There are few in our society who do not feel that the burden of inflation falls heavier than the burden of war on the poor. For many of them, life is a constant battle against consistently rising prices, fought with the inadequate weapons of food stamps. In short, it is a steadily losing proposition for too many senior citizens.

One of the greatest tragedies of our time is the fact that the crushing burden of the cost-of-living crisis is forcing so many of our senior citizens to sell their homes or to have to purchase a new one for over \$20,000.

Several years ago, the Legislature enacted a law to help senior citizens cope with rising taxes. The state constitution was amended to permit the state to increase the rate of its sales tax from 3 to 4 percent, and the increase in taxes and other forms have made the \$80 figure look progressively irrelevant.

### Hated won't achieve the peace we all want

The outstanding development on the national level this spring has been the expansion of the Vietnam war into the rest of Indochina, coupled with a crescendo of student protest at home.

It was all brought to the point of confrontation, of course, by the sudden burst of gunfire last week on the campus at Kent State University.

The ultimate goal for almost all of us is the same. We all want peace. This applies to President Nixon as well as to the young people who are trapped in a military fiasco not of his own making. It applies equally to the young people marching to express their opposition to national policy and to the most of those who advocate the emotional instability in the form of Viet Cong flags.

"Certainly, the property rights of the landlord. If they do not, recognize that they are as a landlord's responsibility to him to maintain the premises in a safe and sound condition."

The proposed ordinance would provide for construction of a "code enforcement agency" under the leadership of the town building inspector, and would stipulate procedures for enforcement.

A key provision of the ordinance is the requirement that the building inspector issue a new certificate of occupancy, following an inspection of the premises, each time there is a change in the occupant of a dwelling or dwelling unit.

THIS, HOWEVER, was the prime contention of those who participated in the public session of the meeting - that the sleeping certificate would create an undue burden on many roads, especially Springfield Avenue, and side roads alike.

# Dotto issues warning on poisoning

"Lead poisoning can have serious consequences," said Charles J. Dotto, health officer of the Springfield Board of Health, "and this is especially true among young children, who seem to be its most frequent victims."

He attributed the majority of cases to children's unknowingly eating lead or materials containing lead in their natural desire to put things into their mouths.

Some of the possible sources, the health officer added, included lead-containing paint and face powders, toys, colored crayons and chalks, and field-grown fruits and vegetables improperly cleaned of certain insecticides. Other cases consisted of drinking water transmitted through lead pipes, and inhaling fumes from the burning of items which contain lead, such as storage batteries.

"By far the most frequent cause is from eating paint," Dotto said. The explanation he gave was that many young children have the habit of chewing on painted surfaces. If the paint they swallow as a result of this activity contains lead, a lot of paint is ingested, which can occur.

Lead tends to build up in the body, and as it increases, it becomes poisonous and produces symptoms ranging from mild weakness with vomiting and loss of appetite to brain damage and death.

Dotto recommended that only paints without lead be used on interior walls and furniture, because the home offers the child the greatest access to painted surfaces. Home painters carry a statement of lead content.

If there is any doubt, do not use it, the health officer said. He suggested that parents have any doubts about previously-painted furniture, walls or woodwork, try to remove the paint and recover with non-lead paint, or at least paint over with non-lead paint.

Dotto urged parents with young children to be on the lookout for possible sources of lead poisoning and to eliminate them as far as possible.

"If you suspect that a child has been exposed to any quantity of lead, regardless of the source, take him to a doctor immediately," the health officer concluded.

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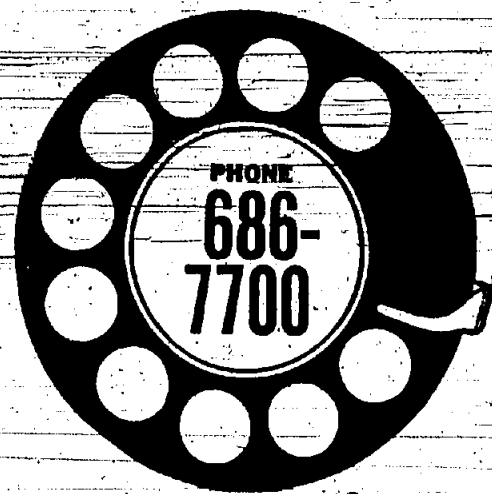

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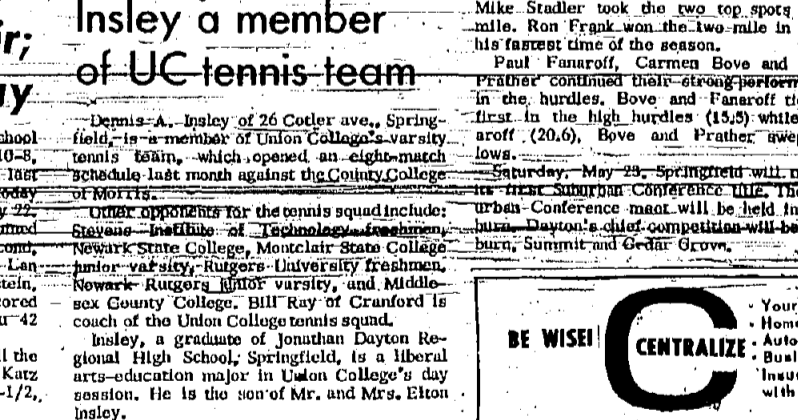
QUICK STARTER—Senior Arnold Gerst is the leading sprinter this year for the Jonathan Dayton Regional High School track team.

Gary Grant, second in the mile, is one of the top performers of the Jonathan Dayton Regional High School track team.

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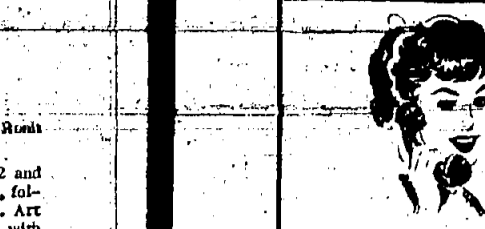

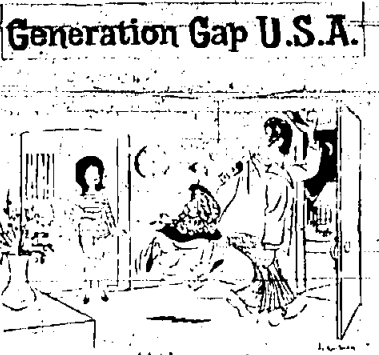
