

'Green Thumbers' changing the face of America

WASHINGTON, D.C. — A million of the American Thumbers scattered throughout 17 states are literally changing the face of this country.

Called Green Thumbers, these older and mostly retired low income, rural men and women are traveling, starting ecological trails, aiding community development, and providing services for the sick and shut-in. People are noticing.

The Soil Conservation Society of America, Keep America Beautiful, Inc., and the Wildlife Federation all paid tribute to these contribute citizens by bestowing upon them some of their highest awards. The significance of these awards becomes more meaningful when it is known that these nearly 3,000 men and women average 69 years of age.

The Oregon Green Thumb program was designed by the Soil Conservation Society of America as recipient of its 1970 Merit Award for "Advancing the Science and Art of Good Land Use." The 142 Green Thumbers in the state are found in 12 counties where they work three days each week at beautification, conservation, upkeep of public parks, clearing brush, landscaping, and planting grass, trees, and flowers.

Green Thumbers in Arkansas were commended by Keep America Beautiful, Inc. for their efforts in the area of litter prevention throughout the state. In awarding the citation, William F. May, chairman of the K.A.B. Board of trustees, observed, "These active and caring senior citizens have practically eliminated litter in rural Arkansas. Green Thumbers in the state have also been responsible for considerable highway improvement and rehabilitation of community facilities in several counties."

The Wisconsin Wildlife Federation recently recognized the accomplishments of Green Thumbers in that state with a merit award for the 1970-71 season. The award, presented to the sponsoring leaders in the conservation movement, reads in part, "The recognition of Green Thumbers in Wisconsin is a commendation of their efforts in the area of litter prevention throughout the state. In awarding the citation, William F. May, chairman of the K.A.B. Board of trustees, observed, "These active and caring senior citizens have practically eliminated litter in rural Arkansas. Green Thumbers in the state have also been responsible for considerable highway improvement and rehabilitation of community facilities in several counties."

Several historical items among them are old Southern plantation mansions, and two early American homes, all open to the public. "We also are planning for the assistance this organization gives us, both in spirit and in financiality," the wives of a seven-man crew in Utah recently wrote. A couple re-estimated "It gives us great pride to be able to work for ourselves and benefit the country." These same remarks are reflected in those heard from Green Thumbers and Green Lighters around the country. They are typical of the people found in rural America—many of whom would rather "sweat it out" on a well-earned or receive a handout.

Throughout the country these older men and women are demonstrating that age is no criteria for measuring productivity. They

Control of insects to be topic at club

The Westfield Club of Westfield will meet Tuesday at 8 p.m. in Leomin Hall in the basement of the First Congregational Church of Westfield, 128 Elmer St. William Metzger, deputy director of the Division of Plant Industry in the New Jersey Department of Agriculture will be the guest speaker. He will discuss "Biological Control of Insects."

Metzger is a graduate of Ohio State University with a degree in Biology. He has been involved with the insect control program of the New Jersey Department of Agriculture for the past 12 years. He will discuss the general techniques of biological control and will demonstrate how they are applicable to specific problems in the home.

A club spokesman said, "In this time of increasing insect nuisances, it is increasingly important because they avoid the hazard of residual chemical and the expense of insecticides. The use of biological control methods has been successful in curbing the Japanese beetle and the sawfly and currently are being developed for the control of insects which is threatening New Jersey's hardwoods and shrubs trees."

Rinaldo lauds okay of anti-bomber law

State Senator Matthew J. Rinaldo (R-Edison) this week lauded Governor Cahill's signing into law S-70, a Rinaldo-sponsored bill which would impose a \$100 fine for possession of a pen or pencil for persons convicted of planting bombs.

"I am gratified that the governor has given his approval to this measure, which puts much sharper teeth into New Jersey's laws against bombers," Senator Rinaldo said.

The Union Township Republican introduced the bill last year in response to the bombings of longer jail sentences on anyone found guilty of planting bombs in an open or enclosed area "public or private" within the jurisdiction of this state.

