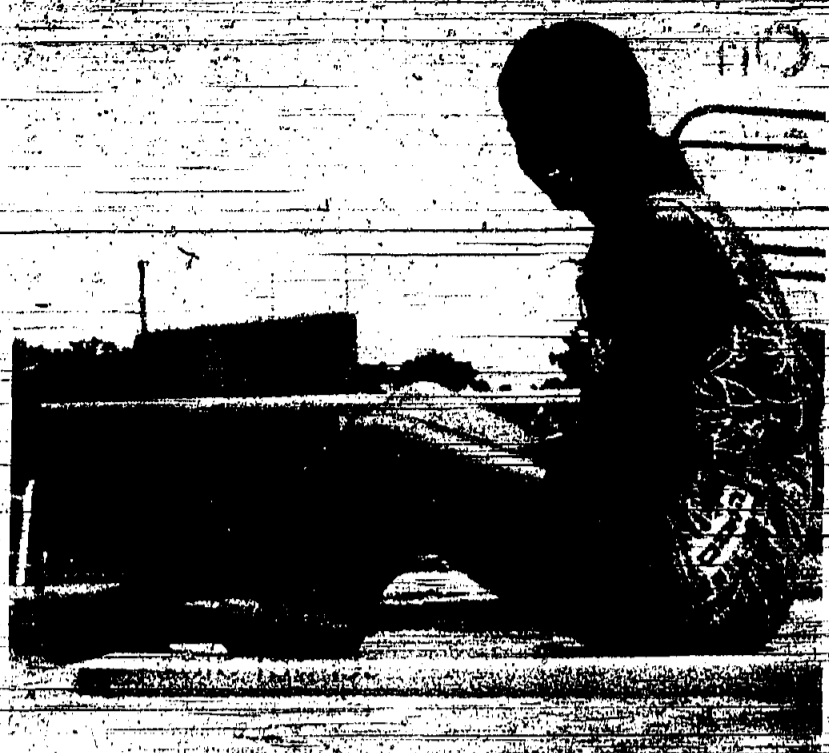

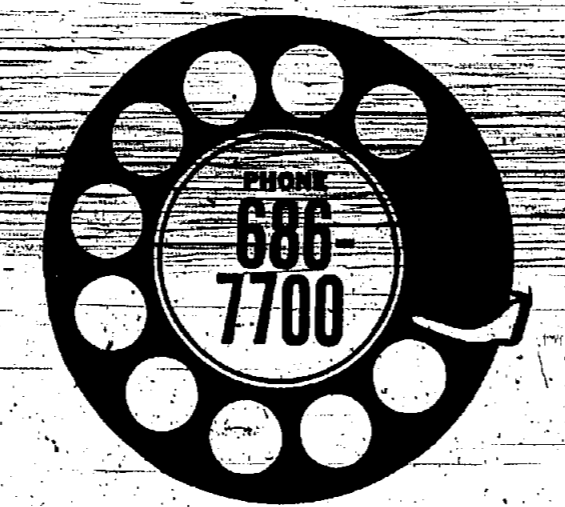

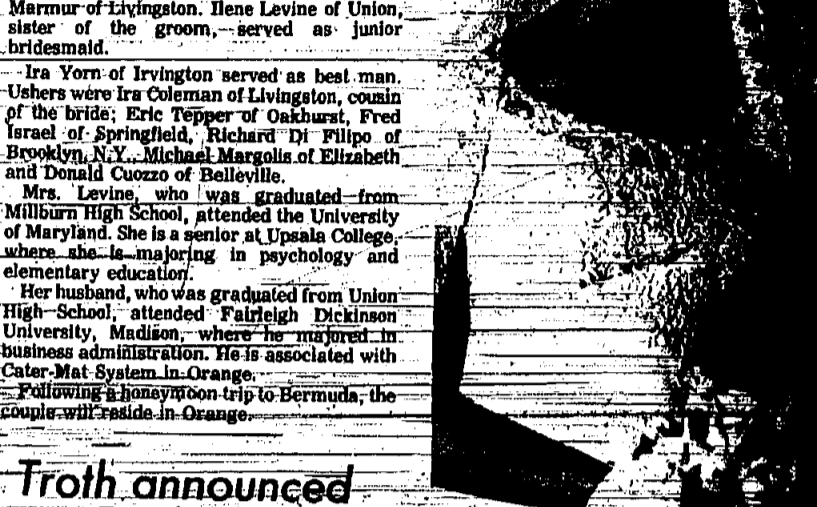

Self-suggestion, when used in a relaxed, aimed at changing one's feelings and thoughts about cigarettes, can be helpful. One health educator remarked recently, "Smoking is a habit, not a disease. It is a habit that willpower and a little food in the stomach."

