DiPaglia's first trial in January ended in a mistrial when the jury was unable to reach a verdict after nine hours of deliberation. The jurors Monday took three hours to make their decision.

3:40 p.m. - visit to Flemington by train to board the Burlington. 4 p.m. - tour of old Raritan where President Warren G. Harding signed the Treaty ending World War I in 1918. The Borough of Raritan is celebrating the 150th anniversary of this event this month. Tours will be made of the old Presbyterian House (not open to the public); the Dutch Reformed Church restored by President Harding; and adjacent site. The guide here will be Donald F. Esposito, historian of the Borough of Raritan.

6 p.m. - the group will board the bus at Raritan to return to the Springfield parking lot at 7 p.m.

The cost for the steam train, bus transportation and admission to the Wallace House is \$8 per person. Luncheon will be at each station's own expense. 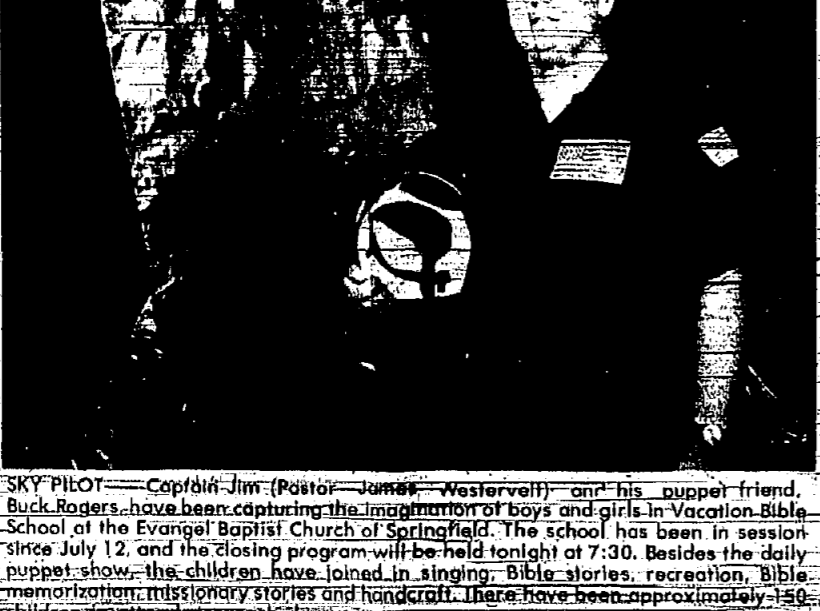

Berwick feels his positive approach has rubbed off on local school system

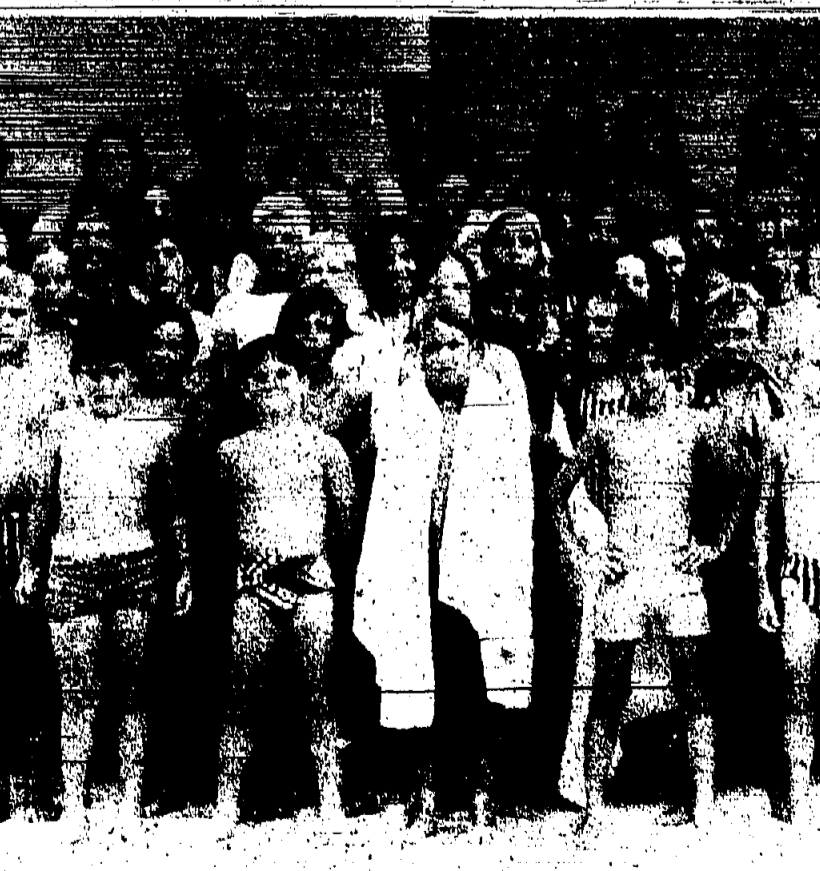
Taking his theme from an old song, John O. Berwick, Springfield's superintendent of schools for seven years, feels that his major accomplishment has been to accentuate the positive.
