Regional board names new superintendent

Merachnik takes school leadership

Dr. Donald Merachnik was named superintendent of schools of the Union County Regional High School District by a unanimous vote of the Regional Board of Education Tuesday night at Jonathan Dayton Regional High School, Springfield.

Dr. Merachnik, 42, had been acting superintendent since August, when Dr. Warren M. Davis left the post to become associate professor of education at Lehigh University.

In other business, the board voted to authorize preparation of a lease for some 7,000 square feet of office space in the Keyes Martin Building on Mountain avenue, Springfield, for an annual rental of \$16,000.

The offices, expected to be occupied within 90 days, will house the superintendent and top administrators of the district. This will make available for classroom use the board offices at Jonathan Dayton. Dayton is now overcrowded, and the pressures will increase over the next several years during construction of added facilities at Dayton and the other Regional schools.

FOLLOWING APPOINTMENT of Dr. Merachnik, Dr. Fred Hagedorn, board president, issued the following statement:

"In selecting Dr. Donald Merachnik to be superintendent of schools, the Regional Board of Education is confident of his success. Dr. Merachnik's talents, leadership, and dedication to fulfillment of educational opportunity for each child have long been recognized within the Regional District. The district was indeed fortunate to have an assistant superintendent of Dr. Merachnik's caliber and capabilities to serve as acting superintendent while the board evaluated applications from more than 100 candidates for the superintendency.

"As has been previously announced, the board did not decide in favor of any of these candidates. Rather, the board has concluded that Dr. Merachnik is best qualified for the permanent appointment to the superintendency.

"Among the more important factors which entered into the board's decision were Dr. Merachnik's obvious and extensive abilities, his first-rate performance in his previous assignments, his character and integrity, and his detailed knowledge of the Regional District. The board believes that these and the many other outstanding characteristics which Dr. Merachnik has shown will serve him and the district well in providing the educational leadership necessary for the 1970's.

Banner, Ruocco back major changes in drug abuse fight

"It was shocking but I believe that one out of every five to 10 local students has used or is using drugs in Springfield," said Norman Banner, GOP candidate for Springfield Township Committee. "It's time we stopped it."

Banner and his running mate, William A. Ruocco, said that it is disturbing to think that 10 to 20 percent of Springfield's students have experimented at one time or another with drugs.

"We have a Mayor's Committee on Drug Abuse in Springfield," Ruocco said, "but the social atmosphere of this committee has done little to help the social problem we face."

Ruocco said the committee set up a hotline telephone number, which has been discontinued in town. Anyone who calls the Springfield hotline will be referred to the Union County Narcotics Clinic.

Banner, who has served on the Union County Narcotics Advisory Commission and who has dedicated much of his energy to the drug problem, wants change. "A commission on drug abuse will be more effective than a committee," he said, "because it will have the power to act and the medical assistance of one or two doctors allied to it. Medical help is of the utmost importance in dealing with this problem."

Banner says he knows the drug problem well. He first became aware of drug abuse from his father, an opiate addict who served in the Spanish-American War and saw narcotics being used, even then, by men in the service.

Banner's father, Eugene, was also a special agent and advisor to the Newark Police Department before a formal narcotics squad existed.

In the Army, Banner's interest in drugs led to special training. After World War II, he was active in the Army's rehabilitation program for narcotics addicts who had become addicted while in the service.

He said he has consistently increased his knowledge of narcotics. Recently, he advised the Union County Board of Education in for

Prager, Dry cite costly disparity in township taxing

Democratic candidates for Township Committee, Neil Prager and Elton Dry, said they would like to see a provision of the state's tax law that would allow Springfield to raise its tax revenues and to pay for the cost of maintaining the number of years.

They promised, if elected, to press for modification of the law under which land owned by non-farmers is assessed for tax purposes at a low farm-land rate.

"Would you like to have your taxes reduced to one-fifth of their present level? Impossible? It is for the ordinary citizens of Springfield."

However, a multi-million dollar corporation which owns almost 60 acres of prime agricultural land in Springfield, pays one-fifth the taxes that it might be paying on 31,000 acres. It does this because the land qualifies for favorable tax considerations under the Farmland Assessment Act of 1964.

"Because this 'Alexander's' land is rented out to be farmed, it is assessed at approximately \$400 per acre. Adjoining land used for commercial purposes is assessed at \$20,000 per acre. Even though this land was obviously assessed with no intention of using it for farming, the Township of Springfield receives only \$1300 per year in taxes. Were it not for the tax yield to the community, it would be 50 times as great, or \$60,000.

