## Board promotes man it just demoted Cieri, Kaish assume top posts

### Dems now control all five seats New mayor vows to maintain balance

By ABNER GOLD

The first task of local government this year will be to use "public resources to continue to maintain balance in the community," Mayor William Cieri said in his inaugural address on Monday.

Speaking at the Township Committee's organization meeting at Town Hall, the mayor placed top priority on flood control, landlord-tenant relations, the police and fire departments, maintenance of the zoning code and continuation of the recreation program. Cieri and Stanley Kaish were sworn in for their first three-year terms on the governing body, now all Democratic for the first time in more than 18 years. Cieri was named Township Committee chairman, with the title of mayor, and Kaish was chosen as deputy mayor.

Rev. Robert E. Levine of Temple Beth Ahm offered the invocation. Monsignor Francis X. Coyle of St. James Church pronounced the benediction. The program opened with the presentation of the colors by the color guard of Springfield Continental Post, American Legion.

Helping Mayor Joanne Rajoppl praised Cieri for his leadership ability. Nothing that she will serve this year in the dual capacity of Township Committee member and Union County freeholder, she said that she will work for all county residents in general, and particularly for the people of Springfield.

Committee member Robert Welchek said he looks forward to serving with Cieri and Kaish for many years. Pointing out that this is the "first one-party committee in many years," he added, "We all have individual minds. We will serve all the people of the community with the high standards they have been accustomed to."

Kaish noted that he was the only one on the date not a member of a former mayor. He said that he is often asked why he and his colleagues devote so much time to municipal government. "What we do here," he said, "is to provide a better quality of life for our citizens. We are concerned with the elimination of most flood problems, pointing also to the municipal swim pool and local rent controls. All this came about through action by those sitting up here. I pledge to continue this tradition."

Nick Stiles recalled that he was the first of the present committee members to be elected, in 1969. He said, "It has been a great experience, serving the community for all these years. I am proud of all the people elected since then, Democrats and Republicans." He added, "Bill Cieri is a sincere and dedicated person; he will be a fine mayor."

## Rt. 22 mall opposition mobilizing

With predicted opposition from Springfield, the developers expected to file plans today with the Union Township Building Department for a plant shopping mall at the site of the drive-in theater and state motor vehicle inspection station on Rt. 22 in Union.

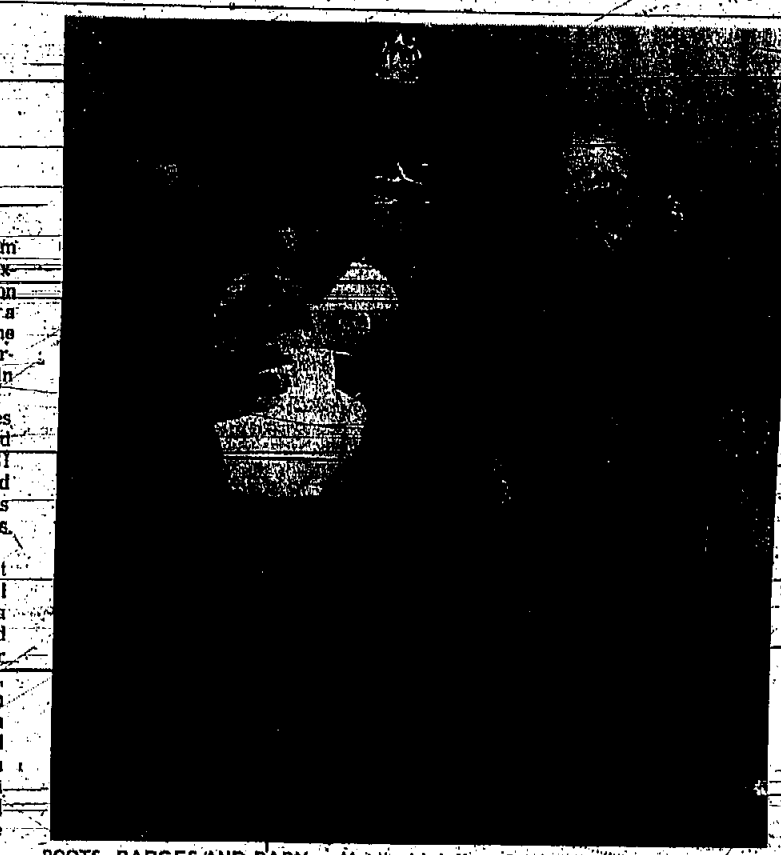
State Department of Motor Vehicles officials confirmed that their leaders for the inspection station, SEI Properties, has asked them to find another site. Repeatedly DMV officials are looking in Springfield, as well as Union, for a new location.

