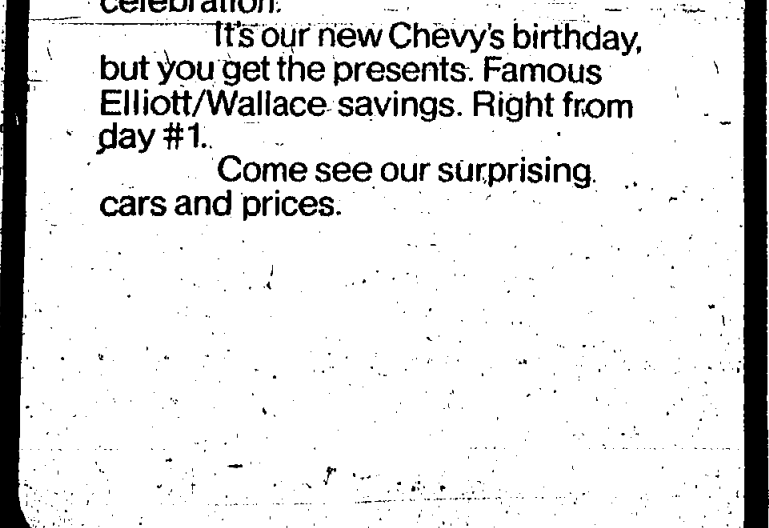

Some of our best ideas come to us in the small hours of the morning as we wait impatiently for the blessings of sleep to beat the first rays of the sun into our beam.

The latest is: What wonders the ancient Romans could have performed if only their government had all the advantages we know today under the constitution and rules of procedure now followed in New Jersey.

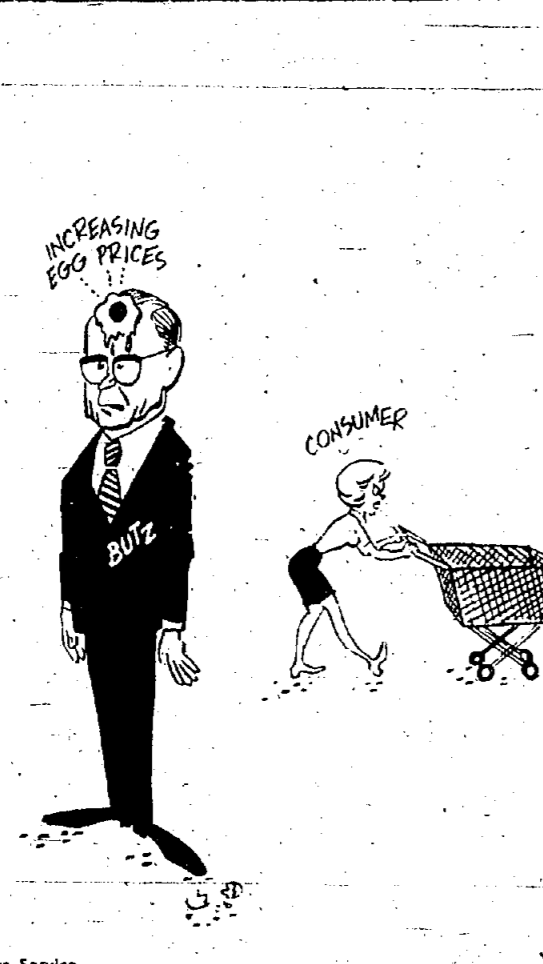
"But hurry the whole thing as fast as you can. I want both a press conference before the Ides of March."

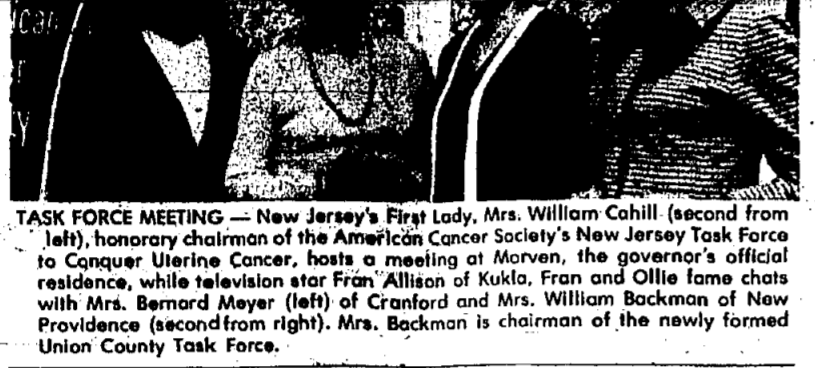
