Springfield detective praised for actions in Rt. 22 blaze

A Springfield detective has been credited by local fire officials with the safe evacuation of customers and employees from a Rt. 22 restaurant after a kitchen fire broke out there last week.

According to Fire Chief Robert Day, Det. Lt. Samuel Calabrese was dining at the Chis Dynasty, Rt. 22 West, at approximately 7 p.m. Nov. 11 when he smelled smoke and saw a haze near the kitchen area.

"He ran to the back and found several employees trying to fight a fire in the range exhaust hood," Day said. "According to the chief, Calabrese turned in the fire alarm and directed the building's approximately 100 workers and customers."

Day noted that when the engines arrived, flames were already visible through the roof of the two-story masonry structure. Sixteen members of the Fire Department, assisted by 21 volunteers, brought the blaze under control in about a half-hour, but remained on the scene for another 30 minutes.

One volunteer, Jack Brenner, suffered slight leg and hand injuries when he fell partially through the roof and another, Tom Erwin, suffered smoke inhalation. Both were treated at the scene.

According to Day, the fire was confined to the kitchen area, but there was structural damage to the roof and extensive smoke damage throughout the building. The cause of the blaze has not been determined, although an electrical short in a fan is suspected.

Items for recycling lost in trailer fire, arson suspected

Members of the Jonathan Dayton Regional High School Key Club saw a good portion of their monthly recycling collection literally go up in smoke Sunday night when five destroyed a tractor trailer and its load of newspapers and magazines donated to the drive.

According to Springfield Fire Chief Robert Day, arson is suspected in the fire in the 35-foot vehicle which was parked at the Echo Plaza Shopping Center lot, off Rt. 22 at the Mountaintop line. One Springfield fireman, Marcel Campion, suffered smoke inhalation and another received minor hand and leg injuries during the three-hour blaze, and required treatment at Overlook Hospital.

The alarm was called at 8 p.m. by a motorist who saw the flames from Rt. 22, but Day believes the fire started at least an hour before. "By the time we got there, flames were already shooting through the aluminum sides of the trailer," he said. Day, who said the doors to the vehicle were not locked, feels someone opened them and threw a match inside.

No figures were available on the amount of paper destroyed, but the Fire Chief noted that the trailer was "packed to the roof." "They could not have gotten one more magazine inside," he commented.

The paper had been collected in the Key Club's monthly recycling effort, conducted last Saturday. The trailer had been left in the lot for pickup on Monday.

Man fined, license revoked on charge of driving 111 mph

A Springfield man, charged with driving 111 mph in a 25-mile zone on Rt. 22, was fined \$125 and had his license revoked for 90 days after appearing before Judge Joseph A. Horowitz at the Nov. 10 session of Springfield Municipal Court.

The motorist, Larry J. Cohen, was one of three ticketed for speeding on the highway. Neal P. Crilly of South Orange paid \$35 for traveling 79 mph; Robert J. Carchillo of North Arlington, \$25 for 70 mph.

Another court action, a fine of \$225 was levied against Robert G. Kelly of Mountaintop for driving while his license was revoked; he had been apprehended on Morris avenue.

Floris C. Glasgall of Short Hills received a \$100 penalty for shoplifting \$3.81 worth of goods from a local Shop-Rite market. David E. Heller of Berkeley Heights, charged with issuing a bad check in the amount of \$35 to the same store, was fined \$50.

A \$50 fine and three months' probation were the penalties for Bertie Jones of Newark, arrested Oct. 18 at the intersection of Morris and Mountain avenues for loitering and creating a disturbance while under the influence of alcohol.

William C. Thompson of Irvington, arrested Sept. 22 at the Echo Plaza shopping center, was placed on six months' probation after being found guilty of possession of less than 25 grams of marijuana.

Forgery, stolen check cases against pair go to grand jury

A man and a woman who allegedly attempted to pass a forged, stolen check at a Rt. 22 store were ordered held for the Union County Grand Jury after appearing before Judge David A. Meeber of Westfield at Monday night's session of Springfield Municipal Court.

