Inside the van were two chairs, two stereo AM-FM radios and a set of speakers.

The three suspects—Fernando Brito, 18, Joseph Abrantes, 20, and Jose Peixoto, 19, all of Newark—were charged in Springfield with break-and-entry, larceny and possession of burglary tools.



Two-way TV hook-up aids in college course

Who says you can't be in two places at once?

With the aid of modern technology Ernest Gross of Rutgers University is able to teach labor relations in more than a dozen places at one time.

To accomplish this seemingly difficult feat, Gross, chairman of the public education department of the state university's Institute of Management and Labor Relations (IMLR), has hooked up with a closed circuit two-way television network that transmits its programs by microwave.

Using the Metropolitan Regional Council's system, MRC-TV, Gross and other members of his department can teach from a central location and still "see" their students in New Jersey, New York and Connecticut.

MRC-TV has been broadcasting from the roof of One World Trade Center in New York City to studios in an approximately 50-mile radius since 1973. Studios in Essex, Bergen, Hudson, Middlesex and Union counties were among the first established.

Since 1976 Gross' staff has designed five programs concerning public sector labor relations, including "Negotiating a Collective Bargaining Agreement for Public Employers" and "Administering the Public Labor Agreement."

The latest program developed, a two-hour discussion of the New Jersey fire and police compulsory arbitration law, was recently aired.

"They're not 'Gone With the Wind' or 'The Greatest Story Ever Told,'" Gross said with a laugh, "but based on the response, I am convinced they're genuine learning experiences."

Each studio, which is usually set up in the local government building, is equipped with a couple of television monitors and a remote control-
