

Cloudy weather at Union College

Dufloca leaving meteorological station

Whatever the forecasts, the climate at Union College is somewhat chilly these days as students and faculty adjust to the retirement of Harold D. Dufloca, college meteorologist.

Dufloca's warmth and old world charm have lightened the dreariest of predictions since the college's "Meteorological Station," a cooperative station of the U.S. Weather Bureau, first opened on Jan. 1, 1969, reported by Kenneth W. Iversen, president.

While Dufloca is retiring to Ocean Grove "to take things easy," he admits that he will probably still get up in the middle of the night to check what time the rain began and to check the temperatures.

For Dufloca tracking the weather has been almost a lifetime avocation. He first became interested in meteorology as a Boy Scout in Flushing, New York. His interest led him to the office of the U.S. Weather Bureau at the Battery, Dr. James H. Scott, then meteorologist at the New York Station, recognized the young boy's interest as more than casual and helped him to set up the cooperative weather station at home.

In time, "Dufloca of Flushing" became known as a "sure-fire" weatherman and housewives called him to ask if they should hang out the wash and organizations called to see if their picnic should be held as scheduled.

He later joined the Weather Bureau as a regular staff member and remained there for five years. Leaving to take a position with the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad, he continued to maintain a special meteorological station at home.

Weather forecasting again became more than an avocation in 1957 when New York City asked him to take on the job of snowmaker and he took a leave of absence from his railroad post to spend a winter predicting snow storms.

On his word, the city would mobilize its snow-making equipment or sit back, secure in the knowledge that the flurries would never amount to a snowfall.

Dufloca moved to Cranford following his retirement from the Baltimore & Ohio, to live with his brother-in-law and sister, Mr. and Mrs. Rex E. Reed, where he continued his interest in weather and meteorology. With the establishment of Union College's cooperative weather station, Dufloca became the college's official meteorologist.

For the past 11 years, he has kept a daily record of temperature, precipitation, barometric pressure, wind-direction and velocity and the character of the day. This information is included in the New Jersey Climatological Data Bulletin and is also made available to news agencies, government agencies, industries and other organizations.

He has also involved students in his work and he is most proud that some of these students are now professional meteorologists. In fact, it is to his students that he leaves the tasks of weather reporting at Union College. They will maintain the station under the supervision of Prof. Patrick J. White, astronomy instructor and director of the Sperry Observatory.

Looking back over the past 11 years, Dufloca finds that his greatest satisfaction came from working with young people—the college students, the elementary and high school youngsters and the Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts who visited the weather station.

"Nothing makes me happier," he says, "than helping a young person to get a real knowledge of meteorology, knowing how much pleasure this interest has given me."

He has also received Social Security retirement checks and half lived with relatives, according to Ralph W. Jones, Social Security district manager in the Union, reduced benefits at 62, 63, or 64, depending on the number of years he has worked.

But more than nine out of 10 people 65 and over are eligible for Social Security payments, he noted. "And I want to live by themselves—no relatives, no married couples or single people."

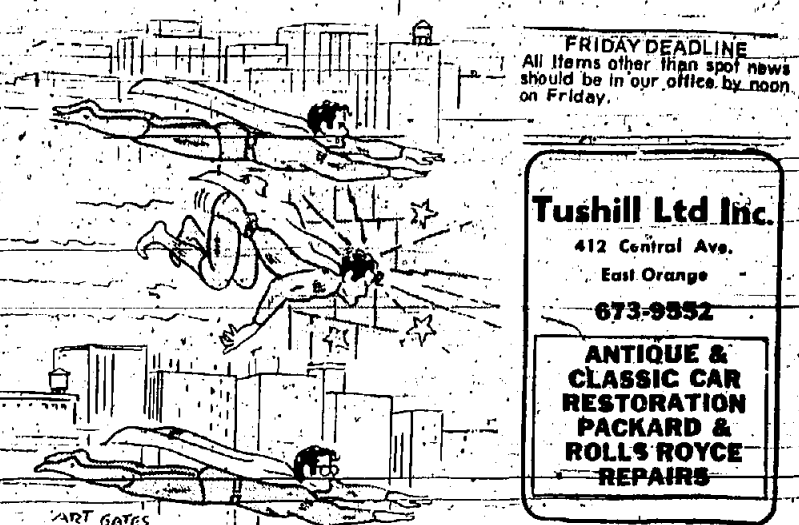
Far out of five married couples with one member 65 or over, only one couple lives apart from relatives—compared to two out of three in 1952.

