide housing for bodies, which is certainly needed, and to improve the standards in the high schools beyond what the taxpayers will pay for."

He added, "I'm all in favor of reduced class

Bond referendum yes vote urged

The officers of the Jonathan Dayton Regional High School PTA have endorsed Tuesday's referendum for the expansion of the four schools of Union County Regional District, including Springfield, Berkeley Heights, Kentworth, Mountainside, Garwood and Clark.

In making the endorsement, Mrs. Leonard Harris, PTA president, issued the following statement: "The pupil population of the Regional District has been growing steadily and the schools have been seriously overcrowded for the past several years. There is an acute shortage of classroom space and a very great need to renovate the Jonathan Dayton High School.

"The May 12 referendum proposed by the Regional Board of Education is a fair and equitable way to solve these problems. It will provide needed classroom, laboratory, and library space and will create physical facilities that will contribute to the development of quality education in the four schools of the Regional District.

Yes vote urged in school bond voting by LWV

"After a thorough study of the proposed school referendum, the League of Women Voters of Springfield recommends and urges that all voters support it by a yes vote on Tuesday," Mrs. Herbert Forman, League president, announced this week.

"Why yes?" "Present overcrowding at all four schools in the district would be alleviated. We have substandard cafeterias, gym, and library facilities. Study halls are used excessively because of insufficient classroom space.

"Dayton, the oldest school in the district, will receive much-needed renovation and expansion.

"Instructional media centers (expanded learning centers) with facilities for individual study would be provided."

Mrs. Forman cited other reasons for those inclined to question the need for more spending, and therefore higher taxes: "A school system of high quality can only improve property values since homes in this area are more desirable."

"Furthermore, as construction costs increase, so would the cost of a new referendum should this one be defeated."

Mrs. Forman concluded, "Both Leagues in the Union County Regional High School District — Berkeley Heights and Springfield — have studied the referendum and believe it will benefit the entire school population.



High school Student Council asks expansion plan approval

The Student Council of Jonathan Dayton Regional High School this week urged all local citizens to vote in favor of the \$7 million Regional High School District expansion plan, which will be presented in a referendum Tuesday in the district's six member communities.

The Student Council declared: "On May 12, the six towns of the Regional High School District will vote on the proposed expansion referendum. This planned expansion of the Regional schools will provide the much-needed facilities to relieve the congestion of our high schools.

"We of the Jonathan Dayton Regional High School Student Council believe that passage

of this referendum is requisite to the future of this school district.

"We recognize that perhaps the major fault of our schools is the unfortunate inadequacy of existing facilities. Classrooms are overcrowded, and special services (laboratory, library and physical education equipment, etc.) do not meet the needs of the ever-increasing school population.

"Many projected renovations in scheduling and teaching methodology are being deferred because of the lack of space. For example, plans for an independent study program and closed-circuit television equipment have necessarily been delayed until further space

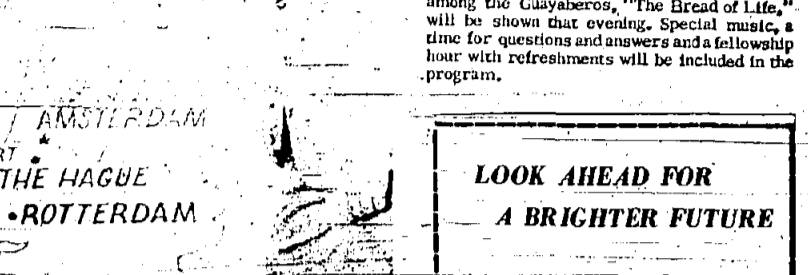

The Computer Van helps doctors learn how to fight cancer

Computer Van, a new and unique method of continuing education for physicians and patients, will be one of the attractions at the annual convention of the Medical and Dental Societies of New Jersey scheduled for next week and the following week in Atlantic City. Computer Van was built and equipped by the Academy of Medicine of New Jersey with the aid of a grant from the New Jersey Division of the American Cancer Society.

The van will be parked on the street outside the Shoreline Hotel for the Dental Society meeting from Sunday through Wednesday, and then will move to the exhibit area of Hudson Hall for the Medical Society of New Jersey convention May 17 to 19.

