In these car-pooling days, it is common for one mother to drive three children to nursery school. But there aren't many car-poolers like the one Mrs. Peri operates for three little passengers, all age 3.

Before driving them, Mrs. Peri says she gets dressed and gives them breakfast. And makes sure each is properly bundled up in cold weather. She's as close as a mother to all three. In fact, she is the mother of all three—Amie, Elissa and Robyn. Peri, the only triplets in Springfield.

It takes a little organization, but we're up bright and early and then bright and early," says Mrs. Peri. "Each has a very different personality, one of a kind, although they happened to be born on the same day," says their mother.

It was Nov. 26, 1974, which happened to be Thanksgiving Day. And Mrs. Peri and her husband, Louis, a medical doctor, have been thankful ever since. "They have other friends, too, but of course, they're great playmates for each other. They cook together, play house together, sing together, talk together—and, gee, it's fun to be with them."

Housing group cites 2 retiring members

The Springfield Senior Citizens Council is presently seeking nominations for two retiring board members, James F. Smith and Donald Rossetet.

The not-profit corporation will operate Springfield's \$4.2 million federally-funded senior citizens housing project containing 137 apartments. Construction is scheduled to be completed by April 1979.

Smith was a charter member of the corporation and served on the board for seven years. Rossetet served four years.

The board praised their integrity and performance in serving the needs of the community.

Arthur Falkin, president of the corporation, said that the retiring members' experience in real estate management, accounting, and government regulations have been of inestimable value throughout the difficult planning years of the project.

Rossetet said, "We shall miss your tact and your keen attention to details in public relations, your correspondence in planning and your assistance in attending technical matters in Trenton."

The letters and certificates of appreciation were signed by Beatrice Epstein, corporate president; the Rev. Paul J. Koehn, vice president; Janice Bongiovanni, secretary; Bernard Koller, treasurer; and others who were members of the board last year.

Sandra Garwin, Thomas Brown, and Rabbi Howard Shapiro, Einstein said state and federal regulations will prevent the corporation from accepting pre-approached forces for membership. She added that "hundreds" of informal inquiries have demonstrated a need for senior citizens housing.

Expansion plan inaugurated by psychiatric unit

As a first step in expansion of its services to North-Havenside, Berkeley Heights, Summit, Springfield, Union and Mountaintop, the Union County Psychiatric Center is adding staff personnel to its Summit office.

Frances Chvala, psychiatric social worker, currently in the Elizabeth office, will be reassigned and begin Feb. 15 in Summit. Eventually, her office will increase to full time for the community's total care.

Jean Shigekane has joined the Summit staff as a senior psychologist transferring from Plainfield.

These staff additions in Summit, Haddock said, are being made to meet the growing demand for the clinic's outpatient psychiatric services and its non-for-profit public agency, which offers its services on an ability-to-pay basis.

The clinic is supported by fees from patients based on a sliding scale, grants from state, county and municipal governments, United Ways, school boards and the courts.

Land in the Poconos offers good return

Burying your savings in a crock in the backyard is considered a little old-fashioned—but there's another way of putting them into the ground that makes more sense, according to the Larsen brothers.

The developers of Big Bass Lake in the Poconos point out that investment in a leisure home is one of the soundest ways of saving available to a young couple today.

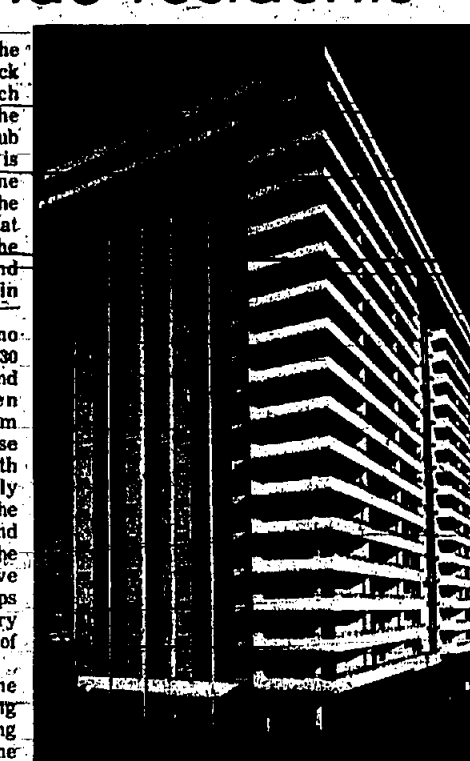
Warm neighborhood for condo residents

UC data makes it official: January snows set mark

The greatest one-month snowfall recorded by Union College's U.S. Cooperative Weather Station, which has been in operation continuously since Jan. 1, 1892, came last month.

