Mrs. Dorsky is named to membership on Regional school board in landslide

Mrs. Sonya Dorsky won a landslide victory in the election Tuesday to name a Springfield member to the Regional High School District Board of Education.

Mrs. Dorsky won with 825 votes. Robert Halsey had 342, and William Doerrier trailed with 156. Springfield's other member on the board, Mrs. Natalie Wald, still has two years to serve on her current term.

Mrs. Dorsky won the election with a margin of more than three to one at the Edward Walton School, where citizens in Election District 7 to 13 voted. Residents of Districts 1 to 6 voted at Jonathan Dayton Regional High School.

The vote at the Walton School was: Mrs. Dorsky, 701; Halsey, 152, and Doerrier, 46.

The vote at Dayton Regional was: Mrs. Dorsky, 105; Halsey, 190; Doerrier, 110.

Mrs. Dorsky also had 19 absentee votes. Halsey had four, and there were no absentee ballots for Doerrier.

Mrs. Dorsky has just completed nine years as a member of the Springfield Board of Education. Halsey is a board member and former president of the Springfield Public Library.

Doerrier was active last year in opposition to the Regional expansion bond proposal which was defeated at the polls last spring. He based his campaign this year on opposition to another expansion proposal which will be presented in a referendum on May 4. Both Mrs. Dorsky and Halsey have indicated support of the expansion plan.

Following her election, Mrs. Dorsky declared, "I appreciate all the help I have received and the confidence people have shown in me."

She added, "Between the vote for me and that for Mr. Halsey, I am glad to see the people of Springfield have rejected the negative approach to education."

"I plan to work immediately for the formation of a Springfield advisory committee to assist me. The job is too big for just two Springfield board members."

Two other members of the Regional school board were reelected on Tuesday. Manuel Diaz of Clark, board president, ran unopposed and won with 52 votes. Clifford Hight of Berkeley Heights defeated Richard G. Light, 349 votes to 167.

Springfield PBA to present Citizenship Award citations

A Springfield woman and a Kenilworth man will share the first Citizenship Award to be presented by Springfield Local 76 of the Policemen's Benevolent Association.

The presentations to Mrs. Joan Swardloff of 295 Batusrol way, Springfield, and Albert Grady of 220 N. 16th st., Kenilworth, will be made at the PBA hall to be held Friday evening, April 16, at Wieland's Steak House, Rt. 22a, Mountaintide. Dancing will begin at 8:30 and a floor show starring comedian Billy Blair will start at 10 p.m. Music will be by Lefty and the Dominos.

Detective Samuel A. Calabrese, PBA president, said the Citizenship Award is being presented "to recognize citizens in and out of Springfield who have assisted the Springfield Police Department or who have performed an act which prevented injury or possible death."

He said:

"Mrs. Swardloff receives her award for her quick thinking on the morning of Sept. 18, 1969, when, while speaking to a friend on the phone, she overheard two armed men announce to her friend that this was a holdup. Mrs. Swardloff immediately called Springfield police headquarters and, due to her quick action, police were able to apprehend two men in the commission of a holdup."

"Mr. Grady receives his award for his

quick actions without regard to his personal safety on the evening of Nov. 5, 1970. Mr. Grady was seated in the Lido Diner with his wife Mary Ann and a friend when a truck traveling east on Rt. 22 went out of control and hurtled towards the diner, exactly at the spot where the Grady party was seated.

"Grady observed the truck coming towards the diner, and, thinking quickly, pushed his wife and friend out of the booth they were seated in and covered his wife's body with his body just as the truck struck the building. The impact shattered the window by their booth and scattered large chunks of glass in all directions. Some glass and debris fell on Mr. Grady, but his wife was not seriously injured due to his quick actions."

"Tickets are priced at \$2 each and can be purchased from any police officer in Springfield or at Springfield Police Headquarters."

3 persons arrested in coordinated raid

Three people were arrested in Springfield Friday by local police as part of a series of coordinated raids in conjunction with the Union County prosecutor's office and state police.

The raid in Springfield took place at the home of Joseph George Marzano of 531 S. Springfield ave. Marzano and Joseph Lamorte of Oceanport were each charged with conspiracy and receiving stolen goods.