The van makes various types of cancer cases available to the doctors with simulated patients through use of computers. The physician "examines" the patient, orders the diagnostic procedures and obtains instant results. He then selects the treatment of his choice and the results of this action are presented instantaneously by the computer.

Four continuous projection programs illustrate various types of cancer, as well as other aspects of malignant disease. The computer software used in the van was furnished by Worley & Ring, Inc., of Philadelphia.

The simulated patient cases have been written by New Jersey physicians of international repute. This new concept in education provides physicians and dentists with the opportunity to keep up on the latest techniques in cancer care more efficiently and at no charge.

The van, which opened in September at Mountsinclair Hospital in Montclair, has visited a hospital in each of the 21 counties in the state.

'Timed intervals' can prevent injury, costly auto collisions

Leaving too little room between cars sets the stage for one of the most costly and involved types of all traffic crashes—the rear-end collision. It accounts for more than one-third of all traffic mishaps, today and for non-malicious drivers. To keep a safe distance between cars and avoid rear-end collisions, Motor Club suggests that drivers apply the theory of the "timed interval" when driving.

The "timed interval" means at any given time, a car should be 100 feet behind the car in front. At 60 m.p.h., it covers 100 feet in two seconds. Each distance is what the experts recommend that drivers apply at that particular speed.

Wireless heart care center at work Unit monitors 48 patients at St. Barnabas

St. Barnabas Medical Center, Livingston, N.J., has opened a new wireless heart care center in the United States as part of a \$3 million facilities-expansion program. The new facility monitors continuously the heart patterns of 48 patients in the new Heart Care Convalescent Wing of the hospital.

An electronic heart care center consists of some 48 transmitter units attached to the patients, and a display unit consisting of meters, dials, and visual display devices, like small television screens at a central monitoring station. The manifestations are watched continuously by nurses, and in addition, any significant deviations from normal set off an audible alarm.

The new electronic ambulatory system, designed and installed by the Medical Systems Division of Gulton Industries, Menlo Park, is completely wireless. Thus the patient need not remain in bed while being monitored, but can walk about carrying a transmitter that looks much like a small transistor radio the size of a pack of cigarettes. With older techniques the patient had to remain in bed while under observation, and the heart signals were transmitted by wire to the central monitoring station. Besides giving the patient freedom of movement, the new Gulton approach assures that the patient is isolated from all other equipment, providing added convenience with total monitoring safety.

THE NEW HEART care facility, according to Anthony Scala, president of the St. Barnabas Board of Trustees, will offer three important advantages over conventional systems:

1. Better care for the patient. With continuous monitoring in place of intermittent checking, both long-time and sudden short deviations are noted immediately, and action taken. The doctor can study the patient's heart activity without interrupting it. It is the psychological effect of his presence at the application of instruments, by observing the patient under varying conditions (sleeping, conversing, walking, exercising, etc.) in a quiet location to tell when the patient is ready to leave the hospital, and can develop a "work load" pattern for him (tell him whether he can resume full activity, carry on with his job, or must rest completely, and continue his convalescence at home).

2. Economy. Because each patient's condition is continuously monitored at the central station, it is possible to shorten his stay in intensive care, while at the same time assuring the patient the equivalent care of a nurse at his side at all times. This will reduce the cost to the patient, improve care received—and, coincidentally, provide for better utilization of nursing personnel.