"We do not believe that the fault lies with 'Alexander's' but rather with the law which permits such situations to exist. We propose when elected to press to have the state limit eligibility for farm land assessment to owners with a demonstrable interest in farming."

"We would also propose that in communities where less than 15 percent of the available land is utilized for farming, no increase in taxes should be allowed which would eliminate the farm land assessment. If this is such a community, it should be allowed to increase taxes on land which is not being farmed."

Flood insurance from HUD being expanded in Springfield

The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development has announced today that real property and casualty agents can now start selling additional coverage in Springfield under HUD's national flood insurance program.

"Now that a rate study has been completed and the area of special flood hazard has been defined for the community," explained federal insurance administrator George K. Bernstein, "we are able to expand the availability and limits of coverage under the program."

However, he said that coverage under the regular program should not be confused with coverage under the emergency program.

"Under the regular program," Bernstein said, "coverage is now available, for the first time, to the owners of newly constructed residential properties. Those properties started after the emergency program became effective and located within the area of special flood hazard are eligible for coverage only at actuarial rates. New properties located outside this area, however, are eligible for coverage at the actuarial or subsidized rates, whichever is less.

Additional coverage, also at actuarial rates, can now be purchased for existing structures within the entire area eligible for flood insurance.

Under the emergency program, he added, limited amounts of flood insurance can be bought at federally subsidized rates for structures existing at the time the community was declared a special flood hazard."

Hold-up man takes cash in Wednesday supermarket heist

A lone bandit held up the Acme Supermarket at the Echo Shopping Plaza last Wednesday and escaped with between \$1,000 and \$1,600, according to Springfield police.

The police report said the gunman entered the store sometime after 10 a.m. and was looking at merchandise for several minutes. He then asked for the manager. When Richard Peel, the assistant manager, arrived, the bandit pulled a .38 caliber pistol and announced the hold-up.

"The hold-up man forced Peel to open the safe from which he took some cash. The bandit also took money from the cash drawer in the office. The actual hold-up took about five minutes, police stated.

The man then fled to an automobile parked next to the market. Patrolmen Robert Roessner and Andrew Calabrese arrived at the scene just as the robber pulled out to go west on Rt. 22. Police said they attempted to chase the bandit but were unable to find him.

The perpetrator is said to be a black man 30 to 35 years old, 5 feet 10 inches tall, weighing 150 lbs. and with a mustache. He was wearing sunglasses, a gold shirt, dark pants and a watch on his left wrist. He was driving a dark-colored sedan with New Jersey license plates, was wearing a blue or purple hat with a black vinyl top.

The chairman of all existing donor groups have been notified, and donors have been asked to make their appointments through them.

A chapter spokesman added, "By donating blood regularly, donors and their families assure themselves of receiving blood credits, should they require them, and of having credits available to those members of their organizations unable to donate for reasons of age or health."

"But of even greater importance is the fact that without regular donations of all types of blood, there is simply not enough fresh blood on hand to meet the need. Hospitals stock all types of blood at all times, to meet the emergencies which constantly arise."

"Although blood credits are good for one year, fresh blood is usable as such for only three weeks. Only when healthy adults between the ages of 18-65 donate a pint of their blood at regular intervals can this constant need be met."