Rumored sporadically in recent years, the shopping-center proposal surfaced again last summer when a spokesman for SEI Properties said plans were "on the drawing board" for a two-story structure equipped with heated and air-conditioned, on Rt. 22 in Union abutting Michigan avenue in Kenilworth. K-Mart reportedly would be one of the retail tenants, with others including a supermarket, twin cinemas, a bank, an office building and 50 to 70 small shops. There would be parking for 1,500 cars.

Although Springfield does not adjoin the site, several members of the local Township Committee took stands against the mall last summer. Environmental Commission member Allan Zeller said the mall would generate traffic problems locally, and might reduce county revenues. It is 22 overpass, hotly opposed in Springfield.

Township Committeewoman Joanne Rajoppl, a Democrat and former mayor, asked Zeller, a Republican, to speak out in Union when the mall proposal formally reached that body's Board of Adjustment, joining bipartisan opposition to the mall was Stanley Kaish, then a candidate for Township Committee and now deputy mayor.

## Residents register 352 smoke alarms for reminder service

More than 350 Springfield families registered their household smoke detectors during the first three months of the Fire Department's reminder plan. And firemen are urging those who received detectors as holiday gifts to take advantage of the free service.

Fremont will telephone each registered home at six-month intervals and remind the family to replace batteries, if necessary, and to check test buttons and warning lights on the detector. To obtain the service, a Springfield resident may telephone or stop by fire department headquarters, next to Town Hall. Fremont Donald Stewart and William Gras, program coordinators, asked telephone callers to use the non-emergency number, 374-0144, when registering smoke detectors.

Gras said registration has continued at the rate of more than 100 homes per month since the service started in October, and 152 detectors were listed in our files before Christmas.

Fremont said the registration service also will help residents in cases such as the recall of some defective detector units by BRK electronics, in cooperation with the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission. Of the registered detectors in Springfield, Fremont said, none is subject to the recall.

But firemen warned owners of unregistered detectors to make sure they are not depending upon defective units.

Gras said the manufacturer is recalling BRK SS 780 series smoke detectors produced from March 1974 to September 1975.

"Some of these units were apparently assembled with incorrect resistors and could cause failure of the detector and possible fire," Gras explained. "The units subject to this recall are 100-volt AC-powered models marketed by BRK, AMP, ITB and Sears. Battery-operated models are not involved."

Gras said he or Stewart could be contacted at headquarters by anyone however believing he might have one of the detectors subject to recall.

## Boosters press bid at Dayton

### Seek more action on varsity sports

The Union County Regional High School District Board of Education, facing standing-room crowds of protesters when it stripped Louis Peragallo of his title as athletic director last fall, Tuesday appointed him to a higher level management position, including duties as athletic director.

Board members said he would fill a new management position as director of athletics, health, student activities and driver education either at the Dayton-Hessley campus in Kenilworth or the Arthur Thomas campus in Clark. They left it to the administration to choose between the two campuses.

The new management position already has been filled at each of the other regional campuses. Jonathan Dayton in Springfield and Gov. Livingston in Berkeley Heights.

