#### Firms, workers urged to minimize arsenic exposure

The U.S. Department of Labor recently announced that it has received information from two large chemical companies linking inorganic arsenic compounds to high rates of lung and lymphatic cancer in exposed workers.

Last January, the National Institute of
Occupational Safety and Health of the U.S. tment of Health, Education and Welfard issued a study on inorganic arsenic which recommended a ten-fold reduction for employee exposure. This recommendation, based pon previous reports of increased cancer exposure limit from the present 0.5 to 0.05 milligrams of arsenic per cubic meter of air.

The North Jersey-Essex County Blood Bank, the state's largest community blood bank, has initiated a highly specialized tissue-typing ervice, according to Dr. Kamill Gal, medical The service, which offers anti-tissue antibody screening for high-risk transfesion cases as crossmatching for potential kidney donors and recipients, is now available to all

area hospitals.
"The point is that these are very difficult and sophisticated laboratory techniques. Many area-hospitals have the need and the clinical skill but lack the lab support," Dr. Gal said We thought there ought to be a central placwhere the service is available for a price which reflects the complexity of the procedure."

According to Dr. Gal, the average hospital would call upon the service no more than half a dozen times a year. "We do not anticipate, no vill we accept, a large-volume," he stated Tissue typing activity is very much in the forefront of blood banking, according to Dr. Gal, "Blood banks can do more than just take major role as a medical resource," he ob-

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



Among the suggested types of detention areas are depressions in parking lots; excavated basins; basins created through use of curbs, stabilized earth beams or dikes or other forms of grading which serve to temporarily impound and store Also suggested are rooftop storage on flat or

slightly pitched roofs; drywells or leeching basins; porous asphaltic pavement "which preserves the natural ground absorption capacity of a site and provides a subsurface reservoir for temporary storage of storm water," and systems of porous media, such a gravel trenches drained by porous wall or perforated pipe.

The ordinance also states any storm water detention facility "shall be designed to contain an amount equal to the increase in volume of runoff which would result from the develop-ment of any site."