The other simultaneous raids took place at the Marzani Mortgage Co. in Clifton and Bauer Bus Lines in Union. Authorities confiscated six electric typewriters in Clifton and three electric typewriters in Union. All had allegedly been stolen from a warehouse in Newark on March 20.

Springfield authorities who participated in the raid were Lt. Robert Taffo, Det. Samuel A. Calabrese, Det. Howard Thompson, and Plainclothesman Gene Pederson.

June 8 date for primary is probable

Pressure on to select candidates this month

Last week's announcement of legislative apportionment, with a June 8 primary election, will have two specific effects on Springfield.

First, the June primary date, rather than the generally anticipated September primary, means that local, as well as county, party leaders will have to step up their screening and selection processes. The deadline for filing to run in the primary election is April 29. There is still some chance a legal challenge will delay the primary until September.

Second, the town will shift from an Assembly district that has been consistently Republican to one that will probably tend to be Democratic. The new district consists of Springfield, Linden, Rahway and Mountaintide.

The two members of the Township Committee whose terms expire this year are Robert G. Planer and Raymond W. Forbes. Both are Republicans. Neither has made any announcement as to whether he intends to run again.

Angelo Menza, municipal GOP chairman, said this week that he would have no official comment on the local picture at this time. He promised to announce the incumbents' decisions as soon as possible.

He did state, however, "I am a little disappointed in the June 8 primary. There's not too much time to act on candidates. We have to screen candidates for an opening in the State Senate, and there are bound to be a few changes in the Assembly slate."

"I think the new district is pretty fair. It seems evenly matched between the two parties. The change in the last election in these towns toward the Democrats should be temporary."

"As far as our town is concerned, I am absolutely certain the voters will come out strongly in favor of the two Republican candidates."

DONALD LAN, Springfield Democratic chairman, characterized the new district as "highly favorable to the Democrats." He noted that John Connor, Democratic candidate for assemblyman at-large, had carried the eight towns by a slim margin in 1969, which was a poor year for the party. Last year, Lan added, the party's freeholder slate had led by a substantial margin in the new district, going on to carry the county.

He declared, "There is a potential in a good Democratic year for the party to carry the district by as much as 7-10,000 votes." Lan added, "I would think that in the new district incumbency by itself does not necessarily guarantee nomination."

"Turning to the local scene, the chairman said, "The screening process has been actively in swing for several months. There are numerous attractive potential candidates being screened by the party."

THE OLD ASSEMBLY district of which Springfield has been a part included Berkeley Heights, Garwood, Hillside, New Providence, Summit, Union and Westfield.

Of the towns in the new district, Linden is a major Democratic stronghold, and tiny Winfield is also heavily Democratic. Garwood too, has primarily a Democratic record, and Rahway, despite some lapses, is usually Democratic.

Cranford, usually Republican in the past, seems to be turning into a swing community, Union and Springfield, while they have gone either way in local elections, usually back the county GOP slate. Mountaintide is the only Republican bastion in the district, and even there local Democrats have been mounting strong attacks.

