

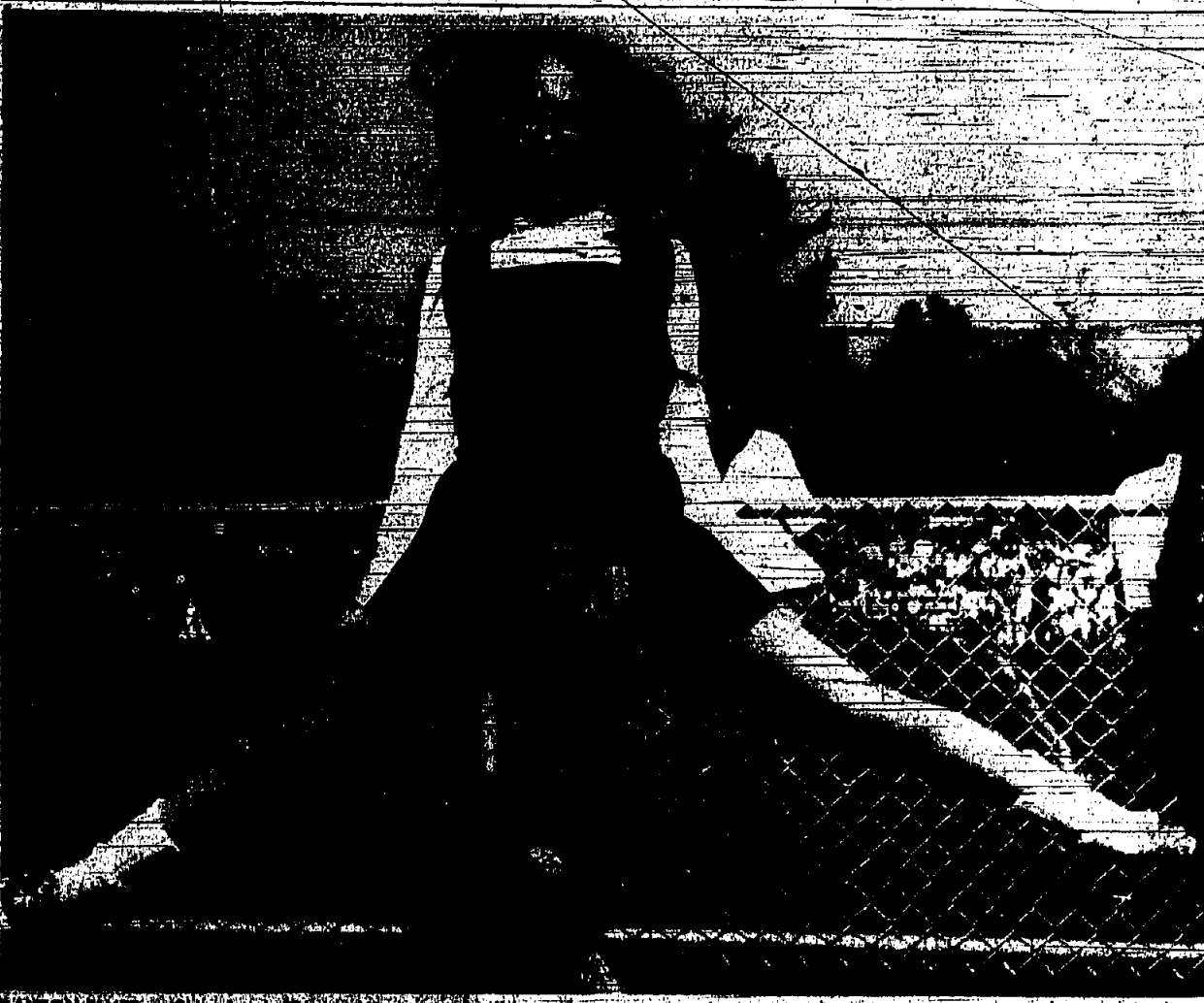

Ruocco, Banner win election to committee

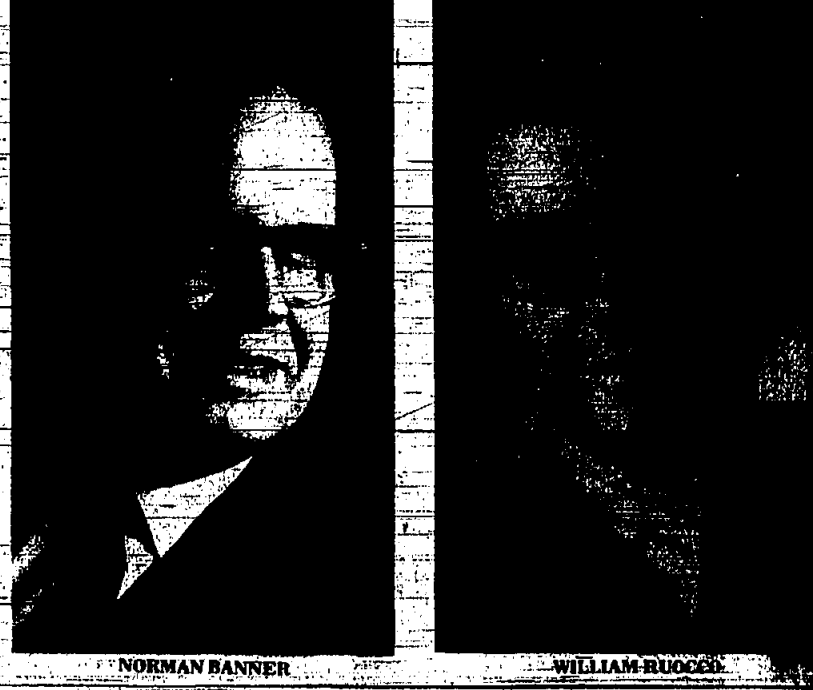


Norman Banner and William Ruocco, Republican candidates for township committee, embrace after the election. (Photo by Jim Adams)

500 votes separate 2 from Dems

GOP candidates win in light voter turnout

The two Republican candidates, William Ruocco and Norman Banner, swept to victory by a margin of some 500 votes in Springfield's Township Committee election on Tuesday. They led their Democratic opponents, Elton Dry and Neil Prager, in eight of the town's 13 election districts. The Democrats took four districts and one was a stand-off.

Republican suspense lifts with shouts as winning district vote totals come in

Genuine suspense over the outcome of the election made Republican headquarters an exciting place to be on Tuesday night. The heat, the tension and the crush of anxious campaigners in the tiny GOP trailer became more intense as the tallies came in, each district seeming to confirm what some Republicans only dared to hope was really happening.

The returns started to come in shortly after 8, kicking off the excitement. The first tallies pointing to an election victory came from Districts 1, 2, 4, 6 and 8, all coming in early and all in favor of the Republican challengers.

But the Republicans were in no mood to count their chickens, and attention focused on the missing figures. Candidate Bill Ruocco took to leading the trailer and talking hopefully to his campaigners while his running mate, Norman Banner, took a front seat at the scoreboard, where he was surrounded by GOP workers.

By 8:35, two districts were still not in. "Who's got the 11th and the 12th?" someone asked. But by this time it didn't matter. "The hell with them. You don't need them."

Moments later the totals from Districts 8 and 11 came in, both going to the Democrats, but the Republicans were delighted to get the results. Now they could get the total.

