Council president gives student view of controversy over final examinations

Bonnie Bernstein, president of the Student Council at Jonathan Dayton Regional High School, Springfield, this week took issue with comments made by Dr. Donald Merachnik, superintendent of schools of the Regional High School District, regarding student proposals that final examinations be made optional for Dayton students. He had also discussed

possibilities for a revision of the grading system. In a separate statement, Miss Bernstein noted that Carl L. Marburger, N.J. commissioner of education had sent a student spokesman a copy of a report which Marburger said "casts serious questions on the practices of secondary schools in New Jersey as to final examinations." (More information on that report will appear next week.)

Merachnik's belligerent attitude toward David Hodes, the student whose original letter to the editor provoked Merachnik's response. David is respected by the school community as an intelligent, sincere and considerate person. I do not think that a "man in" Dr. Merachnik's position should feel a need to condemn such an individual. He is exemplifying the immediately defensive and distorted attitude the Regional administration usually takes when confronted with the more hard-core student concerns.

School budget wins majority in Regional voting

The Regional High School District current expense budget for the coming school year won approval by a vote of 1,144 to 764 Tuesday in the six member communities of the Regional District. The capital outlay item on the ballot was also approved, 1,666 to 817.

THE FULL TEXT of Miss Bernstein's reply to Dr. Merachnik follows: "As president of the Student Council and a member of the student body at Jonathan Dayton Regional High School, I have to protest certain statements issued by Dr. Merachnik in last week's Leader and present community adults with a more accurate picture concerning the Student Council's proposal for optional exams and the board's handling of that proposal.

"First, an objective overview of the situation is warranted. In 1968-69, the Jonathan Dayton Student Council presented the board with a proposal for senior exam exemptions. The board granted the principal, Robert LaVature, the option to give seniors with A averages exemptions. In 1969-70, all four regional school principals were granted that option by the Board. Seniors with A or B averages at Dayton received exemptions. The grading system for 1970-1971 was devised to have no final exams per se, but cumulative reviews or final projects or products were weighted very heavily and averaged into the last of four marking periods. Students whose averages fell between two grades were to be given the lower grade.

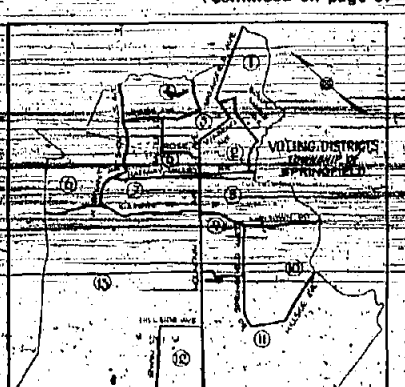
U.S. funds allotted to restore bridges

Turnpike troopers start the new year with 137 arrests

The alertness of troopers patrolling the New Jersey Turnpike resulted in a record 137 criminal arrests during the first 10 days of 1972. Five and one-half times more than during last year's corresponding period.

Heading the list were more than 50 arrests involving narcotics valued at about \$27,000, and 49 for carrying concealed weapons. Other offenses included motor vehicle violations, with most occurring in the north of New Brunswick.

At the same time, the Turnpike Authority released statistics for 1971 that showed a total of 3,171 persons who thought they could make a safe getaway to their destination from a total of 7,000 D patrols. They were arrested on a variety of charges, most of which involved criminal violations. The 1971 statistics showed 1,066 in 1971 and 429 in 1970 and receiving station projects in 1971 and 255 in 1970.

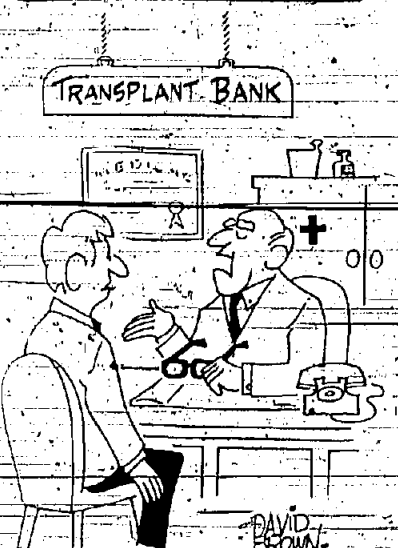
