# Cooperation stressed in immunization drive

The health officers of Union County and the Union County Medical Society are cooperating in an effort to help schools and families meet the requirements of the new state immunization law.

This new law, Chapter 14 of the New Jersey Statutes, became effective last September. It was passed in response to the unexpected measles epidemic which occurred in several sections of the state last year.

The immunization requirements of all public school districts are being reviewed. The law also covers all children over one year old who are in private schools, nursery schools, kindergartens and day care centers.

Basically, each child must have received four doses of the diphtheria-tetanus-pertussis and polio vaccine, three doses of the measles vaccine, one dose of the German measles vaccine, and one dose of the typhoid vaccine only if there are medical or religious contraindications.

The school principal or director has the authority and responsibility to keep children who are not properly immunized in school. In most cases, schools are going through their

**Bicentennial list of events planned by heritage group**

Plans will also be discussed for the New Jersey state capital program for counties being selected for the summer and fall of 1976.

**Wallace backer rips primary law**

Democratic coordinator for the George Wallace campaign for the Democratic presidential nomination have charged that "state Democratic leaders have purposely confused New Jersey voters" with a new law that creates "restrictive primaries."

Richard Frank, state coordinator for the 12th Congressional District, said a law recently enacted by Gov. Brendan Byrne forces voters to declare themselves in one primary 30 days prior to voting while candidates don't have to declare themselves until 45 days before balloting.

Frank criticized Democratic leaders, who he charged, were instrumental in pushing the legislation. Frank said the state should "let the voters choose a law which might prevent them from having a free choice in the upcoming election."