Raymond J. Daly, director, reported that a total of 24.5 inches of snow fell in January, according to his monthly meteorological summary to the National Weather Service. There were 12 inches of snow on Friday, Jan. 20.

The mean temperature of 28.99 degrees (3.05 degrees below normal) was an improvement over the previous January when the mean temperature was 21.6 degrees, he noted.

The highest temperature for the month was 60 degrees on Jan. 9; the lowest was three degrees on Jan. 3. The highest temperature for January in the station's records was 68 degrees in 1897 and 1974. The lowest January temperature on record was minus-eight degrees in 1961.

The total precipitation for the month, Daly reported, was 8.28 inches, 5.43 inches above normal, making it the wettest January on station records. The lowest January rainfall on record was 0.56 inches in 1976.

Total degree days for the month was 1,188, bringing the total from the start of the heating season on September 1, 1977, to 9,728. Total degree days at this time last year, Daly stated, was 2,510, with January accounting for 1,326 of those degree days.

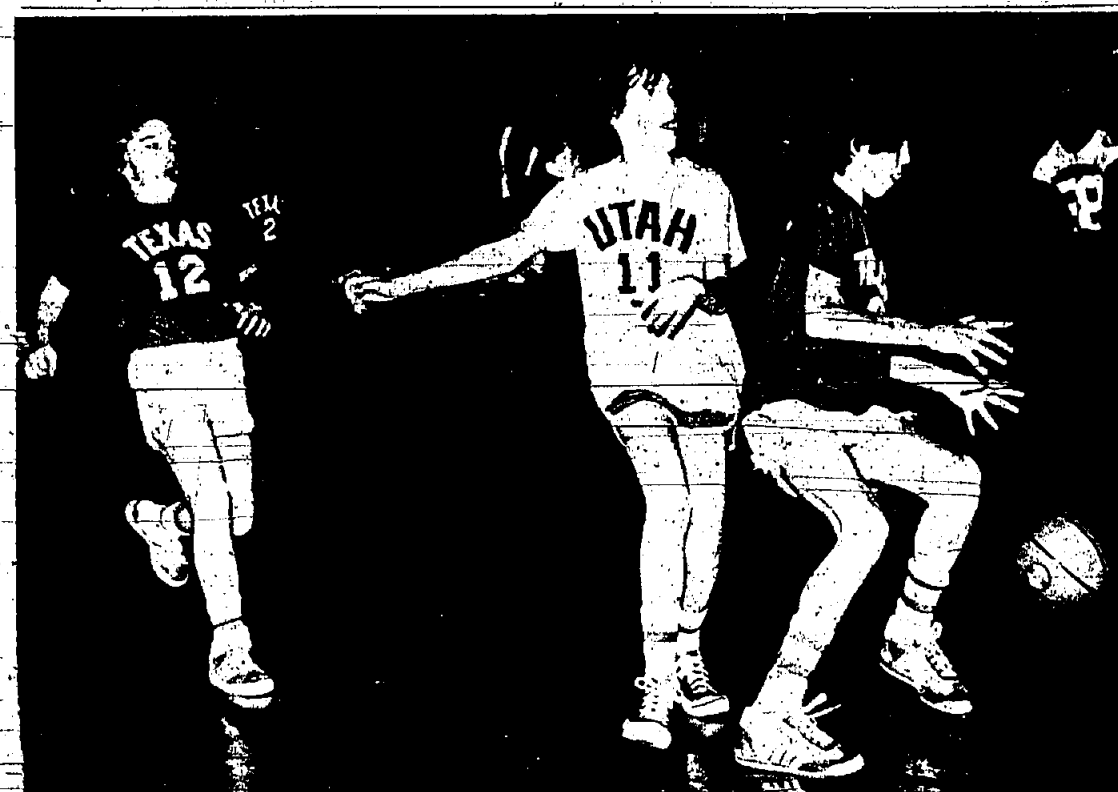
