State parks cut boat launching, parking prices

A reduction in weekday and weekend fees at all New Jersey state parks has been put into effect by the Department Environmental Protection (DEP). Summer parking rates, from have been reduced by a dollar. For example, the weekday parking rate at Island Beach State Park is now \$3 per Round Valley and Spruce Run ecreation areas the weekday rate

Alfred T. Guido, acting director of DEP's Division of Parks and Forestry, said the weekday park fees were reduced to encourage greater use of the state's recreation facilities from Monday through Friday For example, the weekday parking fee at seven state parks -- Allaire, Belleplain, Cheesequake, Lebanon, Ringwood Skylands, Stokes (Stony Lake) and Wawayanda — now is only \$1. Motorcycle and moped parking fees have been lowered to \$1. Daily launthing fees have been reduced to \$1 a boat at Hopatcong, Spruce Run and Wharton (Crowley Landing). Annua boat launching permits have been have been eliminated at Bass River, Belleplain, Bull's Island, High Point,

Parvin, Stokes and Worthington. Walk-in charges have been eliminated in 15 areas. A 50-cent walkin fee for those 12 and over will remain at_Barnegat Lighthouse, Bass River State Forest, Lake Hopatcong State Park, Round Valley, Spruce Swartswood and Parvin. There is no parking fee at Parvin. No fee is charged for New Jersey







as-"kiddie porn" in the news media, isone of the least discussed aspects of the billion dollar pornography business. The sexual exploitation of children for profit is a shocking and distasteful subject, and actual cases of such abuse exemplify the degradation and horror to which many innocent children are

Child porn is also a relatively new area of the porno business, and the subject has only recently received egislative attention—at both the state

As sponsor of the anti-child pornography bill that was just signed into law by Governor Brendan Byrne, I am often asked how widespread the

Researchers estimate that hundreds of thousands of children are involved in activities concerning sex for sale. The over 260 nationally-distributed books and magazines depicting children engaged in sexual acts use as subjects many of the nearly one-million runaways who leave abusive or neglectful homes each year. Even more hocking is theuseof children, often as he trade by their parents or guardians While many courts and civil liberties

advocates argue that the First Amendment of our Constitution protects adults who wish to participate children in such material can often be prevented under our legal system. Beginning with the passage of child labor laws less than one hundred years ago, we have come to realize that childhood is a special, unique phase of human development. Crimes against children are, in most instances, more deplorable because of the defen selessness and innocence of the victim. It is now generally recognized that the state has a right to protect children

from criminal abuse, even in cases where the parent is involved. Our New Jersey law now prohibits the sexual exploitation of children in photographs or films, and ma anyone, even a parent or guardian, who permits or participates in such activity, guilty of a high misdemeanor. Offen-





President Carter's half a trillion lollar federal budget is now with Congress, and over the next few months s sure to undergo extensive changes So all the budget details we have been hearing and reading about during the past week should not be taken as an inflexible account of spending levels and policies to be followed in fiscal 1979. A broad outline has been drawn, but significant details are open to revision increase the tax cuts beyond the \$25. billion level recommended by the President. In addition, I want a formula established ensuring that meaningful tax cuts go to middle-income families Statistics show that middle-income Americans bear the brunt of tax burlens. Yet they receive little benefit. under the Administration tax program

uthority for foreign aid. While increasing foreign aid. President Carter proposes pegging the highly successful public works program at 1977 levels. It's a case of lavishly aiding foreigners while holding back on badly needed job-producing programs for out-of-work Americans. Funds have been included to reimiemonstration projects as part of the welfare program. The goal of this proposed spending is sound; but it could achieved far more effectively through tax incentives encouraging usiness to expand and in-so-doing to

create permanent new jobs.

Many aspects of the President's budget deserve praise. For example, that he has apparently decided not to embark on costly, major new programs in the next fiscal year. And he is expanding the federal college scholarship programs to make more middle-income students eligible.

In dollar distribution, the budget has sentially the same look as in recent years. Nearly one-fourth of the total spending is earmarked for defense; one-fifth for Social Security, and one tenth for interest on government

Four major programs-Medicare, Medicaid, unemployment compensation and pension checks—take the spending to two-thirds of the total. All other government services and
