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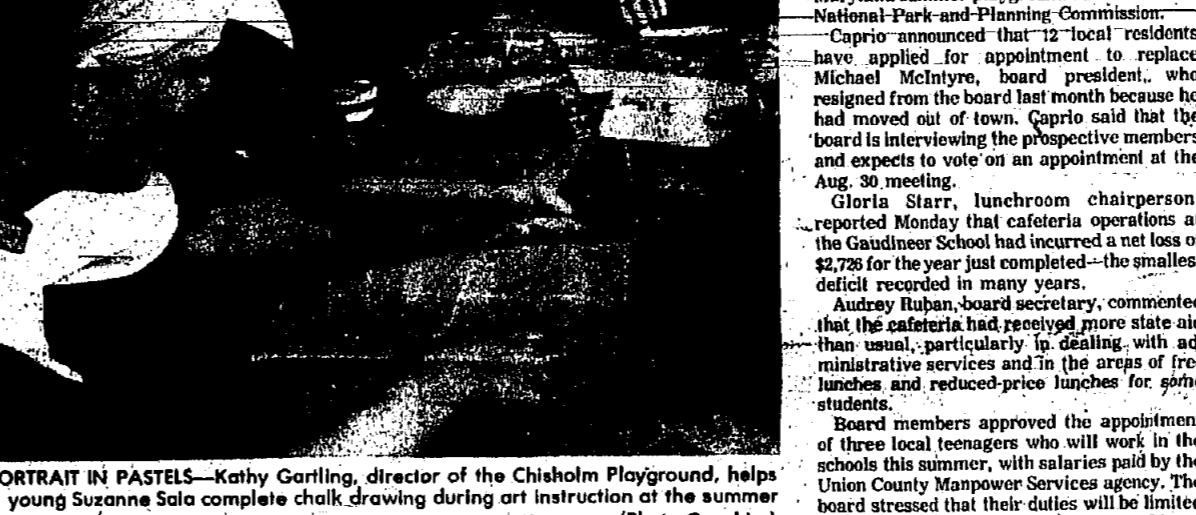