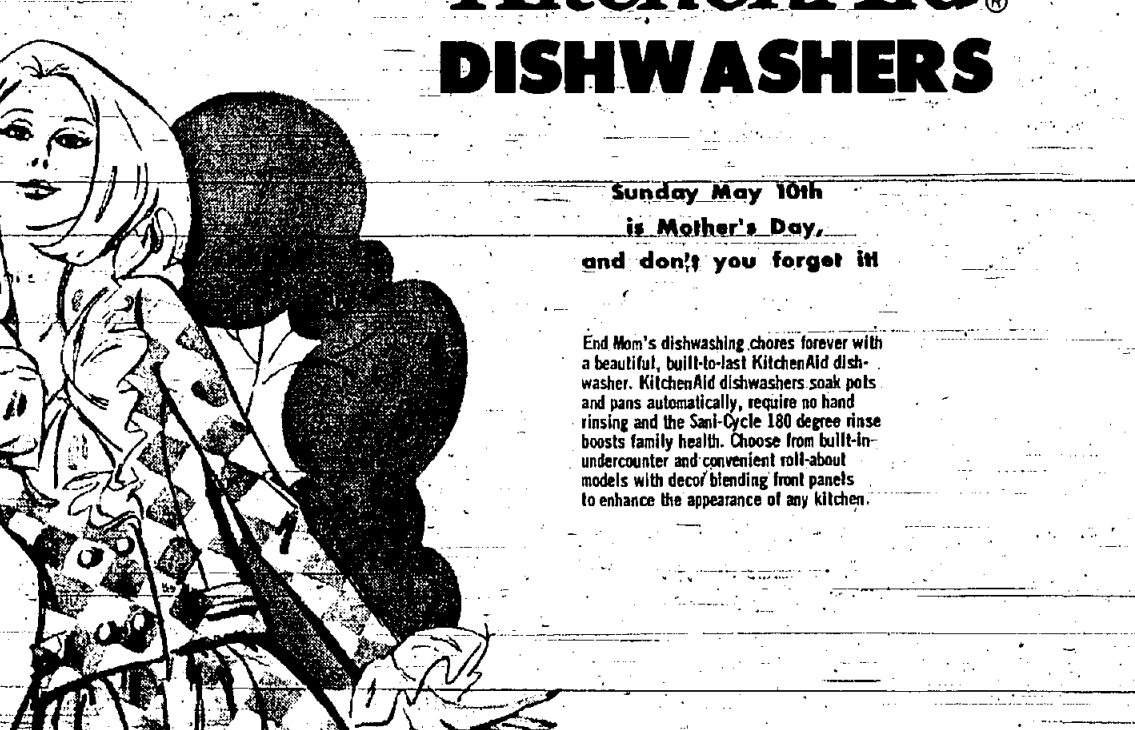
3. Emergencies or significant changes in the patient's heart condition are signaled immediately. This is very important. Scala stated, "Even a nurse at the bedside would often require some seconds or minutes to note the effects of a change that might have been flashed on the cathode-ray screen while still in the patient's room."

THE GULTON EQUIPMENT consists of two banks of 24 receivers each, with metering units having high-limit and low-limit switches that indicate an alarm if the heart manifestations deviate beyond set limits. Each of the receiver banks is connected to a recording and display unit consisting of an 8-channel oscilloscope, a two-channel oscilloscope, a strip-chart recorder and a switch panel permitting the nurse on duty to place the patient from any 18 of the 48 patients on the scope display for visual study, or on the strip chart recorder, or both at once. If a patient's heart response deviates beyond safe limits his heart pattern is automatically displayed on the two-channel scope and a 15-second recording made.

Scope frequencies and selective filtering circuits add to the isolation between the emergency center and reduce possibilities of interference to a negligible minimum.

The gulton multi-lead alarm circuit operates when the signal from the transmitter disappears (battery goes dead, patient walks into a shielded spot, etc.) or is no longer modulated (electrode falls off the patient). In such cases "transmitter-off" or "electrode-off" lights are actuated instead of an alarm.