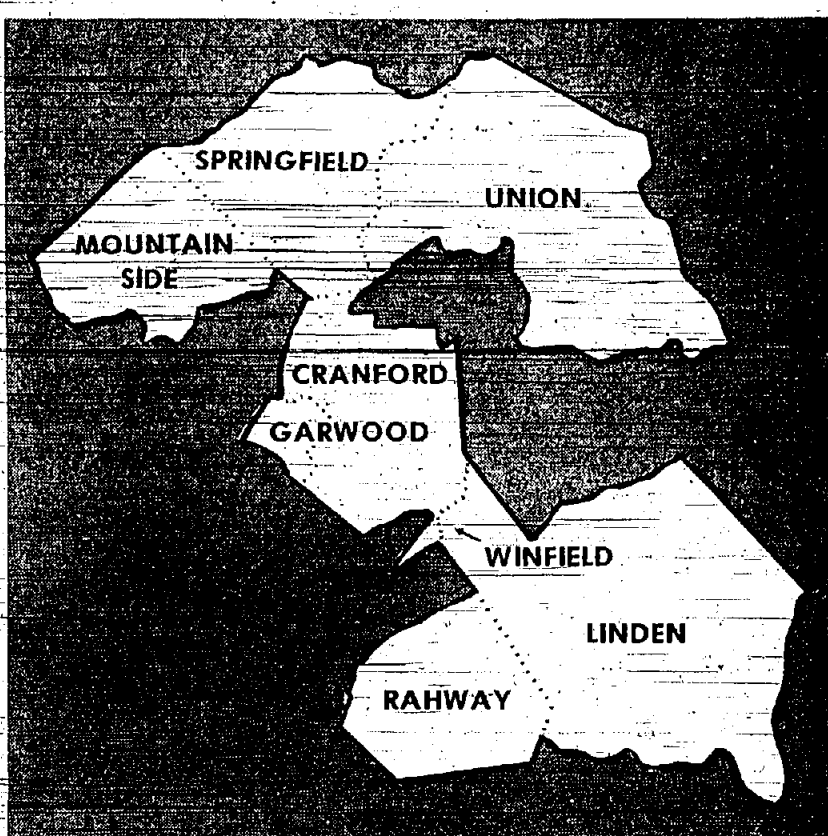
In 1969, when Gov. William F. Cahill led a Republican landslide throughout the state, Democrat John Connor of Cranford lost to Republican Charles Levin of Mountaintide in the race for county assemblyman at large. Connor, however, carried the eight communities of the new district, 35,770 to 37,294. Of this total, Connor led by some 3,000 votes in Linden and 2,300 in Rahway.

In 1970, when Democrats swept to victories across the county, the margin between the top Democrats in the eight towns and the top Republicans was 37,049 for the Democrats to 28,820. The Republicans carried only Union and Mountaintide. Top Democratic areas again were Linden, with a plurality of 7,000 votes, and Rahway, 4,700.

Henry Gavran, a Linden Democrat, has been an assemblyman in the former district which included Linden and Elizabeth. In view of his incumbency and the strength of his party organization, he must be regarded as a front-runner for a nomination in the new district.

The new district also includes one Republican incumbent. He is Herbert H. Klein of Rahway. The other Republican incumbent, Jewell Way, is also a front-runner.

'Rap' session to be held to conclude drug series

Former drug addicts, high school students and a psychologist will conduct a panel discussion on the problems of drug abuse next Monday evening at the Jonathan Dayton Regional High School.

The community "rap" session is the last in a series of programs, "Drugs: The Turning Point," presented by the Springfield Mayor's Commission for the Prevention of Drug Abuse and the Union County Regional Adult School in cooperation with the Springfield Council of PTAs.

"Monday's program will be an audience participation discussion with presentations by members of the panel. This will give the community the opportunity to discuss drugs in

an informal atmosphere," Harry E. Linkin, director of adult education, said.

On the panel along with two residents of Odyssey House, a drug rehabilitation center, will be Susan Atkins and Joseph Benigno, students at Jonathan Dayton.

Also on the panel will be Detective Samuel Calabrese of the Springfield Police Department, a spokesman for the mayor's commission, and Dr. Catherine Ruttiger, principal psychologist at the New Jersey Diagnostic Center in Menlo Park.

An licensed practicing psychologist in Menlo Park, Dr. Ruttiger has also served as a research associate in sociology at the Rutgers College of Arts and Sciences and was director of Jane Addams House at Douglass College, a settlement house for underprivileged youngsters.

Dr. Ruttiger studied at the New York School of Social Work, Columbia University. She earned her Ph.D. degree at the Rutgers Graduate School.

Board to hold four hearings on bond issue

Four public hearings will be held by the Union County Regional High School District to present the facts about its proposed building expansion program to be submitted to voters in a special election on Tuesday, May 4.

The hearings dates are: Tuesday, April 20, Jonathan Dayton Regional High School, Springfield; Wednesday, April 21, Arthur L. Johnson Regional High School, Clark; Monday, April 22, Governor Livingston Regional High School, Berkeley Heights; and Wednesday, April 23, David Breckley Regional High School, Kentwood.

Each meeting will be held in the school auditorium and will begin at 8 p.m.

The school board proposes to expand and renovate each of the high schools to relieve overcrowding. Total cost of the bond issue would be \$4,730,000.

The Regional District comprises Berkeley Heights, Clark, Garwood, Kentwood, Mountaintop and Springfield, and operates four high schools with a total student enrollment of 5,535.
