Editorial Comment

The big wheel spins on and turns up Springfield

There has been growing discussion of a "magic new formula" to solve all of New Jersey's financial problems by making an East Coast Las Vegas—complete with giant wheels and even more gigantic hotels, out of Atlantic City.

The proposal has drawn support from a wide variety of sources, including the United County legislators who have failed to demonstrate how further debasing the moral standards of Atlantic County will help the people of Union County.

Our feeling is that the proponents of this Shore utopia have been going about the whole thing backwards. We need a gambling enclave not in North Jersey, but in the South Jersey area, of course, a number of changes that would be indicated.

Our political leaders, of both parties, are far too honest to get along with the Syndicate executives who would have to take over the town. That would be easy enough to correct, certainly. A few friendly middle-of-the-night phone calls should encourage them to do so.

Our schools would need a few changes. The fine mathematics program would provide an ample supply of skilled labor, all dedicated

to the principle that all men can be equally separated from their money.

The history curriculum, naturally, would require substantial revision, to eliminate irrelevances about human rights and the dignity of man.

Our young women, those with the suitable physical endowments, could be encouraged to enter the Las Vegas-type entertainment fields, in all its ramifications. Others would provide clerical help, both in the casinos and in the credit investigation and debt collection firms.

For our clergy, the gambling environment would be somewhat of a mixed blessing. On the one hand, some members of their flocks might get so busy in the snoring that they would forget the shepherd.

On the other, there would never be a dearth of sermon material. A clergyman could walk two blocks along Morris avenue, see what he could see, and then return to his church.

Sooner or later, this outpouring of prosperity would attract the ultimate in success symbols—a reclusive millionaire. He could stand himself behind the walls of the condemned portion of the Raymond Chisholm School.

And by then, of course, all would be well in the best of all possible Springfields.

"Pull together, I see sunshine on the land."

If the President's "New American Republic" means anything at all, it means a great deal. It means the first full-scale recognition by a national administration that the main responsibility for the economic well-being of the nation lies with the government, not with the private sector.

It is the how that counts, and it is the how that we must get right.

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UC faculty will attend seminar on computers

Union College faculty members will be sitting on the other side of the desk as they take the role of student for a seminar on computers, announced this week by Floyd Elmer Wolf, dean.

The seminar, which begins today, is intended to acquaint faculty members in all departments with the fundamentals of how computers work and how they can be used to solve complex problems, according to Fred Robert S. McCoskey, director of the Union College Computer Center and professor of engineering. The seminar will be conducted by the New Jersey Educational Computing Center, New Brunswick.

Union College is a participating member in the computer network directed by NJEC. Topics to be covered in the 4-11 program include:

- Components of computer systems, information storage and retrieval, decision making, programming, organization of data, and computer languages.
- The Union College Computer Center houses an IBM computer system. It is used in the college's engineering, science and business programs and for administrative purposes in the areas of admissions, accounting, and other areas.
- The introductory course in computer science is also open to business and liberal arts students.
- Through its affiliation with the statewide educational network, Union College also has access to the IBM 360/67 located at Rutgers University.
- This affiliation extends the number of computer languages available for instruction.

Recreation Department holds midwinter recess program

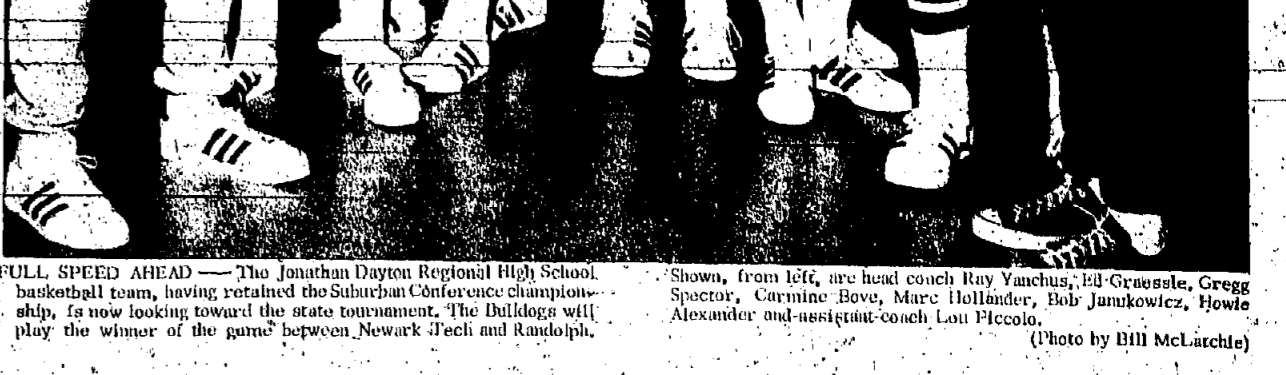