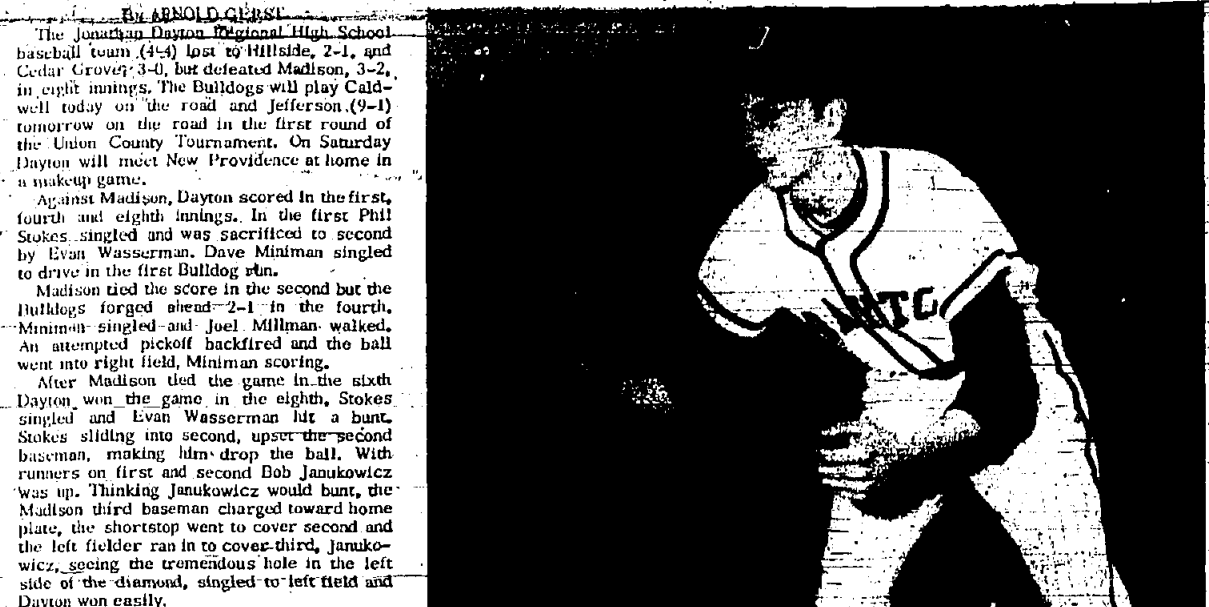

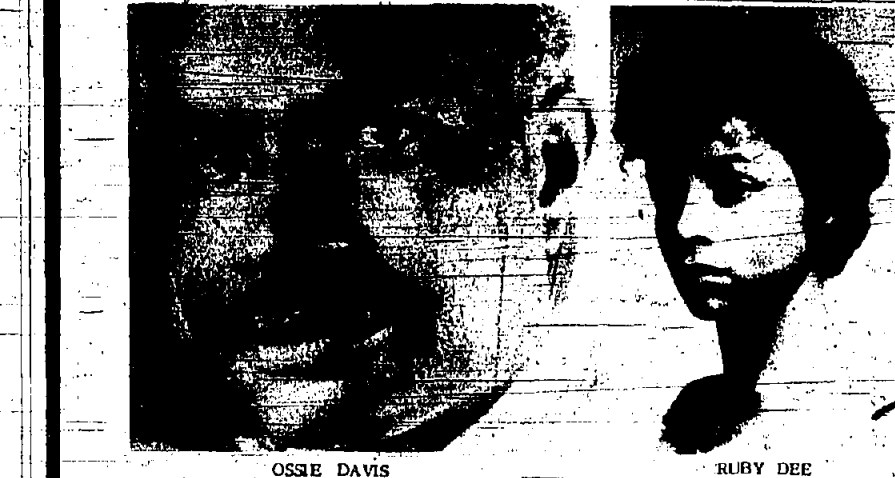

Medical program gets \$1.3 million

A \$1,332,201 grant has been received by the New Jersey Regional Medical Program to carry out a three-year, statewide planning effort and operational programs relating to heart disease, cancer, stroke and related disorders, according to Alvin A. Fleish, M.D., coordinator.

In its third year, the NJRMP seeks to improve the quality and availability of health care for the state's nearly 7 1/2 million residents. To date, more than \$2 million has been received from the U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare for planning and project activities.