As the results were being recorded and added up, phone calls kept coming in. "We won. We won! Really!"

The Democratic votes were totaled first: 2,253 for Prager and 2,223 for Dry. Then the total for Ruocco was recorded: 2,841. "600 votes!" Ruocco exclaimed. "600 votes—620 votes!"

The total for Banner, now on his feet and sharing his pleasure with overwhelmed campaigners, was a healthy 2,714.

"We worked so hard for it," someone said. "Another comment on the screen, which may have helped to keep the vote down. Voter turnout was indeed light with little more than 50 percent of those registered coming to the polls."

"We picked the two right guys to run," someone else offered.

Shortly after 9 o'clock, Prager and Dry arrived to offer their congratulations to the winners.

The Democratic scene: gloom and determination

The gloom deepened early Tuesday night in Springfield Democratic headquarters upstairs at the Springfield Recreation Center. It was the first time the two district victory lines were only moments after the polls closed. The strong Republican lead was apparent to the party candidates for township committee, Elton Dry and Neil Prager, left to extend their personal congratulations to the GOP winners, William Ruocco and Norman Banner. They later returned to continue their thanks to their party workers.

The local results may have been part of a trend evident throughout the county, and the state, but several of the party faithful had comments on the loss in Springfield.

They contrasted the hard-hitting attacks of the past two years, which gave the party its first Town Hall majority in a decade, with the restrained tone of the 1971 campaign—the first one lost in three years.

The strong implication was that next year the Democrats will again find specific issues which they can present in graphic manner to the township's voters.