To think of stopping smoking as self-control is an error. The smoker should stop believing that he is giving up an object of value, however dependent he may be on it. If he begins to feel sorry for himself and broods on his sufferings, they may become more acute and indeed unendurable. He should recognize that he is teaching himself a new position, more constructive, more rewarding behavior.

#### Try Cutting Down...

An important first step in the process of giving up cigarettes for many smokers is to set the date for Q Day, when you are going to stop completely and start the procedure for gradually reducing the number of cigarettes you smoke, day by day. Before you begin:

A good reason is to decide only to smoke one or two cigarettes a day, alternating between the hours of 9 and 10:30, 11 and 12, 1 and 2, 3 and 4, etc. And then to extend the non-smoking time by half an hour or more two hours a day.

You may decide to have the cigarette you smoke week by week, giving yourself four weeks to Q Day.

Remember smoking half of each cigarette is the process of smoking the number of daily cigarettes, try various possibilities. If you have one pocket in which you always carry your pack, put it in another so that you will have to fumble for it. If you always use your right hand to bring your cigarette to your mouth,

use the left hand. Is it your custom to rest the cigarette in the right hand? Try the left hand. Make it a real effort to get a cigarette. #### QUESTIONS & ANSWERS



**Do You Believe in "Cold Turkey" Quitting?**  
You, for some, no, for others, if you are a really "addicted" smoker, psychologists favor the sudden, decisive break.

For some, gradual withdrawal is less painful and equally satisfactory. Some cigarette smokers admit to being possible victims to stop but almost always within a month, often years of thought and worry.

**What about going to a cigarette withdrawal clinic?**  
If there is a clinic or program in your community, you may find it helpful. The American Cancer Society favors such efforts.

Sharing your withdrawal experiences with others and working with them on a common problem can be very helpful. The clinic may make it considerably easier in various ways to stop cigarette smoking.

**Shall I Make A Big Thing Of Q-Day?**  
Some find it most satisfactory to work on a cigarette in a quiet, comfortable day in their personal lives—that is, to do it in a quiet, comfortable day in their personal lives.

**How About Ashtrays?**  
One school of thought says, do you know a habit of which you are a victim? This means that you are a victim of a habit of which you are a victim.

**Is Smoking A Real Addiction?**  
This depends on your definition of words. In any case, smokers obviously can become very strongly dependent on cigarettes.

**How About Hypnosis?**  
The hypnosis of giving up smoking is not a new idea. It has been used for many years with varying success. Why not discuss the matter with your physician, if you are interested?

#### Keep A Track Record

Many smokers find that a useful step in understanding their smoking is the keeping of a daily record on a scale like that below. In your gradual withdrawal you may decide to eliminate those daily cigarettes that you find are most "addictive," i.e., ones you want least.

**PLUS AND MINUS**

**SCORE CARD**

#### THE WEEK BEFORE Q-DAY

Think over your list of reasons why you should not smoke: the risk of disease, the blurring of the taste of food, the cost, the cough, the bad breath, the mess and smell of morning after ashtrays.

Concentrate each evening when you are relaxed, just before you fall asleep, on one dreadful result of cigarette smoking. Repeat and repeat and repeat that single fact. Drive home another fact the next night and another the next.

Review the facts that you know about the risks of cigarette smoking. Remind yourself that there, but for the grace of God go you, that you may indeed, if you continue smoking, lose six and a half years of life, that—if you are a heavy smoker—your chances of dying between 25 and 65 years of age are twice as great as those of the nonsmoker. Are the six minutes of pleasure to a heavy smoker in a cigarette worth six fewer minutes of life? Would you fly in an airplane if the chances of crash and death were even close to the risks of cigarette smoking? Think over why it is that 100,000 physicians have quit cigarette smoking.

#### Dr. Silvan Tomkins distinguishes four general types of smoking behavior. An abbreviated summary of the types follows:

#### Four Smoking Styles

# State employment program explained

## Neighborhood centers aid underemployed

Concentrated Employment Program. What is it? What does it do? Who does it serve? These questions were recently posed to Ronald M. Heymann, commissioner of the State Department of Labor and Industry.

"The Concentrated Employment Program is designed to provide neighborhood service centers for disadvantaged people who are unemployed or underemployed to help them secure and retain good jobs," Commissioner Heymann said. "This is done primarily through job placement, occupational training, basic education, minor medical services, bonding, day care for children, and other necessary supportive services."

