The road home may be more hazardous for returning Thanksgiving weekend motorists than the outbound trip, according to the New Jersey State Safety Council. The council gives two reasons why. First, traffic volumes will be heavy Sunday; particularly in the afternoon and late evening due to motorists who delay their departures until the last moment and the returning college students who each year create traffic jams at all of the major transportation centers.

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

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
