"New Year's has come to symbolize a time of looking back at the past and taking stock of where we are, and a time looking forward and making resolutions regarding where we are heading, and how we can get there effectively."

"If imbalances appear in our recreational programs, we must take the steps necessary to redress them."

"We must have an opportunity in developing mix of governmental and community services to the taxpayer to enhance the quality of their lives in Springfield. We intend to do this through the economic, economically and a timely fashion."

The task of the new Springfield Township Committee will be difficult, but then the task of effective self-government is always demanding.

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
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## LIBRARY Novelist's private hell

**PSYCHOLOGICAL APPROACH**  
TO EDITH WHARTON

By Cynthia H. Johnson

To re-create the artist, Edith Wharton, we must slowly unravel her past, back-tracking from the elderly, mature novelist, to the middle-aged woman, to the young matron, to the debutante, to the "smart, desolate, lonely, and comfortable" girl of words. She managed to endure the climate and food, and how they survived socially. The group was impressed by the superb achievements of the Seabees, and the cheerful camaraderie of the New Zealanders. Longtime editor and contributor of the "Year Book," the author, managing editor, and editor-in-chief, was an eminently pleasant and amiable hostess. Her biography feels that the child's great need for love and security is denied by his mother, but only somewhat balanced by a powerful affection; for her son expressed itself in tears of consolation, and she was able to console him.

Because of her emotional impoverishment, Edith's esthetic sensibilities intensified. This, with her personal life transferred from the mode of consciousness to the mode of unconsciousness, she was able to control and order. But her problems increased with adolescence. Her puritanical mother and a society shut off from all social knowledge crippled the passionate girl as a writer.

Her first literary ventures were interrupted by a series of events over a period of 11 years: debut romantic encounters, travel, marriage to Edward Wharton. Most of her novels and short stories were written during this period.

Edith Wharton's life story through the eyes of the author who finds Wharton's many sides integrated into the pattern of her works. Plagued by serious emotional problems, she was ultimately able to confront them and meet them on their terms.






