Local boards of education should not be expected to assume the full costs of various extracurricular and "gray area" student programs, and services until the state can provide the financial support to the public schools, the report submitted to the State Board of Education by the New Jersey School Boards Association, says.

The report, which is the result of a year-long study, warns that assumption of the cost of these programs and services will have a negative effect on the state's ability to provide a quality education. It also points out that the state's current financial policies are not equitable and that the state should provide the necessary support to the local boards.

Dr. Kaufmann, 40, has been at Rutgers for five years. He has a Ph.D. in Music from the University of Pennsylvania and has served as a music director at various churches.

N.J. Realtors say rent curbs hinder housing programs

New Jersey's ability to meet its housing needs in the 1970's will be seriously hindered if local rent control ordinances are enacted, according to a report by the newly-elected president of the New Jersey Association of Realtors.

The report, titled "Rent Control: A Barrier to Housing Programs," states that rent control will discourage investment in new housing and lead to a shortage of rental units.

Dr. Kaufmann described his part-time service to the church as "tentmaking." He said that he will continue to teach at Rutgers while serving as a priest. He will be assigned to a parish in Trenton.

Dr. Kaufmann's decision has been met with surprise by some of his colleagues at Rutgers. However, he said that he has always had a strong faith and that he felt called to the priesthood.

Law made cleanup quick Polluter told to remove oil slick

One of the new water pollution control laws passed during the 1971 session of the Legislature may prove to be a greater help to the private citizen than anyone suspected.

A statute controlling the discharge of petroleum products into waters of the state (Chapter 172, P.L. 1971) was amended by environmental bills signed by Gov. William Cahill last June.

The law states that if a polluter is found to have caused an oil spill, they must clean up the spill within a certain time frame. Failure to do so can result in fines and imprisonment.

Supervisor named for meat, poultry inspection in state

Dr. Charles H. Hackenberg has been named the U.S. Department of Agriculture's acting area supervisor for meat and poultry inspection in New Jersey.

According to the USDA's Consumer and Marketing Service, which is responsible for the Federal inspection program, the office will be located in Trenton and will supervise federal inspection in packing and processing plants as well as maintain surveillance of state inspection programs that are certified by USDA as equal to federal.

Dr. Hackenberg's appointment is part of a USDA reorganization of its meat and poultry inspection program, in which eight regional offices were consolidated into five and 36 area offices were established. Most of the latter offices will be located in State capitals and will report to one of the five regional offices.

The New Jersey area office will come under the Northeast Regional Office in Philadelphia. Acting director will be Dr. Chester J. Diehl.

Public Service Electric and Gas Co. said this week that programs encouraging gas distribution companies to participate in exploration programs are being delayed or abandoned pending Federal Power Commission clarification of how gas discovered would be allocated.

Last March, Transcontinental Gas Pipe Line Corp. and 31 of its customer companies, including Public Service, Elizabethton Gas and South Jersey Gas, developed a program to supply funds for gas exploration. The plan was designed to allow the customer to share in the cost of gas discovered.

The companies said that they believe that such gas exploration programs are in the public interest because they would provide part of the enormous amount of capital needed. They pointed out that previous statements by the FPC indicated that the commission encouraged distribution companies to participate in exploration.

MENTAL HEALTH MATTERS

Stanley F. Yolles, M.D., Director, National Institute of Mental Health

A young housewife feels "so much of the time an elderly man withdraws from family life and spends more time alone in his room."

Are these persons emotionally or mentally ill or are their actions within the bounds of "normal behavior?"

Defining what is "average" or "normal" in the wide range of human behavior always has been a problem for all of us. The layman, the psychiatrist, the scientist alike.

But now a newly reported research study employing a new method, has established what the researchers feel can be indices for normal behavior according to sex, marital status, age, and social class.

The "Scientists' emphasis" strongly that there are many patterns of normality in human behavior, with no one pattern necessarily "right." Many differences, they found, are a result of differing factors, such as age, marital status, and social class.