Another factor frequently cited was this year's GOP statement, repeated many times, that both parties should be represented on the Township Committee.

"The Republicans got their voters out this year," was the way one party worker phrased it. "And too many of the Democrats stayed home."

Yale Greenspoon, the town's municipal chairman, also dominated the statements made by the party candidates—Dry and Prager—and by the Democratic municipal chairman, Yale Greenspoon.

Prager said, "The bipartisan issue is still a good one, and apparently the voters of Springfield agree. We offer our congratulations to Mr. Ruocco and Mr. Banner and we extend to them our cooperation."

Dry commented, "It looks as if the bipartisan issue carried the field. It's the same issue that put Democrats Bob Welch and Art Caprio in office last year—and apparently it will apply in the future. I offer my congratulations to the winners."

Greenspoon declared, "Obviously the voters responded to the question of bipartisanship. We are still the majority party in the Township Committee. We have a lot of work to do, and a lot of promises to fulfill. Although I wish the best of luck to Mr. Ruocco and Mr. Banner, I can promise that the next 12 months of Democratic administration are going to see a great amount of concerned activity in this town."

"Maybe next year you'll be asking the Republican chairman for this sort of statement."

Greenspoon added, "It's hard for an administration to build up a record in just 12 months of control. Now we'll have another 12 before we go back to the voters."

And as the evening waned, a few of the most faithful remained to exchange commissions and to start planning for November of 1972. Most of the sandwiches remained uneaten, however, and most of the bottles were still unopened.

LEAVING ALL CANDIDATES in Springfield as he did throughout the county was incumbent Republican State Sen. Matthew J. Rinaldo, with 2,964 votes. Other Republicans were incumbent Francis X. McDermott, 2,740 and James E. Spillane, 2,566.

Democratic totals were John Connor, 2,107; Carmine Latta, 2,013; and Christopher Diets, 2,011. Independent Coalition figures were Richard Ayant, 249; the Rev. Elmer Sullivan, 273; and Arnold Gold, 338. The three GOP candidates went on to over-all victory.

Candidates for an unexpired term in the Senate were Van Dyke, Pollitt, Republican, 2,322; Jerry F. English, Democrat, 2,264; and Father Sullivan, IC, 285. Mrs. English was the county winner in a close race.

Figures in the race for an unexpired Assembly term were Elizabeth Cox, Republican, 2,450; Harry Foskey, Democrat, 2,035; and David McGuire, IC, 337. Miss Cox was the ultimate winner.

Walter Halpin, Republican incumbent county clerk who won easy reelection, led locally with 2,616 votes to 2,075 for Democrat James Delaney.

Springfield totals in the race to elect three freeholders were William Maguire (R), 2,488; Donald Dunne (R), 2,440; Matthew Nilsen (R), 2,443; Thomas Kaczmarek (D), 2,074; Matilda McGowan (D), 2,123; Joseph Garrubio (D), 2,124; Linda Gerstmann (IC), 263; David Burkitt (IC), 257; Sanford Williams (IC), 288; and Anthony Carbone, Independent, 70. The winners were Maguire, Nilsen and Kaczmarek.

The three public questions on the ballot all won support in Springfield. No. 1, for a higher education bond issue, carried, 2,773 to 1,528. No. 2, providing added tax exemptions for senior citizens, carried, 3,773 to 699. No. 3, a "green areas" bond issue, carried, 3,454 to 1,024. All three headed for state-wide approval.

In the local election the Republicans carried their usual strong districts, 10, 6 and 11; Democrats took the 7th, 9th, 10th and 11th.

