When Mrs. Mary Stanton of Wilkes Barre, Pa., arrived at the Medical Center suffering from a severe example of tetralogy of Fallot, a combination of four congenital cardiac defects, she was deep purple and near death. She had been kept alive during the night-march three and one-half hour ambulance ride from Wilkes Barre with constant nasal oxygen, fully aware that she might not complete the trip.

Mrs. Stanton's life-long problems began to reach a climax two years ago and, when the final emergency occurred, no hospital near her home was able to schedule an open-heart procedure for six weeks to three months.

Mrs. Crescent Roselle of Elizabeth, the patient's sister, appealed to the Union County Heart Association which contacted Newark Beth Israel Medical Center and arrangements were made to admit Mrs. Stanton to the Coronary Care Unit as an emergency patient.

Following cardiac catheterization and still dependent on oxygen, she underwent a week-long series of studies by members of the Cardiology Section and the Heart Station. It was found that while she had been born with the quartet of congenital defects, she had never had palliative surgery to alleviate the tiredness, fainting spells, shortness of breath or blue skin color, nor had curative surgery ever been considered. According to Medical Center physicians, it is extremely rare for anyone with four such cardiac abnormalities to live 52 years even with surgery.

DURING HER EARLY CHILDHOOD, Mrs. Stanton was able to attend the grammar school next door to her home but was forced to abandon all thoughts of normal schooling when the daily journey to a nearby junior high school proved too tiring. After her marriage she was able to carry on a small beauty business but found herself resting more frequently during the day in an effort to combat the constant fatigue with which she had lived all of her life.

Following the extensive preliminary studies by the Heart Station, the Cardiology Section and the Department of Laboratories, a cardiac catheterization study of the chest, the angiologist and the chief of the Pulmonary Section determined the operative course for Mrs. Stanton.

A hole the size of a marble in the right ventricle—one of the pumping chambers of the heart—was closed as was a smaller hole between the aorta, the reserve chamber. The surgeons then unclipped a pulmonary aneurysm which is a narrowing of the channel between the artery for the lungs and the right ventricle. It is this stenosis, or blockage, that diminishes the blood flow to the lungs and causes the "old" cyanotic (blue) blood to be pumped to the brain and into the systemic circulation. There was also a severe thickening of the right ventricular muscle. The patient, breathing normally, cheerful and delighted with her skin color, was discharged from the Medical Center three weeks after surgery.

THE OPEN HEART surgery program at Newark Beth Israel Medical Center has been accelerated and 130 patients have had open heart procedures. While one or two such operations a week were planned during 1969, in some weeks as many as six were performed. The operations, some of which were performed for the first time in the state, give persuasive evidence of the progress that has been made toward controlling or curing cardiovascular problems which were considered irreversible. According to Medical Center surgeons, a successful open heart program can only be achieved when complete teamwork between medical and surgical services exists.

During open heart surgery, there are three spheres of influence in the surgical suite—the surgeon and nurses, the anesthesiologist and the extracorporeal team needed to support and monitor the patient's bodily functions and made up of members of the Pulmonary Rehabilitation Laboratory.

Each patient poses a different problem for the anesthesiologist who is responsible for the total care of the patient so the doctors can concentrate on the surgery alone. He must evaluate the patient as to risk, aim in condition for anesthesia and for surgery and

hands all drug therapy during surgery. Modern, sophisticated medicine enables the anesthesiologist to control the patient's temperature, to put him to sleep by anesthetizing the nervous system, to paralyze the patient and "do the breathing for him" or to keep him partially awake and alert although free of pain.

Five members of the Pulmonary Rehabilitation Laboratory men a gas analyzer which performs constant blood gas studies, oximetry which displays the blood pressure and electrocardiographic of the patient and a monitor which records the arterial and venous pressures. During the actual bypass, when the patient's blood is channeled away from his heart to provide the surgeon with a blood-

into a shopping-center as a permitted use in an L-40 zone.

"The results of such elimination will be that before a shopping center may be constructed in an L-40 zone the person desiring adjustment for a variance. Such application would have to be predicated upon a full submission of plans, including the method of dealing with any traffic problems both inside and outside of the shopping center.

"If the Board of Adjustment should decide favorably on such application, it will be in a position to impose such conditions upon the installation of the shopping center as may be necessary to protect fully the interests of the Township and its residents. Then the Township Committee would have the opportunity to review the findings and recommendations of the Board of Adjustment, and either reject the board's recommendations or approve with any other conditions that the committee may deem advisable.

"In passing, it may be of interest to you to know that, at the present time, there are no definitive plans for the construction of a shopping center in the township, and that it is unlikely that such plans will be developed to the point of application to the Board of Adjustment for some time.

"It should also be pointed out to you that, notwithstanding what many people said, the Township Committee never prejudged this matter, never took a position for or against a shopping center in the L-40 zone, but rather stated that it required sufficient time to make an in-depth study to arrive at a responsible and reasoned conclusion. This it has done, although it was abused for so doing.

"I believe that we have fulfilled our obligations to the residents of this community by taking the approach we did rather than succumbing to the pressure exerted upon us to make an instant decision on an emotional basis.

"As your mayor, I respectfully submit this report to you."

Four bridges will carry Route 1-78 and two ramps over the mainline tracks of the Lehigh Valley Railroad, and two others will take the freeway over a spur of the railroad.

Some tracks of the mainline of the Lehigh Valley Railroad will be relocated and certain abandoned trackage will be removed.

There will be no traffic interference on Elizabeth street. During the relocation of spur tracks across Empire street, in connection with the culvert construction, the contractor will be required to maintain a minimum of one lane of traffic on that local street. Route 28, which will be 66.2 miles long in New Jersey, will provide an express highway for transcontinental traffic crossing the

state from Phillipsburg to the Newark metropolitan area and to the Holland Tunnel by way of the New Jersey Turnpike Extension. When it is completed, the new superhighway is expected to relieve Route 22 of some of its traffic.


