## Chamber urges federal approval of atom generator

Proposed proposal for construction of a heating nuclear electric generating station proposed for an offshore site 12 miles northeast of Atlantic City was submitted to the Nuclear Safety and Licensing Board of the U.S. Nuclear Regulatory Commission by the New Jersey State Chamber of Commerce.

In a brief statement filed with the Atomic Safety and Licensing Board of the U.S. Nuclear Regulatory Commission, the chamber declared that the source of fuel for generating electricity have varying uncertainties and that the use of nuclear power for meeting the demand for electrical energy appears to be the wisest.

With over 50 nuclear power plants presently operating throughout the nation, none have been found to have significant impact on the environment or to wildlife or humans, the chamber statement said.

The chamber's statement was submitted in connection with a public hearing before the Nuclear Regulatory Commission of Westinghouse Electric Corporation, to construct two nuclear generating units which would be owned jointly by Atlantic City Electric Company, New Jersey Bell Telephone Company, and Public Service Electric & Gas Company to provide electric power for New Jersey.

The hearing was an extension of a previous one held in Jacksonville, Florida, where the fueling facility would be manufactured.

Noting that the nation and New Jersey will need more fuel to meet the growing demand for electric energy needs, the chamber said such heavy dependence upon crude oil imported—largely from politically unstable countries—is hazardous to the future well-being of the American people.

"Oil as a fuel, the chamber said, also is affected by environmental regulations which limit its use in New Jersey by virtue of the fact that it is a major source of coal, the chamber continued; is virtually precluded in New Jersey by the same environmental regulations. And the use of coal, fuel oil, natural gas and other fossil fuels has increased in recent years due to the fact that the chamber said.

Dr. Charles F. Peck, a professor of jersey and environmental engineering at New Jersey Institute of Technology, has named himself Vice president of business affairs of NJIT, and will be responsible for all business affairs in the new position.
