Cooperation stressed in immunization drive

 Springfield Health Officer Henry Birne says that the health officers of Union County are cooperating in an effort to help schools and families meet the requirements of the new state immunization law.
 This new law, Chapter 14 of the New Jersey Statutes, became effective last September. It was passed in response to the unexpected measles epidemic which occurred in several counties in the state last year.
 The immunization requirements of all public school districts are being reviewed. The law also covers all children over one year old who are in private schools, nursery schools, kindergartens and day care centers.
 Basically, each child must have received four doses of the diphtheria-tetanus-pertussis and polio vaccine, three doses of the measles-mumps vaccine, one dose of the one-year-old mumps vaccine (German measles) vaccine, and one dose of the hepatitis B vaccine only if there are medical or religious contraindications.
 The school principal or director has the authority and responsibility to keep children who are not properly immunized in school. This is not, schools are going through their

measles records on each child and sending forms home to parents to help fill in missing information. Many parents have probably received these forms already.
 If you are one of these parents, it is very important for you to complete the form and return it to your child's school. It might be necessary for you to have your child tested to get the required information or to get him rechecked if he has had a previous measles infection.
 Public schools are able to find out how many children need each kind of immunization through the immunization records kept at each school. In addition, special clinics to provide these immunizations are being held in various locations. These clinics will be announced in the meantime. Immunizations are necessary to keep children who have children lacking some of the immunizations from attending school.
 The State Department of Health stresses that only the personal physician of the pupil, or the physician of the child's family doctor, or those who may not have ready access to private physicians, hospitals, or health centers, should be immunized. It is the open clinics to be conducted jointly by the schools and health departments.

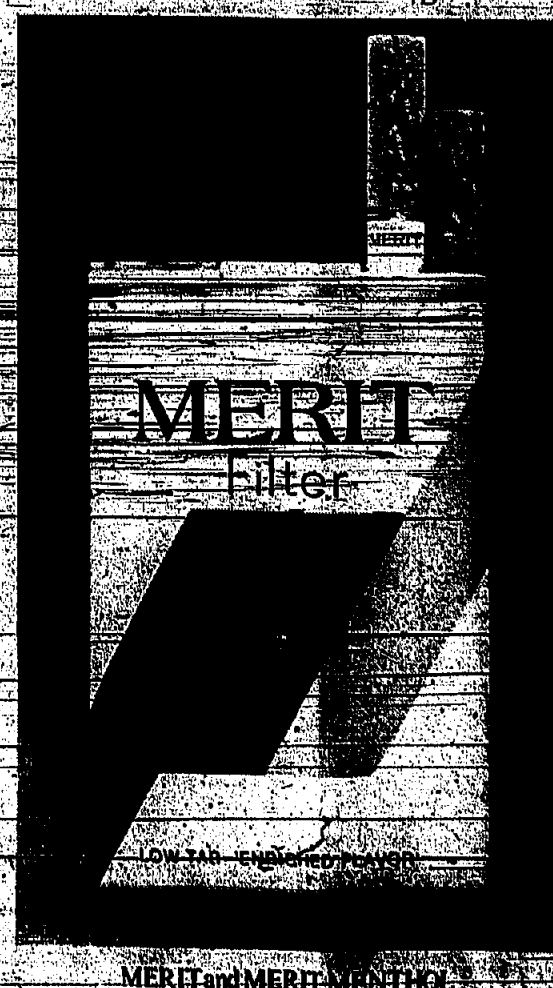
