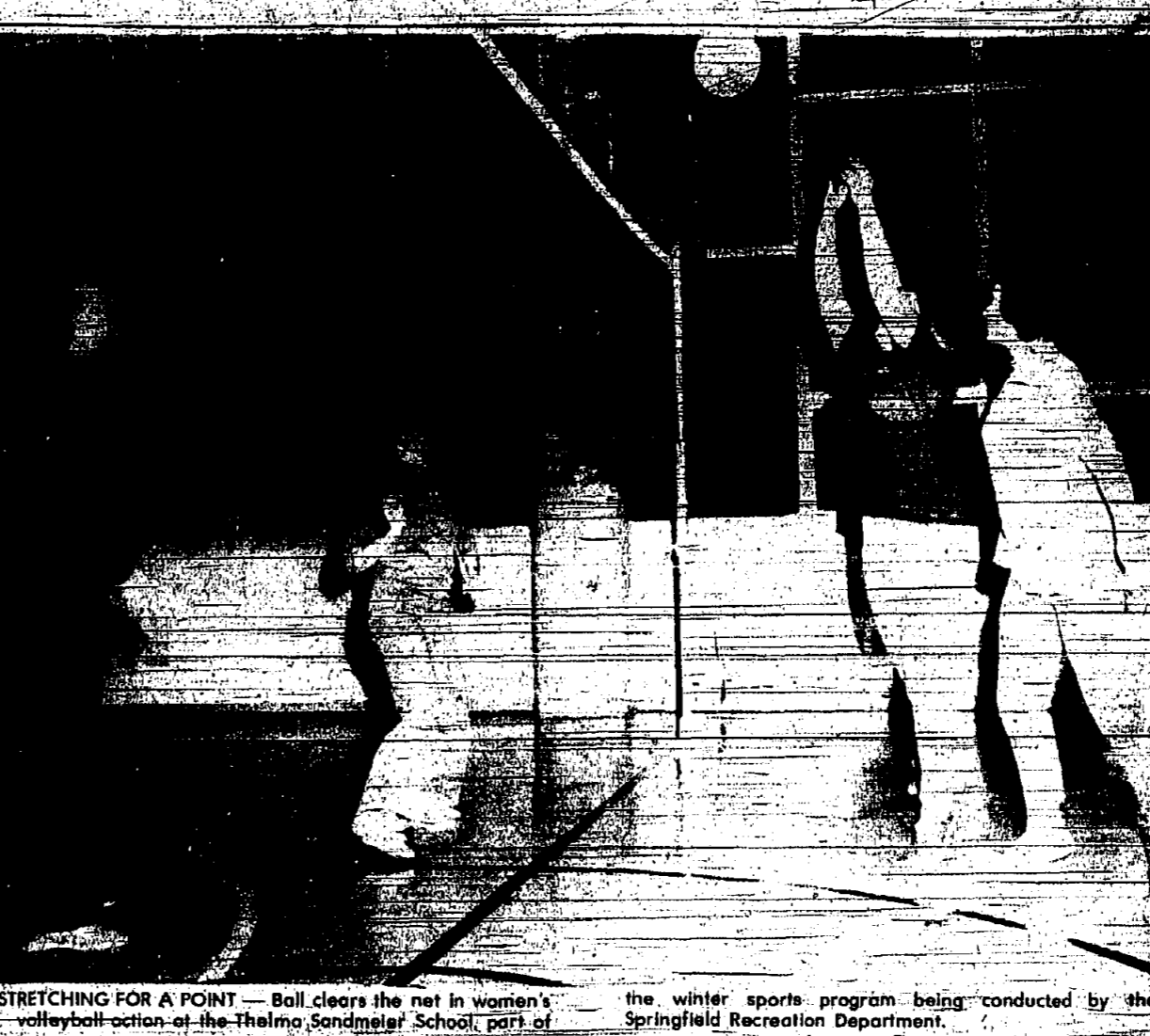

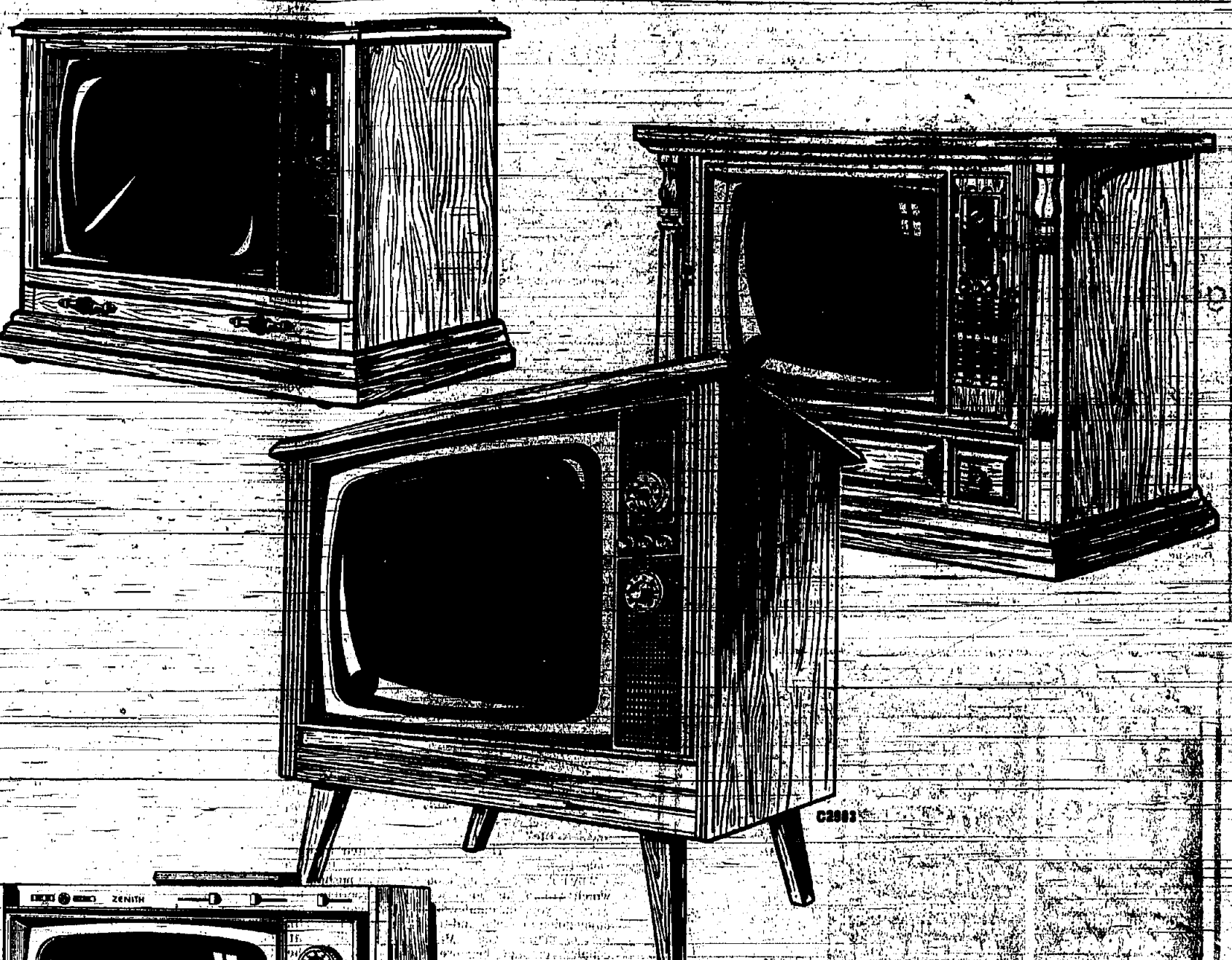

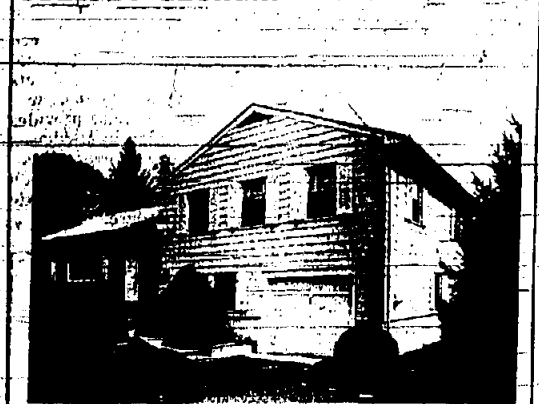

Stanley F. Volles, M.D. Director National Institute of Mental Health

ARCHITECTURAL New concepts developed in Oklahoma using architecture to aid in the treatment of mental illness have been attracting attention in professional circles here and abroad.

This was evidenced earlier this year when a presentation was made in Denmark at an international meeting of psychiatricians describing facilities recently built at Central State Hospital in Oklahoma.

The four buildings are designed just backward from the traditional hospital building, where the patient is kept in bed. We fight every step of the way to keep them out of the hospital and out of bed.