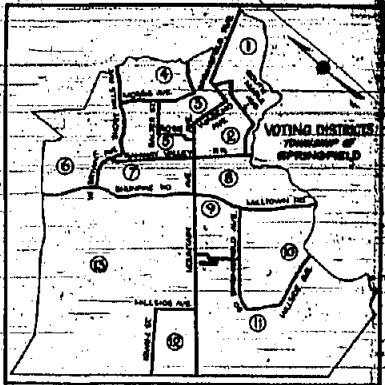
Hurwitz winner of Rotary award

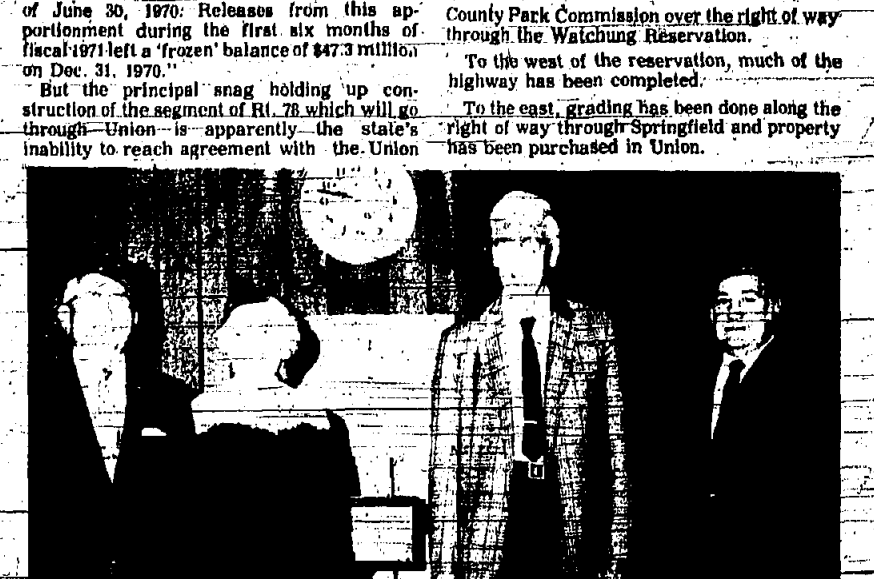

Overlook lists progress since the 'good old days'

Overlook Hospital will open its \$500,000 new plant and renovation work with 170 beds, questioning nostalgia for the "good old days" as far as medicine is concerned. Recalling days of quinine for pneumonia, polio, whooping cough and other fever common and deadly, a hospital spokesman pointed to the added years of life enjoyed today — from the average age of 35 years in 1776 to an average life span of 73 in 1971.

"We've come a long way," the spokesman added, "thanks to the advances of modern medicine, the techniques, skills, and equipment that have created the modern hospital out of the old horse and buggy days."

The coffee house, the first project of its kind in the country, was established through the cooperative efforts of the Port Authority, the New York City Office for the Aging, the Travelers Aid Society of New York and Project FIND, an Office of Economic Opportunity program on the Westside. Since June, about 500 elderly people have become "members" of the FIND Coffee House. It is open each weekday from 11 a.m. to 5 p.m. and its members can chat, sip coffee, play cards or read. An arts and crafts program, and a referral service for those who have problems they want to discuss is also offered.

It all started about two years ago when Mrs. Elizabeth "Steele" Traynor, the executive director of FIND, obtained permission from the Port Authority to assign two senior citizen community aides to the terminal. They staffed a service and information booth three afternoons a week to look into the problem of the elderly "room" sitters.

The committee of interested agencies formed by Mrs. Traynor to study the problem included Mrs. Stella B. Allen of the New York City Office of the Aging, Marvin Weiss who was then manager of the bus terminal, and the late William "Tom" Peck.

Studded tire season cut 6 weeks
U.S. Motor Vehicle Director Ray J. Marshall this week reinstated market that studded tires will be permitted on New Jersey roads until Nov. 15. In the past, studded tires could be used from Oct. 15 until April 15. The new regulation allows them only until April 1.

"This winter, we are cutting out six weeks of studded tire use, as a result of studies which indicate they cause increased road wear damage," Marshall said. "Market studies have estimated that studded tires double the expense of state highway maintenance." By eliminating 50 percent of the time studded tires are in use, we will reduce road wear by more than 25 percent," Marshall explained.

Welfare system will be topic for spring institute at college
The Welfare System, Challenge of the 70's, has been selected as the theme of the eighth annual Monmouth College Government Institute scheduled to be held next spring at the college.

The institute, scheduled for March 25, draws hundreds of high school students and their teachers, as well as interested citizens each year. It is sponsored by the Ashbury Park Press in cooperation with the college's high school social science departments.

A letter to high schools throughout New Jersey, Paul E. Zigo, assistant director of community relations at Monmouth, and the institute coordinator, said the day-long sessions focus on the national issue of our country's welfare system.

"The students are encouraged to submit research papers dealing with an aspect of the welfare system. The papers will be judged by a panel of experts and the authors of the best research papers will be invited to deliver the papers before the group attending the institute. Past institutes covered such topics as federal-state government interrelationships, county-municipal relationships, the New Jersey judiciary, regionalization of government services, the state cabinet post including its functions, problems and responsibilities to local government, the urban crisis and environmental problems."

"To our knowledge, this is the only program in the state which affords this opportunity to young adults interested in the social sciences," Zigo said.