The defendants, Claire M. Tassilo of Fanwood and George Marzocchini of Elizabeth, were arrested Oct. 28 in Woodbridge on warrants issued by the Springfield police resulting from an Oct. 18 incident at Harmony House.

Miss Tassilo is accused of forgery, possession of a check stolen from the Scudder Trucking Co., Scotch Plains; possession of a stolen driver's license and an company credit card and attempting to pass a stolen check with intent to defraud.

The charges against Marzocchini are attempting to pass a stolen check with intent to defraud, conspiracy to pass a forged, stolen check, and possession of a stolen check.

Marmorstein also was to appear in Mountaintop Municipal Court last night, charged with a break-and-entry and theft of some \$4,500 in jewelry, clothing and other items from a borough home on Sept. 27.

The Dayton Bulldogs competed against such high school bands as the Scotch Plains and Hillsdale bands. The Dayton Bulldogs won two trophies for their performance.

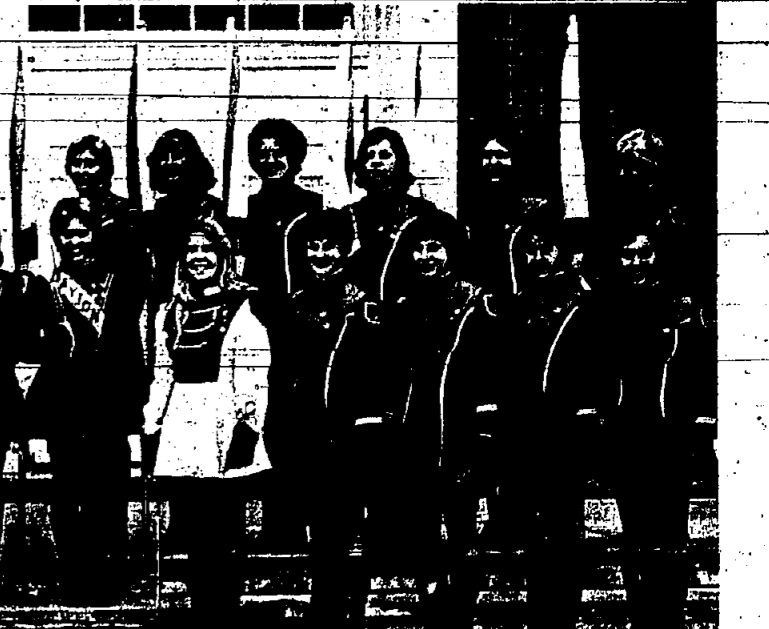

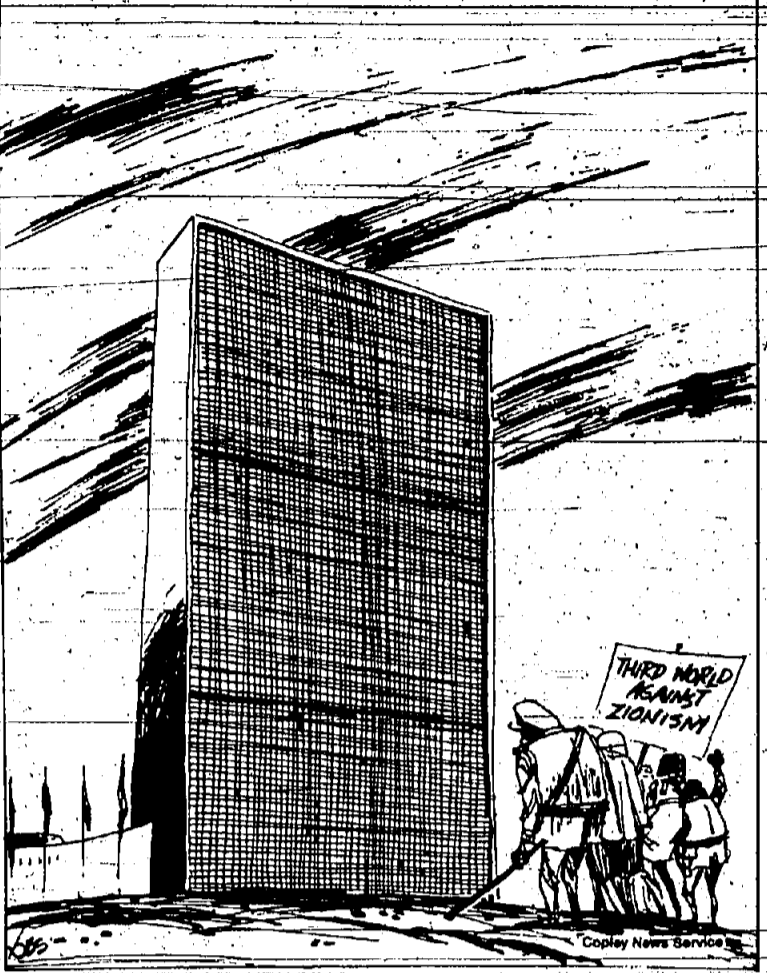

School district, following state order, begins pupil immunization drive

The Springfield school system has launched a campaign to make sure that all youngsters have received all immunizations required by state health authorities. A team of health workers will be on hand to administer the shots.

Immunizations in the Springfield school district will be conducted in accordance with the following legal criteria: Every pupil shall receive four doses of diphtheria, tetanus, toxoid and pertussis vaccine (DTP) and the last dose shall be administered not less than six months after the previous dose.

Every pupil shall have received at least three doses of polio vaccine, live oral, trivalent, and the last dose must have been administered not less than six months after previous dose.

Every pupil shall have received one dose of measles, mumps vaccine, live attenuated, or any vaccine combination containing measles virus vaccine, live attenuated, administered after one year of age.

Each parent or guardian of students attending the Springfield Township Public Schools will receive a questionnaire with existing school records and missing requirements for all registered pupils in the near future.

Parents or guardians are urged to check with the family health records or family physician which of the missing required immunizations their children have already received and which will need to be given.

Winning The Race Against Death