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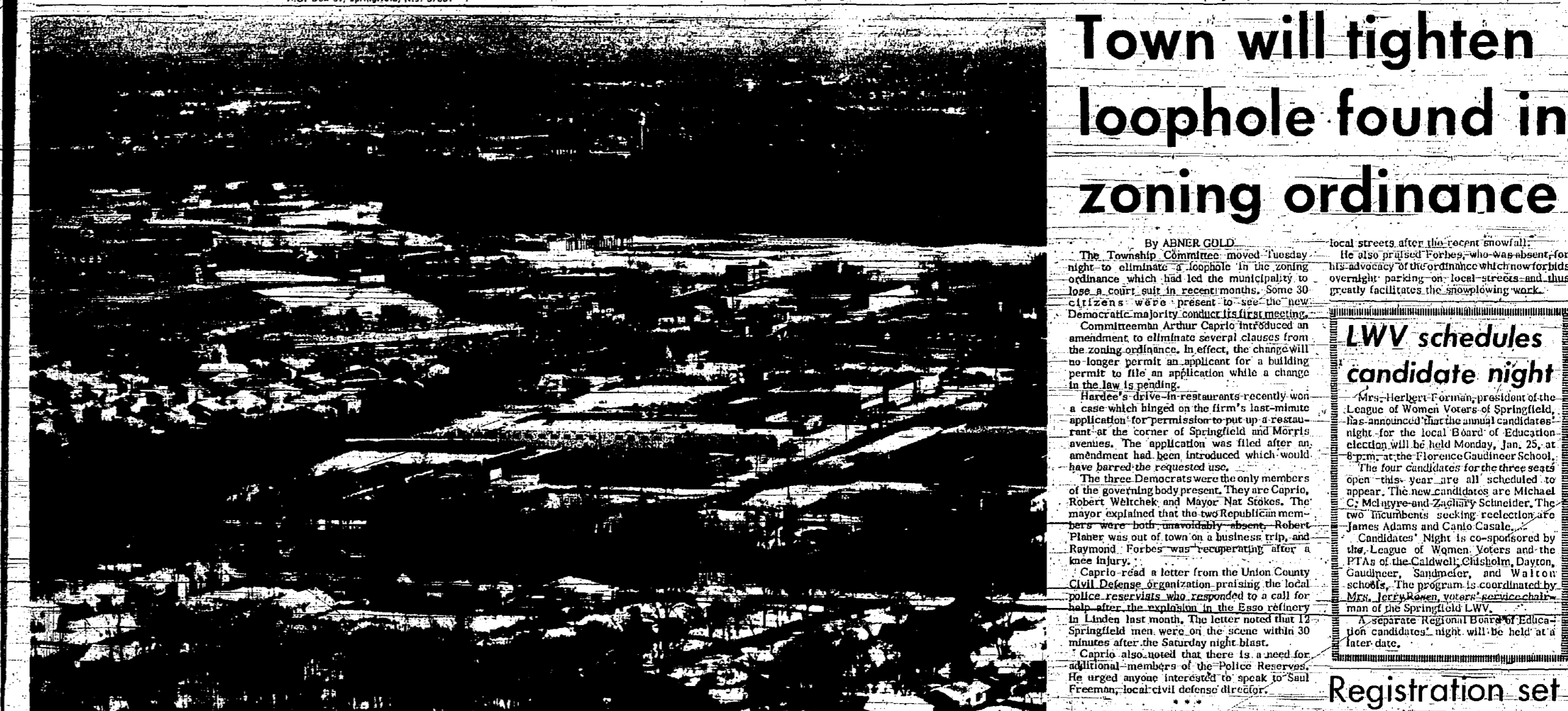

Saying what we mean can bring on problems

As we look back over the years, there are a few high spots of community journalism which always remind us that language as a means of communication is not yet perfected.

There was, for example, the gentleman who delivered a long speech to the municipal governing body, then handed us a copy and asked us to print it "word for word."

There are also the families, about once a year, who send us social page items beginning: "Mrs. John Smith and the late Mr. Smith announce the engagement of their daughter."

Then there was the local PTA which proudly announced a study group for pre-kindergarten mothers. And we thought, "ten-year-old mothers were enough of a problem."

We can also recall the concerned publicity chairman who came in to ask why her press release was not in the paper. When we showed it to her, on Page 19 she replied, "I can't understand why it's in your copy here and not in my copy at home."

Another high spot was the feminine dignitary who demanded we print a retraction of the picture we ran with her profile interview. Taken by our staff photographer, we settled that one, finally, by asking her to have a picture taken by her own photo-

grapher, complete with airbrush, and finding an opportunity to run it as soon as possible.