He said persons interested in obtaining more information about the institute may contact the Monmouth College Community Relations Office, while interested students may contact their high school social science teachers.

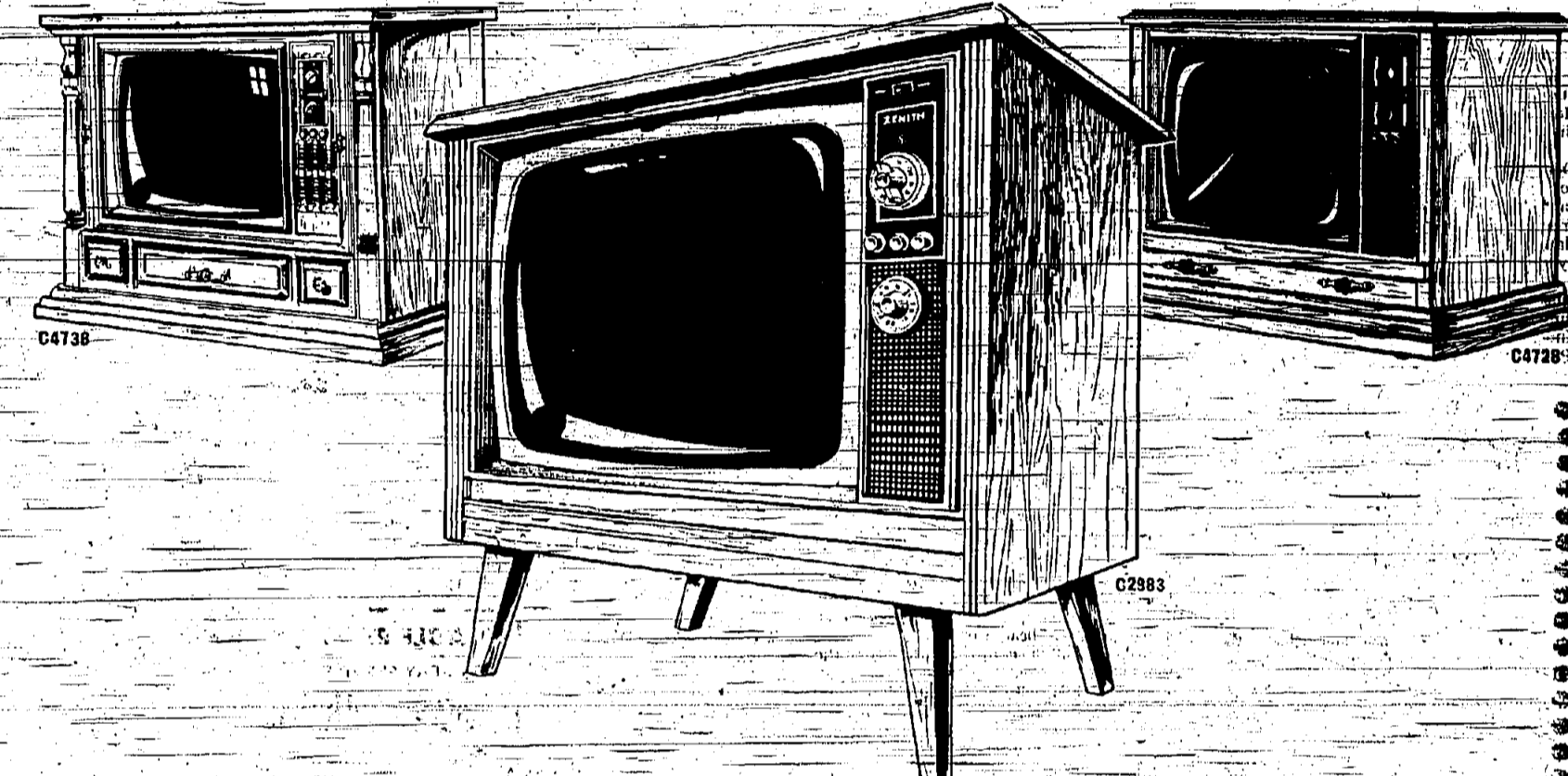

As You Approach Q Day

Many areas will appear as the decisive factor in giving up cigarettes. For them the issue that they manage their own lives is of great importance. They enjoy challenging themselves and, with an effort of will, they break the cigarette habit.

Some smokers describe stopping cigarettes as an exercise in self-control. They introduce a new dimension of self-control. They find that willpower does not help them in giving up cigarettes. They try to stop, they do not, and they feel guilty over their weakness.

Try Cutting Down...