Mobile Intensive Care

Fifty percent of heart attack victims die before they reach the hospital. What can be done to save their lives? That's the question Overlook Hospital and area rescue squads have been working on.

Newest weapon in the team approach to saving lives is the Mobile Intensive Care Unit, a mini-hospital emergency room on wheels that is dispatched from Overlook to join the local rescue squad at the scene in cases of cardiac emergency.

Driven by a paramedic who has completed a state approved course of 400 hours, officially certifying him for advanced emergency cardiac care, the mobile unit also carries a resident physician from Overlook's House Staff.

Here's How It Works

As soon as the local rescue squad receives a call for cardiac emergency, the dispatcher will notify Overlook's Coronary Care Unit at the same time that the ambulance is alerted.

The Head Nurse or Cardiac Fellow on the hospital's CCU will make the determination whether to send the mobile unit, depending on symptoms.

Once dispatched, the unit can reach the most distant points in the Overlook service area in ten minutes, arriving shortly after the rescue squad has gone into immediate lifesaving action.

All Life-Saving Equipment

The vehicle carries all emergency drugs, defibrillator, intubation equipment and intravenous solutions, equipping it for every known lifesaving measure.

Armed with two-way radio and portable telemetry transmitter, the mobile unit can send an immediate electrocardiogram and other accurate data to the hospital, where a physician interprets the EKG, issuing immediate instructions to the on-site paramedic and emergency resident physician.

The resident accompanies the patient to the hospital as needed, riding with the Rescue Squad and keeping in touch with Overlook's Coronary Care Unit, where all is in readiness for the patient's arrival.

Thus, definitive treatment has begun pre-hospital. Not a precious second has been lost in the race against time and death.

Pilot Project

Overlook is one of five approved pilot projects in the state for paramedic training and development of the mobile intensive care unit. Setting up course requirements and guidelines, establishing training centers and certification, working with the N.J. State Department of Health, New Jersey Heart Association, The New Jersey Hospital Association and many other agencies concerned with emergency services, has been a challenging assignment, involving countless hours of work and planning by Overlook cardiologists.