Three out of five single people 65 or over live alone—compared to two out of three in 1952.

The study was conducted by the Social Security Administration of the U.S. Department of Health, Education, and Welfare.

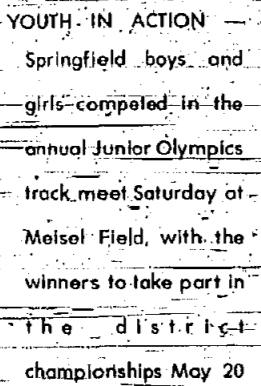

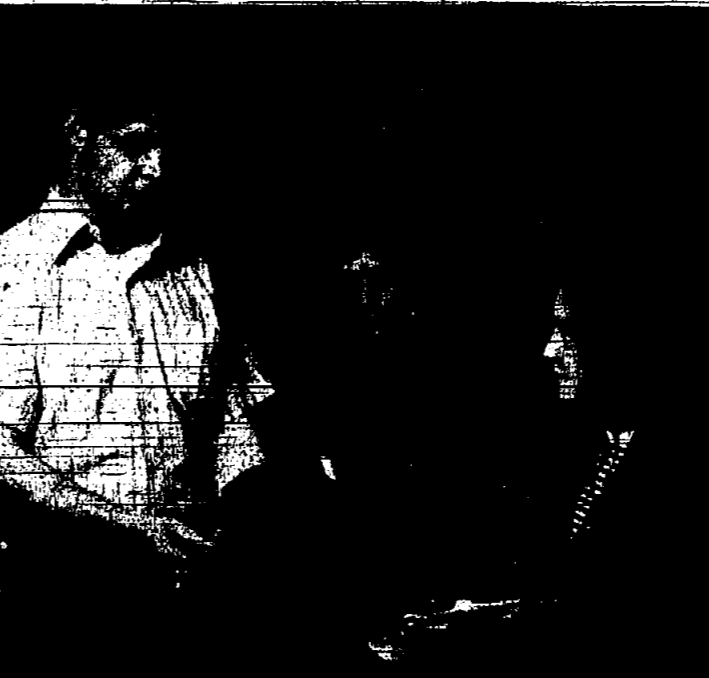

Medical school affiliates with Muhlenberg Hospital

Signing of a major affiliation between the College of Medicine and Dentistry of Rutgers Medical School and Muhlenberg Hospital, Plainfield, was announced this week.

According to Dr. James W. Mackenzie, dean of the College of Medicine and Dentistry, this affiliation will help in a four-year M.D. degree-granting institution in accordance with the wishes of our board of trustees and pending approval by the appropriate agencies. It will provide the clinical base necessary for medical students to continue into their third and fourth years.

Presently, Rutgers Medical School grants a master of medical science degree to students who successfully complete the school's two-year program. Students must then apply to another school with an M.D. degree-granting program. This coming fall, Rutgers will have its first class of three-year students continuing studies at the Medical School, and it is hoped, studied at Muhlenberg, that fourth-year students will be able to continue their training at Muhlenberg.

Dr. Stanley S. Bergin, president of the Board of Directors of Muhlenberg Hospital, expressed the hospital's pride in "the achievement of this educational landmark in our 85 years of service. This major affiliation has been a goal of the board of governors for a decade, and should be a source of great esteem to the greater Plainfield community, pointing up the value of Muhlenberg's academic efforts."

Dr. Stanley S. Bergin, president of the College of Medicine and Dentistry of New Jersey, added his support to the signing. "Muhlenberg has a fine reputation as a community teaching hospital. Its philosophy of progressive patient care and its teaching programs in nursing, estheticology, histologic technique and medical and X-ray technology, along with its intern and resident programs, make it an ideal setting for training three-year students from our Rutgers Medical School.