A delegation of 12 Dayton Boosters Club members attended the Board of Education meeting Tuesday to make it clear that neither appointment of the athletic director—Charles Baruchin of Lindenhurst, N.Y., who started work Tuesday nor preliminary action on the Miesel Fieldhouse has ended their dissatisfaction with the Springfield-Mountainides sports program.

Natalie Waldt, senior board member from Springfield, announced Tuesday night that the district's buildings and grounds committee has come up with a 22-point plan for repairing and renovating the fieldhouse. She said the plan has been forwarded to the business office for cost accounting.

"They still haven't come up with answers to our big questions," said Mel Vargas.

Vargas, Jim Adams, Harold (Lefty) Ruggier and Sandy Irene, vice-president of the Boosters Club, described their "big questions" as: (1) criteria for selecting and evaluating coaches and (2) philosophies on how students are motivated to participate in sports and chosen for teams.

From 12 to 30 Dayton Boosters Club members and friends have been attending weekly board meetings for a month to demand upgrading of athletics.

"Sure we don't like the top-sid scores," said Vargas about football, for example. "But it isn't lasting were we selling about. We're talking about how you motivate kids."

Club members have been especially bitter about a Dayton girl who lettered three years in gymnasium. She was bumped from the team as a freshman. They said "in boys' baseball, for example, players are told they have less chance to make the team until they are seniors."

"It shows the lack of consistency," said Vargas. "There is no real policy. One day you're bumped to make room for a freshman. It isn't based strictly on ability. The freshman merely has potential." The senior has (Continued on page 2)

## Board race still needs candidates

With the filing deadline at 4 p.m. today, there was still only one declared candidate at press time for three board seats to be filled in the Feb. 14 election of the Springfield School District.

At 21, Simpson, who is a township recreation commissioner, was the youngest candidate in memory. She is a product of local schools, from kindergarten on, and a Kean College student. Heller is a recent college graduate and a substitute teacher.

The school board will be headed by its senior member, August Caprio, and its president, Charles Cohn, as well as member Doris Gittes. Friends were trying to persuade them to change their (Continued on page 2)

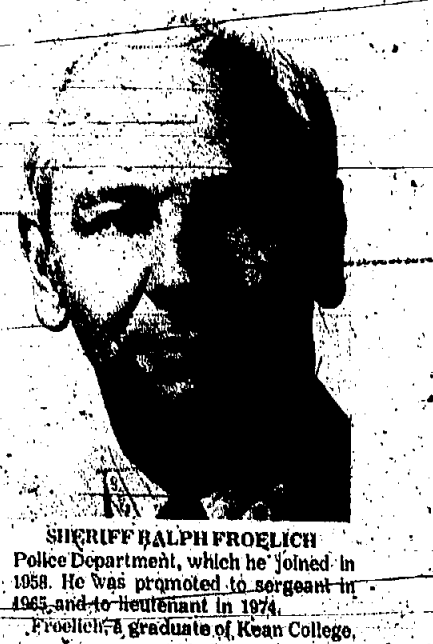
## Sheriff to address fete for Sandmeier

## Vets get increased pensions

More than a million disabled veterans and 1.3 million widows and their children will receive a 6.5 percent increase in their January pension checks, the Veterans Administration said today.

The increase was contained in legislation proposed in May by VA Administrator Max Cleland and signed by President Carter on Dec. 2. It comes exactly a year after the last VA pension increase and is the 10th increase granted by Congress since 1960.

Veterans with service-connected disabilities had already received a 6.5 percent increase in their VA compensation checks by virtue of other legislation that went into effect Oct. 1.

The new legislation sets the basic pension rate from \$5 to \$222 per month, according to income.

Cleland said it also insures that no one will lose a pension solely because of this year's "boost" in Social Security benefits.

The legislation raises the basic monthly pension rate for veterans whose health requires the regular aid and attendance of another person from \$15 to \$165.

Permanently housebound veterans not requiring the aid and attendance of another person will receive an additional \$61 per month.

The new pension bill also includes a 6.5 percent increase in payments to 60,000 parents-of-deceased veterans receiving dependency and indemnity compensation payments.