Educational Goals

Overlook has conducted a number of seminars for the community on the subject of heart disease: how to prevent it through proper diet, lower cholesterol, planned exercise, non-smoking, and regular medical check-ups.

A fulltime coordinator of Community and Patient Education has been recently added to the staff to work directly in the area of public health education, coordinating programs with Rescue Squad personnel and other health oriented groups as well as cardiac patients and their families.

Area Rescue Squads

Most important has been liaison with area rescue squads to tailor the Overlook program to fit into their needs and plans, supplementing their services until their own squad members have qualified as advanced paramedics.

Four members of area squads were enrolled in this past summer's first official Paramedic Course. They will phase in on evening and weekend duty, replacing the coordinator on off hours, as their local squad duties and hours permit.

Working with the physician-director of community medicine, Coordinator Freedman will meet monthly with squad captains, also police and fire chiefs. He will continue to recruit squad members to the Paramedic program, as well as developing other intensive care services with the squads.

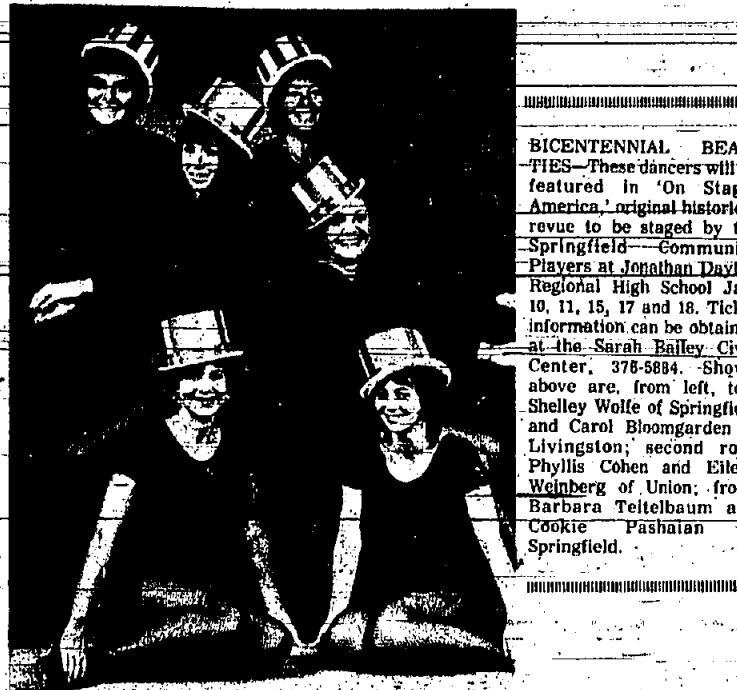

McDonough asks Rockefeller help in PATH aid bid

State Sen. Peter J. McDonough (R-2nd District) revealed this week that he has written to Vice President Nelson Rockefeller urging his intervention with Capital Urban Mass Transit Authority.

McDonough noted that the Central Railroad of New Jersey (CNJ) will increase approximately 20 percent on Dec. 1 and will be accompanied by a reduction in service. He noted the current state budget cut of \$6 million in subsidies and that an \$11 million increase is required next year.

"But I have no confidence whatever that the Legislature will approve these new monies," The Republican senator also cited New Jersey's \$50 million share for the Northeast Corridor system and the defeat of the transportation bond issue.

"It appears that virtually all financial circumstances are closing in to destroy mass transit in the central corridor area," McDonough continued.

McDonough predicted a massive migration of New York-based business and industry away from the metropolitan area because of the increasing difficulty management and other personnel will have getting to work. "I am convinced that opponents of the PATH extension plan who favor the upgrading of the bankrupt CNJ are simply wrong," McDonough said.

"If we have difficulty retaining \$6 million in subsidy monies, I cannot imagine the state providing its share of the multi-million upgrading project."