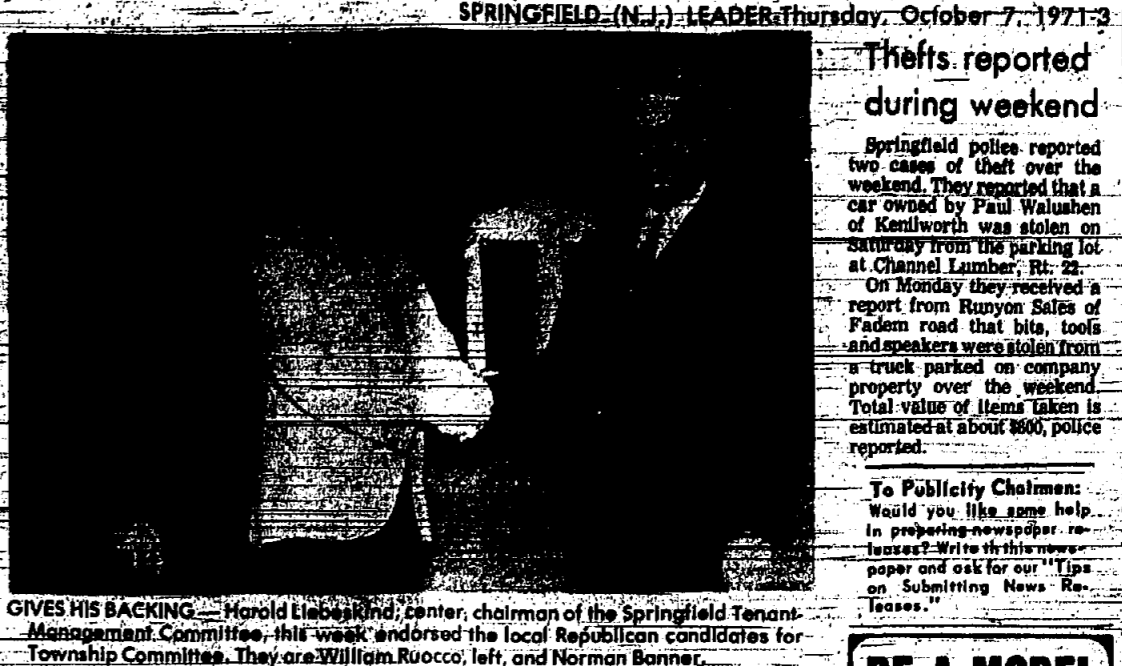

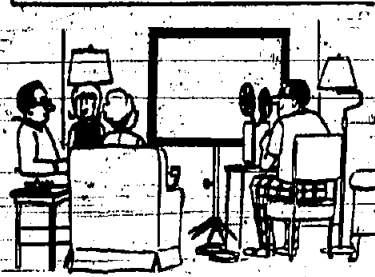

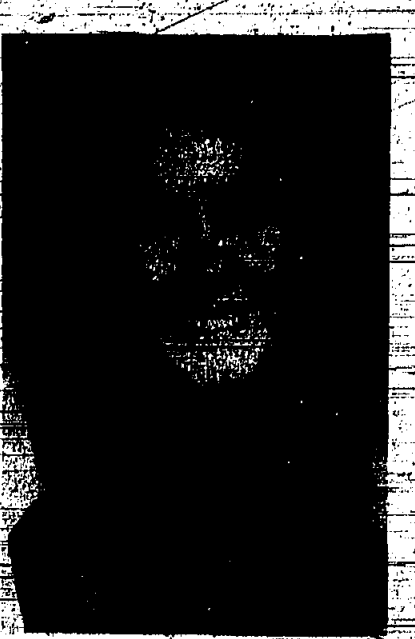

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Metric clothing in America's future?

"I'd like to see it," says the customer. "What size, sir?" inquires the salesman. "A 36 metric regular," replies the customer. "What?"

The man who today comes to his suit size in inches may, by the end of the decade or perhaps the early '80s, be requesting his garment based on centimeters if the metric system is adopted in the U.S. The metric system would eliminate inches, pounds and quarts and replace them with meters, kilograms and liters. Since 90 percent of the world is already on some sort of metric system, the U.S. is one of the last holdouts.

Our present Imperial system of measurements was adopted from the British who themselves are in the midst of "going metric."

In the Congress authorized study of the effects of going metric in the U.S., and results compiled by the National Bureau of Standards, Metric experts, however, are suggesting that a size

system be established rather than "use the centimeter designations." This would involve 1 centimeter in four centimeters or a four-centimeter interval which would be divided in half to provide size designations. Thus a 36-inch suit would be a 94 metric size.

A man wearing a 36 or 44 inch (chest size) suit would have little conversion problem. However, a 40 might have to choose between a size 92 and a size 94. If the metric system is adopted, it will involve some adjustment in men's clothing sizes, according to Hart Schaffner & Marx.

The most popular suit sizes today are expressed in multiples of two inches—40, 42, 44, 46. Converting to metric would probably involve multiples of four centimeters (1 centimeter equals 0.3937 inch).

It's not an egg, but nevertheless we call the large purple vegetable an eggplant. The eggplants in Europe were the first small-fruited kinds, resembling the egg. This attractive vegetable is in good supply at your local market. A satisfying main dish, how about stuffed eggplant?

Pumpkin cake salutes fall

Following the summer lull in baking, what could be more welcome on the first cool days of autumn than a special treat from the oven? Here's one fashioned for fall—the pumpkin cake.