An important first step in the process of giving up cigarettes for many smokers is to set the date for Q Day. When you are going to stop completely, and, as a suggestion, to gradually reduce the number of cigarettes you smoke each day by day, or week by week.

A good system is to decide only to smoke one cigarette a day for the first week. You may decide to have the cigarette you smoke each day at a certain time, such as 9 and 10 o'clock, 11 and 12, 1 and 2, 3 and 4, etc. And then to extend the time, one cigarette at a time, until you are back to your normal smoking habit.

How about making half of each cigarette? In the process of reducing the number of daily cigarettes, try various possibilities: if you have one pocket in which you always carry your pack, put it in another so that you will have to fumble for it if you always use your right hand to bring your cigarette to your mouth.

Do You Believe In "Cold Turkey" Quitting?

Yes, for some, a gradual withdrawal is less painful and, therefore, more successful. Some cigarette smokers find it easier to give up cigarettes in a matter of days. Others find it easier to give up cigarettes in a matter of weeks. Some find it easier to give up cigarettes in a matter of months. Others find it easier to give up cigarettes in a matter of years.

What about going to a cigarette withdrawal clinic?

If there is a clinic or program in your community, you may find it useful. The American Cancer Society (ACS) has such programs. Sharing your withdrawal experiences with others and working with them on a common problem can be very helpful. The clinic may make it possible for you to see a doctor or nurse who can provide a variety of services. Some of these services include: counseling, support, and information.

Shall I Make A Big Thing Of Q-Day?

Some find it more satisfactory to work on a schedule of Q-Day, quitting day is singled out as an important, decisive day in their personal lives—that indeed it is. Others who have known for a long time that they want to quit, find it easier to give up cigarettes on a day that is not so important.

Keep A Track Record

Many smokers have found that a useful step in understanding their smoking is the keeping of a daily record on a scale like that below. In your gradual withdrawal you may decide to record the number of cigarettes you smoke each day. This record can be used as a guide to your progress.

Approaches in Giving up Cigarette Smoking

1. List the reasons for and against smoking.
2. Select Q Day—change to low tar and nicotine cigarette.
3. Chart your smoking habits for at least two weeks; how many cigarettes, when, the most and least important.
4. Repeat each night, at least ten times, one of your reasons for not smoking cigarettes.
5. Eliminate one category of cigarettes the most or the least desired.

6. Secure a supply of substitutes, mints, gum, an inhaler, ginger root, etc.

7. On or Q Day—try the different substitutes as the wish to smoke recedes—enlist your wife or a friend in a busy series of events, eating well, going to the movies or theater, exercise and many long walks, moderate drinking.

8. If you are depressed, see your physician and discuss your symptoms.

9. Keep reminding yourself, again and again, of the shocking risks in cigarette smoking.

THE WEEK BEFORE Q-DAY

Think over your list of reasons why you should not smoke: the risk of disease, the burning of the taste of food, the cost, the cough, the bad breath, the mess and smell of morning-after ashtrays.

Concentrate each evening when you are relaxed, just before you fall asleep, on one dreadful result of cigarette smoking. Repeat and repeat and repeat that single fact. Drive home another fact the next night and another the next.

Review the facts that you know about the risks of cigarette smoking. Remind yourself that there, but for the grace of God go you, that you may indeed, if you continue smoking, lose six and a half years of life, that—if you are a heavy smoker—your chances of dying between 25 and 65 years of age are twice as great as those of the nonsmoker. Are the six minutes of pleasure to a heavy smoker in a cigarette worth six fewer minutes of life? Would you fly in an airplane if the chances of crash and death were even close to the risks of cigarette smoking? Think over why it is that 100,000 physicians have quit cigarette smoking.

How About Ashtrays?

One school of thought says that the use of ashtrays is to get rid of cigarettes, ashtrays, anything that might remind a smoker of the former habit.

Will I Tell Others Of My Decision?

Some do, some don't. Some find that the wider they spread the news of their decision the greater it is for them to make it stick. Others regard not smoking as their own personal business and keep it secret from those with whom they are most intimate. You should choose for yourself.

Will I Gain Weight?

Many do. Food is a substitute for cigarettes for many people. And your appetite may be frailer than it was.

During the first few weeks of giving up cigarettes some psychologists recommend planning to eat more often. Some people find that eating these things that are pleasant and fulfilling. Some people, those to whom self-control is vital, get rewards out of controlling their weight. For some people, the act of eating is a reward for not smoking.

How About Hypnosis?
