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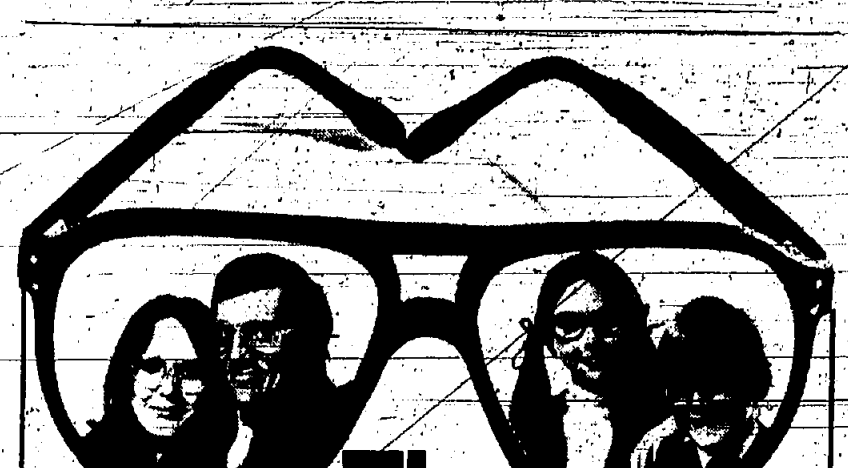

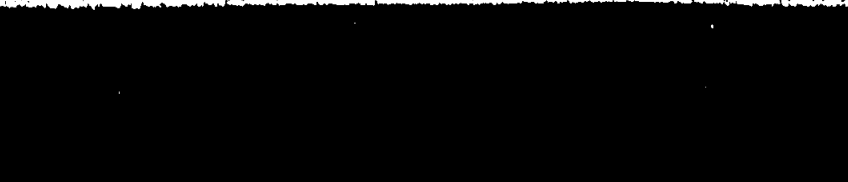

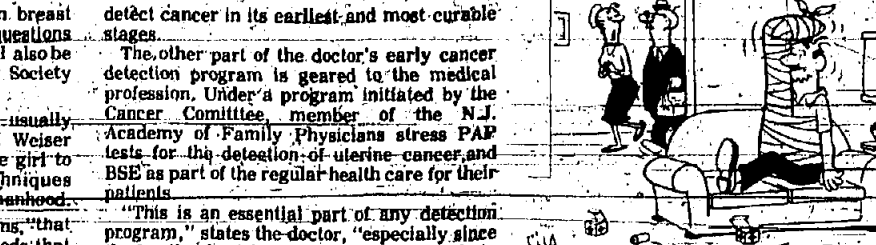

## 5 local stargazers complete UC course in basic astronomy

Five Springfield residents, among 412 persons who have completed "What's Out There?"—An Introduction to Astronomy?—an eight-week course for adults which was offered for the fifth consecutive year at the William Sperry Observatory on the Union College campus, in Clatskanie, Ore., graduated last night with their diplomas.

The astronomy course, which was developed jointly by Amateur Astronomers Inc. who operate the Sperry Observatory jointly with the University of Oregon, is designed to acquaint the layman with the universe, motions and physical characteristics of planets, moons, comets and stars, and how professional astronomers go about finding out "what's out there."

Highlights of the astronomy course include laboratory experiences, including viewing through the Sperry Observatory's turret telescopes.

### Cancer strikes children too; parents should know signs

While the chances of any child being struck by cancer are remote, there are some 4,000 children under the age of 15 who will succumb to cancer this year. Every parent should be aware of this statistic and other facts about cancer in children," Dr. Warren Knauer, executive committee chairman of the Union County Unit of the American Cancer Society, said this week.

"Cancer in children is labeled an important health problem because more children of school age will die of cancer than of any other disease," Dr. Knauer said. "Almost half of this number will die of leukemia, leukemia, cancer of the blood-forming tissue." Dr. Knauer explained, "It is characterized by the abnormal production of white blood cells. Acute leukemia strikes children in large numbers and can be treated by drugs. Combinations of drugs have proved capable of extending life for a few months or as long as ten or more years. The right signs that medical science is on the right track."

Children's cancers are often hard to recognize, since they may, uncharacteristically, manifest "disorders," Dr. Knauer said. "Knowledge of cancer's warning signs and symptoms, if acted upon promptly, may serve to save a child's life."

### Regional board approves basic curriculum changes

The Regional High School District Board of Education approved major changes in the U.S. history and English curriculum at its monthly meeting before some 16 interested citizens Tuesday night at A. L. Johnson Regional High School.

Board members tabled, probably for a month, first reading of policy change revising course requirements for graduation which would permit exceptional students to qualify for diplomas in three years instead of four. Similar but less fundamental changes were also approved in foreign languages, industrial arts, mathematics and other areas of social studies.

The new U.S. history offerings approved unanimously comprise nine semester courses, which need not be taken in sequence. Each student must choose at least four of the courses, covering at least three different areas.

IN THE GENERAL AREA ARE A U.S. history survey, covering basic trends in a chronological manner, and American urban studies, stressing past developments, possibilities for future growth and proposed solutions.

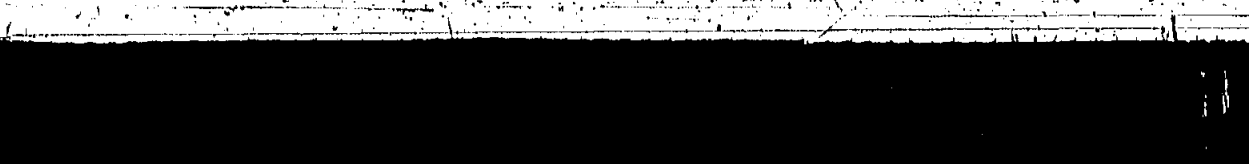