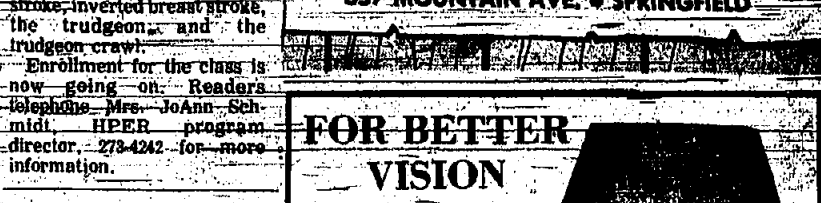

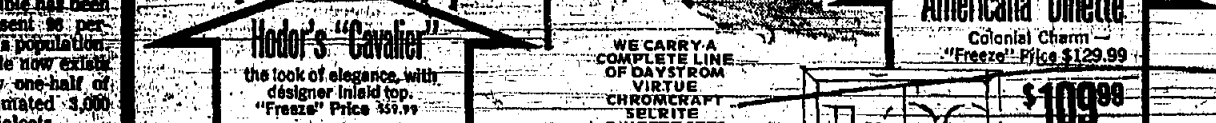

Heymann predicts continued upsurge in state's economy

Donald M. Heymann, commissioner of the N.J. Department of Labor and Industry, said this week, "Most of the September business indicators indicate a continued upsurge in the state's economy." Heymann was commenting on the current issue of New Jersey Economic Indicators, the monthly analysis of business conditions by the N.J. Department of Labor and Industry's Division of Planning and Research.

Heymann cited strong gains in automobile sales through September along with a vigorous pace in checkbook spending as reflected in the state's retail sales which ran 18 percent ahead of last year. He also pointed out that retail sales in New Jersey advanced to another record high in July of last year: \$1.1 billion, up 7.3 percent from a year ago.

Indicators of planned homebuilding in New Jersey continued strong through August and September, said Heymann. "The number of building permits issued for dwelling units in the highest level since the start of the mid-1960's and has been rising almost steadily since the winter of 1968-1970. Non-residential construction was down in August from July's very high level, but they appear to be in the process of reversing last year's slump."

Heymann said, "New business incorporations and business failures continue to behave in a manner consistent with an expanding economy." Over 2,200 new corporations were incorporated in the state in September while the total of 27 failures reported for the month was the lowest since March 1970.

Leading job market indicators have been mixed in recent months following promising upturns earlier in the year. The labor force and unemployment rate in September were unchanged at 2.2 percent of the work force on a seasonally adjusted basis. Seasonal adjustment in a statistical device to eliminate the repetitive short-term fluctuations that appear periodically during the year and thereby to make the underlying economic trends more discernible.

The average factory workweek was 40.5 hours in September, little changed from the revised August figure of 40.2 hours, but well above last winter's low of 38.7. Heymann explained, "A strengthening of the workweek has been followed by increased hiring in the manufacturing sector. However, the demand for labor has not yet risen fast enough to put a significant dent in the unemployment rate."

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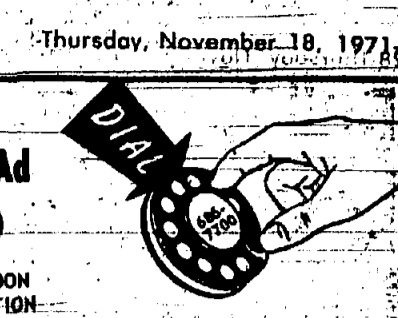

Approximately 90 families had an opportunity to participate in the first step of an educational goals assessment project launched this year by the Springfield Board of Education and the administration of the public schools.

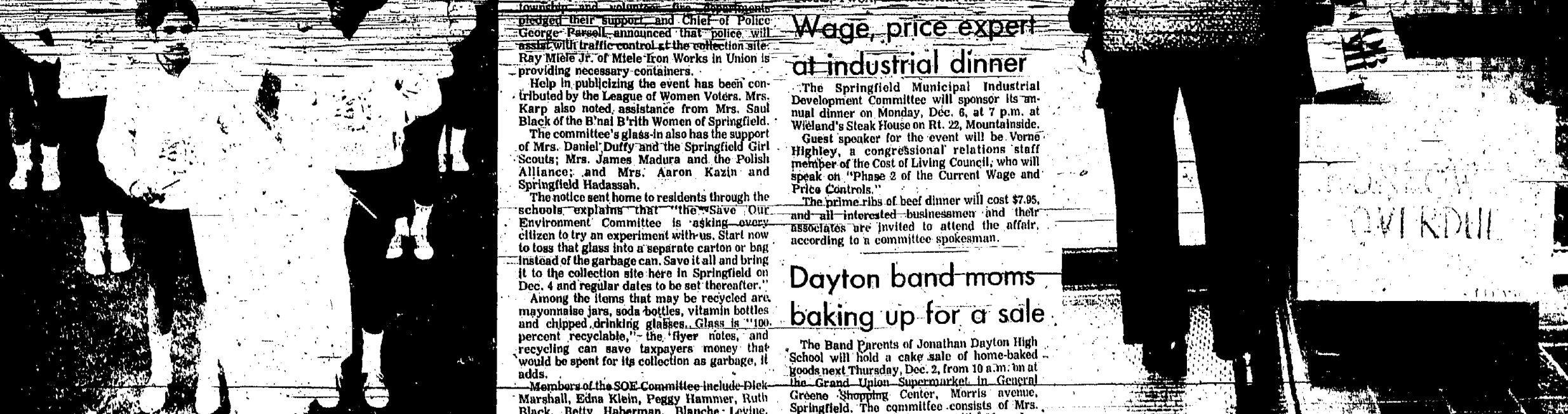