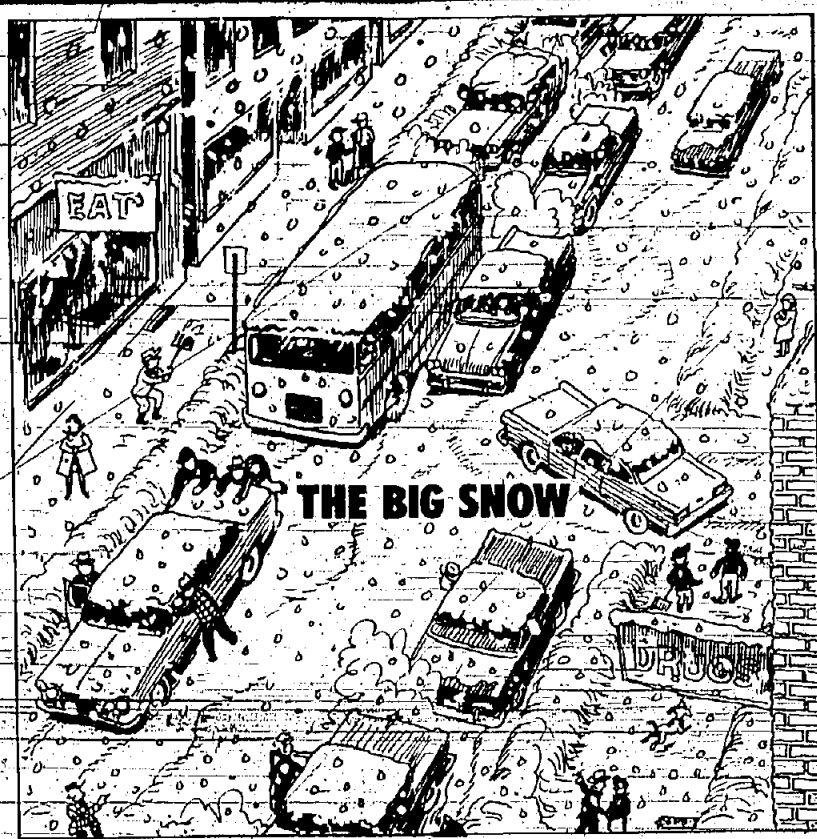
One angry mother called us to complain that her son's name had been omitted from the Little League basketball article - "even though he scored the winning touch-down."

Not all phone calls, of course, are confined to family pride. One woman called to ask if our first baby-of-the-year contest was still open, since her neighbor was having a baby in 15 minutes.

We never did get another call to learn how that one came out. Quite recently we were informed of a talk to be given by a speaker who billed himself as an active clubman, regional president, housewife, mother of four and sex symbol. Unfortunately, she failed to provide us with a picture.

There was also the local clergyman who called us to ask that we not publicize the plight of a member of his congregation, who had run afoul of the law. The clergyman, obviously embarrassed by having to make the request, added that his congregation reportedly has a very high moral standard.

Antenna twisting will bring in state's TV station

New Jersey's own television stations counting on the air in 1971, viewers should be getting improved antenna systems. If they do not already get crisp UHF reception, John Wilner, director of engineering at the new TV facility, said anyone living within 35 miles of Trenton should be able to pick up a "good color picture from the first station to be in operation in March, WNTJ-TV, Channel 52. Wilner, formerly of Linden and one of the leading television engineering authorities in the country, has recruited one of the top engineering firms available to operate the technical end of the venture by the New Jersey Public Broadcasting Authority. The authority, which will operate four full color UHF stations, has the finest RCA color equipment available, said Wilner. It's picture quality will be as crisp and clear as any picture now being received in this state, he said. But Wilner reminded citizens that they should make some checks to determine if they are getting good color UHF signals from the other UHF stations in their areas. WILNER SAID THE best way to check with the little loop UHF antenna usually comes with the color TV set. If a good picture is being received on that, small antenna, there should be little or no difficulty in receiving the state station in the area. If an outside roof antenna is needed, then the following should be considered: - See if a good color picture can be received. - Tune the VHF tuner (the one with the numbers 2-13 to the (3) position, for TV sets sold after 1965). Then slowly rotate the UHF tuning knob (numbers 14-43) to the approximate location of the channel desired. When tuning Channel 52, turn just past 48 and bring in the best picture and sound level with the fine tuning knob. - If you receive service from either Pennsylvania or New York UHF stations, your problems are not over if you have an outside antenna. You may have to rotate your antenna in an entirely different direction from that required for either Pennsylvania or New York. With Channel 52, a transmitter in Trenton, the antenna must naturally point to the Trenton station for good clear reception. Wilner recommended the purchase of a small inexpensive (about \$15) UHF antenna to be mounted below your normal antenna and connected to your present lead-in and pointed toward the new Trenton station. (This can be done by slowly rotating the antenna while someone watches the TV set, signaling when the picture has the best quality.) - In some cases, it will be necessary to run a separate lead-in from the UHF antenna to the TV set. A small switch should be used to direct the new antenna signal to the UHF tuner, Wilner added.