CEP has three operating agencies in New Jersey run by local community action groups. In Newark, Total Employment and Manpower (TEAM) operates a program; in Hoboken, it is the Hoboken Organization against Poverty and Stress (HOPESS); and in Trenton, United Progress, Incorporated (UPI), handles operations. A total of 272 CEP participants were placed in jobs in 1970 (254 in Trenton, 82 in Hoboken, 100 in Newark).

CEP is RUN-BY independent sponsoring groups who contract with the Federal Manpower Administration to run the program in their particular area. Subcontracts to local agencies for specialized parts of the program

are included in the funding proposal made by the sponsoring organization.

As an example of this, Commissioner Heymann said, "If the sponsors cannot provide for child-day care from within the program itself, they subcontract with a professional center to handle the demand. As each program is different, subcontracts are also different."

Heymann continued, "As to the actual working of each program, it is of course different in each area. Basically though, the CEP people provide services in a target area, usually the most severely disadvantaged section of a city and service all needy residents of that area. CEP puts the client through approximately two weeks of orientation and assessment, giving him a small stipend if needed, and taking care of other individual obligations such as child day care."

THIS IS WHERE we get involved. The New Jersey State Training and Employment Service provides a Manpower Package for CEP. They subcontract to us to provide all our services on a specialized basis. We have a special staff of professionals who work directly with the CEP people and their target area clients to help determine the best course to follow in each individual case. Naturally all our services are available to anyone who needs them, but these programs are given complete teams of Employment Service people to help formulate intensive plans of action.

"Often it is simply job placement, but we also help with on-the-job training programs. The CEP staff may decide their client should have a basic education course or an English-as-a-second language course. We help as best we can during the assessment period and provide services after a determination of need has been made in each case."

"In essence, the program runs like this: A sponsoring group (TEAM, HOPESS, UPI, and so forth) prepares a proposal to provide certain services for a target area—an area of extreme need. They petition the Federal Manpower Administration for funds, outlining

what they propose to do in this target area and what they wish to subcontract. Upon approval, the program begins and a number of clients eventually comes to the CEP Offices, our staff works with the CEP staff during the orientation period and we help in the placement of the clients."

MRS. PHYLLIS SHERMAN, one of the job developers of the North Trenton Concentrated Employment Program and a member of the Manpower Package team supplied to CEP, works hard at creating job opportunities for applicants who had been in dead-end jobs previously and were unemployed at the time they came into the program. They were also underemployed in their last jobs, in terms of potential for working at their highest level of skill.

One of Mrs. Sherman's applicants, Miss Jessica Brown of Trenton, had worked for three and one-half years as a laundry checker after graduating from high school. She had some clerical training while in high school, but had lost most of her skill in typing during the last three and one-half years.

Miss Brown was referred for two weeks of orientation through the CEP program. During that period, she had time to brush up on her typing, learn the techniques of job search, and Mrs. Sherman worked closely with her to instill some confidence in her in approaching employers.

Several contacts were made by Mrs. Sherman with local area companies who might utilize Miss Brown's skills and provide on-the-job training and career opportunity for her. The Union Camp Corporation, Trenton, was one of these companies who decided to give her a chance as a trainee statistical clerk. After approximately six months, Miss Brown

received a pay increase and is being considered for a promotion as well as an additional wage increase. She has now been employed by that company for almost a year, and is experiencing a great deal of job satisfaction.

### Turnpike reports lower fatality rate

The safety record of the 12-lane section of the New Jersey Turnpike keeps getting better and better.

As of Aug. 4, the 12-mile of separate roadways from Edison to Newark logged 31.4 million vehicle-miles more than the similar period last year and yet attained a fatality rate of 1.18. That's 45 points below the 1.63 rate last year—a reduction of 27.6 percent.

The safety performance of the 12-lane segment, known as the dual-dual, has been instrumental in bringing the overall fatality rate on the entire Turnpike down to 1.42 for the period. In 1970 it was 55 points greater, at 1.97.

The rate for the entire northern section, a 30-mile stretch that includes the 12-lane facility, is slightly higher, at 2.03. However, three of the eight fatalities in this area were pedestrians and were not the result of motor vehicle accidents.

The 12-lane section is an entity in itself, with safety measures designed to prevent accidents and ease traffic by separating passenger cars from commercial vehicles.

It opened to the public on Jan. 12, 1970, running from milepost 88 at Edison to milepost 105 in Newark. It connects at the "mixing bowl" with the new westerly route, a six- and four-lane extension west of the Hackensack River.

It is these same safety features of the 12-lane section that the Turnpike Authority will incorporate in the proposed widening from Edison south to New Brunswick Interchange 9.