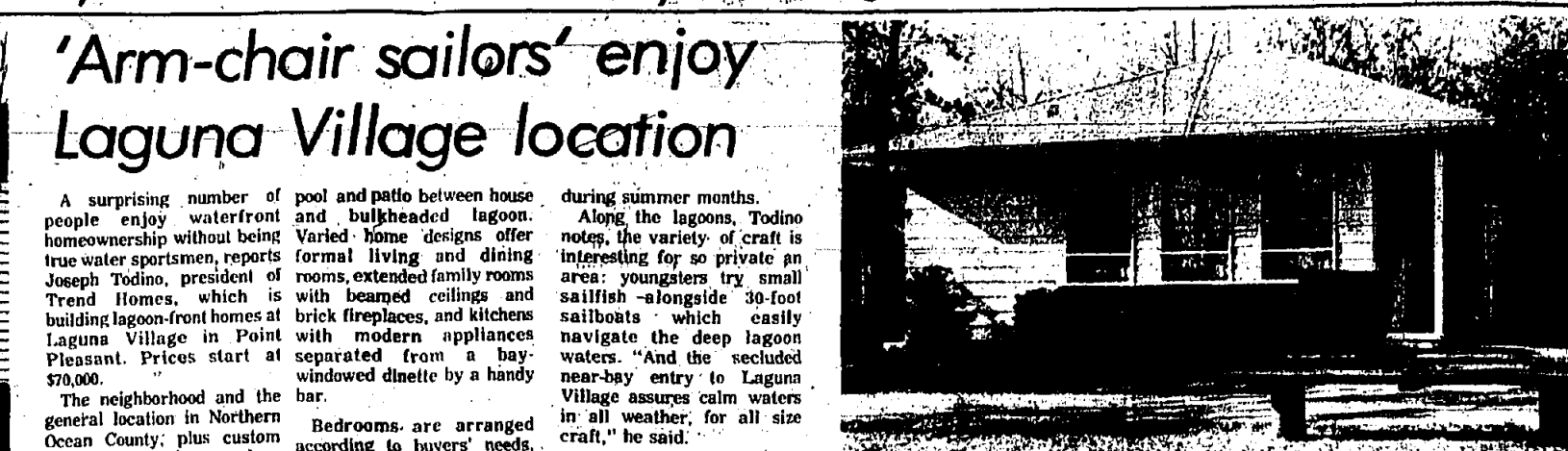

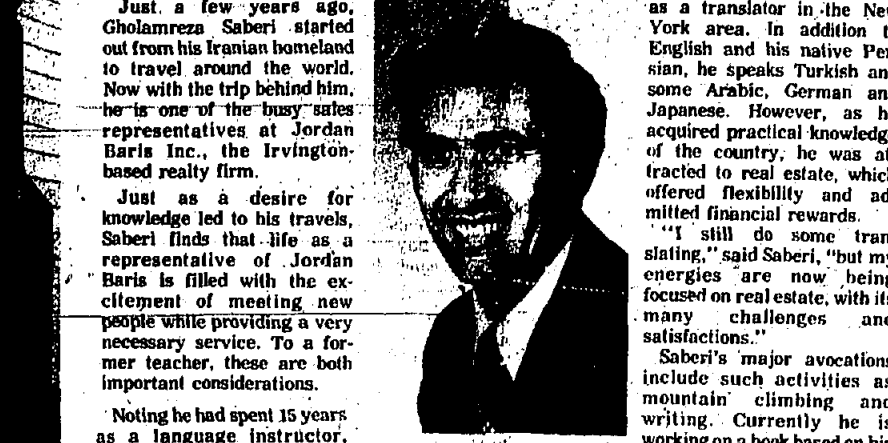

## Quarry control ordinance unveiled by governing body

The Township Committee Tuesday night introduced an ordinance to control local quarry operations. Ballast Road residents have long complained about noise and damage to their homes caused by blasting at the Houdaille Quarry adjacent to their neighborhood.

Committee member William Russo commented on the ordinance after it was approved in Warren Township which has been upheld by the courts. He added that the details are still under study, with some revisions anticipated at the Aug. 16 meeting. The measure is scheduled for a final hearing on Aug. 24.

More than 20 people attended the meeting at Town Hall. In other business, Mayor Robert Weisbeck debated operations of the Police Department with Marvin Teitelbaum, first man of a citizens' advisory committee named by the Volunteer's Benevolent Association.

The ordinance requires that all quarry operators (Houdaille is the only one in Springfield) be licensed by the township. Operators must file and live up to reclamation plans for their land. Slopes may not exceed 45 degrees, and loess must be retained to cover "cut" when quarry work is finished.

The plans must also include "such other factors that may bear upon or relate to the continued enjoyment and harmonious physical development of the township."

The ordinance creates the office of quarry inspector. Quarrying may be conducted only one hour per day, between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. Monday to Saturday. Rigid measures are required for dust control. A six-foot chain link fence must surround the property.

There must be a 50-foot level buffer area between work areas and adjoining property. Buffer areas must include a "solid and continuous landscape screen" consisting of "matured evergreen and deciduous trees and shrubs of such species of desirable as will provide a solid and continuous screen throughout the full course of the year."

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## Local district gets \$57,000 grant to continue preschool 'Dy Dee' class

The Division of School Programs of the New Jersey State Education Department has announced that the Springfield School District has been awarded a \$57,000 grant for the second year of its pilot preschool project for hearing impaired children. Known by the acronym "Dy Dee," the program is conducted in cooperation with the Milltown School for the Deaf.

Dr. Fred Beruchin, superintendent of schools, said that the purposes of the project are fourfold:

1. It provides both hearing impaired and normal hearing pre-school children with experiences in pre-academic, social, environmental and sensory-motor activities.

2. It promotes a natural and spontaneous interaction between hearing impaired and normal hearing pre-school children.

3. It enables the hearing impaired child to develop concepts along lines which are parallel to those of his hearing peers.

4. It helps all children maximize their respective total communication skills and abilities.

Hearing impaired pre-school children from Essex, Morris, Union, Somerset, Hudson and Middlesex counties and normal hearing pre-school children who reside in Springfield are eligible for the program which is housed in the Raymond-Clashroom School. Each school year consists of two 2½-hour sessions.