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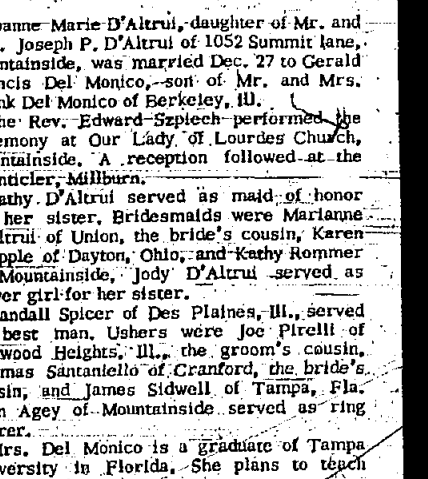
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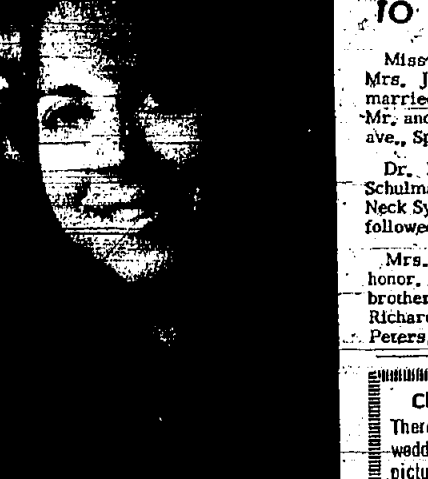

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Rutgers prof plans 'recreation' for rats

Experiments in Prague to study heart health

Although he's not particularly fond of rats, James J. McGrath of the Rutgers College of Agriculture and Environmental Science takes them on a climbing and swimming. Developing a recreational program for rats is not what McGrath is interested in, but he is interested in their hearts and their health.

Dr. McGrath, an assistant professor of physiology, specializes in environmental physiology, and specifically those factors in the environment which affect the heart by weakening it or strengthening it.

At the end of the three weeks he injected a drug that induces "heart attacks" into both the high altitude rats and a twin group of rats that had been living at sea level conditions.

"I'd like to know more about what accounts for this increased resistance to heart attack," he says. "One thing is for sure, though -- as the heart becomes stronger through long term exposure to hypoxia, it's less prone to heart attack."

Dr. McGrath has discovered in preliminary experiments that their first swimming lesson usually lasts only 90 seconds, at the end of which they are exhausted and he must rescue them. The next day they'll swim for one and a half to two minutes. Eventually they can swim for 45 minutes to an hour.

The Springfield Board of Education approved a \$3,017,754 budget for the coming school year, following a hearing before some 15 citizens at the Florence Gaudin school near School. The budget will now be presented to the voters in the school board election Feb. 9.

The figure of just over \$3 million is up from \$2,700,500 for 1970. The total year and \$2,700,500 for 1969-70. Board members estimated that it will bring about a 16 point increase in the local tax rate. The increase represents an additional \$24 a year for a house with a market value of \$300,000, assessed at 50 cents of that value.

A member commented that the board has been "very careful not to extend its expenditures beyond what the taxpayers can afford to pay." The portion of the increase comes from an approximately 9 percent increase in salaries for teachers and other staff members.

The pay raises remain approximate because negotiations are still under way with the Springfield Teachers' Association on a contract for next year.