The five-year cost-of-living increase is estimated at just over \$789 million.

## Director of VA calls pamphlet 'false, a hoax'

James R. Purdy, director of the Veterans Administration regional office in Newark, denounced a week that a "false and misleading" pamphlet is again being distributed throughout New Jersey.

The pamphlet advises that a special dividend is available to all World War II veterans "who held National Service Life Insurance regardless of whether the insurance was continued after separation from service."

The pamphlet urges veterans to apply directly to the VA Center, Philadelphia, to receive the "special dividend."

Purdy stated that the information is "erroneous and a cruel hoax." He advised that this type of material has been distributed on many occasions over the past several years.

"The volume of inquiries received has seriously disrupted the VA's ability to carry on its normal operation," Purdy suggested that veterans ignore such pamphlets and assured veterans that no payment would be served in writing to the insurance center.

## Trend is seen as people move from Northern cities to South

Although there is disagreement on whether there is a trend toward less mobility, there is no question where Americans are moving to and where the population flow is coming from, the National Association of Realtors reported this week.

American in increasing numbers are migrating from the heavily populated Northeast and North Central regions to the South and West. And according to the Census Bureau, a shift in population to non-metropolitan areas is also evident.

Between 1965 and 1970, according to the Census Bureau, nearly 2,000,000 people left the Northeast. However, since 1.3 million people migrated to the region, the Northeast showed a net migration loss of 700,000 for the period.

Nearly 2.4 million people left the region in the next five years, and slightly more than 1,000,000 moved there during 1970-75. Thus, the region recorded a net migration loss of more than 1.3 million in the first five years of the decade.

The North Central region suffered similar population losses during the 10 year period. The region's net migrational loss for 1965-70 totaled about 636,000 (1.2 million, between 1970-75).

On the other side of the coin, both the South and West recorded net migration gains between 1965 and 1975.

Between 1965 and 1970, about 3.1 million people moved into the South, while just under 2.5 million left between 1965 and 1970 for a net increase in population of more than 650,000 in the next five-year span.

Arrivals increased and departures decreased. The result was a net increase of 1.8 million people.

The number of people moving to the West totaled 693,000 from 1965-70. And, despite increases in both emigration and migration during the following five-year span, net migration rose to 708,000 for that period.

Several southern and western states have experienced impressive population gains through emigration. Arizona's population grew 27.9 percent between 1970 and 1976, 33.1 percent attributable to net migration.

Florida's population rose 22.9 percent between 1970 and 1976, 20.7 percent due to net migration. Georgia's population increased 14 percent between 1970 and 1976.

At the other end of the scale, 16 states and the District of Columbia recorded net migration losses between 1970 and 1976, according to the Census Bureau, and two states—Rhode Island and New York—actually lost population.

Between 1965 and 1976, central cities gained 2,650,000 persons through emigration, but 4,605,000 persons left for a net loss of 1,955,000. Nearly two-thirds of people leaving the central cities—some 3,490,000—settled in the suburbs. The other third—about 1,165,000—settled in non-metropolitan areas.

Rural counties—particularly those with a state university of attractive recreation or retirement centers—have attracted new residents in recent years, according to Kristin A. Hansen, Census Bureau statistician. The Ozarks typically such an area, she said.

On Sunday, the Friends of the Museum will bring the Paper Bag Pipers to the auditorium stage for 2 and 4 p.m. presentations of their new "I Won't Take a Bath" fantasy.

The film for young people Jan. 14 and 15 will transport the audience to Jules Verne's "Mysterious Island."

Then at 3 p.m. Jan. 15, the Museum will recognize Martin Luther King's birthday with a screening of "The Day After Tomorrow," a documentary account of the civil rights march on Washington in 1963.

Reflections, a social group for mature singles interested in cultural programs, meets the first Sunday and third Thursday of the month at the Y, 700 Northfield Avenue, West Orange.