They do feel that their new indices can provide norms for adolescents.

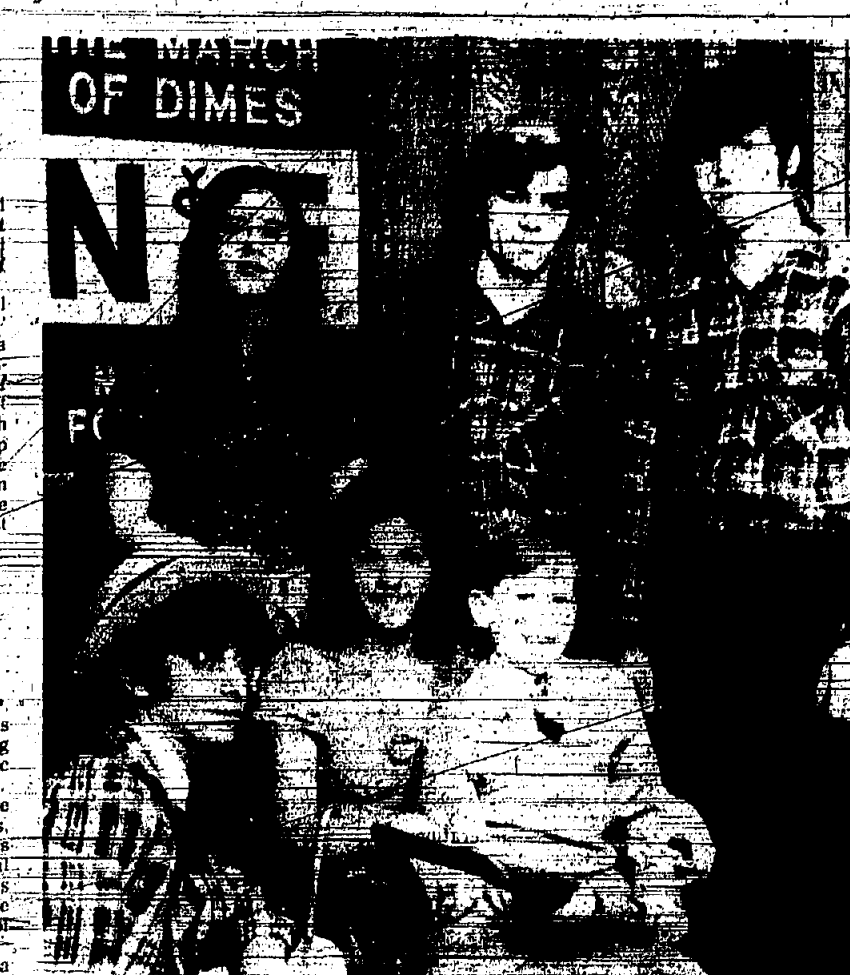

30 million women earn job benefits

Close to 30 million women are earning Social Security protection for themselves and their families through their own work, according to Ralph W. Jones, Social Security district manager for the Union-Somerset County Area.

Women who have both disability and survivors protection, Jones said, "if she becomes unable to work for year or longer because of a disabling accident or severe illness, she and her dependents may be eligible for monthly cash payments from Social Security."

In some cases, Social Security payments can be made from a state rehabilitation agency. So, she can continue to get help in recovering and returning to work, Jones said.

"This is a working woman—she is not a housewife—she is earning a salary," Jones said. "If she becomes unable to work for year or longer because of a disabling accident or severe illness, she and her dependents may be eligible for monthly cash payments from Social Security."

Even though her husband may be working at a full time job, his children are still eligible for benefits, Jones said.

On her own work record, the working woman can retire at 62 with reduced monthly cash payments, Jones said.

Until she is 65 and get full monthly cash benefits, Jones said, but if she could collect higher benefits as a wife on her husband's record, she can collect higher payment.
