

# Harvest from the sea Nodules hold mineral wealth

Billions of tons of nodules scattered on the ocean bottom in the form of nodules—small lumps of minerals, geographers and industrialists both agree that these nodules are a mineral resource of great value, if they can be mined.

In Science, the weekly journal of the American Association for the Advancement of Science, staff writer Allen L. Hammond discusses the possibility of harvesting the mineral wealth that nodules hold.

Man has only begun to tap the ocean's vast riches. Fish, salt, tin and bromine are the largest resources that have so far been extracted from the sea. This, however, is likely to change as more research is done on the

economic viability of mining nodules. The most commercially useful nodules, says Hammond, are black or brown agglomerations of manganese oxide and iron-oxide minerals. The nodules include iron, copper, manganese, cobalt and traces of at least two dozen other metals. Unlike the other minerals, however, large manganese deposits are found both on land and under the sea.

Nodules form on the seabeds of many parts of the world, Hammond explains, but only in mining worthwhile. The Pacific Ocean southwest of Hawaii is the most favorable mining area that has been found.

Where these metals came from and why they are concentrated where they are, is the subject of much debate, says Hammond. It is known that iron and manganese were formed by submarine volcanic eruptions and runoff from the continents, but sources of nickel and copper are uncertain.

A study of nodules and their chemistry has only begun, concludes Hammond, but research has clearly shown that there is a great mineral wealth below the sea.

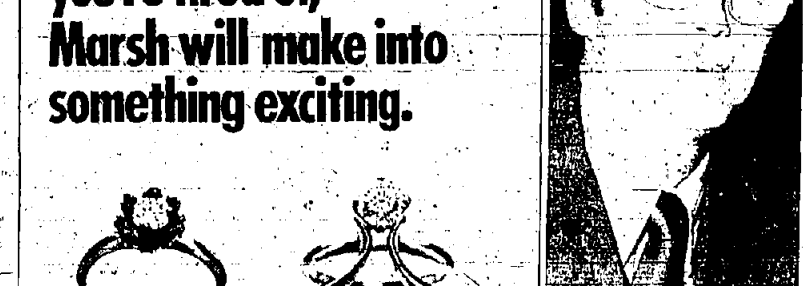

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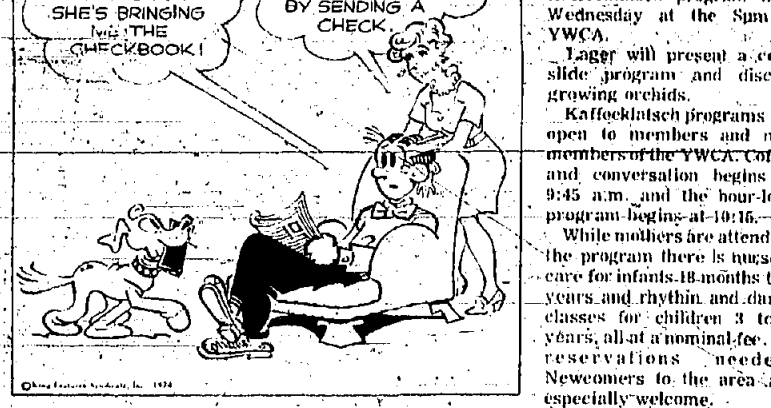

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Newest program supplemental to Social Security

The new Supplemental Security Income program for people 65 or over, or blind, or disabled is run by the Social Security Administration, but it is not the same as Social Security, according to Doris R. Lisaman, Social Security acting district manager in Elizabeth.

"Supplemental Security Income payments are based on financial need," Miss Lisaman said. "Social Security benefits are based on work and earnings."

The amount of a monthly Supplemental Security Income payment depends on whether a person has other income, according to Miss Lisaman.

Social Security retirement, disability, and survivors benefits are paid to eligible workers and their families regardless of income other than earnings, she said.

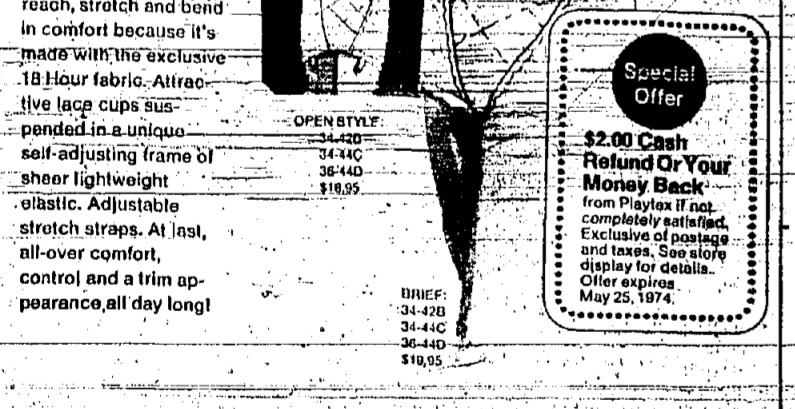

The Union County Kiwanis Club Society recently presented its first International Symbol of Access Certificate to the Springfield Public Library, citing it as being a facility which is designed to be accessible to the physically handicapped, elderly and other temporarily incapacitated.

The award was a result of the county group's participation in a state-wide project sponsored by the New Jersey Easter Seal Society to encourage state design specifications in public buildings.

Besides the use of a speaker's bureau to publicize the effort, the Society also has been contacting builders, architects, engineers and other involved in construction to make them aware of the needs of the handicapped. In addition, Society representatives make on-site inspections of those buildings claiming to be barrier-free.

The symbol of access is given to those facilities which fulfill a set of minimum requirements. These include having a ramp or ramp entrance, door widths of at least 32 inches, restrooms with wide stalls and grab bars, ramped curbs to the street and on parking buildings higher than two or three stories are required to have elevators before they can earn the certificate.

In addition, certificates are also awarded to individuals who have committed themselves to the needs of the handicapped. In addition, Society representatives make on-site inspections of those buildings claiming to be barrier-free.

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