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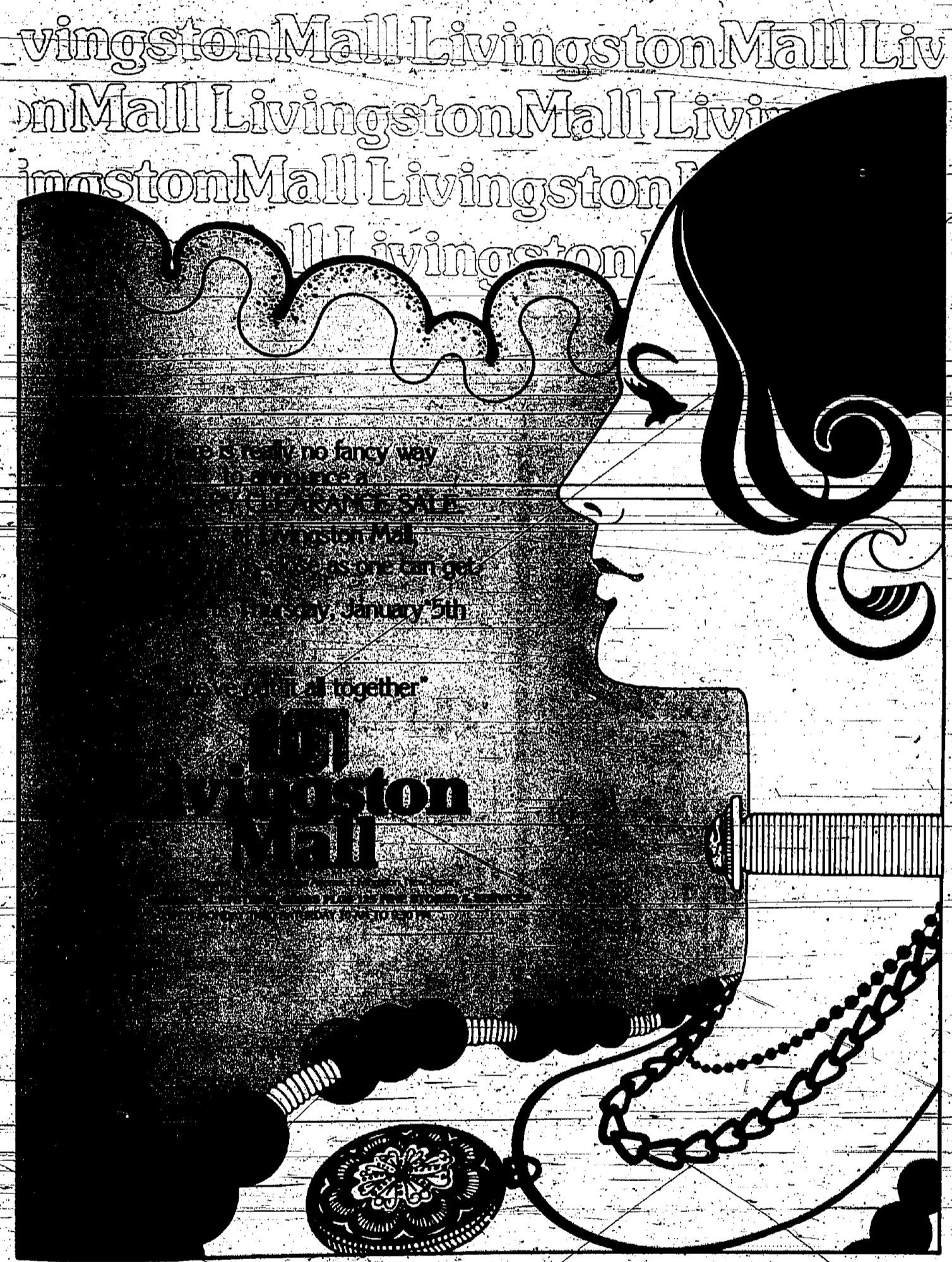