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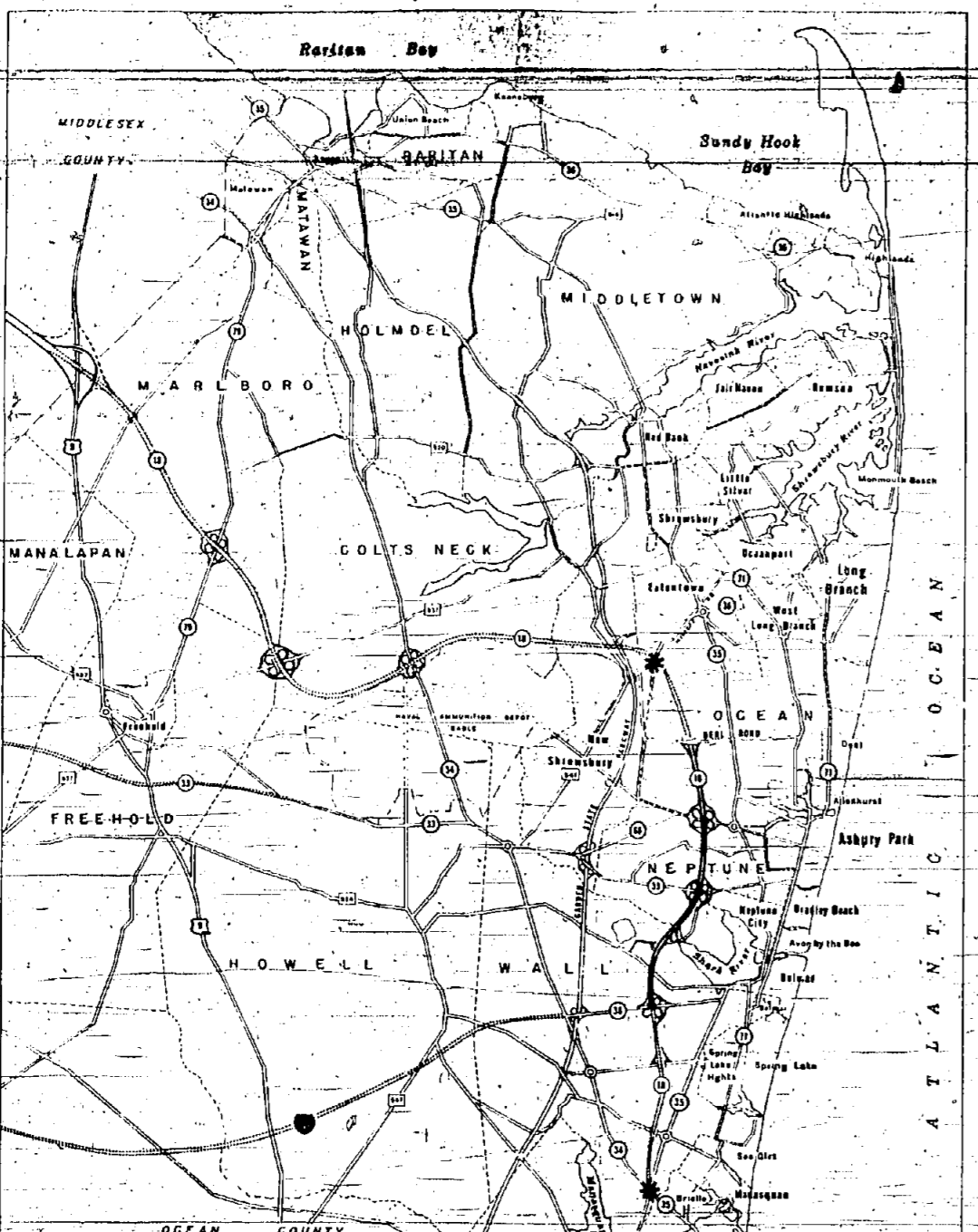

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Entire pollution problem seen solved by single sewage-solid waste system

A "single" system combining sewage treatment and solid waste disposal, which could eliminate water pollution, produce power, reduce air pollution by avoiding incineration, and cut up to 100 degrees Fahrenheit the resulting slurry is free of disease-causing bacteria. The water which passes through the solidification tanks is 90% water after biological treatment, but still contains dissolved impurities, mostly inorganic. New Federal pollution control regulations demand that inorganic impurities be removed from the slurry, and that the slurry be incinerated in a high-temperature unit and added either to the hydroplastic or, after dilution with chlorine, to the slurry plant for final disposal. Eighty percent of the slurry plant product, pure, drinkable water, according to Dr. Etzel.

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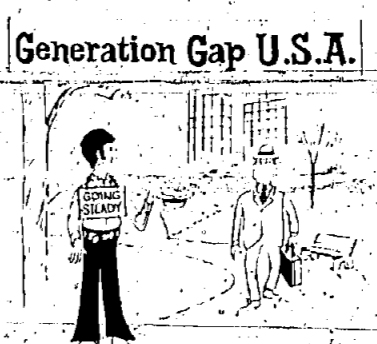
