### White collar jobs are key to N.J. economic future

New Jersey's economic future is tied to high level white-collar employment, industrial jobs, the Regional Planning Association this week told the Governor's Commission on Economic Recovery at a public hearing in Newark.

Sheldon Pollack, information director, pointed out that during the economic decline between 1970 and 1973, the New Jersey sector of the Tri-State Region lost 125,000 industrial jobs while white-collar employment showed only a minor decline after climbing by 400,000 jobs between 1960 and 1974.

The earlier growth in blue-collar jobs represented on the whole relocation from New York City and not a significant increase for the Tri-State Region. Since then, much of the loss in New Jersey represented factories that moved out of the region, consistent with the national pattern of industrial relocation from the Northeast. There is little chance of regaining them, Pollack stated.

On the other hand, Pollack emphasized, the region—and New Jersey—have two great strengths to build on in expanding white collar employment: the large, diverse pool of high quality talent and a basic public transportation system that will be increasingly important in areas of energy conservation. To make the most of these, state policy and investment should strengthen existing cities, where office jobs are most appropriate, and improve their labor force for white-collar employment.

## Shared services for St. James get school board approval in 5-4 votes

**100 on hand as decision is reached**  
Opponents announce intention to go to court

The Springfield Board of Education Monday night approved two types of shared services for youngsters at St. James School and possibly other nonpublic schools. Both decisions came on five-to-four votes, with the alignment changing slightly from one issue to the other.

Board members acted before an audience of more than 100 persons at the Raymond Cluett School and other many members of the audience spoke at length on the issue, which had sparked the sharpest controversy in board history. The board rejected a motion with 200 signatures calling for a referendum on the matter. After the final vote, opponents of the shared services announced their intention to help for St. James youngsters in need of psychological testing, remedial reading and speech therapy, on a case-by-case basis as determined by the board.

The other permits students next year to the parent school, to participate in classes in home economics, industrial arts and physical education. The youngsters will be fitted into existing classes, perhaps three or four at a time.

Board spokesman agreed that the cost for both programs should be "reasonable." Both measures also apply to other nonpublic students in the district.

Many Americans don't really like having a lot of time off from work, in one big chunk. 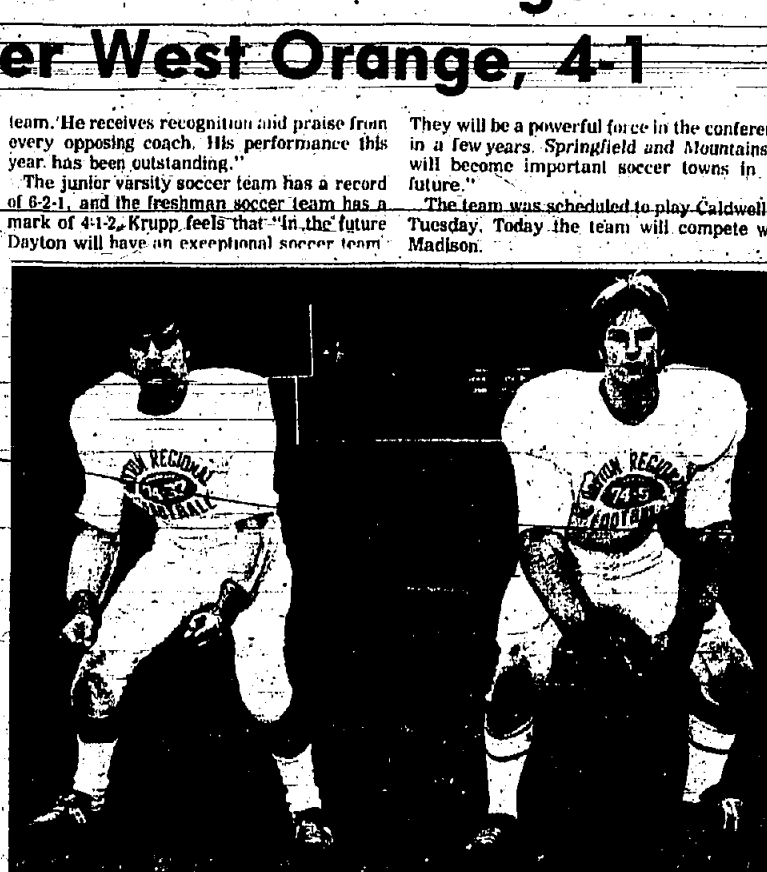

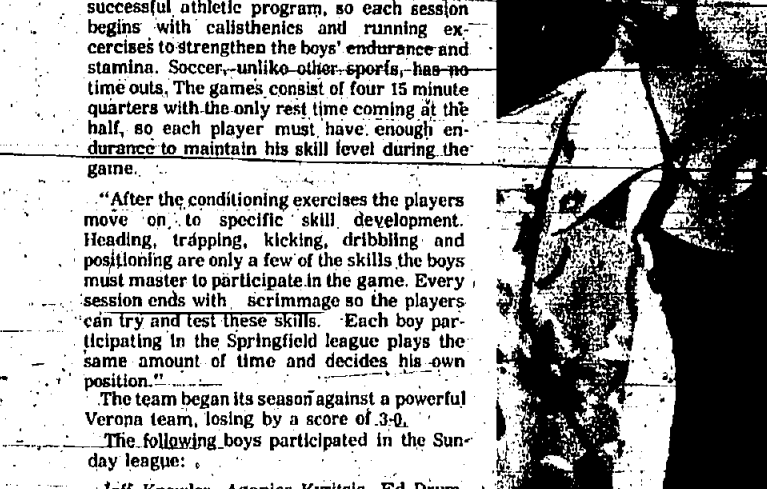

## Kleinert asks voters to OK economic recovery bonds

The economic recovery bonds to be sold on Nov. 4 are a "balanced package of proposals aimed at getting this state moving again in a practical and intelligent way that will serve the interests of all," Robert W. Kleinert said this week.

Kleinert is chairman of the Committee for New Jersey's Economic Recovery. He spoke at a luncheon meeting with Gov. Brendan Byrne and leading business leaders held at the Presidential Insurance Co. headquarters to kick off a campaign to promote passage of the \$922 million package of 1982 bond issues.

The four-part program is composed of \$600 million for highways and mass transit, \$100 million for housing, \$112 million for institutions and \$110 million for water and sewer.

Kleinert noted that the bond issues developed from an extensive study completed earlier this year by the Governor's Commission to Evaluate the Capital Needs of New Jersey.

"We have a product to sell between now and the first Tuesday in November," Kleinert said. "Fortunately, it's a good product. But time is short, and a great many New Jerseyans may not yet realize just how critical these bond issues are to the progress of our state and its turnaround in the economy."

He said that passage of the four issues "will serve the interests of everyone in this state. It is not a partisan, political or business effort or an effort designed to serve the particular interests of labor or commuters or the aged or the infirm or the environmentalists or this community or that community."
