## McKenzie is nominated judge of Superior Court

There will be new sets of name plates on the doors to some of the 120 judges and justices in the Union County Courthouse in Elizabeth when the State Senate acts on judicial nominations made last week by Gov. Brendan Byrne, the governor's spokesman, Donald McKenzie of Union and Bryan W. Griffin of Summit, both judges of the Union County Court, will be elevated in the Superior Court. It was the third time in three years that Byrne has nominated Joseph Barbieri of Elizabeth and William Dries of Plainfield, who now serve as judges in Union County District Court.

The District Court were Edward W. Basile Jr. of Plainfield and Lawrence Weiss of Westfield. The names of the new judges will be confirmed by the Senate on March 14.

Judge McKenzie was nominated to the District Court bench in 1970 by Gov. William Cahill. The Republican governor recommended elevation to the District Court two years later.

McKenzie, 52, was born in Schenectady, N.Y., and raised in Roselle. He attended Rutgers University, where he was captain of the basketball team and a member of Phi Kappa Kappa. He was awarded his law degree by Cornell University in 1948 and came to Union to clerk for Maurice Scotch and the late Gustave J. Hinckley. He was elected to the bench in 1961, serving until 1970, when he joined a firm until forming a partnership with B. Warren Hehl. McKenzie left the partnership when named to the District Court bench.

The most recent election was a party affair before joining the court system. He lost his bid for elective office—Union County freeholder in 1968 and served as legislative correspondent for Sen. George H. Mahon, who was a state senator, and as campaign manager in 1961 for Mrs. C. Canane's election as supervisor.

McKenzie has served as a legal counsel to the Union Township Board of Education and has been a member of the Regular Republican Club of Union, the Optimist Club in Union, the YMCA and Connecticut Farms Church.

**Conservation unit lists essay contest**
